## CONSTITUTION

## OF THE

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## InCORPORATED BY THE STATUTE OF CANADA, 7 VICTORIA, CAP. 68, FOR PROMOTING THE FOLLOWING OBJECTS;

FIRsT-For the encouragement and support of Missionaries and clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland within the Diocese of Toronto, and for creating a fund towards the augmentation of the stipends of poor Clergymen, and towards making provision for those who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, and for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy of the said Church in the said Diocese.

Secondly-For the encouragement of Education, and for the Support of Day-schools and Sunday-schools in the said Diocese, in conformity with the principles of the said Church.

Thirdly-For granting assistance, where it may be nccessary, to those who may be preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the said Church, within the said Diocese.

Fourthiy-For oirculating in the said Diocese the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the said Church, and such other Books and Tracts as shall be approved by the Central Board or Managing Committee of the said Association.

Fifthly-For obtaining and granting aid towards the erection, endowment, and maintenance of Churches, according to the establishment of the said Church, in the said Diocese ; the erection and maintenance of Parsonage houses; the setting apart of Burial-grounds and Church-yards; the endowment and support of Parsonages and Rectories, according to the same establishment, and the management of all matters relating to such endowment.
I.

That before the Scciety shall enter upon any businessat any of its meetings, the following Prayers shall be said:-
" Prevent us, 0 Lord, in all our doings, with Thy most gracious favour, and further us with thy continual help; that in all our works, begun, continued, and ended in Thee, we may glorify Thy Holy Name, and finally by Thy mercy obtain everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

## CONSTITUTION.

"O God, from whom all holy desires, all good counsels, and all works of piety and charity do proceed, we beseech Thee to visit with Thy favour our Sovereign Queen Victoria, and so rule her heart, that she may in all things seek Thy honour and glory. Prosper with Thy blessing the designs of this Society. Comfort with Thy grace those benefactors who contribute to its support. Bless the ministry of Thy servants, the Clergy; the endeavours of all who are engaged in spreading the knowledge of true religion in this Province, and the labours of those Missionaries who are promoting the same in foreign parts. And may Thy Holy Spirit direct all our consultations to the advancement of Thy glory, and the good of thy Church, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
"O Merciful God, who hast made all men, and hatest nothing that thou hast made, nor wouldest the death of a sinner but rather that he should be converted and live, have mercy upon all Jews, Turks, infidels, and heretics, and also upon all those heathen nations upon which the light of Thy glorious Gospel hath not yet shone; especially the Indians of this continent. Bless the means used for their civilization and conversion, and take from them all ignorance, hardness of heart, and contempt of Thy Word: and so fetch them home, blessed Lord, to Thy flock, that they may be saved among the remnant of the true Israelites, and be made one fold under one Shepherd, Jesus Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, world without end. Amen.

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## AND WHEN BUSINESS IS ENDED.

"Almighty God, Father of all mercies, we thine unworthy servants do give Thee most humble and hearty thanks for all Thy goodness, and loving kindness, to us and to all men : more particularly for the providential support by which this Society hath been enabled to spread abroad the knowledge of Thy sacred truth. But above all for Thine inestimable love in the redemption of the world by Thy blessed Son ; for the means of grace and for the hope of glory, which thou hast given us, in the same our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ ; to whom with Thee and the Holy Ghost be all honour and glory, world without end. Amen.
"The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Ghost, be with us all evermore. Amen."

## II.

That all those who are now, or who shall hereafter become, Members of the Association, and who shall subscribe Teu Shillings annually to the Funds of the Society, or contribute as much as Five Ponnds in one sum, shall be Associated Members of the Society, and shall be eligible to be Members of the Corporation.

## III.

That every Incorporated Member subscribe not less than One Pound Five Shillings annually to the Funds of the Society, or contribute not less than Twelve Pounds Ten Shillings in one sum, or land to the value of twenty-five Pounds; and that the Standing Committee be empowered, with the sanction of the President, to recommend persons whether Associated Members or not, to be elected into the Corporation as Life Members, who shall have contributed through any of the Parochial Associations in connexion with the Society, in money, the sum of Twenty Pounds, or in land to the value of Thirty Pounds, for any of the follawing speoial purposes :-To be invested or held in trust for the Widows and Orphans' Fund; to
be invested or 1 that it shall be in each and ev for the year be erased from

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be invested or held in trust for the endowment of a Church or a Church-school ; and that it shall be the duty of the Secretary at the Meeting in the month of October in each and every year to make a return of those who have not paid up the 25 s. for the year ending the 30th day of April previous, and that such names shall be erased from the list of Incorporated Members.

## IV.

That the Corporation shall consist of the Bishop of Toronto for the time being, of the members appointed by the charter, and of so many of the other Associated Members of the Society as shall be elected by ballot Members of the Corporation, at the meetings to be from time to time holden on the days and at the place appointed by the By-laws of the Gorporation for its stated meetings. Provided always, that the whole number of Members of the said Corporation, in addition to those who are made Members by the Statute, shall at no time exceed three hundred, and that the whole number of Members of the Corporation shall never be less than one hundred.

## V.

That the Standing Committee of the Society, to be appointed as provided in one of the following By-laws, be empowered, with the sanction of the President, to recommend persons, whether Associated Members or not, to be elected into the Corporation, without reference to the limitation of numbers.

## VI.

That the Lord Bishop of Toronto for the time being shall be President of the Society, and the Venerable the Archdeacons within the Diocese shall be Vice- . Presidents.

## VII.

That the Society shall, at their Meeting on the second Wednesday in June in each year, choose one or more Vice-President or Vice-Presidents in addition to the Archdeacons; one or more Treasurer or Treasurers; two or more Auditors; one Secretary, and such other officers, ministers and servants as shall be thought convenient to serve in the said offices for the year ensuing. Provided always, that no person not a member of the Society shall be eligible to any office.
VIII.

That the paid officers of the Society to be appointed by the foregoing rule, shall be a Secretary, and a subordinate officer to be selected by himself; that the former shall be in Holy Orders, uncharged with Parochial cure, and that he shall furnish security to the satisfaction of the Solicitor to the amount of $£ 1000$-himself in $£ 500$ and two sureties in $£ 250$ each. Also the Auditors.

## IX.

That the Standing Committee shall propose to the Board at the General Meeting in October, a list of seven Members of the Society, to form the Tract and Book Committee for the year ensuing; that at that meeting any member be at liberty to propose another list of seven members of the Society, instead of that proposed by the Standing Committee ; and that the election of the Tract and Book Committee take place at the General Meeting in November.

## X .

That if it shall happen that any of the persons at any time chosen into any of the said offices shall die, or on any account be removed from such office at any time during the period for which he was elected or appointed to serve, in such case the President, or any one of the Vice-Presidents, shall convene a meeting, to be held at the usual place of meeting of the Society, at such tirfe as shall be specified in the notice of such meeting; and that such members of the Corporation as shall be present at the meeting, or a majoritv of them, shall and may choose an officer or officers in
the room or place of such person or persons so dead or removed, as to them shall seem meet. Provided, that it shall not be necessary for any such meeting to be called for supplying a vacancy in the office of Vice-President: but the President may do so in his discretion.

## XI.

That the Society shall and may, on the second Wednesday in wery month, excepting the months of August and September, for ever hereafter, and oftener if occasion require, meet at the place heretofore used for the transaction of the business of the said Society, or such other place as may be hereafter appointed for that purpose ; and that the President or Standing Committee have power to call a Special Meeting of the said Society at any time. In Lent, the meetings to be holden on Thursday instead of Wednesday.

## XII.

That no act done in any meeting of the said Society shall be valid and effectual unless the President, or some one of the Vice-Presidents, shall be present at such Meeting.

## XIII.

And with regard to all meetings of the Society, and to the making, altering, or repealing any By-laws, Rules or Regulations at such Meetings, it is to We specially noticed, that by the Act of the Legislature incorporating the Society, ( 7 V c. ch. 68, ) it is enacted that no act done in such Assembly or meeting of the Corporation shall be valid or effectual, unless six persons of the Corporation, at the least, shall be present, and the major part of them consenting thereto.

And further, that no Constitution, By-law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, nor any abrogation, repeal, change or alteration of the same, shall be passed, except notice of such intention shall bave been given at the previous monthly freeting, and then it shall not be of any force or effect until it shall have been sanctioned and confirmed by the Bishop of, or administering, the Diocese for the time being, by writing under his hand

## XIV.

That there shall be a Standing Committee (three of whom shall be a quorum, to prepare business for the Monthly Meetings of the Society.

That the President, Vice-Presidents, Rural Deans and Secretary, be ex officio members of the Standing Committee.

That the other members of the Standing Committee, not exceeding twenty in number, shall be elected by the Society out of its Incorporated Members residing in the City of Toronto and its vicinity, also of a Clerical and Lay member from each of the several District Branch Associations in connexion with the Parent Society, to be elected annually by such Branch Association.

That the non-official Members of the Standing Committee residing in the City of Toronto and its vicinity, the four who, having been on the Standing Committee for one entire year, have attended the fewest meetings of the Standing Committee during the twelve months ending on the first Wednesday in March, shall go out at the Annual meeting in June; and if any doubt shall arise under this rule, which member of those who have attended the fewest meetings is to retire, then the one who has served the shortest time on the Committee shall be considered to have vacated his seat.

That the Standing Committee shall recommend to the Society at its Meeting in March in each year four Members to be elected in the place of the four retiring members, who shall not be eligible for the ensuing year.

That any member of the Society wishing to propose other candidates for election on the Standing Committee, be required to give in the names of such candidates to be proposed by him, at or before the Monthly Meeting in March.

## XV.

That Minutes of all the proceedings of the Society be taken, and that at each meeting of the Society the minutes of the preceding meeting be read by the secretary, and aigned by the Chairman.
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## XVI.

That the accounts of the Society be closed on the thirtieth day of April in each year; and that the same be audited within one month from that date.

## XVII.

That the Secretary conduct the correspondence of the Society, take Minutes of the proceedings of the general Meetings and Committees, prepare the annual Report of the Society, attend meetings of the Branches throughout the Diocese under the direction of the President, and take the general superintendence of the affairs and accounts of the Society in all its departments.

## XVIII.

In connexion and correspondence with the Society, District Associations shall be established, comprising one or more Districts (as shall be approved by the President), the same to be composed of the Clergy resident within the bounds of the district, and all other Members who shall contribute in aid of the Society's Funds; the Archdeacon, or Senior Clergyman resident within its bounds, shall ex officio be Chairman of such District Branch Associations, with whom shall be associated, as composing a Committee of Management, all Clergymen in the District, and one or more Laymen from each congregation which observes the constitution, rules and regulations of the Society, and from none others, the lay members to be elected at the Annual Meeting of the District Branch.

A General Meeting of eaeh Branch Dristrict Association shall be held in each year, at any time and place which may be agreed upon at a previous Quarterly Meeting of the Committee of Management; and Quarterly Meetings of the Committee of Management-not less than five to form a quorum-shall be held for the transaction of the ordinary business of the Branch Association.

In order the more fully to carry out the objects of the Society, each parish, in the person of its Clergyman and Churchwardens, shall be a Sub-Association, in correspondence, through its Chairman (the Clergyman), with the District Branch Associations, and may be denominated, The Parochial Committee of the Church Society. The Committee shall meet so often, and at such periods, as they shall themselves decide to be most convenient, inviting the cooperation of all the Parishioners in their deliberations and designs. They shall collect subscriptions and donations from the members of the Church, in such manner as they shall deem most effective, and endeavour by every means in their power to augment the resources of the Society. All moneys raised to be transmitted to the treasurer of the District Association.

The Treasurer of each District Association shall transmit annually the full sum of $£ 15 \mathrm{~s}$. for each duly recognised Clergyman, and also for each incorporated member within his district, and in case of life membership the full sum of $£ 12$ 10s., together with one-fourth of all the moneys paid into his hands, to the Treasurer of the Society at Toronto, to be at the disposol of the Central Board, and the remaining threefourths of such collections shall, when required, be expended within the Parish or District in which they have been made, for such objects only as are specified in the Constitution of the Society-the allotment to be made at the Quarterly Meetings of the District Branch Association. All moneys not required to bo expended for local purposes, and remaining unappropriated at the General Annual Meeting of the District Associations, shall be forthwith transmitted to the Treasurer of the Society at Toronto.

The District Associations, through their respective Secretaries, shall communicate to the Secretary of the Parent Society at Toronto a minute Statement of all receipts and expenditures within the sphere of their operations, embodied in the form of a Report, one in each year, so soon as convenient after the General Annual meeting of such District Branch Associations.

## NLN.

That four Sermons be preached annually in the several Churches, Chapels, and Stations in this Diocese, in aid of the funds of the Society, at such times as the Lord Bishop shall appoint ; that of these collections the proceeds of one shall be for the benefit of the Widows and Orphans of Clergymen deceased, of another, for the
maintenance of Travelling or Resident Missionaries in this Diocese ; of another, to aid Theological Students, and that the proceeds of the fourth shall be appropriated to any other objects embraced within its Constitution, as the Society may from time to time direct.
xx .
That no application for a grant, loan, or other assistance, be entertained from any Rectory, Incumbency or Mission, in which there shall not have been established a "Parochial Committee" of this Society under the provisions of the article of the Constitution thereof, reporting to and in communication with the Parent Society, and in which all the requirements of said Constitution shall not have been complied with, unless upon the omission of such requirement a special written dispensation shall have been obtained within three months of the date thereof; and further, that accompanying such application there be a distinct accurate description of the object towards which aid is sought, together with a detailed account of the sum of money collected in the locality or elsewhere towards the same object, and how applied: Provided nevertheless, that it shall be at all times competent for the President to recommend to the Standing Committee any case which in his Lordship's opinion may require special consideration; and should the Standing Committee report favourably thereon, that the Society may in such case grant the assistance so sought, or any portion thereof; and further, that no application be entertained from the Widow or Orphan or the guardian of the Orphan of any deceased Clergyman of this Diocese who shall not have conformed to the provision's and requirements of a certain By-law, entitled a "By-law for the due administration and improving the Widows and Orphans' Fund of the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto," and also of any amendments to the said By-law, which may be enacted from time to time according to the provisions of the Constitution of the said Society, unless upon the omission of any of the said requirements a special written dispensation had been granted by his Lordship the President, and forwarded to the Secretary for registration within three months after the date thereof. Provided, nevertheless, that it shall be at all times competent for the President to recommend to the Standing Committe any case which in his Lordship's opinion may require special considerstion, and should the Standing Committee report favourably thereon, that then the Society may grant such proportion of any annuity as to said Society may seem fit ; and that it be the duty of the Secretary after ech Annual Meeting of the Society, to notify to each Clergyman whether he have or have not eomplied with the requirements which would entitle his Widow and Orphans to the Pension.

## XXI.

That the Charter and these By-laws do together form the Gonstitution of the Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto, and that nothing which is contained in the Constitution of the Society established on the 28th day of April, 1842, or in any By-law, Rule, or Regulation, amending or altering the same, shall apply to, or be in force in respect to, the Incorporated Church Society of the Diocese of Toronto, except such provisions thereof as are above continued in force.

OF THE

DIOCESE OF TORONTO,

PRESENTED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING AT TORONTO, HELD ON WEDNESDAY, JUNE 9 TH, 1858.

The year which has elapsed since the last public meeting of the Church Society of this Diocese, has been marked by events of deep interest to mankind at large, and of momentous importance to the British Empire. Nor can the Committee, in presenting its Sixteenth Annual Report, fail to trace in these events striking intimations of the Providential Government of the world, and stirring incentives to a more active and faithful discharge of our duties as members of the Church of Christ. The general instructions of our blessed Lord, to "preach the Gospel to every creature," would appear to be addressed with especial emphasis to those churches or civil governments to which it has pleased Almighty God to vouchsafe special facilities for the discharge of this high commission ; and it cannot be denied that the late calamitous events in the Eastern possessions of Great Britain must be regarded as a rebuke for past neglect, and as a warning to redoubled diligence for the future. Your Committee would earnestly urge on the members of our Communion their obligation not only to enable this Society to occupy the missionary field which lies immediately before it among the aborigines, and the poorer settlements in this Diocese, but also to extend their sympathies and efforts to the wider objects which present themselves, and to requite the fostering care which our Branch of the Church bas received in past years from the great Parent Societies at home, by a cordial co-operation in the pious and benevolent
enterprises which recent events have prompted them to undertake. It is indeed consolatory that we are enabled to find, amid the horrors of war, and even in the peculiar atrocities which have marked the late revolt in the East, occasions for applying the remedial influences of the Gospel, and for carrying out in practice the Apostolic injunction, "Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good."
Nor has the past year been barren in events of local interest. Regarding, as the Society ever has, with kindly sympathy, the operations of the Church in the sister Dioceses erected within the aprovinces of British North America, your Committee have witnessed with peculiar interest the creation of the new Bishopric of Huron, by the accomplishment of the long contemplated division of the Diocese of Toronto; and also the great success which has attended the efforts of those who are endeavouring to raise the endowment for the proposed Bishopric of Kingston, warranting, as it does, the belief, that before the next Annual Meeting of our Society, this much desired object will, with God's blessing, be attained.

We rejoice now, both that our venerated and beloved Diocesan has been so far relieved of some part of his too onerous duties; and also that, by the extension of the Episcopate, provision has been made for the more secure and permanent establishment of the Branch of Christ's Church which is planted amongst us. Believing as we do in the Divine iustitution of the Episcopal office, we recognise in the foundation of a new see, a legitimate application of means, devised by no human wisdom or forethought, but appointed by the Great Author of our most holy faith, for the strengthening and edifying of His Church.

The dissolution of former ties must, indeed, under any circumstances, be an occasion of regret ; but the change in our internal relations cannot, we are persuaded, diminish in any degree the affectionate interest which we have ever felt in the prosperity of our brethren in the West, who, though now as a body separated from as by certain arbitrary bounds, ever will, we are confident, be with us in spirit.

## INCOME.

Although your Committee have to report that the gross amount of the receipts by the Parent Society and its district branches is less by $£ 873$ 10s., than in the preceding year, when all circumstances connected therewith are taken into consideration, much cau ze: vill be found for thankfulness and congratulation.

When the report was read last year, the total amount of recejpts was :et down as $£ 53720 \mathrm{~s} .6 \mathrm{~d}$. ; one of the items comprising this amount was $£ 3717 \mathrm{~s} .5 \mathrm{~d}$., received on account of various trusts and investments returned.

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REPORT.
The amount received on these accounts necessarily varies from year to year, and as it is no criterion of the Society's prosperity or otherwise, has always been set down alone, in order to make that part of the report headed "Income," agree with the various tabular statements published in the appendix.

This year, only £202 1s. 4d. was received on account of investments returned, and of moneys merely passing through the hands of the Society as trustees. Thus $£ 169$ 6s. 1d. of the deficiency is accounted for. The balance of this deficiency-£703 13s. 11d. -can be thus satisfactorily accounted for: Since our last report, the western portion of the Diocese of Toronto has been, we rejoice to say, constituted into a new Diocese-the Diocese of Huron. Twenty-six parochial branches, now embraced in this new Diocese, contributed to the Society's funds last year. This year only nine of these have as yet reported and remitted their quota to our funds.

The annual subscriptions of several of the clergy and the incorporated members, for the year ending 30th April, instant, will doubtless be received before the report is printed in pamphlet form.

Some of the parishes within our Diocese, owing to the pressure of the money market, have not as yet reported, though the Secretary has been notified that they will soon do so. For instance, no report has been received from the Simcoe District Branch, but the District Secretary has reported that from what information he has received, at least $£ 100$ has been collected. The collection for the Theological Students' Fund, to be taken in April, had been delayed in many localities for the same reason; and it is confidently hoped that when these sums are received, the income of the Parent Society will, instead of a deficiency, show an increase over that of the last year.

The income of the Parent Society, up to the time of the closing of the books, exclusive of moneys received on account of special trusts and investments returned, and deducting £216 3s. 8 d. , received as per last annual report (on account of previous year, after the books were placed in the Auditors' hands,)

## SERMONS.

The proceeds of the Quarterly Collections in the several churches and stations, during the past year, were as follows:


A decrease, when compared with the last year, of $£ 142$ 18s. 8d., which can be accounted for from the fact that the two last collections were appointed to be taken up after the organization of the new diocese, and that several parishes have not yet remitted the last collection. Last year 655 stations remitted; this year, only 593 have as yet done so. Your Committee see good cause to reiterate the opinion expressed by them last year-ihat if the clergy will carefully consider the statements now regularly sent them quarterly, with respect to the several objects which the Society desires to be advocated, they will be easily able to enlist the sympathies of the laity, and there need be no fear but, though the Diocese be divided and sub-divided, that sufficient funds will be provided for carrying out all those objects.

In addition to the four general objects, a collection was taken up in the several churches, on account of the Indian Relief Fund, the exact amount collected is not known, as a few of the parishes remitted direct. A bill for £264 5s. sterling was sent to the Governor's Seeretary by the Secretary of the Society, and a small balance, subsequently received, is still to the credit of the Fund, at the Commercial Bank, and will be remitted shortly, it having been retained in the hope that it would be further augmented. The sum thus received was not included in the Society's income, as was erroneously done in a previous year, when a collection was taken up on behalf of the Jubilee Fund of S. P. G.

## MISSION FUND.

The proceeds of the quarterly collections for the Mission Fund amounted to $£ 3267 \mathrm{~s}$. 1 d ., over $£ 30$ more than in the previous year, although taken up at 163 stations instead of 178 , the number reported last year.

The following sums have been paid out on this account, during the year, for missionary work:

REPORT.

The Parent Society have undertaken to pay, during the current year, the sum of $£ 590$; of this sum, however, $£ 245$ has been hitherto expended in the Western Diocese. Previous to the collection to be taken up in July, a detailed statement will be published, setting forth the amount required to enable the Society to meet its engagements. And your Committee feel assured that the laity have only to feel convinced that the money is needed for missionary purposes, in order to induce them to give liberally.

## WIDOWS AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The proceeds of the quarterly collections for this object this year fell short by about $£ 78$. The amount received being £382 15 s . 6d-the previous year $£ 462$ 7s. 10d.-taken up at 190 stations, in lieu of 204. The income from investments and clergy subscriptions amounted to $£ 524$ 10s. 4 d., and $£ 376$ 5s. has been added to Investment Fund, so that the sum of £8129 1s. 5d. is now invested on this account. Seven widows and the orphans of two clergymen have received assistance to the amount of $£ 430$.

## GENERAL PURPOSE FUND.

The proceeds of the quarterly collections for this Fund amounted to £222 15s., being a decrease of £32 17s. 7d., raised at 146 stations in lieu of 155 ; add to this amount the sums received from Parochial Branches and annual subscriptions, and it will be found that the total receipts of this account amounted to $£ 13096 \mathrm{~s} .9 \mathrm{~d}$. From this fund grants were made to 10 churches and two parsonages of $£ 1210 \mathrm{~s}$. each, total amount $£ 125$, and grants of books and tracts amounting to $£ 77 \mathbf{1 8 s} .6 \mathrm{~d}$.

## STUDENTS' FUND.

The collections on behalf of this fund were to be taken up in the month of April, and returns have been only received as yet from 90 stations, and the amount only $£ 115$ 11s. 11d., instead of $£ 193$ 12s. 8d. remitted the previous year; there is but little doubt, however, that more moneys will still be received on this account. The names of eleven young gentlemen have been submitted to your committee as having been partially assisted out of this fund. £200 having been paid over as usual to the Bursar of Trinity College.

In consequence of representations which have appeared in print, and which, as there is reason to believe, have left in some quarters a false impression, it may be well to state that the sum annually devoted to Divinity Scholarships in Trinity College has at all times far exceeded the amount subscribed for the purpose by this Society; and that for the ensuing year the sum of $£ 200$ will not cover the necessary outlay-providing, as it does, under the arrangement adopted last year, for four Scholarships only, tenable for two years, thus enabling only four Students annually, or eight Students of the two years over which the Theological Course extends, to pursue their studies for Holy Orders, with the partial assistance of Scholarships varying from $£ 30$ to $£ 20$ per annum, the larger amount not covering one half of the necessary expenses of College residence.
The existing uncertainty as to the means of supporting our younger Clergy, or rather the certainty that no sufficiency or secure provision has been made for their maintenance, will, if it should unhappily continue, no doubt act as a most serious discouragement to those who would otherwise gladly devote themselves to the sacred Ministry. But it is to be hoped that some prompt and united action on the part of our Synod may enable us to surmount the difficulty, which if it should continue to exist, cannot but exercise a most disastrous influence on our communion, and on society at large. If Christian privileges are to be continued to us, christian obligations must be frankly recognised; neither have we any ground to expect that the benefits of a well-instructed and zealous Ministry, can be enjoyed by those who neglect the apostolic instruction, that the Lord himself has ordained that "they who preach the Gospel should live of the Gospel."

## COMMITTEES.

Most satisfactory reports have been received from the Clergy Commutation Fund Committee, and from the Episcopal Endowment Fund Committees, both in the West and East, and there is every prospect of the Eastern Diocese being shortly in a position

## EXTRACTS FROM DISTRICT AND PAROCHIAL REPORTS.

## HOME DISTRICT.

## report of the managing committee.

From a review of the proceedings of this branch since the last Annual Report was submitted, your Committee are thankful to be enabled to state that such a degree of success has attended its operations as might in Christian faith have been expected to accompany any efforts, ho ver humble, designed to promote the glory of God, by the extension of His kingdom among men ; at the same time that that success, as might also have been expected in any work committed to human agency, has not come up to what it might have been, were we all actuated by the zeal which such a work demands, and by that unity of feeling and action which should characterise every branch of the Church of Christ. The statement appended exhibits the names of only eleven Clergymen, as having co-operated with the District Branch, while eleven have not. Of this latter number, however, several, as your Committee have been certified, purpose to act in concert with it for the future. Notwithstanding, however, that the adoption of the District system has thus been as yet only partial, your Committee are happy to state that the total amount raised by this Branch compares favourably with that of the previous year, being £286 16s. 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. against $£ 2655 \mathrm{~s}$. 4d. for 1857, an increase of £21 11s. $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. Reports have been received from fifteen parochial branches, two of which, namely, St. James', Albion, and Pickering, are new ones, in the missions of the Rev. H. Osler and the Rev. G. Viner ; making four within the last two years; which is another evidence of the advantage of the revival of the District Branch.

Since the last report was made, your Committee has been able to assist in establishing a new mission, comprising parts of the townships of Reach, Pickering and Whitby, under the charge of the Rev. G. Viner, to whom the District Branch has guaranteed $\boldsymbol{£ 1 0 0}$ per annum for three years, from October, 1857. The Parent Society, also, by a resolution of 14th April, 1858, very generously consented to assist the District Branch with a grant of $£ 100$ per annum lowards payment of missionaries, on the District meeting it with a like sum. Your Committee, therefore, in addition to the

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annual stipend guaranteed as above to Mr. Viner, taking into consideration the pecuniary inconveniences, (not to say distress,) often experienced by clergymen dependent solely upon the voluntary system, and no second travelling missionary having yet been obtained, determined upon assisting four clergymen of the district by grants of $£ 37$ 10s. each, not with a view of exempting their congregations from any part of their duty, but as special relief to the Clergymen themselves.

## NIAGARA DISTRICT.

Your Committee desire now to perform the grateful task of congratulating this Branch Association on the fact that an active and
zealous Missionary has by God's blessing at length been obtained
for the principal portions of our too long destitute travelling missions. Although his field of labour is not so extended as that of your former missionaries, yet they have reason to believe more permanent good will be effected, and the Church more firmly established in what always were the more flourishing stations, through the more frequent visits of the Missionary acting more as a resident clergyman than as travelling Missionary, though having a large district.

In the early part of last summer, a clergyman from Nova Scotia, the Rev. J. Stannage, visited our district, bringing with him most satisfactory assurances of his being a single-hearted, hard working Missionary, and having been taken to Merrittsville, the county town of Welland, (which place your Committe desire to make the head-quarters of your missionary,) and the parts adjacent, by the Rev. the Rural Dean, he engaged to return in the autumn, bringing with him his wife and family. Accordingly, on September 19th last, he entered on his duties, and since that time has been actively engaged proclaiming the welcome tidings of the Gospel in and around Merrittsville, Port Colborne, and Marshville. Your Secretary is enabled from private sources to say, that his services are well-received and highly appreciated by those among whom he labours. He has given an account of his work for the short time that he has been employed, which is highly satisfactory, and the more so when it is known that he has succeeded in establishing three branches of the Society, one at Merrittsville, the others at Marshville and Port Colborne, with fair prospects of success. This gives your Committee much encouragement, when it is remembered that these places are called upon to contribute an amount equalling at least $\$ 400$ towards the Missionary's stipend. Your Committee would now, however, refer to his report and allow the Society to judge for itself. "I have been here as Missionary since September 19th, and have been permitted to keep all my appointments but two at Port Colborne, the weather and the state of the roads being the cause. My congregations in all the three stations are steadily increasing, and some of the buildings (school-houses) most inconveniently crowded. Twenty-six children have been baptized, and many are soon to be. We have hired the Baptist brick meeting house in this town until June next, hoping that as times improve, and the zeal of Churchmen increases, means will be found to procure or to erect a house of worship of our own. We have also formed a Parochial Branch Association in connexion with the Church Society at each station. Considering our small numbers and the many local objects we have at this moment in view, much could not be expected, but $\$ 23$ was subscribed in Merrittsville, $\$ 3$ at

Marshville, and about $\$ 30$ at Port Colborne, and we hope to have something to add to these sums." The Missionary continues, "I should be very glad if I could place the real wants of this mission in such a manner before the Society, as to call forth all their sympathies in its behalf. There is no time to lose, and no means should be spared to hasten the erection of churches in each of the three stations. Here in Merrittsville, where the congregation is greatly increased, we want a church that will be in some degree on a par with the county buildings and county town; about $\$ 800$ has been promised towards it, but we want $\$ 4000$ at least, and we hope your Society will come largely to our assistance. In Port Colborne, a strong desire exists for a Church of England. The Schoolhouses are crowded and most inconvenient; one person has offered to raise $\$ 1000$, and another, the Hon. T. Park, has promised $\$ 100$ for himself, and thinks be can procure $\$ 200$ more from his family, but this is nearly all we can expect from the place. The people's means have been rather heavily taxed in the erection of a building for all denominations, under the idea that they would not have a Clergyman of the Church. , They assure me that if I had been there this time last year, they would not have built it. In Marshville, the same urgent need of a church is felt. The wretched schoolhouse is crowded to excess, and it is a great pity that we cannot immediately put up a suitable edifice. The people are poor and very scattered, but very zealous, and I think would contribute according to their abilities. A grant to each place to be paid when the work is done or in progress would be a very great stimulant." Thus it is evident to your Committee that much is already gained, and they pray God that still more fruit may result from their efforts to send the glad tidings of the gospel as proclaimed by our reformed church to those too long neglected lambs of the flock of Christ.
Your Committee would here advert to the gratifying result of the necessarily unfrequent visits of the Rev. the Rural Dean to Merrittsville. By the good providence of God, on Sunday evening the 19th August last, after at least nineteen miles travelling and two full services with confirmation, our venerable Bishop visited that town and held a Confirmation in the court-room, which was crowded to excess with a most attentive congregation, and seven candidates were confirmed, The Bishop addressed the candidates and congregation in his accustomed happy manner, with perhaps more energy and foree than usual, this being his Lordship's first visit, setting forth the institution of that holy and apostolic rite, and urging all to increased holiness in heart and life: On, Monday, his Lordship proceeded to Marshville, where, however, he only held an afternoon service and preached, the candidates here, through some mistake as to the day appointed, not being present.

Hence it is evident to your Committee that the seed sown has, though perhaps at rare intervals, through Christ, wonderfully brought forth fruit. May this fruit be lasting and ripen, and be the earnest of a still larger harvest in God's good time! In rendering their tribute of humble and hearty thanks to Almighty God for this apparent fruit from the labours of the Society, your Committee would suggest that, as part of our travelling mission is now provided for, the attention of the Society be turned, as soon as practicable, to the yet destitute and remaining portion, and they trust that the time may soon arrive, when they may be enabled, through the liberality of the members of our church in the more favoured parts of the Deanery, to employ another missionary in order that many now destitute of the bread of life, may have it broken to them.

Your Secretary preached sermons in behalf of the Society at. Fort Erie, and the Ridge, Bertie, also at Thorold. He also attended a meeting of the Parochial Association at Dunnville, where there appeared much interest in the workings of the Society. He also proceeded with the Incumbent to Port Maitland, but through some untoward circumstances there was no meeting. The Rev. the Rural Dean kindly preached on behalf of the Society at Stamford and Drummondville. Your Secretary was to have been at Merrittville, Port Colborne and Marshville, but owing to the state of the roads at the time, and indisposition, he was, he grieves to say, prevented.

The Committee would strongly recommend that the regulation of this District Branch Association, be as far as practicable more generally carried out ; and meetings be regularly held by the various Parochial Associations at such time and place as to them shall seem most convenient, though the attendance might unhappily be small. And the neighbouring clergy are respectfully requested to aid one another to the utmost of their ability in bringing the claims of the Society before the people.

From the reports received, your Committee are rejoiced to say, that there is not such a falling off as might have been anticipated from the unparalleled pressure of the times. The Parish of Niagara report as having received since the last annual meeting the sum of $\$ 50$, being the annual contribution of R. Hiscott, Esq., together with $\$ 450$ collected by that individual in his own neighbourhood. Your Committee have great pleasure in being able to report $\$ 22820$ as the amount collected for 1858, being an increase over last year. This goes to prove that the Churchmen of Niagara have not forgotten that beautiful injunction, "be merciful Gfter thy power; if thou hast much, give plenteously, if thou hast little, do thy diligence gladly to give of that little; for so gatherest thou thyself a good reward in the day of necessity."

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[^3]The Parish of St . Catharines reports with great satisfaction the amount of subscriptions for the current year to be $£ 60 \mathrm{ls}$. or $\$ 240$ 20. In consequence of the commercial depression under which the country is now suffering, and which has been severely felt in this Parish, the amount above reported is much beyond what the Parochial Committee at this particular time had reason to expect. And they feel that next to the influence of God's grace, by which the heart is moved to give, they are bound to acknowledge that much of this success is owing to the laudable and zealous exertions of two young ladies who acted as collectors within the town.

The Parish of Louth, no report received *
The Parish of Thorold.-The Chairman of this Parochial Branch reports that as the time came round for making our annual collections for the Church Society, I had my fears that in consequence of the universal complaint of scarcity of money, our collections would be much less than usual this year. However, I am happy to say that in this respect I have been agreeably disappointed. The congregation at Port Robinson have considerably increased their contributions this year; for this we are indebled to the very active exertions of the young gentleman who has for the three last years made the collections, and to the increase of the congregation during the past year. The congregation of Thorold have not been as well canvassed; the consequence of which is that the contributions of the whole parish amount this year to $\$ 12275$, being $\$ 1025$ more than last year. Your Committee would respectfully suggest that the hint given in the close of this parochial report be taken by all the parishes in the Deanery, which is, I think, that for all the parishes on the line of the canal, the earlier after the close of navigation the collections are made, the better will be the returns.

The Parish of Chippewa reports an increase over last year, the amount being $£ 491 \mathrm{~s}$. 3 d . or $\$ 19625$.

The united associations of Drummondville and Stamford, in the Parish of Chippawa, report that owing to various causes, such as the removal of several of the large subscribers, and the increased demands upon the liberality of the members of the Church in this parish, coupled with the general cry of depression, the amount to be reported this year is not near so large as last. This is, however, no just cause for the withholding our usual quota at least from that handmaid of the Church in this Diocese, the Church Society. They would, however, trust that at another annual meeting they may be able more favorably to report and

[^4]show a steady increase in the Society's funds, given with a feeling of reverence and gratitude. Much, however, has been done. All Saints Church bas been opened, and a very large proportion of the debt remaining on the buildiag liquidated; the congregations have also materially increased their contributions to the curate's stipend. The amount to be reported is $£ 516 \mathrm{~s} .10 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. for general purpose, and $£ 93 \mathrm{~s}$. 3d. for special objects, making in all $£ 150 \mathrm{~s}$. $1 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. or $\$ 6003$.

The whole amount raised for church purposes from all sources within the bounds of the united association, for the year ending Easter, 1858, was $£ 108$ 11s. 1d. or $\$ 43422$.

The Committee would therefore say, that although there is a diminution in the Society's funds, yet they have reason to believe that there is a growing attachment to our Church, pure and holy as she is, protesting alike against formalism and superstition on the one band, and a rabid indifferentism on the other. The number confirmed last summer was nearly double that of any preceding year, being 23 for Drummondville and 11 for Stamford.
The Parish of Fort Erie reports the sum of $\$ 3750$.
The Parish of Dunnville and Port Maitland report $\$ 45$, or $£ 115 \mathrm{~s}$.

## GORE AND WELLINGTON DISTRICT.

The following is the report submitted to the annual meeting:
The Committee of the Gore and Wellington District Branch of the Church Society, in presenting its members with the usual

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Annual Report, are sorry to be obliged, for the first time, to record a diminution of income. It is true that, in some parishes, there has been an increase on the contributions of former years; but in the majority of parishes, the collections have fallen considerably short. The "hardness of the times" is urged in extenuation of the deficency; and your Committee are aware that, from a state of unexampled prosperity, the Province generally has, during the last year, fallen into a condition of almost unparalleled distress. Your Committee, however, must be allowed the expression of their decided opinion that the "hardness of the times" is no sufficient reason why the members of the Church should withhold their accustomed donations to the funds of the Church Society. Were the times never so hard, and the scarcity of money never so great, we are surely not discharged by that hardness and that scarcity from the heaven-imposed obligation of doing ourduty to God and our fellowmen. The rule of duty is an unalterable rule, quite independent of times and circumstances. There is not one rule for times of plenty, and another for seasons of destitution. The spiritual wants of the country are not less pressing, the souls of our brethren are not less precious in times like the present, than they are when we are basking, as it were, in the smile of a Bountiful Heaven. It is recorded to the praise of one of the early Churches that, out of the depth of their poverty, they contributed, not as most modern Christians do, what they could afford, but beyond their power. The sums generally given to the Church Society are so small as scarcely to be an object to the contributors, even in times of the greatest pressure; they will spend ten fold the amount in vanity and self-indulgence, and not whisper a syllable about the "hardness of the times." With reverence be it spoken, God is made the sufferer by the " hardness of the times." His claims are to be overlooked, and subordinated to our own pleasure and comfort. His work is allowed to languish, his Ministers to starve, and his ransomed people to perish for lack of knowledge. The committee leave to the members of the Church within the bounds of this District Association, as a question worthy to be considered, whether this is a method calculated to restore the country to its wonted prosperity.

Notwithstanding the indifference of too many professed members of our communion, the Committee are happy to be able to state that something has been done by this Association in the glorious cause it has in hand. It has been permitted during the past year to pay either wholly or in part the stipends of five Clergymen, who are diligently labouring as travelling Missionaries in many distant Townships, which would, but for its aid, be wholly destitute of the ordinances of our Church. Reports have been received from all these gentlemen exhibiting much zeal, and no in-
considerable success to their arduous labours. Through their selfdenying exertions, Churches have been built and filled with devout and appreciating worshippers; vast numbers of children have been admitted within the Christian covenant; and the consolations of our most holy faith extended to thousands both of the whole and the diseased. These devoted men feel painfully their inadequacy to meet the increasing requirements of a growing population, and cry with one voice for additional labourers. The Committee confidently hope that the members of the Church, will by increased liberality, put the Association in a position to accede to the demand.

By a rule of the Association made some months back, all Clergymen receiving aid from its funds were required to make collections in their missions for the Church Society. In some cases this rule bas been complied with, and seems large in proportion to the number and means of the donors which have been remitted to the Treasurer.

Your Committee congratulate the members of this Association on the creation of the new Diocese of Huron, which consists of the western portion of the former Diocese of Toronto; and on the elevation of a gentleman of known piety to the supervision of the See. Four or five'parishes which have hitherto maintained a close and cordial connection with the Gore and Wellington District Branch of your Society, form part of the new Diocese, and will not, of course, hereafier contribute any thing to your funds. With the consent and sanction, however, of the Lord Bishop of Huron, the sums raised this year in those parishes have been, as heretofore, sent to your Treasurer, to be applied to the payment of the Missionaries for whose stipends the whole District was answerable.

The painful insufficiency of the remuneration afforded to some of the rural Clergy, is a subject which has occupied a large measure of the attention both of the parent Society, and the District Branch. It is fully expected that some effectual method will soon be adopted to secure a large and more certain maintenance for those who labour in holy things. A committee has been named by the parent Society to take the subject into the most serious consideration. They propose raising a sustentation fund for the purpose, and recommend, 1st. That in addition to the amount of cotlections made at the annual sermon for the support of the Missionaries, the collection taken up on Easter Sunday shadl form part of the said Fund. 2ndly. That the whole amount of the subscriptions of the Branch Societies, instead of one-fourth as heretofore, be paid into the Parent Society, and added to the Missionary Fund. Thirdly. That the congregations whose clergymen are upon the commutation list, or in the enjoyment of Rectory lands, or other endowments, be called upon to contribute a sum
equal to above $n$ propriat

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equal to one-fourth of the income now derived from the sources above named, such sums to be funded and the revenue to be appropriated to the Mission Fund.

Recent events have attached a painful interest to India. Your Committee claim the warm and hearty sympathy of churchmen for those of our brethren now exposed there to suffering and violence, and for the surviving friends of those who have fallen victims to the treachery and cruelty of the natives of that country. Your Committee fully believe that a repetition of these terrible scenes can only be prevented by the christianization of that unhappy country, and on the part of the members of the Association acknowledge the duty of giving something, notwithstanding our own pressing wants, for the furtherance of this most desirable end. A resolution and memorial will be submitted to this meeting expressive of our views and feelings in this matter, and a collection will be made in aid of missions to India at the conclusion of the proceedings of the evening in both the Church of Ascension, and Christ's Church.

## CHURCH OF ASCENSION.

The Parochial Committee of the Church of Ascension Association, have to report a diminution in the amount received by their collectors, as compared with the amount of last year. The sum subscribed this year for the general objects of the Church Society being $\$ 150$, that for last year having been $\$ 226$; while for special objects the sum this year subscribed amounts to $\$ 174$ 50 , last year the sum having been $\$ 28675$. The latter named sums being subscribed for local objects, specially connected with the Church of Ascension, as, for example, the support of its Sunday schools.

The Committee do not feel justified in attributing the falling off of the collections for the present year to the generally prevailing commercial depression,--though such undoubtedly has to some extent affected their subscription lists. They feel it to be more properly attributable to the circumstance that a subscription, on the part of their congregation, and amounting at present to a sum of $\$ 1200$, has been taken up since the first of January, to increase the stipends of their ministers, and to lessen the debt of their church.

## CHRIST'S CHURCH.

The Parochial Committee of Christ's Church, in reporting the result of their exertions this year on behalf of the Church Society, are concerned to observe a large falling off from the amount collected last year.

Your Committee beg to append the following brief statement of the expenditure of last year's collections, which amounted to $£ 123$.

## MIDLAND DISTRICT.

Our discouragements arise from the yearly increasing spiritual destitution in this District, the apathy of many who ought to be wârm supporters of the Society, and the small sums available for missionary purposes. Our encouragements arise from the fact that, since the last anniversary, $£ 100$ has been granted by the Parent Society towards the salaries of two travelling missonaries in the Midland District, and that two have been added to the number of the clergy, while a third is promised. "But what are they among so many "" How are two, or six, or twelve to supply the deficiency among the many townships around us, where the voice of the Church is never heard?

## NAPANEE.

Sermons have been regularly preached in this mission, and the quarterly collections made in aid of the objects of the Society. The sums raised are as follow :-

The collections have been forwarded to the Parent Society, together with one-fourth of the subscriptions raised. The threefourths have been applied to pay off a balance due on the font, and Sunday School library.

The Repontexpresses an earnest wish that a Travelling Missionary may be appointed, who would bear the Gospel of Christ to the Church's sons and daughters settled in the large tract of country extending to the Madawaska.

## REPORT.

## CAMDEN.

The Rev. G. W. White has succeeded the late Paul Shirley in the charge of Camden and Sheffield. He reports that four stations have been opened in each of these townships, most of which are - numerously attended, and that a Sunday School has been organised in St. Luke's Church, for which a library is about being bought. He says that, as the people have, for the first time, been called upon to support their clergyman, it can hardly be expected that they would give any thing to the Church Society just now, but he hopes that, next year, the mission will be able to contribute its share.

## FREDERICKSBURG AND ADOLPHUSTOWN.

Mr. Harding has sent $\$ 8$, being the fourth part of the sum collected in Fredericksburg for the Church Society, together with his own subscription of $\$ 5$. The three-fourths have been retained for the purchase of communion plate, which, he says, is much needed. He reports that "the congregation at Adolphustown have purchased a site, and concluded arrangements for building a parsonage adjoining their church, to be commenced immediately." The two congregations have promised to pay the rent of their clergyman's house, amounting to $\$ 120$, and have bound themselves to lay out from $\$ 1400$ to $\$ 1500$ in building the parson-age- $\$ 200$ of that sum to be contributed by the congregation at Fredericksburg. He adds, "I may be permitted to claim as a right the privilege to accord my testimony to the truly laudable zeal manifested by these people in their undertaking. They are very few in number, but have commenced with an energy and unity of purpose worthy of the good cause they have in hand."

Here is an example which commends itself to every congregation in the Midland District.

## 'portsmouth.

The Committee report that the usual quarterly collections on behalf of the Church Society have been made and forwarded to the Parent Society, as also the clergyman's subscription of $£ 15 \mathrm{~s} .$, amounting in all to $£ 715 \mathrm{~s}$. There is still a debt on the parsonage, which the congregation are endeavouring to pay off. The report says, "Your Committee rejoice that the Colonial Church Society have sent us one labourer for the long neglected district of Wolfe Island, and that another is on his way to this country, to take charge of the districts of Murvale, Sydenham and Storrington."

## ST. JAMES' CHURCH.

The Committee of this Branch report as follows :-"The four quarterly collections have been made, amounting to $£ 6 \mathbf{1 7 s} .9 \mathrm{~d}$., and the Incumbent's annual subscription to the Widows and Orphans' Fund has been paid. An effort has been commenced to

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raise funds for building a Sunday school, which, owing to the present depressed times, has to be put off to some season of greater wordly prosperity. The sum of $£ 26 \mathrm{15s}$. has been collected for this object, and £2 12s. 1d. from the Sunday School children for the library. Our Sunday School continues to enjoy a good measure of support; and its attendance is such both by teachers and scholars, as to prove its estimation by the congregation as an eminent means of grace."

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH.
The Rev. J. A. Mulock reports that, "Owing to the heavy debt upon this church, together with the current expenses, which have been considerable, resulting from the unfinished state of the building, it has not been considered advisable to establish a Branch of the Church Society this year. During the occupancy of the present incumbent, the sum of $£ 211 \mathrm{~s}$. for the Widows and Orphans' Fund has been sent to the Parent Society, together with the incumbent's yearly subscription of $£ 15 \mathrm{~s}$. A special collection is taken up monthly towards paying off some of the debt, which has been well responded to ; nevertheless it may be many years before the present debt is liquidated."

## ST. GEORGE'S CHURCH.

This Branch is still in a flourishing condition, although the contributions are not so great as in former years. As usual, it supplies the only funds available for missionary and other purposes in this district. The quarterly collections have been regularly made, and remitted to the Parent Society. The subscriptions for the present year amount to $£ 497 \mathrm{~s} .6 \mathrm{~d}$. Although this congregation give upwards of $£ 150$ every year to the poor, and are frequently called upon for contributions to various religious objects, they are still ready with their subscriptions to the Church Society.

## BARRIEFIELD.

The missionary reports that the services in that township have been regularly kept up, and it is with much pleasure he has to state that the attendance is always very good, and particularly at St. James' Church, Birmingham, where the numbers attending church have nearly doubled within the last year.

There have been 48 children baptized, 11 marriages and 8 funerals during the year, in this mission.

There is no report from Amherst Island or Bath.
THE DEPOSITORY.
This year the sales at the Depository have been nearly doubled. The stock of books now on hand is small, there laving been no importation for more than eighteen months. As the Depository ought to furnish a supply of Bibles and Prayer Books, with other
religious books, and tracts sufficient to meet all demands, no time ought to be lost in sending for a fresh supply.

## THE BISHOP'S FUND.

The plan, long contemplated, of constituting a separate See, from that part of Toronto Diocese east of the River Trent, seems ltkely to be soon carried into effect, an effort is now being made to raise the necessary endowment, which has thus far been very successful. Nearly one-half of the minimum sum required has been secured ; and as the canvass will be prosecuted vigorously, until every corner of the proposed diocese shall have been gone over, it is not too much to hope that in a few months, we may be called upon to elect a Bishop of our own. This calls loudly upon all who love our truly Apostolic Church, to pray earnestly and perseveringly that God would send us a man after his own heart to rule over his heritage.

Upon a review of the statistics given above, it will be apparent that the Diocesan Church Society, like other institutions of a like nature, is subject to fluctuations. It is much to be regretted that at the present time, it is divided in its counsels. This must inevitably lessen its usefulness. Peace and unity alone can give prosperity within the borders of our beloved Church. We ought, therefore, to pray that the members of the Society may all be one in spirit, one in desire, one in aim, and then may we expect to see the efforts of the Society crowned with abundant success.

And let us never forget that, as á true branch of Christ's Church, we ought to exhibit a missionary spirit, the manifestations of which will find ample scope all around us. Both men and means are wanted at the present time, for "the harvest truly is great, but the labourers are few." As Churchmen, we ought to rise to the work, as the wants of the Church increase, giving with a glad mind of our substance, according to our ability, and praying the Lord of the harvest to send forth more labourers into his harvest. It will be only then that we shall "have done that which was our duty to do."

## NEWCASTLE DISTRICT.

The following reports have been received from the various parishes in connexion with this Branch :-

COBOURG.
The complaint of hard times, though often unjustifiably iudulged in, is this year no fiction; and the indisputable fact of its existence has in some degree impaired the returns to the Society. The ladies, dividing the lown and neighbourhood into sections, worked with great zeal and assiduity ; but it was in vain to combat against an undeniable pressure.

During the year, by special subscription and otherwise, $£ 400$ have been raised in the parish, independent of the ordinary Church revenue; one half of which has been applied to the introduction of gas into St. Peter's Church and the procuring of a new bell, and the remaining $£ 200$ has been appropriated to the liquidation of the debt upon the Church. This is now reduced to £125, and it will be further diminished against Easter Monday.

CLARKE.
The people of this parish are actively engaged in building a new church in the village of Newcasile. This undertaking, involving a large outlay, will require the combined exertions of all the members, and will tax their christian liberality to the very ut most. Still the Committee feel no inclination, on that account, to evade the undoubted claims which the Society has to the undivided and hearly support of Churchmen. Being the only institution in the Diocese, under episcopal sanction, tor the furtherance of the important objects it seeks to altain, no local enterprise, or general pecuniary embarrassment, should be offered as an excuse, either for withholding or lessening the measure of support hitherto extended to it.

The subscription lists not having yet been returned by the collectors, the exact amount raised within the bounds of the association cannot be stated. It is confidently hoped, however, that it will not be less than that of any previous year. But should this hope not be realised, the Committee are prepared to recommend that a larger proportion be transmitted to Torngto than is required by the constitution; as they are unwilling that the great work should be in the least degree impeded by any lack of individual liberality.

This parish has since reported $£ 135$ s. collected, and remitted £7 5s. to Parent Society.

Cavan.
The lists not having as yet been received from the collectors in this mission, the exact amount subscribed cannot be ascertained. It is confidently expected, however, that the whole sum raised this year will amount to about £30, viz., $£ 15$ from St. Paul's Parochial Association, and the same sum from St. John's Association.

It is worthy of remark also, that at the annual parochial meeting, a resolution was proposed, by the special desire of the people themselves, and unanimously adopted, to send the whole amount subscribed and collected, to the Parent Society, instead of the one fourth as heretofore. It xvas undersiood that this resolution
was adopted in order to make some amends for a falling off last year in the amount raised for the Society. It could not, bowever, be intended by this arrangement to deprive this District Branch of the one fifth already appropriated, yiz., one tenth for the maintenance of a depository ; and one tenth for the formation of a Travelling Missionary Fund. The desire on the part of the parishioners to pay over (the whole amount raised) to the funds of the Parent Society, is exceedingly creditable to their zeal and liberality.

Much improvement has also been made in the interior of St . Paul's Church, chiefly through the exertions of a lady of the congregation.

GRAFTON
In this parish the claims of the Society have been fully explained and urged upon the members of the Church, and the effect has been exceedingly satisfactory. On no previous occasion has the appeal to our people been more personal and directevery Church family having been applied to by the two gentemen who kindly undertook the arduous task of collection. The resuth has exceeded our most sanguine expectations. The collectors scarcely met with more thari one or two refusals in the whole parish. So that, notwithstanding the severe monetary pressure, and in a little community of Churchmen, few and widely scattered, the sum of $\$ 88$ has already been subscribed-nearly the whole of which has been paid in-and there is reason to hope that the final amount will not fall much short of $\$ 100$.

Your Committee feel that the two collectors, who exerted themselves so petseveringly on behalf of the Society, deserve the cordial thanks of all earnest and sound-hearted Churchmen. And they are of opinion, that whatever may be the backwardness of some of our people to contribute to the cause of the Church, still the success of our institutions depends in a great measure upon the hearty good will and personal exertion of those who are appointed to plead their cause, and to urge their claims upon our members. Any timidity or backwardness will be sure to meet with disappointment. 'The Cburch requires the individual exertion of all her triends, and we know that united effort can accomplish almost any thing, for "union is strength."

COLBORNE.
Your Committee regret to learn, that in consequence of severe domestic affliction to the families of two of the collectors, very little has as yet been done for the Society in this Branch. They are not without hope, however, that before the final close of the Parent Society's Report, the work of collection will be resumed, and the usual proportion at least be forwarded to the Secretary. As it would be a subject for deep regret that any local causes
should deprive the Society of that measure of snpport which she may fairly and jusily claim at the hands of all her members.

This association has reported $£ 1210 \mathrm{~s}$. "collected, and remitted £5.

PERRYTOWN.
The subscriptions in this mission have not as yet been completed. But the committee are enabled to report thus far the sum of £16 17s. 10d., for the Perrytown Association, and for Elizabethville about $£ 10$, the latter being a considerable increase over that of last year: thas making together the sum of $£ 26$ 17s. 10 d ., a very satisfactory result from this comparatively new mission.

Another gratifying fact is, that the Parochial Commiltee at Elizabetbville have resolved to transmit the whole amount raised, to the Parent Sociely, for missionary purposes.
Various improvements have likewise been effected in the churches of this mission, during the past year-such as painting, the procuring of a chandelier, and also a bell, at a considerable expense to the congregations. These, however, being purely local, or parochial matters, do not properly come within the scope of the Annual Report; but they are exccedingly creditable to the people, and must serve to cheer the labours of the zealous and hard-working missionary. It is painful, however, to add, that only abbut three-fourths of his income have been paid during the past year.

## CARTWRIGHT AND MANVERS.

The usual well-attended and interesting meetings were held in these townships. In the former township $£ 10$ has been paid, and in the latter, $£ 6$ has been subscribed, which, within a trifle, has been paid upalso. It was unanimously agreed that the whole of the amount thus raised should be transmitted to the Parent Society.

A very interesting meeting was held at Bowmanville, in the mouth of January. The altendance was betler thah on former occasions, and the speeches more than usually eflective. The result was perceptible in the very lively interest excited, and a considerable improvement in the amount of contributions, notwithstanding the drawback of the times. The sum of $£ 20$ has been collected, of which one-fourth will be transmitted to the Pa rent Society.
In concluding their Report, the Managing Committee are painfully eqnscious that the cause of Church extension within this District has not increased in proportion to the wants of our brethren, during the past year. It will be perceived that no Report has been received from Port Hope, as nothing has been done ihere for the Church Society for the last two or three years. This is a

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subject of deep regret to the Committee, that so large and important a parish should feel ilself excused from co-operating in fhe work of mainaining the Church, and spreading her influetice, through the means of the Church Society, and must cause the most painful reflections in the minds of all right-thinking Christians. The cause of the Church Society is the cause of the whole Church -it belongs to no section or school of theology within the Church, but is based simply upon the wants of our people, and the necessity of doing all we can to spread and extend the blessings of the Guspel, upon the principles laid down and maintained in the Book of Common Prayer. And we do not see how poorer parishes are to be assisted, or new missions opened, unless the wealthier parishes will all unite in this work of Church extension, by upholding our institutions, and freely contributing the means required for that purpose.

Several clerical changes have taken place in the District, within the past year. The Committee have to regret the loss of the Rev. J. W. Beck, who has lately been appointed to the vacant Rectory of Peterboro'. Mr. Beck is a young clergyman of great promise, a sound and zealous Churchman, and desirous of seeing the Church every where maintained in her efficiency. We wish him God-speed in his future labours, and hope that he may be made an instrument of much good to the people whom he has been appointed to serve.

Rice Lake and other neighbouring settlements are now served by the Rev. Charles Brown, resident in Cobourg, who will report the result of his labours to the Venerable the Archdeacon, as Chairman of the District.
The Rev. Charles Thompson, appointed to the mission of Elora, has been succeeded by the Rev. Henry Wm. Davies, as Assistant Minister at Cobourg. The Rev. F.J.S. Groves has been appointed to the vacant mission of Seymour and Percy.

It thus appears that there are eleven clergymen at present labouring within the pounds of the Newcastle District, and only seven parishes or mistions which have Parochial Associations in connexion with the Church Society.

The Committee trust, however, that the appointments recently made to vacant places will have the effect of stirring up our people to the necessity of greater and more combined exertion in supporting the various objects of the Society. And that the appropriation of one-tenth, which this District Branch has determined to set apart for the maintenance of a Travelling Mission Fund, will enable the Society, before a great while, to employ one or more additional missionaries in the destitute settlements of this populous and flourishing District.

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It will be seen that in this region the Church is taking the first step towards becoming self supporting; and with care, zeal and good management on the part of her rulers and pastors, with God's good blessing to guide and prosper, in a hundred years she will be so firmly planted, that no power of man will be able to uproot her. In much less time a great improvement would be manifest.

You will notice among the resolutions enclosed, one to appropriate one-fourth of the Parochial Subscriptions to missions upon the Ottawa, the remaining three-fourths go to the Mission Fund Parent Society.


## Eastern DISTRICT BRANCH CHURCH SOCIETY.

In presenting a report of the operations of this District Branch of the Diocesan Church Society, for the past year, your Secretary deeply regrets that it is not of a more favorable character. Various causes may no doubt be assigned for the lamentable fact, for truly lamentable it must be regarded, by all who have the interests of the Church at heart, that any causes should exist to diminish the income of a Society, established for the advancement of God's glory and the extension of His Church.

Your Secretary is aware that "the hardness of the times," to use a common expression, may be pleaded as one cause of the deficiency which will be found in the financial statement of the Society's income, as compared with former years. Yet this cannot be the chief reason, for otherwise it might be expected to operate equally in every parish, where there was no special or extraordinary local object, which required a more than usual exercise of liberality on the part of the parishioners. But in Cornwall and Prescott we find that "the hardness of the times" has caused no diminution of the income of these parochial branches, for in poth there exists a small increase over the income of the past year. Other causes must therefore exist, and if these should be found to arise in any degree from apathy or indifference on the part either of the clergy or the laity, it must certainly prove a subject of deep regret'and humiliation. But without seeking further to investigate the causes of past deficiencies, let us rather anticipate a hap-
pier state of things for the future, and to the attainment of so desirable a result, let every Member of Christ's Holy Church, resident within our bounds, only resolve to do his utmost for this holy cause, in proportion to the means and ability which God has graciously given to each, and the desirable end will be happily attained. It ought by us all to be regarded as a privilege as well as a duty to be allowed to co-operate in the glorious work of promoting the efficiency, and of extending the usefulness of that pure branch of Christ's holy Church to which it is our great bappiness to belong. "In her (to quote the language of an eloquent prelate recently gone to his rest) we recognise a Church Scriptural in doctrine and Apostolic in constitution. A Church appealing to the written Word of God as the sole standard of truth and rule of faith, and yet thankfully accepting, in the interpretation of that Word, the aid afforded by the testimony of primitive antiquity. A Church which has neither added to the Sacrameuts ordained by Christ, nor diminished from them ; nor has she lost or impaired that three-fold ministry to whom these Sacraments were originally entrusted. A Church treasuring in her Liturgy the express image of Catholic and ahcient piety. A Church in her Articles, vindicating God's truth from the corruptions wherewith it had been overloaded, in the days of Romish superstition, and giving to her members a Scriptural rule whereby to walk." Members of such a Church as she has been thus eloquently described, we should manifest that we appreciate our privileges by seeking to make her more and more an honoured instrument of God for the propagation of pure and undefiled religion.

The folowing statement will exbibit the financial operations of this District Branch, for the past year, as far as they have been reported to your Secretary. This statement must not, however, be regarded as any thing like a full exposition of our financial position, since the following parishes have not as yet reported, viz., Hawkesbury, Mountain, Lamb's Pond, Charleston and Merricksville-5.

By way of appendix, other works connected with the advancement of the Church in the several parishes, may here be introduced, especially as the expenditure necessarily involved in these, may have tended in some instances to diminish the contributions to the Church Society. Thus, the Rector of Kemptville reports that his people have contributed, since the last Annual Report, about $£ 175$ towards the purchase of a parsonage house, the Rector's salary, the enclosing of the burial ground, and the painting of the church.

The Rector of Cornwall reports that an addition has been made to Trinity Church in said town, which has cost £130. The Rector's stipend, offertory, \&c., amonnt to about $£ 100$ more.

The Rev. Dr. Lewis reports that, besides contributions to benevolent objects out of the parish, which have probably amounted to $£ 200$, his people have contributed to objects connected with the Church in the parish, such as the parochial school, the offertory, and the minister's salary, about $£ 780$.

The annual meeting of this District Branch of the Church Society was held in Kemptville, on Wednesday, March 3rd, 1858 , at ${ }^{7} 7 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. There was Divine Service in the church at 4 p . m., and a sermon preached by the Rev. Dr. Patton.

Owing to the bad state of the roads and other causes, many of the clergy of the Deanery were unable to be present.

The Parish of Hawkesbury, through the Chairman, Rev. J. G. Armstrong, who was appointed to the charge of that place in the fall of 1857, has reported direct to the Parent Society:
