Ihis is, we fancy, under the circumstances, the wisest conrse for all partios. It were well if some official assignces, howerer, could be induced to take a lesson from one we hear mentioned in this connection. The settlement is on the basis of 50 cents in the dollar, one-third cash, and tie balmee umsecured at 9 and 12 montis. The total hatbilities direet and indirect foot up $\$ 100,000$, but somewhat more than half of this is represented by morignges, lenving a sumplus of about $560,-$ 000 in real estate over and above the incmmbrances. The estate showed a deficiency of about S25,000.
$\because$ Samples have lately been exhibited in this city of whent from the Mennonite settlements in Manitoba. The samples are of Black Sea wheat, though not what has been hitherto regarded throughont Canada by that name, being a beardiess wheat. Sumples are from both the settlements, that known as the Wesleyans on the west side of the Red River, opposite Emerson, and also from Riverville, wbich is on the enst side. The original seed was brought three years ago from Russia by the Mennonites, and has much improved both in size and color by the change of soil. The berry, which was originally very small, hard, and almost black, retains to some extent those characteristics still, and also those qualities which render it so desirable for the manufacture of strong flour. It weighs 05 libs 10 the bushel. The Mennonites lave already sold over 50,000 bushels of this year's crop, and have still a large guantity to sell.

About the middle of the month, he was notified to come to town and conclude the arrangements, having previously given the assignee deeds of sale, plans, \&c., in order to prepare the security. He intimated in reply that as the times were improving he thought he could do something better for the creditors, and asked for a little delay: . When hearrived, he hesitated to sign the notes to the assignee; he wentabout among the creditors and grve them notes at three and four months. getting their receipts. Some of the creditors expressed unbounded confidence itt the man's honesty; the security was not necessary. About two weeks ago he sent word he was coming to town to pry all his notes in full. He left Waterloo
on the 20 th nlt, ostensibly on that mission, but he must have thken the wrong rond, as the last heard of him was in Wisconsin. An accountant sent to see what was the cause of the delay, found the stock in possession of Levi Clark, a nephew, who produced vouchers that he had purchased it at 50 cents in the dollar, cash, amounting to $\$ 3,280.11$; the outstandings had been sold to E. Wells for $\$ 862.50$, and the furniture had been disposed of at 75 cents in the dollar, bringing 8333 ; giving a total of $\$ 4,475.0 \mathrm{cash}$ realized by the missing man. A Writ has been issued at the instance of Young \& MeGauran, through P. Cowan of Sweetsburg, whose attempt to obtain possession of the stock at last accounts way not successful. ## MONTREAL, JANUARY 2, 1879.

## 1850.

The closing months of 1879 witnessed a remarknble advance in prices of general produce and merchandise, accompanied by an altogether unexpected revival of trade. New lifo was suddenly infused into almost every department of industry, and, to the surprise of business men everywhere, a day of profits quickly succeeded to the era of losses which had come to be regarded by many as only terminable through general bankruptcy. The change, which was radical and complete, was soon discovered to be well-founded, in that good crops brought good prices, thus enabling the country buyers to meet maturing bills with rare promptitude. Money flowed in at financial centres freely, and, in consequence, the year closed with tradesmen wearing an unwonted look of cheerfulness, and predicting the future with no little confidence. With the close of navigation the abatement of activity tended in some measure to moderate this confidence, but encouraging advices from across the Atlantic, and ever-increasing strength and activity in the markets of the United States have acted as a wholesome tonic, and it is safe to say that not since 1873 has any year opened
with the fair promises which usher in the present one.
This is well. A buoyant feeling is in every way desirable in commerial aflairs and, when well founded, serves as a stimulus to trade. But with buoyancy comes the temptation to discount the future, and take risks that ordinarily would be avoided. Herein is a danger: and it would seem timely to direct atten. tion to the fact at this juncture of a new year and great expectations. Country merchants see that the farmers have done well, :and have the practical evidence of it in the payment in part or in whole, of long standing accounts. At once the conclusion is reached that it is now quite safe to give such a party credit, and, setting aside the tenchings of the past years of depression, eredit is given almost umreservedly. The farmer, by reason of poor resulta, has been practising enforced economy for an indefinite time past, and now, finding himself with both many needs and the privilege of supplying them, of course he avails himself of the opportunity, having no cloubt that this good season is but the harbinger of many to follow. If it should turn out so, all would be well; but-ifotherwise?
The wholestale dealer in tum, finding his country customer meeting his bills with unwonted promptness, and in not in few instances availing of the discount ofiered for cash payment, stands ready, with the opening of the new season, to offer credit with a liberal hand, and is only too glad when he succeeds in selling a tried and proved account an extra line of goods. So the seed of new disasters is sown. For a time, for years, all may go on well, but the appetite for doing a large business is a growing one, and the longer apparent prosperity contimues based upon facile and imprudent extension of credit, the greater the cmash when it does come, as in time it must.
The caution that we would utter of course only applies to a class; but the records of bankruptcy during the year just past, tell a strange story of how large that class is, and how honored has been the business talent represented. Fortunes, good solid fortumes, have been lost for no other reison than that somal business principles, known as well to the losers as to their most prudent and successful compeers, havo been deliberately disregarded. The fascination of success, and the hope of closing $u p$ before the next crash shall come, are the lures which have drawn many a merchant capitalist to his financial destruction during the past few years of depression, and it is much to be feared they have lost but little, if any, of their
power to achieve like results in thie future. The teachings of 1879 are : light stocks, proportioned to capital ; limited and carefial extension of credit, and the smallest possible interest account for 1880 . It is not impossible that a more ambitious policy will prove at the end of the year to have paid better; indeed, the outlook is so good that this issue may be accepted as probable, but the merchant who does well in 1880 throngh taking great risks is very tikely to be found taking simila risks in subsequent y ears, and ultimately seeking indulgence at the hands of his creditors.

## IITE COTVON INDUSTRY IN ENG. LAND.

Accounts from Manchester give a gloomy description of the condition of affairs in that great centre of the cotion industry. Within a radius of thirty-five miles from Manchester is found the most densely populated district in Great Britain, taking in Liverpool, Leeds, Sheffield, Stockport, Oldham, Wigan, Blackburn, Bradlord and other important cities and towns. This district now suffers more severely than others in proportion to the denseness of its jopulation and the greatly diminished demand for labor in all deparlments of trade. The stranger who walks through Manchester to day finds there many silent mills, long rows of empty houses, and throngs of idle workmen. In and about the city there are clustered two thousand cotton mills, employing from fifty to twenty-five hundred operatives each. The Haworths Mill of Salford, the largest in Great Britain, and employing about 2500 hands, is running from four and a half to five days a week. One manufacturer states that he has not made one per cent. on his capital during the last year; another manufacturer, employing but lifty hands, is losing $\$ 2 j 0$ per week, but would lose $\$ 275$ per week if be should stop altogether. A report has recently been prepared by the Anevican consul at Manchester, which sets down the year 187s, as a year of unprecedented depression in the cotton manufactures, but cluring 1879, the same causes have been at work in an intensified form; and the condition is still worse. The high price of cotton, the low price of manufactured goods, the small demand for cotton goods in England, the smaller foreign orders, close competition, and the prevailing uncertainty of affairs are among the caluses to which he attributes the present unrest and gloom. Good observers do not see any reason for anticipating improvement.

Dr. John Watts, author of the article on cotton in the New Encyclopedin is quoted as having said lately :
"I see no possibility for a revival of the cotion trade in the near future. The only circumstance that can aid the manufacturer is an increased demand for manufactured goods; and where are your ordens to come from? I see very well the causes of the revival in the iron trade. Many cities are just at present building tramways on a large scale, and they consume large quantities of iron. Large orders are coming over from America, boll from the United States and Canada, but where are orders for cotton goods to come from? The recent famines in China and India have closed those markets almost entirely; the protective policies of Germany and the United States drive away all foreign goods in the cotton line; the great failure of the harvest in England has diminished to an alarming extent the home demand, and the same is true in regard to France. The notion that the present depression is a fugitive one is false. Only by a change of national and individual policy can matlers be bettered. The rise of the cotton trade must be very slow, and it will follow fur behind the advance in the other trades." A return to prosperity in general will of course bring up the cotion trade, but a long time must elapse before that is brought about.

## IIYMAN S. G. ASCTIER.

The examination of H. S. G. Ascher, before the creditors of the estate of Ascher, Laurie \& Co., was concluded the the ult., whereupon Archibald Campbel, repre. senting the Consolidated Bank, moved to oppose the discharge of the insolvent. Mr. C. B. Carter, representing A. Lowensohn of New York, moved, seconded by B. Kortosk, tliat the assignee be instructed to take no proceedings opposing Mr. Ascher's discharge. Carried. The same prarties moved and resolved that the orelitors are satisfied with the examination end explanations given by H.S.G. Ascher. A. Iowensohn, G.J. Gebhardt, M. Kortosk $\mathfrak{A}$ Co., and M. Sternberg (the last mamed for Bya Berg his wife) voted for ; A. Campbell for the Consolidated Bank, against.

Will our readers kindly take a look backward with us in this case? Those who were subscribers before the Ist Septenber last will remember that a writ of attachment was issuen on the 290 ha gust, against the firm of Ascher, Lauric \& Co., dealers in fancy goods, mad against Hyman S. G. Ascher of that firm, and individually, as late partner in the celebrated firm of Ascher \& Co., who owe the Consolidated Pank some $\$ 550,000$. The
following is a statement of the firm's affairs for the eight months ending the 2sth fuly hast:

Mr. T. U. lloe, who inventoried the stock, said he examined it even a second time, and had every assistance from Mr. Ascher, Mr. Laurie and the employees. The following is the inventory:

There were, besides, on consignment goods of M. Kortosk \& Co., amounting to $\$ 350$ S.21, and goods of 11 . \& A. Saunders, to $\$ 2,435.22$. Anhlavits were made by the partuers as to the correctness of the stock inventory. H. S. G. Ascher states further in his atidavit that the siving accommolation paper which I am unable to meet," was the canse of their insolvency. David Hatley Latie concludes his athidavit as follows:
"And I believe and dechare the cause of our insolvency to have been the giving of accommodation paper, and the mismanagement of the estate by my pariner, while I was travelling, the accommodation paper having been given without my knowledge and against our Deed of Partnership; also misrepresentation by my partner to me of where the paper anal moneys received by the lirm were placed, also the disuppearance of paper and moneys received by the firm and not accommed for in the disharsments."
At the meeting of Sptember 22 nd Mr. Laurie otfered 55 cents in the dollar, eash, for the estate; $11 . \mathrm{S}$. G. Ascher offered $\$ 6,000$, halr cash, balance in 4, 6 and 9 months, equal to about 332 cents in the dollar: At the $29 t h$ september meeting Mr. Ascher withdrew his offer, and begged to make a new one. On motion of $B$. Kortosk, seconded by Moses Sternberg, the offers of both were rejected. At the af-
ternoon meeting Mr. Ascher offered 58 s cents cash; Mr. haurie ollered ei cents cash, which was accepted.

At the adjommen meeting of October thl the assignee read statements of the condition of the books. Analysis of the merchandise accomt showed there was about $\$ 10,000$ or $\$ 11,000$ to be acconnted for; equivalent to the deficiency as per the statement of the insolvents. Mi. Ascher explained he believed some gools had been stolen, but could only specily some linen handkerchiefs. Mr. Laurip, being the traveller for the firm, was al. sent, and could not say. Mr. Ascher being asked to account for his drawing 8 ;182 in seven months, of which 82,142 was dhawn in one month, fuly, replied it was caused by illness in his family and preexisting debts. The inspectors were instructed to examine him on these points. At a subsequent meeting held November 3rd, Mr. Ascher complained of this treatment, and asked for time to explain, which was granted till the 17 th of the same month. The meeting on the 3rd November to consider the discharge of D. IT. lamie was adjourned till the 10h on a motion to approve by Mr. Dumesnil representing Ville Marie Bank, seconded by Mr. Hains for Riley \& Gebhardt. Ary. Stemberg moved an adjoumment till the $97 t h$. The latter was not seconded. Mr. Sternberg then ohjected to the claims of Gelhardt \& Riley, that he (Stemberg) had purchased the latter's claim. The first motion was carried yens, Dumesnil, Campbell, Hains; nay, M, Sternberg for Eva Rerg, his wife.

On Monday, the lith ult., the examination of H. S. G. Ascher was begun, but he wished for further time, and that Mr Latarie, who was in Toronto, should be examined also. Aljourned till 24 th. On that day Mr. Ascher, answering at some length, said that, in swearing to the correctness of the statement, he did so Hirough inalvertence; he thought it whs a mere matter of form. He did not admit the correctness of the statement; he could explain the deticiency.

At the aljournot meeting, held the geth ult., He Ascher began his explanation of how the statment presented at the first meeting of creditors and sworn to hy him was incorrect. 1st. He said that the claim of Kirk, lockerby \& Co., $\$ 147.59$, was not a proper claim againal the estate, but was supposed by him to have been given for a private debt of Mr. Laurie, mat he believed they had secmity. 2nd. The clam of J. Sternberg \& Co., $\$ 002$, is for an emborsenent granted to Ascher \& Co. 3rd. The account of Furniss \& Co. for $\$ 1,245$, after deducting col-
laterals of $\$ 755$, he has been told was a mistake, as Fumiss \& Co. hold more col lateral than shown by their (Ascher, Irurie \& Co.'s) bookkeeper in the statement. If such errors as those occurred in the statement it must be incorrect. He would state further that in the valuation of stock 20 per cent. advance on American goods was not enough, as the duty on some were $2 \overline{3}$ and on others 35 and 40 per cent.; and on English goods, where only 50 per cent. sterling advance was made, it should have bcen 75 per cent. He represented that fancy goods depre ciate rapidly in value, also that various cases of samples should have been entered at an advance of 75 per cent. Breakage on chima gools should have been allowed also. The total of these reluctions would amount to $\$ 7,240$. The oflice turniture entered at $\$ 200$ shows ledger cosi of $\$ S 6 T$. 29. There were also glass-cases, trunks, both amounting to $\$ 1,303$, in favor of a reduction of the original statement swom to. In reply he stated that he began some inquivies after November 3rd and made these discoveries. He would have made a larger offer for the estate lad he known these facts.

When asked to explain how he drew $\$ 2,142.62$ in July, the month the writ was issued, he furnished the following memorandum :

If the ledger stated he drew $\$ 3,339$ from Nov. 28, when they began business, till July 26 , it must be correct. When asked it he would refund the money or any portion thercof, he said he had none. When asked if he couldgive any explanation of the claim of the Consolidated Bank amounting to $\$ 37,970.42$, of a portion of which there is no trace in the tirm's.books of account, vie., three promssory notes of $\$ 9,000$ each and one of $\$ \$, 800$, he said he wished to see the notes. At the adjourned meeting the 4 th inst. he answered the - last question by saying that the note for
$\$ 8,800$, payable to B. Furniss \& Co., was given direct to the Consolidated Bank, and no value was received by him (Ascher). That for $\$ 9,000$, payable to Ascher \& Co., was of the same nature. They were not entered in the books becaise no value was got for them, and thero was no expectation any demand for payment would ever be made. He would not answer as to the two other notes till they were produced. He had no other assets than those in the statement of Ascher, Laurie $\mathbb{E}$ Co. He excused himself from being sworn as to the answers made in the course of the examination until he had consulted with his legal adviser. Thus ended the examination of Mr. H. S. G. Ascher as stated in the outsel of this article. Mr. Ascher's discharge was confirmed by the Court on the geth inst.
In reading the preceding synopsis of the case the public will form their own conclusions. Those who conducted the whole affair in the interests of commercial morality are deserving of much credit. It may not be ont of phace, however, to make a few remarks from our impurtial point of riew.
It will naturally occur to even ordinary minds to inquire how so much money was drawn at dillerent periods in the month of July, if the drawer knew of his insolvency; or whether he wenl about paying the accounts, expecting it? His partuership agreement allowed him to draw only 52,500 a year, whereas in nine months he drew $\$ 3,389.1 \mathrm{~S}$, and this, notwithstanding the deliciency of over $\$ 11,000$, besides the claim of the Consolidated Bank for about $\$ 35,000$, not alluded to in the state. ment of linbilities or entered in the firm's books.
It will also be a sulject for considera. tion how the promissory note for \$603 given to J. Sternberg $\&$ Co., came to be entered on the books of the firm charged to " merchandise accounts," instead of to his (Ascher's) "Personal Account," when Where is reason for believing it to have been for his own persomil benelit. People will naturally inquire, also, how the inventory caused to be made and supervised by the said H. S. G. Ascher was so grossly incorrect. His rouml offer for the estate was based upon that inventory. He now pleats that he was ignormit of the fact of that undervaluation until examined by the assignee as to the deficiency of his assets to meet his liabilities, while making aftidavit as to their correctness. . Wis offer of $\$ 6,000$ for what he valued at $\$ 15,920$ is notevorthy also; and still more so the accusation in the afti lavit of his partner Laurie. It is claimed that the signature of the Consolidated Bank to the discharge
was surreptitiously procured through his opposition to the writ of attachment, and, if this be withdrawn or annulled, he (Ascher) has not the necessary majority in number and amount. 'The approval of the discharge was signed by only three creditors representing $\$ 100$ to $\$ 200$ each.

It will be noticed that the largest and principle creditor is Isidore (i. Ascher of London, Fugland, quite a musical composer by the way, and doubtless well up in the values of penny whistles and kindred goods. This creditor has lately fyled his claim-over $\$ 20,000$.
The foregoing is only one chapter in the carcer of those who were quite friendly with one another in the heavy dealings principally to be credited in bringing about the latterday history of the Consolidated Bank.

Tite Cost of Lavina, -Last summer a New York Jourmal made the remark that a family in the city ouglit to set th good table on $\$^{2}$ per week for each memberin it. The assertion caused no litle comment, and was pretty generally decided as animpossibility. Miss Juliet Corson, who is a lady well known in New York, made some experiments at the time and has recently paljlished the result. The fimily consisted of ive persons, thee refined women, the editor in charge of $n$ daily paper and a servant. The tust began in a business-like why, making un inventory of supplies, setting aside and valuing enough for a week's use. Miss Corson superintended the cooking herself. A copy was kept of the actunl bills of fare for each day. The bills show that the cost of food was 58 cents a day fur six persons. The following are the bills of fare for three days :

An importatat insurance decsion was recontly readered by the Cirenit Court in St. Lanis, Mo., which must prove interesting. As ex- ress employee was insured for the bencfit of his wife in three motual aid and insurance socirties. Ilis wife died a couple of yerars ygo, and he died some time afterwards. There being no children, the wife's relntives clamed the insumace money as her heirs, while his relatives dispufed the cham. The Court decided that these insurance soci ties are not insurance compranies within the meaning of the law. If the insmance had been in a compray, the wifes heirs wonld be entited to the pulicy on hee denth, as the policy is a contanct, mad reads in finor of the beneficiary or his heits and assigns. In case of the zociety, however, there is nosuch contract, and after the wife dies the hasband can desigmate a new benelicinry if he chooses, and, if he fails to declare in favor of the wife's relatives or heirs, they can have no claim to the insurance moner: Hence the claim of the has. band's heirs was sustatined.

## GRNERAL MARKEIS. <br> Wedsesday, December 31 st, 1879.

The close of the year find the general markets in a healthfal and promising state. Surely there is no branch of trade but lans found a better harvest than could have been expected in midsummer even if boped for, and probably there is no line of industry, taken as a whole, but can look back upon this as at least a less unsatisfactory yene tann its predecessor. Nor is it necessary that the retrospect should be pictured entitely from a negative standpoint. There are positive oceasions for trade congratulations, and bese are neither few in nambery nor doubthat as to title. Juring the hatter fatf of the year fortunes have been umbe in several dejnimments of legrimate indistry, notably in lardware and provisions. la groceries, in leather and its manmbetures, in turs, in oils, in chemicals, in coal, a good and profitable husiness has been done, and even in dry goods a generat average would we think dechare the year a satisfictury one. The shipping trade has been excellent,-stealy engagement of all tomnatgothering at good paying mates from shortiy after the opening of navightion to its very close. Farmers hate been especinlly lavored with the double boon of good erops and high priees, and the onflow of their prosperity has pereolated throngh our whole commercial system, infusing new life into every artery. The holiday season is fitly accompanied by trade inertia and pastimeactivity, so that for the week there is very little to report of interest to these columins. Hardware is still stronger, and a further advance in local prices for iron is almost assured. . Hides are up again, and still tending that way. In pretty much all otber lines the markets are
without special feature. Money remains at rutes last reported, namely, 5 to 6 per cent. on call, 6 to 7 per cent. on time, and 7 to 8 per. cent. discount on first-elass commercial paper. Sierling exchange is quoted 8 fc c. to $8 \ddagger \mathrm{c}$. for $60 \rightarrow$ day bills between banks and 8 is to 8 dordinary demand. The stock market has recovered sharply from the depression of last week, the largest rise taking place in the shares that were weakest during the decline. It would now appear that the scare amongst the operators in Bank of Montreal Stock owing to the thorough going methods of the new management is upon sober review adjurlged unfounded, and certainly this conclusion accords well with the facts of the case. Gras stock has also taken a reactionary jump, though the prospects of electricity as a general illuminator are reported steadily improving. Our summary of sales for the week is as follows: 259 Bank of Montreal at 336 to 139 to 135 ; 39.4 Merehants at 85 to 57 to 80 ; 28 People's at 55 ; 25 Oommerce at $114 \frac{3}{4} ; 50$ ' Toronto at 121 to $122 ; 100$ Jacques Cartier at $69 ; 18$ Ontario at $70 ; 230$ Montred Telegraph at 94 to $93 \dot{3}^{\prime}$; 25 Richelicu Navigation at 41 , and 1075 Oity Gas at 109 to 114. The mariset to-day is barely steady, with Oity Gas again slowing special weakness. Reported sules are: 66 Bank of Montreal at $137 \frac{1}{2}$ to 137; ; 10 Toronto at 121 1 ; 120 Merebants at $86 \pm$ to $86 \frac{5}{4} ; 25$ Commerce at $115 \ddagger$ and 135 City Gits at 113 to 1112 to $111 \%$. The Stuck Exchange stands adjourned mutil Monday next. Consulidated Bank bills are guoted 95 to 97 Mechanics' 20e., as last reported. Boots and Shoes.-The business doing is very light, and confined mostly to felt overshoes and warm winter boots. Very little will
now be done untilafter the holidiys, when travellers will go out with their spring sumples.

Dnugs and Chemcals. - We have no change to report in the condition of lhings in this lime. Dulness continues to imevail, and we do not look for much improvement until well on in the month of January. Prices are nominally unchanged.

Dry Goods.-Apart from taking stock there is nothing doing in this line of trate. Foreign advices are very fism, and during the week an advance of a farthing lins been effected in prints, with a correspondiug wovement in other lines of cotton rools. A private cable from Glisfow to a valued customer in this city states that it is useless to come over with any expectation of buying goorls at old prices; that all possible concessions will be mide, but that the present state and the ummistakable tendency of the market point io continued and well sustained higher prices. We would direct the suecial atention of the country merchant to this condition of the fureign matket, since its platin meaning is that he mist, in turn, be prepared for higher prices. These changes are quite in keeping with the course of the market tor raw cotion, to which reference bas beon made under this headiug from time to time, and we donbt not the trade uf the conntry is cenerally looking forward to them. Similar contitions obtain in the wool market, and higher prices in ma.atactures of woullen may be regarded as also probable.

Frit,--Bnt litite change is to be noted in this market, stocks are light and prices timm. Fresh salmon has advanced somewhat, and is now guoted at 10 c and Haddock 3 to 32 c , as will be found by reference to one prices chrrent.
Flovis and Grann-The only business in whent reported in this market since last weck. are $\Omega$ few sales of car loads of Ganada Spriag No. 2 at $\$ 1.41$. Since these trimsactions the market has hardened some what in tone, and nominal quotations have been moved up to $\$ 1.42$ to $\$ 1.45$, but these figures are merely the reflection of the Ohicago market, and are without practical significunce. In Red and white Winter Whents, there is nothing doing and nothing said. In the Chicaro market not much has is yet developed conlirmatory of our suggestions as to the insiability of present high prices, although the set back here recorded might ensily assumie larger proportions and so jusify our interpretation of the condition of speculation. Barly in the week stili further advances tork place, and January delirery reached St.33. to $\$ 1.34$. Reaction then set in, and on Tuesday a tumble of 3 c per bushel was recorded. Talk of the "Keene Clique" is now becoming more general, and there are those who see in present operitions a deep-jaid blan to corner the market. Report has it that the jool contrul $6,000,000$ busliels in the West and $10,-$ 000,000 , or very nearly the entire stock, in New York. The teaching of experience is that attempts to priticularize the dealings of speculative combinations while in progress are tor the most part futile, and we give these fifures mere1y as we find them reporied, as madet gossip. Concentrated operations for a rise on a grand scale are beyond donbt taking place, but what. their exact mensure and delimite purpose it is safest to assume to be anknown: At any moment the manarer of the clique may deternine to unloarl, and it is tolembly certain that the time of this change of progamme will be as arffally concealed on this oceasion as it has been heretofore iu like operations condacted by the rejuted keen-witted chief actor. Prices in Chicago have ranged as follows for Jinnary drlivery: Friday, Sl.31d; Shurchy, El.33k; Monday, Sl$33 \frac{3}{3}$; Tuesday, S1.31, and to-diy at 1.05 p.m. Sl.314. In coarse grains sales of Barley are ieported at 65c und Oats at 32e. Pease are quoted 8ucto 8le, and Corn in boad nbout 70c. The shipments of Rye to Antwerp from this port for the past season foot up 322,000 bushels, and the
result of the business is stid to be most grati-
fring to shippers. The flow marke has been exeeedingly dull since last report with prices well maintained, few transuctions recorded $b$ ing at full figures. We note sules of Strong Bakers'at \$6.50; Superior Extra, \$0.30 nud City lags, $\$ 3.30$. A leading dealer states that firmers are in the habit of selling their choicest fruit to the local trade, and send what is left to this market, expecting to realize about ruling quotations for wholesale lots of the finest selections. There are apples in market, and have been all along, at Sl per barel, bint they are of the poorest description, both as to natural quality and condition. From this price up to sis the figure that any one consigmant would bring depends mon the grading, pracking, sce. ind at to these matters there is always roon for th wide diflerence of opinion. We give the prices at which the fruit is sold here by dealers it wholesate luts. Oranges remain over plentiful at $\$ 0.50$ per barel; Cranberies are yuoted at $\$ 7.50$ per barrel, and scarce. Uiher frits unchanged.

Fubt.-The market is reported unchanged for conl, with Stove at $\$ 7.00$ to $\$ 7.50 ; \mathrm{Egg}$, $\$ 7.00$ to 57.25 ; Chestnut, $S 6.75$ to $\$ 7.25$ Grate, $\$ 5.00$ to $S 5.50$ yer net ton delivered, and Steamer Coal per gross ton, $\$ 5.00$ to $\$ 5.50$. With a view to diminishing the outpuit the Reading and New Jersey Central Companies have shut down entirely until the 5 th inst., and it is stated that a number of the Lehigh collieries will also close operatious for a time. Cordrood-Market withont reported change sinec last week.

Fuis.-The close of the season finds the frade in good spirits, owing to the exceptionally brisk business of the past two menthe. Slocks are abnormally low, and money has come in steadily in unexpeted proportions. The yenr, notwithsianding mit the rery great dmwbncks und discomagements which it has known, proves a very lair one, and, as nearly all the mend is at the close, the satisfiction griven is perhaps greater ham gencral resuls would seem to justify.

Grocemes.-In ordinary business' there continucs a good averige trade doing on orders. With the exception of sometining in Teas and Molnsses, chielly in exchinge, the heavy wholesale tade is mot large nor spechative. Hioss.-There would seem to be a disposition on the part of a majority of the dealers to keep prices doirn, and efforts in this direction are so
earnest nid persistent that some dillieulty attaches to gainingadmission of the actual condition of the market, which is one of great gtrength. We are directly informed of bids above ruling ghotations which have faited to secure supplies, and it is contended that, ats hides are atrictly castiratiole, and the bighest bidder invariably commands the mituket, the prices generally reported cannot firirly representactual transactions. Certain it is that differemi deatiers grote the market somewhat apart, and the interence is almost forced upon us that the butchers, instend of getting a uniform price for their hides, are furnishing them to their castomers at virying rates. One large denter knows of no basiness over $\$ 10$; mother wonld be glad to have all there is in the market at Bil0.25, and would quote them $\$ 10.25$ to S10.50; while a third marks the price at \$10.5u. The lowest price named it will be nuticed is an ad vance of 50 cents over last week. These facts ciearly indicate the tuac of the market to be very cearly indicate the toan of hemarket tobe very
fimm, with an upward iendency in prices. Ail the hides oflering are taken-up at once, rand not only is the maket kept bare, but deaters camol secure needed supplies. The fret is that Now Jork rules the hide markets of the continent, and where so eager is the demand hat large contracts have been entered into, we are informed, for supplies as far ahead as April. This business is, however, speculative, and, therefore, cmnnot be counted upon to give stability to pices. Our American cousins are much in the habit of over-doing hangs in every line of trade, whether, markets be tending upward or downward, and it is not surprising that conservative dealers here should follow nip higrh prices reluctanty and, so fir as permitted to do so, at a sufe distance. The actual condition of the market we think to be finitly represented by the quotations, Green Buthers, No. 1, \$10.25 to $\$ 10.50$; No. $2, \$ 9.25$ u, $\$ 9.50$, and Nu. 3, ss.20 to $\$ 8.50$. 'hese ligures may lack the element of stability, but, for the time being they are current, and denlings at lower prices uust be regarded us exceptioual. We lind disparity also in quotations for sheep skins, which are admitted to be very strong, and are by some matsed up from last week. The range of prices given is within the spatn, $\$ 1.25$ to $\$ 1.75$, tud, whout attemptiag to dratw them nearer together, we olfer these digules as the true quotntion.

Handware.-The market has undergone ve:y little change since last report as to prices, bot a good deal of strengith is apparent as reflecter from the markets abrond. It is a matter of comphant that dealers here have been persistently selling goods throughout the prest senson of constant adyances at pices less than those at which it was possible to replace them. This policy is certainly umise, and, if persisted in, mast prove fintuenally suicedal ; for, upon a falling mavket, a merciant is not able to sell his goots on the basis of what they cost him, bat ouly on the basis of what the supply market will permit others to sell them for. So, upon a rising market, it he fatil to exact pries proportionate to cost it bought at time of sale, he really conducts his business on the principle of small profits and large losses. of cunrse these are but the simplest axioms of tade, yet there can be no question that they have been much disregarded this fall and winter. There is not a little to be said in expmanam of the conse, pursued, aum perhnysin sone masure to justify it as a departure from estabtished usage, bai the policy in itself admits of no commendation. We have stated that there is no clange in prices, but we should add that a leading house has refused to duplicate orders for irun at the ruliner rate $\$ 2.2 \overline{5}$, nsking $\$ 2.50$, and there is renson to beliere that before next week this price will become established. Advices from England, as intimaled, are of the most encouraging character to holders, and a similar stroug, tone pervades, the United Slates market. In the American markets the demand for pig iron continues active and inquities for stock for the coming season are numerous. The recent advance in
prices does not de ter buyers; "on the contrary with each succeeding rise," as we find it stated in an exchnage, "more anxiety is displayed to secure supplies, and firmucemen are coy in negotiating." Few makers are willing to name a price for tuture delivery. There has been a great quickening in the markets of (ireat Brituin, and, although there may be slight reations, it is quite likely there will be a sus. tained firmoses for some time to come, as the outlook is fivorable to ath extratordinay large consumption during the year, and entirely in makers' fitwor. Ench succeeding week witnesses the lighting up of one or more furnates that inve long been cold. Prices continne unsetted, and it is difticult to give quotations. As far as ean be sean at present it is not probable that pruduction, notwithstanding its increase, will gain much upon consumption, at least for the first half of the year. Higher prices are cabled from (ilasgow, but advancing freights have tended to uasente the markets. The iron masters of North Statfordshire refuse to fill further orders, exept at prices current at time of dulivery. Uur own market partakes of the entivening inthence. Sules of Siemens, (Londondery Works) in quantities of 1,000 tons hatve Jately been made in this maket at a price that did not transpipe, but supposed to be not less than Sez per ton. Enquities from foumdries in the Western States have lately been made for stuck from these works, and some. shipments bave already been mate. The company are about to double their eapacity, and will have the second fondry in operation in a few days. Orders for several months aleend are already on hand; in fact, the demand for atl pig iron is in hand; in fact, the demand tor ath pig tron is in excess of hat supply We learm or a sale of at $\$ 26.90$. General hardware is feeling the thect of the rise in materials, and demers prefer to sell in small lots.
Hors.-It is not only possible for a market to have, but is very frequently the case that it has, a decided tone in the ubsence of transactions and even of bids and offers. This we shouha say is true of the locnl hop market just now. No business and no offerings ate renorted since hist week, but there is stock here which seems rather more than willing to meet wha a parchaser, but quite fails to do so. The New York market is quiet, but this market, if it be fair to quote it on such mengre information, is heary. Shippers are holding off entirely, and the outlook for business is not for the moment at all promising. There would not appear to be any good reason to question the soundness of the general advane? which took place last fill, but just now there is a sensmable duluess calculated to give the market in the eyes of holders who desire to sell a sutt appearance that might well disappear witb the advent of achal business. Wequote trom the New York Commercial Bulletin of 'luesday: "Demand from all quarters is very slow, and prices are nominal at best. Most holders ask about the figures generally quoled, but it does not seem very proBuble that business cond beeffected except at concessions."
