Montreal, Nov. 23 .- The main building of the University of Montreal, bettaining the medical department, was destroyed by fire last night. The damage is estimated at \$400,000 and covered by insurance. 



Before Christmas arrives it is hoped that practical demonstration of the possibility of peace on earth and good. will between the country and the city folk will be given in Toronto by the founding of a Yeomen's Club, for which certain structural plans are under way.





Tells Advantages Veterans Would Gain by Linking With Conservatives.
