By the decision of the privy council, announced yesterday, the Toronto Street Railway Co. have won the litigation with the city, which began in

"We have lost on every point," said City Solicitor Chisholm, and, explaining the effect, went on: "It means that we have no control over the railway company in the matter of extension of routes, stops and the extension into new territory. We lost the famous omnibus suit, an appeal from the supreme court of Canada, and we lost the Avenue-road extension case, an appea rrom the Ontario court of appeal."

According to the judgment their lordships advise that an order be made declaring and ordering:

"That neither the city nor the company have any street railway powers under the said agreement over the streets within the new territorial additions to the city during

ritorial additions to the city during the term therein mentioned;
"That under clauses 14 and 17 of the conditions, the privilege to grant to another person or company for the failure of the company to establish and lay down new lines and open same for traffic, or to extend the tracks and services upon any street as provided by the agreement, is the only remedy the agreement, is the only remedy the

city can claim.
"That it is for the company, and not the city engineer, with the approval of the city council, to determine what routes shall be adopt-

That, subject to condition 30, it is for the company and not the city engineer to determine where the cars shall be stopped for the pur-pose of taking on or letting of passengers.

"That the judgments of the su-

preme court and court of appeal be varied so far as is necessary to varied so far as is necessary to give effect to the above declaration.

"That the corporation pay the railway company the costs incurred by them in the several Canadian courts in respect to the question raised on these consolidated appeals, so far as such costs have yet already been paid them by any not already been paid them by any of the said courts."

The Effect.

The news carried with it something akin to consternation in civic circles, while at the company's office the intelligence was hailed with undisguised satisfaction.

The results are sweeping. The city cannot order extensions within or without the city's limits, the city engineer can neither direct the routes of cars nor prescribe stopping places, and the city is saddled with the costs of the whole previous litigation. The last named is a minor consideration, and it is estimated that a few thousand dollars will cover all these claims. To the amount must, however, be added \$4700, the fee of I. F. Hellmuth, K.C., who was counsel for the city before the privy council in the eedings that have proved so dis-

appointing. Far Reaching.

It is feared, too, that results may be even more far-reaching than at first appeared. Apprehension is abroad that the city's penalty suits, involving many thousands of dollars, will be prejudiced and that the decision of the Ontario Railway Board on the city's applica-tion re overcrowding and other matters may also be affected. It is, in fact, hinted that the foundations upon which rest the railway commission and the Ontario Railway Board are threat-

The city's legal department freely admits defeat, but takes consolation from the fact that the city still has power to draft the timetable, on which the cars must operate. The mayor and board of control likewise acknow-ledge the crushing nature of the re-

Engineer's Views.

GRAND OPERA AT ITS BEST ENJOYED'AT MASSEY HALL Magnificent Production by San

Carlos Company-Soloists and Chorus Alike of First Rank.

Henry Russell should go down in history as the man who, with comparatively small capital, has gotten together an aggregation of artists who rival the most ambitious and expensive organizations of Conried and Hammerstein, for certainly nothing could have been more beautiful and artistic than last night's rendition in Massey Hall of "La Boheme"

To be sure the difficulties in the mechanical part of the opera, owing, to the late arrival of the scenery and the poor facilities of the Massey Hall stage, somewhat marred the perfection of the performance, but the magnificent acoustic properties of the hall more than counterbalanced this draw-

As to the opera itself, it is one of the best examples of what the French would call "Opera Comique." Sweet would call "Opera Comique." Sweet and sensuous and beautiful, full of color and light, as is its music, it yet. falls short of the tragic intensity of the Wagnerian or even the older schools of French and Italian grand opera. Alice Nielsen, who was, naturally, most interesting to Toronto audiences, has gone far since the days of "The Singing Girl" and the "Fortune Teller." Dainty, gay and coquettish in the first act, she rose to an intensity in the last act, which surprised even her most enthusiastic almirers, while her exquisite voice rang true, high and

clear at every note.
Signor Constantino, as Rodolfo, won his audience with his first note. His voice is golden, his head notes perfect, being absolutely free from the slightest suggestion of the falsetto, which so often mars the work of the Italian tenor. In his love duets with Mini he was at his best.



OTTAWA, April 26.-Messrs. Laergne of Montmagny, Devlin of Nicoet, Martin of St. Mary's, and Devlin of Wright put up a strong opposition during the third reading of the bill to authorize the invalidation of certain marriages of minors. They took the round that it would be objectionable o Catholics, who were opposed as a matter of conscience to divorce in any shape. Moreover, the bill had been hastily introduced, and little opportun-

ty given for its consideration.





APPLY CARNEGIE FUND TO LOCAL PROFESSORS

Memorandum Explaining Conditions Under Which Toronto Faculty Labor is Sent Trustees.

Dr. Maurice Hutton, acting president of Toronto University, has submitted memorandum to the trustees of the Carnegie foundation fund regarding retirement allowances for the advance ment of teaching, expressing the hope that the trustees will include this university among beneficiaries of the fund. Another sentence of the memorandum calls attention to the "utter inadequacy of provisions for retirement in the University of Toronto."

The memorandum states that the obligations of the state towards pensions do not appear to have any appreciable recognition in this country. In the earlier history of the University of Toronto, retiring annuities were occasionally granted, but in 1891 the authorities decided against the continuance of such a system. The substituted "retirement fund," Dr. Hutton says, is nothing more than a system of enforced saving by deducting a certain sum monthly from the salaries of the members of the from the salaries of the members of the faculty, which increases with the salaries, according to a fixed scale. This compulsory saving system, according to the memorandum, involves a forfeiture of their own money on the part of the faculty, and they have not sufficient surplus to insure their lives, nor have hemselves. 



Mining Editor Toronto World: I ote in your financial column that cause of the drop in Foster stock is owing to an organized bear attack made possible, not by the known lack of value in the property, but by the absence of one shipments and the distinction of the management to give the stockholders proper information in

Now, I claim that, in view of non-Now, I claim that, in view of non-production and a generality disquieted and sagging market, the management were morally bound to issue to the gen-eral stockholders a full and complete statement of what had been accom-plished at the mine in the way of developing one bodies, their values, etc.

by the moniest dealer. When the mysterious offers are investigated the man with the marked cheque or wad of cash can get no satisfaction. Uusually he is put off a while. If he is not discouraged at this, and pursues the treasure further, he runs against an ingenious excuse why the stock cannot be delivered. Some of these explanations are amusing, and are even worth the trouble.


