In this connection I would like to suggest that some excuse be made for the apparent neglect of the British Parliament in the early days, as I believe that the first vote of that body to assist education at home was somewhere around 1833, which might explain their neglect of such matters in a colony.

Dear Doctor Nicholson :-

Professor MacMillan's History of Mc Gill University.

As you doubtless know the type from which this book was printed is still standing, and I am paying rent for it, but it is my intention to distribute the type. It has, however, occurred to me this afternoon that the University might wish to have plates made of this volume, the cost of which would be approximately 75 or 80 American cents per page. I cannot give you the exact figure, as my office and that of the plate maker are closed.

If you would undertake the expense of making these plates, so far as I am concerned, I would willingly relinquish any claim on future editions of the book. The volume should have a permanent sale, if handled by the University or its agents, and it could then be made to sell for \$1.00, even at so low a price it would be a paying property for the University. If 2,000 were printed at a time, the paper, printing and binding should not cost more than 50 cents a copy. Of course, you would consult Professor MacMillan on the subject.

I will keep the type standing until Wednesday, and unless I have a telegram from you that day, the type will be distributed. If you decide to have plates made, please ask Professor MacMillan to make any necessary alterations, before the plates are made - only I must have your decision by Wednesday.

I am in receipt of your letter of the 18th, and I much regret the misunderstanding there seems to be. I am bound to say that when I named \$3.00 as the published price of the book I was unaware of any difference in the exchange, but I certainly had in mind American money, since the cost of the book is calculated in American dollars.

However, since you inform me that Dr. Macmillan is willing to forego his royalty on the copies sold to College, it would be ungracious on my part were I not to acquiesce in accepting Canadian dollars.

I enclose a copy of my letter to you of October 7th; I supposed that as the copies were being sent out on that understanding with Mr. Murray Gibbon, you would have objected at the time if you did not approve. When I arranged with Mr. Gibbon to have the book reviewed in a number of Canadian papers it was with the understanding that he should have a copy of the book for each paper and that he would send it free of expense. But not even a single copy I understand has been given to him; he very kindly reviewed the books from proofs.

I feel certain that you will find the number of copies correct as invoiced. If not please let us know n and the missing copies will be sent. But I am assured in my office that 1500 copies were sent.

Dear Sir:-

I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of November 12th, and wish to make the following observations in connection therewith:

Your letter written from the University Club on the 8th of Movember last was the first occasion when any mention was made of American currency.

The book is sold at \$3.00 Canadian currency, and when we first discussed the matter of the University purchasing 1500 copies you were careful to point out the fact that your offer to us to buy them at \$2.00 per copy was greatly to our financial advantage. I do not think that any one could hold that you intended the price to us to be \$2.00 in American currency. I have talked to the Graduate Society, who were asked to take 500 copies on the same terms, and their impression is that it was \$2.00 Canadian currency. Dr. Macmillan, the writer of the book, who is familiar with the negotiations' from their inception, and who has, I understand, waived his royalty on those 1500 copies. has never had any idea that your offer to us was \$2.00 per volume in American surrency. Under these circumstances, I am not going to recommend to the Board of Governors that you be paid in American currency.

I feel that I must refer to one or two other matters. I am enclosing the copies of three letters written by you; Wo.1 being a copy of a letter from the Mational Club, Toronto, dated September 19th last; No. 2 being a copy of a letter to Dr. Macmillan from the Windsor Hotel, dated Wovember 7th last; and

Wo.3 being a copy of your letter written from the University Club, Montreal, dated the 8th of Movember last.

To No. 2 you attach certain suggestions. In these suggestions you say that presentation copies were to be sent to 160 newspapers, as arranged by Mr. Murray Gibbon, and you go on to say that this was done'by the approval of Sir Arthur Currie, whom I advised myself by letter'. I cannot understand how you can make such a statement, because at no time did I give my approval to your suggestion and at no time did you advise me by letter of that arrangement.

In the second place, let me again remind you that my telegram to you in Toronto was that we would take the 1500 books, providing they were here by October 13th. The 1500 copies were not here by October 13th, nor for quite a number of days afterwards; and yet, in your letter to Dr. Mscmillan, dated the 7th of Wovember, you speak of my 'repudiating the arrangement'. It was you who first broke the arrangement, not I.

I also think that the last paragraph on page 1 of your letter to Dr. Macmillan contains a phrase which is uncalled for. That phrase is underlined in the copy which I am sending to you. The University did not pay for the dinner which took place at the Windsor Hotel. The cost of that was borne by the graduates who bought tickets for that dinner. The University was not concerned with 'the costly revels at this hotel'.

I also wish to say that the books have not yet been removed from cases A.,B.,C.,D.,and E. These cases should contain 1400 volumes. It is to be hoped that that number of books will be found in the cases, but, as far as one can observe without actually taking the books from the cases, there does not seem to be quite that many.

Dear Sir:

I am obliged by your letter of the loth. It was very gratifying to know that your finance committee approved of the recommendations you made, for I am sure it will prove to be not only a graceful act, but I feel certain it will be the means of bringing fresh grist to the mill. You will be able to appeal again to your generous public, with the history of your great university before them.

The letter I wrote to you was a very hurried one and I thought I had made it quite clear that I was to be paid in American currency, for this point I must really insist upon. In the first place I have to pay the printers and stationers on the 15th of this month, and ordinarily this would have been a cash transaction with the University. For the printing and binding I had to pay overtime rates, so that I doubt if there will be any profit on the book at all. I must therefore ask you to pay the whole in American currency. I really ought to charge you 6% on the amount spent on manufacture, from the date of publication. I have agreed, as you know, to pay the currency.

I should be glad if you would have the kindness to send me a copy of my letter which was so hurriedly written.

This is to inform you that the Finance Committee of the Board of Governors at their meeting to-day approved my recommendations to them re Macmillan's History of McGill.

They will take the 1500 copies at \$2.00 per copy, and we shall pay the customs charges. I note that, according to your letter of November 8th, you agree to pay the express rate.

It is to be understood that this \$2.00 per copy is \$2.00 Canadian money. I may say that I mant that to be quite clear, because I notice in your latter of Movember 8th you mention that you will expect to receive 1,000 American dollars on the 25th instant. Dear Sir Arthur Currie,

Thank you very much for your telegram which I received this afternoon.

I at once telegraphed to the New York House to rush the book but it does not give much time.

The next time you are in London I hope you can spare the time to give a young Artist friend of mine a sitting for a plumbago drawing as Sir William Peterson did in Bath some two years ago. It is a capital drawing but as it is in London I cannot use it in the present edition of the book, but later on I shall be issuing a portfolio of drawings by the Artist - Vernon Hill - in which I should wish to include one of yourself.

On September 19th I forwarded a telegram to Mr. John Lane addressed to the National Club, Toronto. This telegram read as follows:-

> " McGill will guarantee to take 1500 " copies Macmillan's book at two " dollars per copy, providing books " are here by October thirteenth " next. Address them to Lomer, our "Librarian."

The story of the arrival of these books is as follows :-

On October 11th the Librarian received a letter from Mr. John Lane saying that he was sending 100 copies by one of Mr. Murray Gibbon's staff. The Library received these copies delivered by Mr. Max Enos of the New York Office of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

On October 14th Mr. Lane wrote to Mrs. Glassco, who has no connection whatever with McGill University, stating that the day before he had sent off 500 copies of the McGill book and that tomorrow, which would be the 15th, the remaining copies would go. On October 20th the Librarian wrote to The John Lane Publishing Company stating that the copies of invoices for shipment of Professor Macmillan's book, referred to in your letter of October 10th, had not been received. The proper forms were sent to you and you were asked to return them with the least possible delay. These invoices were in due time returned, but it was November 1st before the books were received.

Shipments, without proper invoices are of no use to us, and the undertaking to take 1500 copies was on the distinct understanding that the books would be here by October 13th. They were not here in accordance with the terms of the agreement and were not available for sale during the week of the Contenary. Under these circumstances I would like to receive instructions from you as to what you want done with the 1400 volumes. We will take the original 100 and pay you the price agreed upon, but the balance of 1,400 are here at your disposal, and as we have no room for them, I would like them cleared as quickly as possible.

You, of course, are responsible for the customs charges in connection with these 1,400 volumes. If you instruct us to do so, we shall pay these charges, but shall deduct that amount from what is owing to you by the University in connection with the first 100 volumes shipped.

Please let me hear from you as soon as possible.

MEMORANDUM RE MACMILLAN'S BOOK.

The custom of Universities on the occasion of functions similar to our Centennial Reunion of preparing reports of just what happened and distributing them to the recipients of Honorary Degrees, to visitors of other Universities, and to Libraries with whom literature is exchanged, forces us to do something of the same character.

Instead of doing this I would suggest that a copy of Macmillan's book be sent. This would be much more acceptance than the Report of the proceedings of the Centennial, especially in view of the fact that the Reunion was held to celebrate the Centennial and the History is the history of that 100 years.

The necessity, for political purposes, of our making some tangible acknowledgment of the support received from individuals in the late campaign leads me to believe that it would be a wise thing from all points of view for the University to send to each subscriber of \$300. and more a copy of this book.
