The Italian line is falling back before the Austro-German host, with its concentrated and over-powering artillery.

to be witnessing the beginning of one of those great drives which massed infantry and the march of heavy guns like those which carried the Austro-Germans over Poland, Serbia, and Roumania Another large tract of allied territory— Fruli and Veneto, with their rich and noble cities and fertile fields—may fall into the destroying hands which have ravaged Belgium and northern France. 


