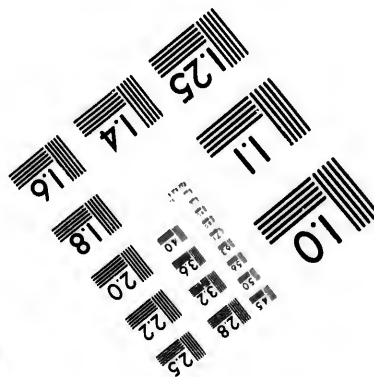

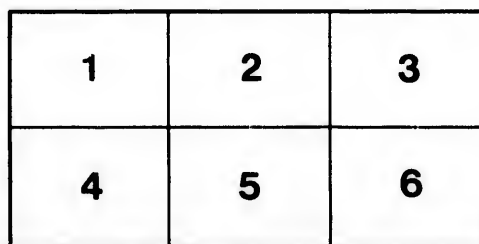
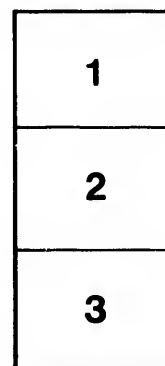

INTRODUCTION.

We rejoice to notice that the noblest of England's children are fast returning to the true faith of their ancestors. The class of persons who were the first to accept Henry VIII's reformation of religion in England, are the first to see the error of such a step; and we now find them returning in goodly numbers to the one true fold under the one great shepherd.

Of the first class were those nobles and courtiers who were more greedy for this world's goods, no matter how they came, justly or unjustly, even though by sacrilege, than for the goods of life eternal. It is consoling to notice in this list names of men whose guilty ancestors were enriched with the spoils of monasteries, colleges, and hospitals, now making restitution in building churches, hospitals, schools, etc., whilst others perform the like good works as thanksgiving offerings for their conversion.

A second class of converts are the descendants of those who, less guilty, joined the new religion to preserve their lands, their estates, their situations in the governments, both Imperial and municipal, of the day, or their positions in the army. For the Reformation was not brought about by the preaching of the true Gospel by pious men, but by penal laws the most odious, fit imitation of the Imperial acts of pagan Rome, by which the Christians were put to death and their lands confiscated. Here is a brief synopsis of these barbarous enactments:

If any person or persons inhabiting within this realm or any other of her Majesty's dominions, shall...willingly or wittingly hear and be present at any other matter or form of common prayer, of administration of the sacraments, of making of ministers in the churches, or of any other rites contained in the book annexed to this act than is mentioned and set forth in the said book, and shall be thereof convicted, he or they shall suffer imprisonment for six months; for the second offence imprisonment for one whole year, and for the third offence imprisonment for his or their lives.—*Pickering's Statutes*, vol. 4, p. 350.

"Those not repairing to church every Sunday shall forfeit twenty pounds for every month they are absent."

"The month here is to be accounted twenty-eight days; so that the recusant will forfeit thirteen score pounds in a year."—*Laws against Papist and Popish recusants, Nonconformists and non-jurors*, p. 8.

If any above 16 years of age shall be convicted of absenting himself from church without lawful cause, one month; impugn the Queen's authority in causes ecclesiastical; frequent conventicles or persuade others so to do, on pretence of exercise of religion, he shall be committed to prison until he conforms.

If within three months after such conviction, he refuses to conform and submit himself, being thereto lawfully required, he shall, in open assizes or sessions, *abjure the realm* (i.e. swear to leave it.)

If the offender refuses to abjure (the realm), or returns without the Queen's license, he is guilty of felony without benefit of clergy.

The offender who abjures (the realm), or, on being required, refuses so to do, forfeits his goods and his lands, during life.—Idem, p. 12.

A person who was sick for part of the time contained in an information upon this statute shall not be at all excused by reason of such sickness, if it be proved that he was recusant both before and after; for it shall be intended that he obstinately forbore during that time.—*Burn's Ecclesiastical Law.*

By such legislation was the Reformation properly prosecuted in England. Another engine or attack was misrepresentation. His Eminence Cardinal Manning well remarks that the so-called Reformation was imposed upon the English people by fraud and misrepresentation.

The illustrious occupant of the Vice-Regal throne in Canada is a descendant of one of those heroes of the faith who suffered in his property for his religious convictions. The seventh Earl of Argyll returned to the ancient faith of his ancestors. For this offence the law of confiscation was put in force, and his son, Lord Lorne, then a Protestant, became his father's heir before his death. Hence those cruel and unjust enactments were not a dead letter. But though those who conformed to the new religion saved their lives and property, how many of them suffered in silence tortures untold in the consciousness of their wrong-doing!—and how many now outside the Catholic Church are broken of heart by the uncertainty of their religion, yet have not the courage to brave the loss of friends or of goods, the reproach or the sneer, to profess before men what they profess before God in secret! With a weakness of mind, which even reason condemns, they continue attendance on a church in which they have little or no faith. This class, thanks be to God, is fast becoming less numerous.

There is a good object to be gained by the publication of these names. It will show to the weak-hearted and wavering that the most noble and learned personages, have, after prayer and self-sacrifice, entered a Church that is held up to the protesting world as corrupt and soul-destroying. That calumny is refuted at once. Those great personages would not, indeed, renounce many worldly advantages but for conscience sake, that they might securely tread the true path that leads to Heaven. We live in lands and times that boast of the religious liberty of the subject, secured by the semblance of a just legislation. One man is supposed to have nothing to do with another's conscientious convictions. But in fact an exception is *always* made of the Catholic. A man may become a Church of England Protestant, a Presbyterian, a Baptist, a Methodist, a Pacha, for that matter it matters not; but if he become a Catholic, he is considered a fool, and ranked a social outlaw. A convert to Catholicity appears to have no toleration, less rights. Well may we argue from this that he must be like his Saviour and the early Christians—"A reproach to the Jews, a folly to the Gentiles"—whilst like them he walks the narrow way that leads to eternal life.

We must not omit remarking on the social status of those who return to the Catholic Church in England. They are, in great part, persons from the highest walks of life—persons whose lives have been spent in the search after truth, with around them all the means for a perfectly rational deduction. Statesmen and scientists, men of law, men of letters, dignitaries and divines—all that is brightest in mind and purest in heart of England's people have testified before God and man that the Reformation was an error and a crime. Those noble converts must do violence to their humility by permitting the light of their good example to be placed upon a mountain that it may serve as a beacon to guide others to eternal life. They have already confessed before men by entering the Church, and Christ says that He will confess them before His Father who is in Heaven; and they again, in this little pamphlet, profess Him before hundreds of thousands of men, saying to them, with the power that experience gives, to come and rest in that fold where alone is peace.

Growth and Progress of Catholicity in the United States.

Only those who have given the subject study and observation realize the great and rapid increase in numbers, in power and influence in recent years of the Catholic Church in this country. Nothing can now impede her progress. Her future is most promising. The first Catholic bishopric in the United States was established, with Baltimore as the seat, in 1790. When this Episcopal See was founded the number of clergymen was 34, who had been governed by a Vicar Apostolic, and who administered to a population of 30,000 Catholics.

In 1840, half a century later, the Roman Catholics numbered 1,500,000 souls, and the Church had 16 bishops, 482 priests, and 454 churches. In 1855, the Catholic population was about 2,000,000; and twenty-one years later, in 1876, it had increased to 3,500,000, with 1 cardinal, 9 archbishops, 56 bishops, 5,358 priests, 5,045 churches, and 3,811 oratories and missionary stations. In the twenty-one years, from 1855 to 1876, the religious houses for men increased from 15 to 95; of conventual establishments from 50 to 225. In the year 1800 there was but one Catholic female academy in the country: in 1876 there were over 400. In the same period, colleges devoted to Catholic teaching, had increased from 2 to 64. These facts and figures, which are reliable, furnish evidence of wonderful vitality. Catholics are increasing in a much greater ratio than any other element of the population; the natural increase exceeds that of any other, whilst great numbers continue to come from foreign lands.

The Catholic Church in the United States is no longer composed wholly of the poorer classes, of the simple and unlearned. A single Jesuit priest, who is not yet a very old man, is known to have received more than 8,000 American Protestants into the Roman Church, ten of whom were ministers of various sects. The order of Paulist Fathers, founded in 1858 by the Rev. Father Hecker, himself a convert from Protestantism, numbers thirty-four members, nearly all of whom are American gentlemen, who were born and educated Protestants. Many of the Jesuits—who have in the United States 750 members—are Americans; the same is true of the Benedictines and the Christian Brothers, who together count 1,000 members. The late Archbishop of Baltimore in five years confirmed 2,752 converts of American birth. The average annual number of adult converts in the city of New York is said to be about 900. The Archbishops of Philadelphia and Milwaukee report that from five to seven per cent. of these they confirm are converts. The Bishop of Richmond says that thirty-five per cent. of the Catholics in North Carolina are converts, and that one parish in that State is composed wholly of converts. The Church which has won from the ranks of Protestantism and enlisted in its own service such men as Dr. Brownson, Dr. Ives, Archbishop Wood, of Philadelphia; Dr. Bayley, the late Archbishop of Baltimore; Father Hecker, Father Hewitt, Dr. Jas. Kent Stone, formerly President of Hobart College; Father Walworth, Vicar-General Preston, Father McLeod, Dr. J. V. Huntingdon, Rev. Virgil H. Barber, Rev. Calvin White, and a host of others not less distinguished, learned and venerated Americans, cannot be regarded with contempt; it must be reckoned with as a force that may be feared, but that must not be despised. In the year 1850—twenty-eight years ago—there were in the entire United States only six Catholic Archbishops, one of whom was an American, three of Irish birth, and two of French origin—and twenty-seven bishops. There were 1,800 priests, 1,073 churches, twenty-nine ecclesiastical institutions, seventeen colleges and ninety-one female academies. There are now eleven archbishops—including one Cardinal Archbishop—fifty-six bishops, 5,548 churches, 5,634 priests, twenty-one theological seminaries, with 1,121 ecclesiastical students; seventy-four colleges and 519 academies. Here is a growth in twenty-eight years of forty-four prelates, 3,834 priests, 3,475 churches, and 477 seminaries, colleges and academies.

Nineteen of the prelates are natives of the United States. The cathedrals of Pittsburg, Philadelphia, Albany, Chicago, Baltimore, Buffalo, Louisville, Milwaukee, St. Louis and Cincinnati are monuments of piety, taste and skill; the cathedral of Boston is a structure of massive beauty, 364 feet long, 160 feet wide, and 120 feet high, with two towers, one rising to the height of 320 feet. The style is purely mediæval Gothic. The new Cathedral of New York, which has now been twenty years in building, is the largest, most costly ecclesiastical structure in the New World.

The number of Catholics in New York city is very large. It is computed that within the three Dioceses of New York, Brooklyn and Jersey City—all contained within a radius of 10 miles, from the City Hall, New York—there are over one million adherents of the Catholic Church.

The growth and increase of Catholic churches in the United States, especially in the last twenty years, is something truly marvelous. Never has there been a wider or better field for the work of the Church, and never has the seed sown yielded so bountiful a harvest or produced such abundant fruit.
