ORGANIZE FOR DEFENSE.

Toronto Branch of the Navy League Offers Some Suggestions to the Dominion Government.

IMPROVE MERCHANT MARINE

Of Twenty-Two of the Very Fast Steamers on the Atlantic Only Nine Fly British Flag.

W. B. McMurrich, K.C., occupied the chair at a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Toronto branch of the Navy League yesterday afternoon.

Subsidize Past Lines. In former memorials, the Toronto branch of the Navy League has endeavored to draw the attention of the Dominion government to the importance of adopting a policy whereby Great Britain and Canada, by a joint system of subsidization, shall create a powerful fleet of merchant steamers in the north Atlantic.

Organize Available Forces. The memorandum goes on, "that at the coming conference, the question of imperial defence shall be discussed, and the Canadian government has given its answer to this proposal."

It is clear that any comprehensive scheme of imperial defence extending to Great Britain and all of her self-governing colonies will involve a common defence fund.



DOCTORS OFTEN IGNORANT

If They Do Not Know What Causes Death, They Say "Heart Failure."

It covers up their misdoing. Dr. Cassidy's Strong Statements Before the Provincial Board of Health.

Dr. J. J. Cassidy read an interesting paper before the Provincial Board of Health yesterday morning, on the "Causes of Mortality Which Are Difficult of Explanation in Autopsy." He pointed out that the autopsy, in many cases, failed to show the cause of death, where there was no foul play. Stomachic trouble was one in which the autopsy could yield no explanation. He pointed out that chloroform was hazardous for some and innocuous for others, but, as to the chances, medical science could not diagnose.

THAT WHICH IS PROPOSED BY AMERICAN MEN

They Agree With Torontonians That Canadians Should Control Their Own Life Insurance Funds.

ASSESSMENT SYSTEM CONDEMNED

"No Reason Why Canadians Should Hand Their Money Over to Foreigners for Investment."

From The Montreal Herald.

The views of prominent residents of Toronto, recently expressed in the Montreal press, on the subject of keeping in Canada the control of the capital of Canadians, especially that represented by the large amount of money paid annually in life insurance premiums, has caused much favorable comment in Montreal. Toronto press representatives who interviewed the leading men in Montreal on the subject, find that they appreciate, as fully as possible, the greater importance of conserving Canadian capital for the development of their own country. The view expressed was raised by a joint letter addressed to a number of prominent people in Canada by Sir Charles Tupper, Mr. John Charlton, M.P., and Mr. George H. Roberts, the executive of the Crown Life Insurance Company. This company is making a strong effort to rectify some of the evils affecting the life insurance business in Canada. A Canadian who invests his money in a Canadian can obtain the greatest advantages in life insurance by giving his money to a Canadian company. The prominence of the men composing the directorate of the Crown Life, who have promoted this movement, has caused a widespread interest in the subject. The Hon. Henri B. Rainey, Col. F. C. Henshall, Messrs. Forger, H. Markland, Molson, and Charles Cassels are the Quebec directors of the Crown Life.

ALDERMAN LAPORTE.
Alderman Laporte, when interviewed on the subject of Canadian life insurance, said he had long since recognized that a great deal of money was being unnecessarily sent out of Canada to American life insurance companies, and that the assessment of a Canadian life insurance company should be on a Canadian basis. There was no reason, he said, why a Canadian life insurance company should not be established in Canada. He pointed out that the money which was sent out of Canada to American life insurance companies could be used in Canada for the benefit of the Canadian people. One dollar fines were imposed.

W.C.T.U. Meeting. Toronto District W.C.T.U. has arranged to hold a school of methods in the lecture room of Parkdale Methodist Church, on Thursday, April 17, conducted by Mrs. Annie O. Rutherford, president of the Dominion W.C.T.U. A very interesting program has been prepared. Mrs. Stevens, president for Toronto, will take charge of a quiz for presidents of local unions.

Barns' Monument. The statue of the poet Burns, to be erected in Toronto, will be shipped from Edinburgh in the beginning of the month. The government and the city have been approached on the question of a site. The Parks and Recreation Committee of the City Council has passed a resolution recommending that leave be granted to place the monument at the northeast corner of the Allan Gardens, and yesterday J. L. Morrison, chairman of the committee, returned a notification to that effect. If the site offered by the city is selected, the Mayor will probably be asked to turn the first sod.

George Elliot. An interesting treat for those who admire the writings of George Elliot, and who does not—is promised in the coming week. It is to be found in another column of a lecture to be given by the Rev. Canon Welch, M.A., D.C.L., rector of St. James' Cathedral, in St. George's Hall, Elm-street, on the evening of Tuesday, the 22nd inst. Those who attend will take a quiet walk with brickbat and stone, and the good work of the Toronto Humane Society, in aid of whose fund the lecture is kindly given by Canon Welch.

Pardon for Prentice. Ottawa, April 11.—Arthur Prentice, a young English lad, five years ago was sentenced to be hanged for the murder of a farmer in Western Ontario. Prentice had quarrelled with a neighboring farmer's son over a rabbit, which Prentice said belonged to him. The death sentence was changed to imprisonment for life, and Prentice and don has been granted Prentice. PROTECTION IN ENGLAND. Rumor That Budget Will Put Tax on Flour and Wheat.

London, April 11.—In spite of today's announcement that Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, is progressing so well that it is certain he will be able to introduce the budget on Monday next, there are those who believe that another postponement is likely to occur. It is openly said that the disposition of the budget is the subject of more diplomatic than organic. Those who are in the position of the West Indies, went away with a strong impression that the government, even at this late date, had not definitely decided how to raise the sum represented by the enormous deficit. Nevertheless, the counties' rumors regarding the budget provisions continue to circulate. The Associated Press has good reason for believing that a tax will be imposed on flour, while it is possible that some sort of duty will be placed on wheat. The oil trade anticipates a duty on petroleum, but this is merely an intelligent surmise, as the proposals are guarded with the utmost secrecy, in order to avoid the loss of revenue which occurred owing to business interests taking advantage of the premature leakage of the last budget's proposals.

ASSERT CANADA'S RIGHTS. Parliamentary Committee Will Discuss Copyright on Tuesday.

The Parliamentary Committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association held a meeting yesterday afternoon, at which the principal topic discussed was the copyright question. W. J. Gage was present and pointed out what he thought was the injustice of the present law. A special meeting of the committee will be held next Tuesday night to consider the following resolution:

"That, in the opinion of this committee, the Canadian Manufacturers' Association should place itself on record as being favorable to Canada asserting her rights to legislate regarding copyright, and that such legislation should require all books copyrighted in Canada to be manufactured in the Dominion.

All interested in the question are invited to attend the meeting.

RIOTERS ATTACK GENDARMES. Soldiers Use Their Revolvers, But Forced to Retreat.

Brussels, April 11.—Sharp fighting occurred this morning at Brucquegnies (near Charleroi). Several thousand strikers attacked and stoned a body of gendarmes, who retaliated by firing their revolvers. A sharp fusillade followed, and the gendarmes were compelled to retreat. A squadron of mounted police galloped up and charged and dispersed the mob.

The Belgian government has decided to prosecute martial law on Monday, unless order is previously restored.

To the Indian Ocean. St. Petersburg, April 11.—The Exchange Gazette says it thinks the recent loans to Persia ought to lead to the formation of a Russian company for railway construction in Persia. Russia ought in this way to obtain a share in the Indian Ocean in the same manner as by the Manchurian Railway she has obtained access to the Pacific.

AMENDMENTS WILL BE CONSIDERED

Motion to Postpone the Phone Bill Deferred by the Chairman's Vote.

The Senate Committee Stood 16 to 16 on Proposal to Lay It Over for a Year.

Ottawa, Ont., April 11.—The Bell Telephone Company's bill came up before the Senate Railway Committee today. The bill asked for power to increase the capital stock of the company on the 1st of May. The bill was heard on behalf of the promoters, and explained that the capital stock of the company was now \$5,000,000. All that money was expended and for the past two years the company has been borrowing money. The company started with a capital of \$500,000, which has gradually increased until it now amounts to \$5,000,000. There were 50,000 subscribers and all the money subscribed had been paid out. The demands of the company were growing, and the revenue was not sufficient to meet them. The system was exhausted. What was desired was sufficient amount to carry on with new lines. Increase of Five Millions. They therefore asked for an increase from five to ten millions. The company would require to spend about \$1,000,000 a year, not on buying up, but in improving service and giving to the people a very low rate. Of the expenditure over \$300,000 would be made in the city of Toronto alone. Without getting more capital it would be impossible to improve the service or construct new lines. Mr. Macdonald (British Columbia): Did you suffer any damage last year by not being allowed to increase your capital stock? Mr. Sise: We had to go and borrow money. Mr. Miller (Nova Scotia): Are you willing to remove the ambiguity of the bill? Mr. Sise: You want me to admit that it is ambiguous. If you refer to the increase of rates, I may say that we do not intend increasing the rates. The existing service will pay existing rates. Mr. Miller asked if Mr. Sise would consent to the amendments he would propose, and Mr. Sise replied that he would not. Mr. Macdonald: Are you not charging higher rates than is allowed by the Government-General-in-Council? Mr. Sise: For existing rates we charge existing rates. If anything additional is wanted we must charge accordingly. If a man wants a Pullman car he would have to pay for it. Mr. Loughheed: Where did you want to increase the service? Mr. Sise: Principally in Ontario and the Northwest. Mr. Drummond (Montreal) wanted to know what the question of rates was to do with the matter. He never knew the company had any capital stock. The Canadian Pacific had applied to the government for an increase in its capital stock, and he had no objection to the government making the company give certain conditions.
