At the beginning of the year which is now fast speeding away, the English flour milling trade was not in a very enviable position. The United States of America, on the United States of America, on the height of a gigandic wave of busi-ness prosperity, challenged our all-round commercial supremacy, and in our own department there were many pessimists who were thrown into a terrible state of alarm, and seemed ready to accent Americans into a terrible state of alarm, and seemed ready to accept Americans at their own inflated price. * * The year 1902 did not start well. For more seasons than we can to count we have been at the mercy of those American millers who, re-gardless of cost, have flooded our warehouses with their surolus progardless of cost, have flooded our warehouses with their surplus pro-duction, and we have suffered ac-cordingly. At the beginning of this year the state of the market was very unsatisfactory, and profits were difficult to make. At the same time American millers called a halt, and looked their own position fairly in the face. To their credit, be it in the face. To their credit, be it said—in so far as credit can be given in such circumstances—they realized that something must be realized that something must be done to stop the great money leak-age, and they began to worry the cargiers of their produce. They wanted better terms. They wanted to be still able to punish us at the expense of the railway com-panies and shippers. We do not say this in any carping spirit, but simply as a matter of fact.

Look at that picture and then on this: Look at that picture and then on this: The position to-day distinctly fav-ors English millers. They have been able to compete successfully for fully six months. Again, giv-ing American millers their due, they have stopped dumping upon discov-ering that they were losing huge sums of money, and the field has therefore been more open for us in therefore been more open for us in England. The corn tax may have contributed its share in bringing about better prospects, but that is not the main point. The main point is that America has decided to fight upon better lines, and we welcome the inauguration of their Millers' Federation, and trust that nuch good will result from the closer business relations accruing therefrom. Harking back to out main point, it is a fact that English milling is looking up, the prospect is brighter, and trade is of greater volume. Most of all the smaller manufacturers are partaking freely in the slight advantages we are now enjoying, and there is a more hopeful tone regarding the future. Many small millers have, during the Many small millers have, during the year, taken heart and put their mills in better order, and there is a pleas-ant hum about things in general which must be very gratifying.' * * * Taking the year as a whole we have had a fairly level run of prices, and the benefits have almost solely accrued thru larger individual trade volume, and this proves con-olusively that given a right or bet-ter proportion of orders we are still able to make profits. The trouble commences when the influx from abroad is inordinately great. At abroad is inordinately great. A present we are better satisfied than we have been for a considerable period of time, and, as we say, we shall be glad if the resent condi-tions can be indefinitely prolonged. We shall be glad if American millers, by means of their new organi ation, can induce their fraternity to onfine their output to profitable limensions, for we feel sure it would be better for them, as well as for the millers of our own islands. We welcome all that is for the good of the trade wheresoever conduct-ed, and the American Federation has our hearty approval. The fire commissioners of New York have dis covered that in that city during 1901 no less than 1313 fires were caused, and eight lives lost by the use of parlor matches; and, as a result, the Municipal Explosives Committee has included them in the list of explosives which "no person, firm or corporation shall have, use, keep, sell or give away," the prohibiton to go into force on the first day of January next. 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




