

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



### ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1870.

From the following statement it will be seen that there is a considerable falling off in the voluntary contributions to the Society for the year ending December 31st, 1870, as compared with those of the previous year:

Of the three great funds of the Society, the Widows and Orphans' Fund alone exhibits a favourable increase in the amount of voluntary contributions; whilst the General Fund shows a deficiency of \$181.57, and the Mission Fund of \$257.39.

Owing to the failure of District Treasurers and Clergy to transmit their contributions before the closing of the Society's books, on the 31st of December, the foregoing statement will not correspond with the Treasurer's accounts.

#### MISSION FUND.

In referring the Society for an account of Missionary work to the Report of the Diocesan Board, the Central Board would mention that in the early part of the past year they were induced to put forth a special appeal in behalf of the Mission Fund. The incomes of the Rural Clergy have during the past few years been kept up to a maximum of \$600 per annum. Owing to the great advance in the cost of living this amount to-day is not more than equivalent to the old standard of \$500. In order therefore to ameliorate, if possible, this con-

dition of things, which, if unchecked, must tend to lower the present standard of ministerial efficiency-not to speak of the hardships which it entails upon the clergy now working in the Diocese-your Board appealed to churchmen to raise for the past year an additional sum of \$1500, which would have enabled the Diocesan Board to add \$50 to the stipend of each Missionary in Priest's orders. It is needless for the Board to repeat the regret with which they learn that in place of any increase there is so large a deficiency in the receipts of the Mission Fund. It is quite impossible with due regard to the welfare of the Diocese that the revenues of the Clergy should remain at their present insufficient standard. Your Board trust therefore that at the ensuing Annual Meeting of the Society energetic measures may be taken to increase permanently the revenues of the Clergy. Last year on application of the Diocesan Board, your Board granted \$1000 for the purpose of giving a bonus to the Clergy on a scale regulated according to length of service in the Diocese, and this year they have ventured to do the same, though to do so has necessitated the appropriation of nearly the whole amount to the credit of the General Fund. But whilst your Board have cheerfully responded to the application of the Diocesan Board, they are confident that churchmen generally will agree with them in thinking that the system of granting a bonus annually to the Clergy is not one that should be continued longer than necessity requires. It will be observed that another year has gone by without the Board receiving any amounts for transmission to the Missionary Societies engaged in evangelizing the heathen nations of the world. This important object which is included amongst the leading works specified in the Society's constitution may be beyond the present strength of churchmen in this diocese, but certainly whilst we are doing nothing towards conveying the Gospel to the heathen, we ought not to be content without exerting ourselves to the very utmost to support the Church's ministrations within our own borders with more generosity than is apparent in the Mission Fund for the year.

#### WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The amount of voluntary contributions to this fund for the past year is considerably in advance of that of the two preceding years. For the past four years the claims on this fund have fallen considerably short of the amount of voluntary contributions, whilst the annual interest accruing from the funded capital, reaches, according to the last statement, \$1578 00.

Five years having clapsed since the adoption of the by-law under which the fund is administered, the Board have thought it desirable to submit it to the eminent Actuary, A. G. Ramsay, Esq., for the purpose of obtaining his opinion (1) as to the extent to which the pension to widows and orphans may be increased under the present circumstances of the fund; and (2) as to the effect of abolishing the present subscription of the Clergy, as required by the by-law. Your Board trust to be able to present Mr. Ramsay's opinion at an early day for the consideration of the Society.

By the lamented death of the Rev. R. G. Ward, a widow and four children have recently been added to the list of claimants.

#### PENSION FUND.

The Pension Fund has not received that measure of support which, from the importance of its object, might have been reasonably expected. The receipts for the past year amount to only \$354.80. Though the majority of the Clergy now labouring in the diocese are comparatively young men, it is not to be forgotten that any day they may be disabled by accident or sickness from further work, and that this fund, which now only yields the sum of \$194.00, is all the provision which the diocese has made towards the support of infirm Clergymen. It may be necessary to remind churchmen that the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel has thrown upon the Church in this diocese the responsibility of providing pensions in the future for the Clergy.

#### ENDOWMENT FUND.

A list of the Rural Endowment Funds of the diocese, to which no addition has been made during the year, will be found in the Clergy Trust Fund account, with the exception of that for Nicolet, which appears in the accounts of the Treasurer of the Society.

The Board have to report that they have received, by bequest of the late Miss Sheppard, of Drummondville, the sum of \$2000, in aid of an endowment for the benefit of Drummondville Mission, and that they have informed the Clergymen and Church Wardens of the mission that they are

prepared to make a grant of \$150, provided the mission raise \$200 for the same purpose, within one year from the date of resolution, (June 8, 1870.)

#### LAND COMMITTEE.

Some progress has been made during the year towards converting into money certain lands belonging to the Society, which have hitherto been unproductive of revenue. A thorough investigation was made by the Land Committee into the position of those situated in the Township of Chester, and it was found that they have all been occupied without title or permission. An estimate of their value was obtained, and deeds of sale entered into with two of the occupants, who made payments to the amount of \$116.67, and bound themselves to pay further annual instalments. The others have not yet been brought to terms, but will probably soon feel the necessity of acquiring titles to their farms.

The Society is much indebted to the Chairman of the Land Committee, M. Sheppard, Esq., for the time and energy which he has devoted to the management of the Society's lands.

From the foregoing statement it will be seen that the sales of 1870 compare most unfavourably with those of 1869, and still more unfavourably with those of 1868. This falling off may be attributed, in the first instance, to the fact that the usual Christmas order to the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, though transmitted in October last with an urgent request that it might be sent in time for our holiday sales, has only just reached the Depository, and also to the unsuitable character and limited number of the Society's publications. In August last a letter was received from the Editorial Secretary of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, enquiring how far the existing publications of

the Society met our diocesan and even local or class wants; to which a very elaborate reply was drawn up at the request of the Depository Committee, and transmitted to the parent society. The department continues to receive the indefatigable services of the Secretary-Treasurer, C. Judge, Esq.

#### EDUCATION.

During the past year aid has been extended to an additional school at Portneuf, and also to one at Bourg Louis. \$40 per annum have also been promised to a school in the Magdalen Islands.

The schools aided by the Society on the north shore of the St. Lawrence are under the supervision of the Rev. R. G. Plees; those on the south shore under that of the Rev. H. J. Petry; both of which gentlemen will shortly proceed to make their annual inspection.

# ABSTRACT OF PROCEEDINGS OF CENTRAL BOARD DURING THE YEAR 1870.

JANUARY.—Report of the Committee on the conditions attached to the Nicolet Endowment Fund and the exact state of that fund as to investments and revenue.

Resolved,—That the amounts held by the Treasurer for the following funds be invested:—W. & O. Fund, Labrador Mission Fund, Nicolet Endowment Fund, Pension Fund.—Standing Committees appointed. Auditors appointed.

Resolved,—That \$100 of the interest arising from the Nicolet Endowment Fund be yearly added to the capital, and that the remainder, together with such sum from General Fund as will make up the amount of \$400, be paid annually to the resident Clergyman in charge of Nicolet.

February.—A Committee appointed to report on the possibility of simplifying the present mode of keeping the accounts with reference to the investments of the Society.

March.—The usual allowance to the Chaplain at the Quarantine Station for the ensuing year placed at the Bishop's disposal. The Board, in answer to a resolution of the St. Francis Deanery, inform the chapter that they are of opinion that the interests of the Rural Deaneries and of the Church Society will be best served by the several District Associations making provision out of the funds at their disposal for the payments of an income or of his expenses or of both, to the Rural Dean, inasmuch as the members of the District Association will always be in a better position than the Central Board to judge as to the work done in each case and the payment which ought to be made. A circular drawing attention to the insufficient stiponds of the Clergy ordered to be printed and circulated in the Diocese.

APRIL.—The bonus granted to Clergymen under the Diocesan Board, extended to Rev. A. A. Allen, Rev. J. Torrance, Revd. W. C. Merrick.—Report of Committee on simplifying the present mode of keeping accounts with reference to the investments of the Society, presented and referred to the honorary Counsel.—Report of Land Committee.—Bequest of \$2000 from the late Miss Sheppard, of Drummondville, towards the endowment of the Church at that place.—Committee appointed to secure the services of a Treasurer, in the room of W. Hunt, Esq., resigned.

SEPTEMBER.—Article 14th, of the by-laws, submitted to A. G. Ramsay, Esquire.

DECEMBER.—G. A. L. Wood, Esq., appointed Treasurer of the Society.—Revd. S. Riopel allowed to qualify as participant in the benefits of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, on fulfilment of the requirements of the by-law.

#### ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

# DIOCESAN BOARD

FOR 1870.

The Diocesan Board in presenting its Annual Report to the Church Society has but little to record with reference to its labours during the past year, beyond the statement that the interests entrusted to its care are fairly prospering.

In answer to the Lord Bishop's forcible appeal, the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, as will be seen by the following copy of the Secretary's letter, consented to continue the undiminished grant of £2,000 stg. for the year 1871:

5, Park Place, St. James' street, London, 29th April, 1870.

MY DEAR LORD,-

I am desired to transmit to your Lordship and the Committee the terms of the Society's grant for Quebec in 1871.

1. That the sum of £2000 be granted for the Diocese of Quebee in the year ending 31st December, 1871, to be administered by the Bishop and Committee in accordance with the Society's by-laws and regulations: that this grant be also charged with any claims for pensions which may arise in the year, and be admitted by the Society, and with any expense for the passage of missionaries from this country to Quebee which may be incurred here in accordance with the regulations, and with any other expense strictly appropriate to the Diocese, and sanctioned by the Society. Also, that the pensions of the Rev. A. Balfour, Mrs. Taylor, Rev. J. Torrance, Mrs. Burrage, Mrs. Arnold, and Mrs. Fleming (together amounting to £350) be paid in 1871 as hitherto.

Also, that the sum of £250 be granted for Divinity students in Bishop's College, Lennoxville, in the year 1871, and be administered in accordance with the regulations.

2. In deference to your Lordship's forcible appeal (dated Feb. 11) the Society has forborne to make any reduction of the grant on this occasion. But I am desired to ask your

attention to the fact that at least six of the missionaries—possibly some of them having special claims—receive £100 per annum, the highest amount under regulation 47. And the Committee wish me to say that the forbearance shown this year must not be regarded as a pledge of the continuance

of the grant on the present scale.

3. I am to assure your Lordship that though the Society's income does not increase, yet the need of progress in the mission-field is arged upon us very strongly. If the Society's regulations, numbered 45, 46, and 47, were to be applied in all eases, a certain sum of money would be set free annually; and the Society would be enabled thereby to follow up some of the new openings for missionary enterprise which are providentially presented every year to the Church of England. The Committee wish it to be understood that they propose to take action in accordance with those regulations on future occasions of renewing the annual grants, unless in any case sufficient reason be shown to the contrary.

With this assurance of aid from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel till the close of 1871, and in reliance on the fulfilment of all local obligations throughout the Diocese, the Board has added three missions to its list as it stood the year before, viz:—Hereford, Stanstead, and the Peninsula—the two former in the Eastern Townships and the latter in the Gaspé District. Hereford and the Peninsula have agreed to pay each \$200 per annum to the funds of the Board, and Stanstead \$300.

A circumstance much to be deplored in connection with the missionary work of the Diocese has been the great difficulty in obtaining elergymen to fill vacant missions, of which there has been during 1870 more than the usual number. The main cause is doubtless to be found in the scanty incomes offered, which our slender resources do not

enable us to increase.

As an earnest of our desire, as far as possible, to ameliorate the condition of the clergy in this respect—your Society having made a grant of \$1,000 towards this object—a bonus was distributed in the month of March last, from which the clergy received sums of \$50, \$35, and \$20, according to their term of service. Steps are also now being taken by the Board, in which it is hoped the Central Board of the Church Society will again co-operate, to provide another gratuity of

at least equal amount.

The Board beg to state that the question of having all church property insured has not been passed over. Certificates of insurance have been received from all missions aided by the Board, except the following:—

With regard to those who may persist in neglecting their own interests in this matter, the action directed to be taken by the Synod will have to be brought into operation.

It is to be noticed that in many cases there is great neglect on the part of the elergy and wardens in replying to communications from the Board on this subject, involving much additional correspondence with no difference in the result.

In the month of February last the following resolution was adopted by the Board, with reference to endowment funds:

"Whenever an endowment fund becomes available, the incumbent of the mission shall receive his salary in full from the Board, in addition to the sum of \$200 arising from the endowment."

The greater personal interest which this rule must naturally give to the clergyman and people in endowments will, it is believed, stimulate their creation in missions where no beginning has yet been made, and tend to the rapid increase of those already existing.

The missions throughout the diocese have, on the whole, proved themselves faithful in the discharge of their obligations during the past year, as may be seen in detail in the treasurer's

tabular statement.

In addition to the new missions undertaken by the Board during the past year, and previously mentioned, the extensive and arduous mission of Frampton has been divided into two separate missions, the people agreeing to pay increased contributions.

The memoranda of agreement between the Diocesan Board and the several congregations expire on the 31st December, 1871. During the coming summer deputations will be sent to visit all congregations, on behalf of the Board, with a view to ascertain the numerical and financial strength of each, so that the Board may be in a position to decide upon the amount of assessment for the triennial period beginning on 1st January, 1872.

As the next three years may witness a large reduction in the grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel and bring to the Board some applications for the opening of new missions, it is to be hoped that the elergy and wardens will prepare their congregations to make a generous addition to their contributions towards the ministrations of the church amongst them.

The Rev. W. T. Early to the mission of Stanstead; and

The Rev. J. Dinsey to the mission of Compton.

In the month of December:

Rev. A. Balfour to the mission of Valcartier.

Rev. A. Rowland to the mission of New Ireland and South Inverness.

And Mr. C. B. Washer (ordained during the present month)

to the mission of Inverness.

One of the missionaries in the diocese, the Rev. R. G. Ward, has been removed from the scene of his labours. He died on the 14th December from a severe cold, contracted in the discharge of his duties at the grave of a parishioner.

The Rev. R. Wainwright has resigned the charge of the

mission of Bury to proceed to another diocese.

The reports of the elergy, containing valuable and interesting details of the work of the church and its prospects in their respective missions, are hereunto annexed, from which it may be gathered that in the midst of many trials and labours and discouragements, real and permanent progress is being evoked by the Divine blessing.

#### REPORT

OF THE

#### ST. FRANCIS DISTRICT ASSOCIATION.

The Committee of the St. Francis District Association of the Church Society have heard with satisfaction the interesting reports presented to them from various Missions of the District; and as they are very lengthy, and will appear in the printed report of the parent Society, the members of this Association are respectfully directed to that report for more full details. It will be well, however, to take a general view of the work of the Church, its prospects and its wants, as presented by those reports. The work of the Church has been steadily progressing, in some missions more rapidly than in others. This, perhaps, ought not to be attributed to any zeal or want of zeal on the part of the clergy; it may rather be traced to local interest and influence.

Some of our Missions have long since settled down into established parishes. Some are making headway in fields where dissent has largely prevailed, and some are carrying on the work in newly-opened territory. Each class of work is attended with different results, but the result as a whole affords evidence of advancement, and gives to the Church prospects which may fairly be looked upon as of a promising character. This statement cannot but awaken sentiments of gratitude in the hearts of all true churchmen, and if they can only feel that they have taken their place and contributed according to their means, be it in time, money, or influence, increased

interest and renewed energy will be sure to follow.

An important feature in the work we have to do, is presented to us by the influx of immigration. To those who feel the importance of peopling our waste lands with an English-speaking population, it will be encouraging to find that from the vast stream of immigration which passes through our country yearly, some portion, though indeed, comparatively speaking, but a small portion, has been, during the past two years, directed to the Townships of this district. Many settlers have proved to be members of the Church of England, and claim at her hands that fostering care which exile from their native land has deprived them of. While every newcomer of respectability adds to our influence and prosperity,

the Church has additional ground for exertion. We have every reasonable hope that, year by year, new fields of usefulness will be opened to us amongst new settlers, but if we neglect our opportunities, others will seize upon them to rob us of our children, and those children of their fondest hopes.

It may be in the power of some of the clergy to devote a portion of their time to these out-lying districts; but such few and far between visits are not much calculated to keep alive that appreciation of the services of the Church which our people bring with them; for in the absence of that form of worship most dear to them, their isolated position tempts them to avail themselves of less valued and oftentimes very questionable ministrations, till at length the ground is hopelessly lost or so divided that Ichabod is inscribed upon these,

the Church's neglected districts.

If it be a matter of importance to extend our borders so that our congregations shall be proportionable to the territorial limits of the Diocese, then the time has come forexertion of no ordinary character. We have only to mark the external agencies which are actively engaged in securing those privileges for other denominations, to arouse that dormant spirit which unhappily pervades our own community. The question which presents itself to us in this hour of rivalry is this,—Shall the Church of England go on satisfied only to hold her own, or shall she awaken to the necessity of prosecuting the work of church extension? The Reports of the Parent Society give evidence that the District of St. Francis has never been behind other portions of the diocese in her response to the church, and let us hope and pray that the work of our beloved church will go on prospering, and to prosper, and that God will raise up men with fervent hearts who will shrink from no toil, no self-denial in seeking to restore the reckless or forgetful to those ways which are ways of pleasantness and peace. If we are faithful to do what God commands, we may reasonably hope he will prosper every sincere effort. Your Committee therefore, deeply impressed with the necessity which exists for increased would call upon every member association to take his or her part in the promotion of its usefulness, either, when it can be done, by an increased subscription, or by inducing those who come under their influence to enrol themselves as contributors to its cause.

#### EXTRACTS FROM REPORTS OF MISSIONARIES.

#### ACTON.

The condition of this mission has not materially changed since last report; a few families having left and others having taken their place.

We have, however, brighter prospects before us.

For the last three months much excitement has prevailed in this locality, owing to the possibility of the Drummond and Richelieu Railroad passing this way to make a junction with the Shefford Railway at Waterloo. Should such be the case, the value of property in the village of Actonvale and the surrounding country will be much enhanced, and much

good in various other ways will be the result.

The congregation at Upton Station still continues to be under my charge, and every Sunday, as heretofore, Divine Service is read in both churches alternately, morning and evening; and I am happy to say less time is lost in travelling between the two churches, enabling both congregations to come to church at more seasonable hours; for, through the assistance of my relatives, I have purchased a horse, thus obviating the necessity of the Sunday six-mile walk on the railway track, which during past years I was frequently obliged to enjoy, but sorry for, on account of loss of time occasioned thereby.

This statement shows an improvement over last year's.

From the Offertory collections a larger amount by \$15.70 was realized.

The average amount contributed by each Protestant family in the mission this year is \$19.57, exclusive of Upton congre-

gation, but including the proceeds of bazaar.

These facts indicate the healthy state of the mission. On the whole, I can heartily thank the Almighty for the mercies he has vouchsafed to us. May He continue to bless our efforts to glorify His holy name.

#### BOURG LOUIS AND PORTNEUF.

The past year has been unmarked by any material change in the united mission of Portneuf and Bourg Louis.

The work of the Church, as evidenced in the attendance at divine worship, has been, upon the whole, steady and regular, though not attaining to the standard I could have desired.

During the summer months, from the beginning of May until the end of October, I have been able to hold divine service once a week at both places, but when the bad roads set in I was compelled to hold service at each place twice a day

on alternate Sundays.

I have been enabled to superintend the Sunday schools at Portneuf and Bourg Louis, and while I am glad to be able to state that those who do attend, attend regularly, and evince a lively interest in the work, yet I must add, with sorrow, that the number who do attend bear a very small proportion to the number who stay at home, and although I make a point, both in church and in the course of visiting, of urging the importance and advantage of religious instruction, yet in the majority of instances a false shame deters the elder, while the distance to be traversed keeps back the younger members of the congregation from the benefit of the Sunday school.

To remedy this evil I have determined to hold evening service and Sunday school at the two school houses (at least in Bourg Louis) on alternate Sundays, and trust thus to be enabled to bring the young people within reach of my personal

instruction.

I must, however, add that the teachers of both the day schools—Miss Ingham and Miss Brown—are both willing and energetic aids to the elergyman, in the discharge of this most important duty, by instructing the children thoroughly in the things which they ought to know and believe, to their soul's health, as contained in the Church Catechism.

It is always a source of disquiet to the pastor's mind to notice a slender attendance at the Lord's Table, and I am sorry to have to say that in Portneuf the poverty of attendance at that heavenly feast has been marked even when the

congregation wellnigh filled the Church.

The fact, however, is partly to be accounted for in the number of those attending our Church's service who are not

strictly communicants.

It has indeed afforded me great joy of heart to witness the very regular attendance of other denominations at our Church service. Amongst the number of those who do so are to be found many as regular, if not more so, than our own professing churchmen, coming often twice a day, though at the sacrifice of much personal inconvenience and trouble.

Kind, most kind, has been their conduct, as well to the

church as to myself.

Both at Portneuf and Bourg Louis I am preparing candidates for confirmation, few in number, I regret to say, in both places.

I have administered the Holy Communion once every

fourth Lord's Day, at both Bourg Louis and Portneuf.

With regard to the condition of the Parsonage, I would say that owing to a fundamental error in its construction it cannot be made a warm house without a very considerable outlay, although since I have been enabled to complete the upper part of the house it is fairly comfortable, and far better than it ever was before.

The Church is in a good state of repair both in Bourg Louis

and Portneuf, warm and water-tight.

Although I am in the habit of keeping a regular account of my visits, the accidental loss of my register forbids my giving a correct estimate of their number. Still I would say that when two missions are made into one, as Portneuf and Bourg Louis, the visiting is a great draft upon the time of the clergyman. In addition to which the large circle of his care detracts very much from the completeness and accuracy of his observation.

#### CAPE COVE.

With the exception of the fact that we have at length succeeded in painting the interior of St. James' Church, Cape Cove, I cannot recollect any change in our affairs worth noticing.

During the past year the services have been as usual regularly held, and on the whole have been well attended. Our Sunday Schools have been in operation during the summer and fall, with an average of forty children and five teachers here, and fifteen children and three teachers at Percé. At a place called L'Anse au Beaufils, half-way between Cape Cove and Percé, I opened a third Sunday School which was in operation during the summer months, with an attendance of fifteen pupils. It was conducted by a kind and zealous member of this congregation, assisted by his daughter, and sometimes by one of his neighbours.

Our finances are in much the same condition as in the past few years; that is, we have met our engagements with the Board of missions punctually partly by assessment and partly from pew rent; we have provided for necessary repairs of the Churches and Parsonage, and we have insured these buildings to the amount, collectively, of \$2100; moreover we have paid our last remaining debt due upon St. James' Church, amounting to sixteen pounds. I am thankful that we have been able to accomplish this. I must notice with gratitude the handsome gift of forty dollars, presented to me by the Cape Cove congregation last Easter; as well as thirteen dollars presented by the Percé congregation at the same time. The kindly feeling evinced on the occasion by many of my people, added greatly to the value of their gifts.

#### COATICOOK AND BARFORD.

The routine work of the Church in this mission has been carried on during the present year without any interruption.

The services have been kept up at Coaticook, Drew's Mills, and Daniel's school-house, Barford. The attendance at these

places is about the same as formerly.

I am very happy to be able to report the complete success of the attempt to plant the Church at Drew's Mills, where I opened a new station in January last. The congregation here is larger than at Coaticook. There are eleven Church families living within a mile and a half of the hall which I have leased for the services. Here I have a most encouraging Sunday school, numbering at present fifty-seven scholars, for whose use I have succeeded in collecting books and maps to the amount of one hundred and twenty dollars. Towards this good work I was most generously aided by Mrs. Plees and Miss Green, of Quebec. The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge granted me books and maps to the amount of \$50, and the Church Society's depository at Quebec gave \$10 worth. The children of the Sunday School added to these amounts the sum of \$25, which they collected amongst their own friends. The great majority of those who attend the services at Drew's Mills have never been accustomed to the Church's ways. Hence the great pleasure it affords me to see the readiness and cheerfulness with which they use the paged Prayer Books, and the heartiness with which all join in the responses.

I cannot speak too highly of the friendly feeling evinced towards me by this congregation, which is, I hope, an earnest of the good work which I shall endeavour to do amongst

them.

The Church school at Coaticook is in vigorous operation, and is doing a good christian work. Our Sunday school at Coaticook is kept up all the year round, and is attended by all the church children within reasonable distance of the village.

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Pastoral visiting has, as usual, been regularly kept up amongst my people, who are scattered over an area of nearly

two hundred square miles.

I regret to say that, owing to the searcity of artizans, we were unable to enlarge the Church at Coaticook, as proposed, this last summer. We are making preparations to do so early next spring. Towards this work one member of the congregation has generously offered all the lumber necessary.

In January last the Bishop held a confirmation at Coaticook,

when thirty candidates received the apostolic rite, and, with twenty-five members of the congregation, partook of the Holy Communion.

#### DANVILLE AND TINGWICK.

The usual services have been regularly held in these two missions. On the 10th July, the Bishop confirmed thirteen persons in Danville, and eight in Tingwick.

The numbers attending the services are steadily increasing; within the last two years, the congregation at Danville has nearly doubled. The new church at Tingwick is finished and paid for.

The usual domiciliary visits have been paid as regularly as circumstances permitted. With four hundred square miles to travel over, it is impossible to pay as many visits as one could wish.

Since I have been in this mission, which will be six years next August, nothing has arisen to disturb the harmony of my connection with the people committed to my charge.

#### DRUMMONDVILLE.

The fine dry weather and our good roads of the past summer and autumn, have shown their results in an increased attendance at Church.

I find difficulty in bringing the people to week-day services, but even at these the numbers are increasing, and promise to increase yet more.

The Sunday schools are progressing favourably. Number

of Scholars at present, 56; of Teachers, 6.

We had a most pleasant visit from our Bishop this summer; 25 Candidates were confirmed; and in the evening the Bishop met a large proportion of the congregation in a hall prepared for the purpose, where an evening was spent in pleasant social communion, concluding with sacred music, and an address from the Bishop.

Financially, our circumstances and prospects seem to be

improving.

The late Miss Sheppard, an aged and valued member of our flock, whose loss we sadly feel, left the sum of \$2000, to be the nucleus of an endowment fund for this parish. This lady has indeed been a benefactor to our struggling little Church community here. Besides subscribing liberally to every Church purpose as it offered itself, we are indebted to her kindness for the special gifts of our stained glass cast window, our stone bell-tower, the bell itself, and our west door of massive oak.

We have been making great eff rts during the past year,—
1st, to bring our Church at last into really habitable condition.
It needed to be closed in, and made weather light; to be provided with sufficient heating apparatus; to be white washed inside, and the pews and panellings to be stained and varnished. Besides this, the chancel had to be fitted up. All this has to a great extent been accomplished. 2nd. We have been trying to raise the sum of \$200 (to meet \$200 generously offered by R. Hamilton, Esq., and \$150 offered by the Church

Society,) to increase the Endowment Fund, which Miss Sheppard's bequest has opened. \$55 only have already been subscribed, but I am in hopes that the whole amount will be collected before Easter.

We are now, I am thankful to say, beginning to see the dawn of brighter prospects in the future. One more strong effort to make up our share of the Endowment Fund, and then I hope we shall soon be in a position to offer our mite of help to our brethren without.

#### HEREFORD.

Hereford was added to the list of missions July 1870. Church work has been carried on with all the usual difficulties of a new mission for six months. Indifference to religion, ignorance (or at the least) slight knowledge of church principles, sectarian hatred, and very limited temporal aid have been the chief characteristics. The church commenced five years ago by Mr. Workman has been so far completed as to be used for public worship. \$325 has been carefully expended, \$50 of which was the Society's grant and the greater portion of the remainder donated by friends of the mission, mostly resident in Quebec. Divine Service has also been held in the school houses at Hall's Stream and West Hereford, with the promise of both becoming ere long regularly constituted congregations. Baptisms, 12. Total amount raised in the mission for church purposes during six months, \$150.

#### DURHAM.

On the second of May last I was licensed by the Bishop to the incumbercy of the mission.

Prior to this I had served as assistant Minister to the Rev. Henry Roe, Incumbent of Melbourne, to whom I wish here to express my thankfulness for friendly counsel and substantial acts of kindness.

During the past year satisfactory progress has been made throughout the mission in temporal matters; I trust that in things spiritual, also, some advancement may be recorded.

The services have been continued in the several stations without interruption; and the important work of Sunday school instruction and parochial visitation has been carried steadily on.

Recognizing the truth that spiritual culture is materially aided by edifices befitting the nature of religion and the ritual of the Church, especial endeavor after improvement in this respect has been made: two new Churches, in an advanced stage of construction, and considerable repairs on an existing place of worship, show that the endeavour has not been fruitless.

I have to record with regret the loss to the mission of the Lay-Reader, Mr. A. Stevens, who, in September last, entered the University of Bishop's College. His earnest and unwearied labors won for him universal esteem and commendation.

His place is supplied in part by the kindness of Mr. William Stevens, my Warden in Upper Durham.

Another loss the mission has sustained in the death of Mr. Christopher Lyster, formerly a delegate to the Synod and a prominent member of the church in Durham. A man of genuine piety and rectitude of life, his light shone brightly before men to the glory of God.

Death has removed the living "Preacher of Righteousness": a common heritage remains,—the unspotted example of a consistent Christian life.

The following are the particulars worthy of note in the various stations.

#### UPPER DURHAM.

The project entertained by the congregation here of repairing the old church has been abandoned; and a new church, gothic in design, and intended to accommodate 250 persons in nave and choir, is now nearly completed on the exterior.

It is constructed of red brick, with dressings of white brick and gray granite.

The windows are to be filled throughout with stained glass, manufactured by Spence, of Montreal, and will be chiefly memorial.

A fine organ and lecturn have already been procured; and a set of communion plate, an altar cloth, and linen for the communion service have, been promised when the church is opened.

The old church building will be repaired for the use of a

Parochial School, and for general parish needs.

I cannot speak too highly of the practical interest in the work of the Church exhibited by the members of this congregation.

### SOUTH DURHAM.

The work of the Church in this station is a continual struggle against peculiar difficulties. Still we toil patiently on, assured that at the eventide of our labors "there shall be light."

Through the zeal and perseverance of the Building Committee, the new Church, though retarded by unforeseen circumstances, will be ready for occupation this winter. Valuable assistance has been rendered the Building Committee by the people of Upper Durham, and by the Ladies' Aid Society of the place.

During the past summer I held a service here every Sunday,

travelling on each occasion twenty miles.

### L'AVENIR.

I notice with pleasure a marked improvement in this hitherto neglected station.

The regular congregation has largely increased.

The services have become more hearty. The Sunday School is numerously attended and interesting.

Through the exertions of Mr. George Atkinson the church

has been comfortably repaired for the winter.

A lecturn has been obtained for the church by Miss Lizzie Elwin; and money for the purchase of a valuable organ has been collected by Miss Lizzie Elwin and Miss Harriet Bothwell.

Altogether the present condition of the station is very gratifying.

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#### BLACK RIVER.

Matters here remain very much as when last reported. The kindness and interest of the people have been shown in various ways.

The house has been fitted for the winter; and several

lamps have been purchased.

The building of a Chapel here has, for the present, been deferred. I hope, however, that at no distant day the project

may be resumed.

In conclusion, I regret to state that the pecuniary demands within the mission have been so numerous and urgent that the usual collections for the Church Society have not been made. A new mission with all its legitimate wants can hardly be expected to follow fully the good examples of older and richer congregations.

#### DUDSWELL.

I have but little to report except the regular round of two services on each Sunday throughout the year. Morning service is held in St. Paul's, Marbleton, every Sunday, with Holy Communion on the first Sunday in each month. My afternoon services are held at South Ham, Lower Dudswell, Stoke and Westbury, requiring, respectively, 19, 16, 14 and 20 miles to be travelled. In the autumn and spring, when the travelling is bad, it requires great perseverance of man and endurance of horse to reach these stations in time. The attendance at all of them, and the spirit manifested, have been satisfactory. The station at South Ham, however, is steadily being depopulated of church-going people, and when a few more families carry out their intention of leaving, I shall transfer this service to some suitable centre of population in Dudswell. The very considerable emigration of the English speaking people, with the continuous influx of French colonists, will, in process of time, tell a bad tale, I fear, of this mission, if something cannot be done in the way of immigration from the British isles to keep up our numbers. It will be remembered that Dudswell is an isolated township in a French county. I am thankful to say that four emigrant families have settled within our limits, and seem disposed to remain. We are anxiously looking for some good results from a Colonization Society formed here last summer, aided, as we hope, by the wealthy and influential one at Sherbrooke. There are still considerable tracts of good land both in West-

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bury and Dudswell, which would make a good field for colonization effort for a time. His Lordship the Bishop held a Confirmation here last July. Twenty-six were confirmed, and I am happy to add that at no confirmation since 1851, when I first came in charge here, has so earnest a spirit been manifested by the young, and the duty of immediately coming to the Communion been so generally followed up. The practice introduced by the Bishop, which was dreaded by many, myself among the number, of questioning the candidates previous to confirmation, in presence of the congregation, seems to have a happy and solemnizing effect. We are still doing what we can to keep up a Church school at Marbleton, aided, from time to time, by a small grant from the Colonial Church and School Society. We are also doing what we can in the way of Sunday schools. The following is a statement of the several amounts raised for Church work during the year:

### EATON.

There are two subjects connected with the work of this mission, which appear to claim some reference. One is the plan adopted for raising the Diocesan Board assessment. Every subscriber is supplied with an envelope quarterly, on which the amount of subscription and date when due, are written. One corner contains a number, which is the number of the subscriber; a book with corresponding numbers is kept to check the paid envelopes. These envelopes are presented at the offertory on the last Sunday in the quarter. So far the plan has worked admirably.

The Clergy and Church Wardens well know the arduous and unpleasant duty of collecting the assessment. The loss of time, the repeated disappointments, the irregular payments, are all avoided by this system.

The other subject is the loss to St. Peter's Church, by removal, of a long tried and faithful Church Warden. I owe it to Mr. R. H. Willford to state that during the past six years his time has been cheerfully devoted to every object calculated to advance the interests of the Church. His loss to us is a great one, but a consoling thought arises from the knowledge that he has removed into a new settlement, where the Church is gradually gaining hold, and where he can still exercise his good offices and influence in building up a congregation. I am thankful to say it has been in my power, for nearly two years, to give regular services to this new mission; many of these have been fortnightly. These services are held in a place of worship belonging to the Wesleyans. It is, however, much to be regretted that we have no Church of our own in that locality. The Church members are on the increase, and though yet contending with the drawbacks of a new settlement, are willing to do all they can towards putting up a Church for themselves.

Through the liberality of the generous people of Quebec, the newly opened Township of Ditton has the prospect of a Church within a very short time. The lumber has already been prepared, and the work will be proceeded with as quiekly as circumstances will allow. This Church will serve for the Norwegian and English families who have lately settled there, and who evince a great desire for the ministration of the Church. I have visited these people from house to house, and have always received a hearty welcome. Upon one occasion, I was compelled to put up for the night at one of their houses, and in a log shanty, not 15 by 20 feet, found a comfortable bed. My kind host,—an English settler of only one winter,—rolled himself up in my buffalo, that I might enjoy a more luxurious repose. This house is twentyfive miles from my house, and from it roads branch out to other English families, who are devotedly attached to the Church, and who never cease the enquiry as to when they shall have a clergyman amongst them.

### GASPÉ BASIN.

Since my last report to the Church Society no change of importance has taken place in this mission. The usual services have been held. The congregation at St. Paul's church is not large, because the Vestry comprises only seventeen pewholders. The financial difficulty has been met by an agreement with the Board, by which I hope the outstanding debts of the Vestry will be soon paid. The Church Wardens complained that the assessment of St. Paul's church (\$150) was a large sum to demand from seventeen families, and I am afraid that any increase in the assessment next year must lead to the closing of this mission or its amalgamation with Sandy Beach.

The congregation of St. James's church is now by far the larger of the two congregations in my mission. The last increase of assessment has done much to abolish the custom of persons holding pews in both churches, so that the congregations are becoming every day more distinct. I do not regret this, as the previous state of affairs led to many complications. Freedom from debt enables the congregation of St. James's church to manifest an active interest in things belonging to the church and service. During the past year the fences round the churchyard have been thoroughly repaired, and the congregation have purchased a small harmonium for the use

of the church.

I subjoin a statement of the financial position of the two

congregations.

The means of education are not at all equal to the requirements of the mission. During the greater portion of the year there have been two schools in operation. There is now only one. The people in the township of York, on the south side of the York river, are without even the semblance of a school. The same may be said of the north-west settlement, where there are more than thirty children of an age to send to school, but no school. The great difficulty is to obtain school teachers. At the Basin and south-west schools the teachers are paid a salary of £50 cy. In these two places the schools are maintained by the Commissioners. In the other places I have mentioned (especially in the township of York, where there is no regular school organization) the aid of the Church Society on the Colonial C. and S. Society would be very acceptable, provided teachers could be found.

The churches are both insured and the parsonage partially so. Last summer we had a very narrow escape. Both the parsonage and St. Paul's church were in danger of destruc-

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tion from a bush fire which devastated the woods behind the glebe. The exertions of the neighbours and men from the shipping saved the buildings, but the fencing was almost all destroyed. The fact that the fire took place in the day time,

humanly speaking, was what saved the property.

Last autumn I was requested by the Secretary of the Diocesan Board to take steps to organize the mission of Peninsula and Little Gaspé,—a portion of the country whose claims have been alluded to from time to time in Church Reports. I found the people anxious and willing to do all they could, and I forwarded the necessary documents to the Secretary. The disappointment felt by the people on the non-arrival of a clergyman this year has been great. I am sure when a clergyman is found to take charge of the mission he will receive a hearty welcome from the people.

During the year that is now closing we have not begn without signs of life and progress, spiritually, we hope, as well as materially.

In the month of January the Bishop visited the mission, and administered the holy rite of Confirmation, when twenty-

three persons were confirmed. The Holy Eucharist was celebrated after the Confirmation, and nine of the newly-confirmed

communicated.

During the summer the Church was thoroughly painted and put into repair, both inside and outside, by men sent from Montreal, at a cost of about two hundred dollars, the greater part of which is being paid out of the offertories, the remaining part by private subscriptions.

In the month of September a decent font of stone was presented to the Church as a thank-offering for mercies received, taking the place of a wooden one hitherto used.

The increase in the annual subscriptions to the Church Society is greatly due to the exertions of Mr. Wadleigh, one of the students of the college, who acted as collector this year. It is with much thankfulness that the clergyman notes the satisfactory condition of the funds of the Church, notwithstanding the continued removal of Church families from the village, and would regard it as a token of life in the

congregation.

The ladies of the congregation have collected during the year some \$450 towards the fund for a new church, but as owing to our diminished numbers, and to other circumstances, we must wait for some years for the fulfilment of our hopes; it has been thought best to repair our present building. Accordingly, it has been improved by coloring the walls and galleries, towards which a special subscription was made. The ladies are also gathering funds for new curtains, altar cloth, &c., towards which some \$70 has been given. Thus the whole amount collected in Lennoxville for church

purposes during the past year is about \$1380.

At the meeting of the vestry on Easter Monday last it was resolved to make all the pews in the church free—the consent of the pew-holders having been previously obtained—and to trust to the offertory for meeting the necessary expenses of the congregation. We shall be better able to judge of financial results at our next Easter meeting when the accounts for the year are submitted—but we are well satisfied that the throwing open of the house of God to all, rich and poor alike, is only in accordance with christian primitive apostolic and scriptural principles—and if wisely and faithfully carried out will in the end be successful. 29 candidates have been confirmed.

#### LEEDS.

The missionary has been too recently appointed to this charge to give anything in the shape of a report. He wishes simply to say that, on the whole, things look encouraging. The field is large. The labor will necessarily tax his strength, and will certainly prevent him from rusting out for the want of employment. The people, if one may judge from the way they turn out to service, do seem to appreciate the ordinances of religion, and are attentive and devout when in church. Services are held as usual in St. James's Church, Leeds, and St. Mark's Church, Lambie's Mills, five Sundays out of six, the Church at Broughton (distant about 20 miles) being served once in six weeks. Congregations—Leeds, about 70; Lambie's Mills and Broughton, each 55. The Church Wardens have stirred round, and, I believe, collected the assessment due

for this year. I hope they will always be as prompt and the people as ready to respond. I have not done much for the Church Society this year. Next year I hope (D. V.) to do more. Two of the young members of the Lambie's Mills Church volunteered to take round a subscription list, and succeeded in collecting some \$12.50, which I remit, together with the Christmas collection for the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, and my own subscription of \$2 to the General Fund.

### NICOLET.

There are only three church families in this once prospering congregation of Nicolet, while there are 6 Protestants distributed in so many families, at St. Monique and at Chatillon, a distance of 8 and 15 miles from Nicolet.

I have held a Morning Service and a Bible Class every Sabbath afternoon at Nicolet, without intermission, until June last, and a few services during last winter at St. Monique. One was in French, at which a Catholic family, (the father being Protestant, and present) attended.

At the request of a member of the church we had a funeral service conducted in French. Some 30 or 40 Canadians assisted, who sat composedly for a half hour or so, while I addressed our own people, who all understand the French

language.

Some of the congregation, about that time, suggested that I should hold French services in the church, and some steps were taken in that direction. About that time, I had visited a Canadian family, at their own request, for religious conversation, but I soon observed that these attempts of mine to do good were misunderstood by those very parties who had suggested them, and were afterwards made a cause of complaint against me.

I have visited, at stated intervals, the scattered members belonging to us, and have always been well received by their families, and when opportunity offered had reading and

prayer with them.

I have administered the Lords' Supper to an old member, 14 miles from Nicolet, and my presence at his house is always welcomed.

I have visited Three Rivers, and with the Bishop's consent, officiated for Mr. Torrance, during his absence from the city.

### RECTORY OF THREE RIVERS.

The stated services on Sunday and week days have been celebrated; the attendance on the part of the people good, and good will has prevailed throughout the parish. The choir has kept up its reputation, under the superintendence of our accomplished and indefatigable organist, who is always at her post of duty, to

"Render praise to God above, For His redeeming love."

The number of communicants have increased. The Sunday school is well attended. The books in the library have been well read, and the young people are thirsting for more.

The Sunday school festival has passed off to the pleasure

and delight of all concerned.

A bazaar took place last summer in order to raise funds for the erection of a memorial window to the memory of the late Rector, Revd. S. S. Wood, which was very successful. Side windows are also contemplated, and the erection of a new chancel, which will be a great improvement to the architectural appearance of the Church.

Last summer, impromptu readings were given, and later some gentlemen voluntarily came from Quebec, and gave readings and music of a high character, which were much appreciated and well attended on the part of the public. It is to be regretted they are not more frequent, as they are sure of patronage, independent of the pleasure and edification received by those who attend them.

Mr. J. W. Ormsby deserves special mention for his determination and zeal in collecting so successfully for the Church Society, which he has cheerfully done for the last three years. The Rector does not know what he would have done without his assistance.

### SHIGAWAKE.

During the past year there has been abundant call for the ministrations of the Church in this mission. Had I no other evidence of this, my Register, which I delivered up only vesterday, would be amply sufficient to prove the correctness of my statement. During the past year I had 29 baptisms, 7 marriages and 16 funerals, besides 186 services. Young and old were carried off during that period by various diseases. There were several cases of consumption, but the greater number of those who died were carried off by scarlet fever, which has prevailed here to a great extent. In some cases I had been constantly visiting those who died, for weeks and months, striving to prepare them for the great change which it was evident must soon overtake them. In other cases the warning was shorter, and before I could pay many visits they were removed from the sphere in which I could be of any service to them.

I think the prospects of the Church in this mission are very satisfactory. It is true that when one thinks of the extent of the mission and the number of inhabitants, they do comparatively little for the cause of religion, and when one sees the long lines of good farms and comfortable looking houses, we might expect a little more. But what they have is really the result of their own hard labours,—they have cleared their own farms and built their own houses and barns. Money has been very scarce, owing to the depressing system of barter. Taking these things into consideration, we cannot wonder that the people should cling hard to what they get. If they are to do much they must be taught that the cause is worthy of their labour, and that that for which they give anything is really meritorious. They are beginning to learn these things, and are beginning to act accordingly. And as they learn more and more about the Church and religion—more about their God and Saviour—the brighter will become the prospect of the Church here.

### SANDY BEACH.

The usual services and missionary work have been sustained and carried on during the year, and have been, as heretofore, well attended and vigorously prosecuted. The people seem more and more alive to the value of their spiritual privileges, and determined to uphold them. A large proportion of the assessment at which the mission is rated, has been paid, and

we trust that it will all be given in by the commencement of 1871. A special effort has been made by the ladies of the congregation to raise funds for the painting of the Church, and their self-denying labors for that end are worthy of all praise. For some time they devoted two days in a month to working together for a bazaar, meeting for the purpose at each other's houses in rotation; besides devoting a large portion of their attention to working at home for the same end. Then they, this fall, had a sale of the articles made and contributed, and realized \$150. The usual contributions for the Church Society and the wants of the mission have been made, and the amounts raised have been about equal to those of last year. The items are:—

The spiritual prospects of the mission are more cheering than the financial, in looking to the future. There is a marked improvement in the seriousness and devotion of the congregations, and in the number of young persons of both sexes who have become habitual communicants. Though there are thus some hopeful elements, which may favorably affect the result, yet I own that I am much concerned and depressed respecting the future of this mission. Extraneous aid is fast failing, and will soon entirely cease; the people are now taxed to their utmost limit; then how, when the whole burden falls upon them, are they to keep up the work of supplying themselves with the ordinances of religion? It is easy to say that two, three, or more missions must be consolidated into one, and so there will be at least a partial But, will the people consent? Will they go on paying at the rate that they now pay, when they have only one-third, or one-fourth, the amount of services that they now I fear not. That they ought to do so, is one thing; that they will be disposed to do so, is quite another. Many years must elapse ere the Endowment Fund will give them any assistance. I fear that, utterly discouraged, they will sever their allegiance from the Church of England, and seek aid from some other Protestant body; determined that if they cannot have what they prefer, they will at least secure that which they may, considering that any Gospel ministrations are better than none. But the Lord reigneth; He is head over all things to the Church; He may be better to us than our fears.

### ST. SYLVESTER, (TRAVELLING MISSIONARY.)

St. Sylvester,—During the past winter Divine Service was held once on a week day, and throughout the year every Attendance at each service encouraging. Sunday. Sunday only is the offertory taken up. Our wood is supplied by the members of the church as needed, and generally the winter previous. Our day school has been well attended, and satisfactory progress made. The scriptures duly read and the children examined in them. The church catechism taught to the children belonging to the church. Our Sunday school was open during the summer, on an average 15 children regularly attended. They recited the collect for the day, a portion of scripture, a hymn, and a portion of the catechism. Two mothers, one of them a widow, very kindly attended as teachers, and in my absence carried on the school. Our three collections have been taken up, and though there may be a small falling off it arises from some families leaving the settlement. The same may be said of the annual subscriptions. In performing these duties as relative to money matters, there may be, and no doubt there are, some unpleasant feelings; still, your Missionary is convinced that it is as much a duty as to preach the Gospel. Your Missionary is further persuaded that at such times each member should be prepare I to give; this would teach them to bear the yoke in their youths and when called on to perform their quota in manhood it would not gall the neck, but the duty would be well and duly performed.

St. Giles,—Our day school was suspended the whole year, but now it is re-opened under the same teacher as last year. Our Sunday school has been duly attended to, but without any aid to the Missionary. Some attention is paid to singing at the close of the schools. Two of the Sunday scholars, though quite young, practice the hymns to be sung on the following Sundays at church at their home, being aided and encouraged by their beloved parents, and in this duty one of the church wardens and his sister take a lively interest. From this small body our public singing is creditable and not

a little encouraging. Our collections, annual subscriptions, are attended to in this parish with equal care as at St. Sylvester; our attendance more varied, as a greater part of the congregation come from a greater distance, and often the roads far more difficult to travel. I feel assured that those who contribute towards the funds of the Society at St. Giles

do it with a good will.

St. Patrick's,—Here we have a day school and an excellent teacher, but few scholars, not more than 15 on an average. Our Sunday school too has fallen through, this latter school I could never attend. I have used means to resuscitate both, time only will prove the amount of success. For the first time a service has been held every Sunday through the past summer. The labour has been well paid, by a much larger and more regular attendance. But it was no little addition of labour to your Missionary, nor could it have been done if A. Ross, Esq., had not sent for your Missionary three miles out, and sent him back again immediately after service. Divine Service at St. Sylvester, to make this plan feasible, was deferred from 3 to 4 p.m. This service, from the shortness of the day, is discontinued for the present, and a service held on a Friday, at 6.30 p.m., instead.

St. Margaret's,—Divine Service once a fortnight in the evening. Our congregation is diminishing fast in the settlement. The families are removing to some other parts of Canada. There are not more than 7 families and 3 adults. The Dissenters attend if it be in the evenings. A goodly company comes from St. Catherine's to this little church, if the roads through the bush and weather permit. We have again opened our day school. It was closed for some months. The children make satisfactory improvement, and the parents readily admit that were it not for the help received from the Church Society, though small it may be, they could

not have started the school.

St. Catherine's,—As your missionary returns homeward from St. Margaret's, through this settlement, Divine service is held if time permit. When Divine service is held at St. Margaret's some from this settlement attend. It is most cheering to me, as I generally return with them, to behold them plodding through the mud or deep snow. The distance from one place to the other is not less than 3 miles. One able and good man willingly serves as pioneer to this people, not unfrequently some from 5 families. If the said young man undertake to guide me and my horse through the forest I follow him without any misgivings. But a few Sundays

ago as we drew near to the entrance of the woods it was completely blocked up by fallen timber, blown down by the mighty wind a little time before. They had furnished themselves with two lanterns and candles. One had to light me to climb over the fallen trees for the space of a third of an acre. And the young man had to take my horse and thread their way through another part of the forest as best they might.

St. Francis,—At this place the Lay Reader labours freely in his duty of holding Divine service amongst the members of the Church. And they as cheerfully attend to their duties. The prayers and responses are made with a full tone of voice, as well as their singing, which is led by the Lay Reader's lady, who, like himself, enters on her task with a thorough good will, so that the singing is done lustily and

with a good courage.

St. George,—The Manor House is, and has been, the place in which Divine Service has been held. Our members continue in one stay. The collections and annual subscriptions are taken up here as well as at all the other places. A small frame of an intended Church has been put up this fall. We hope to complete it in due time. I know not that we can trust for help in completing the building from more than six families.

The Township of Jersey, a small settlement still, is

regularly attended when the river Chaudiere permits.

Cumberland Mills,—The congregation is much scattered. When due notice is given the attendance is good. The people are poor; they commenced to put up a school-house, but leaving it in an unfinished state, it was blown down by that great storm. A teacher, the most suitable for them, was engaged, but has left them for the States. This is a source of grief to the missionary.

St. Mary,—Our little congregation, which consisted of two families, has received an addition of another young couple with one child, a teacher and four young children. These attend Divine Service as often as your missionary passes

through the settlement.

### RICHMOND AND MELBOURNE.

The work of the Church in this mission has lately been enlarged by the addition of two Sunday services, one each in the Township of Brompton and Windsor, distant, respectively, from Melbourne, 14 and 10 miles. I began a fortnightly

week-day service in Brompton in August last, and continued it for three months. Soon the necessity for something more became apparent; and now we have service in Brompton every Sunday morning, and in Windsor once a fortnight in the afternoon. I serve Brompton and Windsor once in four weeks myself, and once in four weeks by an assistant from here. The alternate fortnightly service is due to the zeal of Mr. Albert Stevens, student of divinity at Bishop's College, Lennoxville. The Sunday School at Brompton already numbers 50 scholars. I hope to give a fuller account of this

interesting and promising station next year.

During the year I met with a heavy loss and discouragement in the removal to Montreal of my kind friend and most willing fellow-worker, Mr. Melbourne Tait. Mr. Tait was the first Reader publicly admitted to that office in this diocese,—I believe the first in Canada,—and for two years, with quiet and persistent earnestness, he worked on in the regular round of his duties. Being personally liked and esteemed by everyone in the community, and an attractive reader, Mr. Tait did a good deal towards breaking down that unreasonable and hurtful feeling of prejudice against lay help in the conduct of Divine Service, which so widely prevails among our people, and which is so serious an obstacle in the way of the enlargement of the Church's field of labor. This prejudice, the offspring of pride and selfishness, and of that miserable, cold, exclusive respectability which has too long numbed the energies of English churchmen, is a sad witness to our lack of a godly zeal for the honor of Christ and the good of souls. But it is losing its hold, and must finally give way and disappear before the united and persistent exertions and explanations of the clergy. Notwithstanding Mr. Tait's loss, the services have been kept up every Sunday at St. John's. The Reader's turn at Silver's I have not been able for the last few weeks to supply; the Sunday school, however, is maintained every Sunday. The services in this mission are now as follows: -St. Ann's, twice every Sunday; St. John's and Brompton, once every Sunday; Silver's and Windsor, once a fortnight.

The Sunday Schools are all fairly prosperous. The results of a public examination on successive Sundays, during Divine Service, of the seven classes of the St. John's Sunday School, last winter, amazed the congregation, and was very gratifying to the teachers and myself. I never conducted so satisfactory an examination. I propose to repeat the experiment with that and other schools this winter, giving prizes to the best scholars.

The project of a new Church in Richmond, on a more convenient site, after dragging on for more than two years, was finally, to my great regret, abandoned. Instead, we have enlarged the old St. Ann's, by adding an extension of thirty feet, and otherwise remodelling it, at a cost of some \$1,500, or more, all, of course, raised on the spot, and all paid up. The result, in point of appearance and accommodation, promises to be more satisfactory than we had hoped. We take possession of the enlarged Church on Christmas Day. A very commodious shed, for the protection of the horses, has been lately built by the congregation of St. John's, at a cost of about \$120. This is very much to their credit, and an act of mercy to the poor beasts, which ought never to be neglected.

The Church in this mission has sustained a heavy loss in the death of her oldest, and, as all here agree in saying, best member, and my dear and valued friend, Chester Bissel Cleveland. Mr. Cleveland, who died after an illness of only a few hours, at the age of 73 years, immigrated to Shipton in 1805; and on the first elergyman being settled here in 1830, attached himself to the communion of the Church, and continued to the end a stedfast, consistent, intelligent and liberal member. His loss to myself, both as one in whose judgment and piety I could always confide, and as a personal friend, with whom I could take sweet counsel, is greater than I can express.

I must express my gratitude to several gentlemen—seven in all—for kind and ready help as readers, and to the large staff of our Sunday School teachers, for their unwearied and punctual attendance upon their self-denying duties. My layhelpers during the year have been thus 37 in number. May God abundantly bless them all, and reward them in their own souls with an evergrowing increase of holiness!

I have again to acknowledge many acts of kindness on the part of my people, among others my wood, through Mr. Journeau, from the congregation of St. Ann's; an Epiphany gift, on the Christmas Tree, of \$46; an Easter offering, from the same, amounting to \$63; and still again from the same congregation a gift of \$50 on taking a trip to the sea side for the benefit of my health, last summer. From the congregation of Silver's School House a gift of nearly \$50.

I have only now to repeat what I have said on former occasions, that, in the good providence of God, I have been enabled to carry on the routine of the mission with regularity,—in the performance of Divine Service in the churches, in the superintendence of the Sunday Schools, and in pastoral visiting, except that on two Sundays I was confined to the house by sickness, and on another I could not get to Church by reason of a great storm. The attendance at the Churches continues good, and I may say that almost all seem to come

in a devotional spirit. The number of children at the two Sunday Schools has been over one hundred, and the attendance has been very regular. Much sickness has prevailed during the year, causing much time to be taken up in travelling to visit the different cases, some being at the extreme ends of the mission, and also much exposure to the

inclemency of the weather.

The repairs and alterations outside and inside of St. Peter's Church, Paspebiac, and the draining of the ground around it, have been completed this summer, the expense, amounting to much more than we expected when we began, being considerably above £500. Of this, however, the mercantile house of Messrs. C. Robin & Co. have most liberally paid over £400; and this is far from being the first instance of their liberality to the Church. Their, headquarters is at Paspebiac; and to their chief agent there, M. F. Gibant, Esq., we are under the greatest obligations for earrying out all these improvements. To this, Mr. Gibaut has added a donation of \$100, from himself, to our endowment. Some balances of pew rents and collections which remained in the hands of the Church Treasurer, and about £8 subscribed at a Vestry meeting paid off the whole balance of the expense of the alterations, so that the Church is again clear of debt.

A harmonium, also, has been given to this Church by a few friends, which contributed to the improvement of the chanting

and singing.

St. Andrew's Church, New Carlisle, has not required any repairs during this year, which is fortunate, as we require nearly all we can raise by subscription and pew rents to pay the assessment to the Diocesan Board; which assessment I must again repeat that I consider too high, but as I gave reasons for this opinion in my last year's report, I shall not repeat them here.

Upon the whole, then, the present state of the mission appears satisfactory. As to its future prospects I cannot take

upon me to speak.

## FORMS OF BEQUESTS AND DEVISES BY WILL.

1. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock, or Public Debentures, for the general purposes of the Society.

I give and bequeath to "the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, the sum of (or Shares of Stock in the Bank of standing in my name in the Books of the said Bank, or of Debentures, describe them briefly,) upon trust, to be by the said Church Society applied to and for the uses and purposes of the said Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation and none other.

II. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italies say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Sustentation Fund.

Or,

Towards the support of missionaries and clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, called the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

#### Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund, for endowing the church in the mission of (or at ) held by the said Church Society, subject to the conditions of a Deed of Trust passed between the said Church Society and the Incumbent and church-wardens of the church in the said mission, (or at

#### Or,

As the commencement of an endowment for the church of St. in the mission of , (or at ) and to provide for the future maintenance of divine worship in conformity with the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland.

#### Or,

For and towards the encouragement of education, and the support of Day Schools and Sunday Schools in the said Diocese of Quebec, in conformity with the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland.

#### Or,

For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the United Church of England and Ireland within the said Diocese of Quebec.

#### Or,

For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the United Church of England and Ireland, and the Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

#### Or,

As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of churches according to the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage houses,—the setting apart of burial grounds and church-yards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

### III. A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.

I give and devise unto the "Church Society of the Diocese of Quebee," incorporated by a Statute of the province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, all and singular, &c. [Describe the real estate clearly.] To have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors, for ever; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

# IV. A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

## V. A Devise to the Society of a site for Church, &c.

Same as No. 3, down to the words "for ever"—then go on as follows;—to the uses and upon the trusts following, that is to say; upon trust to hold the same for ever hereafter as and for the place and site of a Church and Church-yard, and Burial-ground, for the sole use and benefit of members of the Church residing in the places adjacent to the said site and premises within the said Diocese of Quebec, according to the doctrine and discipline of the United Church of England and Ireland, and for no other purpose, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

The Annual Sermons in aid of the various funds of the Church Society are appointed to be preached—

FOR GENERAL PURPOSES, on Quinquagesima Sunday.

FOR THE MISSION FUND, on the Sunday nearest to Michaelmas.

FOR THE WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND, on such other Sunday as may be found most convenient.

The attention of applicants for grants is particularly directed to the following rules.

- 1. That no grant be made for any church, parsonage, glebe, or other property, which shall not have been duly vested in the authorities of the Church.
- 2. That grants be payable when the amount shall be sufficient to free the property from debt: or that the debt be a mortgage for an amount not exceeding twenty-five per cent of the value of the property or building, when finished.
- 3. That the Treasurer, when transmitting the amount of any grant of money, made by this Society, to any parish or mission in the diocese, shall require a receipt, signed jointly by the Incumbent of such parish or mission, and one or both of the churchwardens.

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- 4. That in all cases where grants of money (other than personal) are made by the Church Society, it shall be the duty of the person to whom such grant shall be paid, to furnish, within three months afterwards, regular vouchers of the expenditure of such sums, to be submitted to the Board.
- 5. That with the exception of grants to aid in building churches, when the conditions on which any sum is voted are not complied with, and the money applied for within one year from the time it is voted, such grant shall be struck off the list.
- 6. That no grant shall be made towards the erection of any church or parsonage, unless the plans and site have been approved of by the Bishop.

t shall be made to any parish, mission, or least one sermon shall not have been thich the subscription shall not have year.

8. That all applications for aid reach the hands of the Secretary at least a fortnight before the next meeting of the Central Board.

9. That no application for aid in repairing either churches or parsonages be entertained for the future; as the Central Board conceive it to be the duty of congregations to keep all their church property in good repair.

10. Clergymen desirous of participating in the benefits of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund are required to pay their annual contributions before the first of May in each year.
