Cable to New York Reports Negotiations by Austria

ALEXANDER PUT END TO THEM

Reported That Serbian Council Was Seriously Considering Offer Made—Rumor That Does Not Square With Acts of This Fighting Nation

New York, Oct. 16.—A Tribune cable from Paris says:— "The information reached here today that Austria, a month ago offered terms of peace to Serbia, and only the intervention of Prince Alexander, who said that Serbia was ready to play the sword rather than a traitor, prevented an acceptance of the offer.

GERMANS TRY AGAIN IN WEST BUT ARE BEATEN

Paris, Oct. 16.—The French War Office reports:— "We repulsed last night, in Lorraine, a German counter attack against the trenches which we occupied yesterday to the north of Reillon. In the course of these engagements we took 100 prisoners.

BULGARS TRY TO KEEP ALLIES BACK Athens, Greece, Oct. 16.—Forty thousand Bulgarian troops, with artillery, are reported to have begun an attack on the Harza Bridge between Valandovo, on the railroad running from Saloniki into Serbia, and Hovdovo. The point of attack is about seventy miles north of the Greek border. The Bulgarians apparently are attempting to cut railway communication and prevent the allies from forwarding troops and supplies to the Serbians.

Arrest Among Bulgarians Most of the 10,000 men of the Bulgarian people is reported. Officers of pro-Russian sentiment have been retired from the army.

More About United States Plans

Washington, Oct. 16.—Provision for a military force of 665,000 men and construction, by 1920, of sixteen capital ships—ten dreadnoughts, and six battle cruisers—are included in plans for national defense as approved by President Wilson.

This great military force would be provided for by the creation of a continental army of 400,000 men, an increase in the regular army to 140,000 men and a militia strength of 125,000 men.

PICTURE SHOWS IN DOMINION UNDERGO CHANGE

Leading Theatres Adopting High-Class Policy

Influx of World's Greatest Players and New Grand Opera Pictures Indicate the Rapid Ascendency of Pictorial Form of Entertainment—Prices of Admission Being Re-adjusted to Meet New Conditions

The motion picture business in Canada is undergoing quite rapid changes which are resulting in the establishment of a line of theatres of like of the same class as the high-priced picture palaces of New York, Philadelphia and elsewhere.

These big film features proceed from town to town very much like a company of living players. Practically every successful play produced in New York, London or Paris, is now either already filmed or soon to be, which will assure the cities included in the contract showing of these dramatic, operatic or comedy hits no longer after the original players have closed their engagements.

In Toronto the Strand Theatre will present most of these coming big plays and in Montreal the Keith house, Imperial, will show them. This Montreal theatre will next week inaugurate a new twenty-five cent policy similar to the New York houses. A new house to open in Halifax on the 29th of this month, will also charge twenty-five cents in fact the new order of things in the line of pictures, musical features and high-class picture-show programmes in general, is demanding a revision of the old-time scale of admissions—prices which have ruled for years during which time motion pictures have improved immeasurably and additional features such as music and extra attractions have been necessarily enhanced in merit and expense.

In St. John the Imperial Theatre has made very little change in its policy, however, merely changing the orchestra chairs on the floor on a dime to fifteen cents, leaving more than 900 seats at the former ten-cent price. In addition to covering part of the heavy cost of higher grades of picture-plays this new system has practically eliminated the "cheap seats" reason that a partitioning of prices has caused the balcony to be more generally used. Therefore seats are now procurable on the lower floor at almost any time during the evening.

For three years the Ophelia Hall picture in Halifax has been charging fifteen cents for its seats and presenting merely the ordinary programme to please accompaniment and no specialties. This same price and higher prices have ruled for years in all the cities of Canada. The smallest towns and villages are getting the dime. In this regard the people of St. John have been enjoying the minimum of cost for their pictorial entertainment in spite of the continually increasing cost of programme.

It appears, therefore, that the next few months will see marked changes in the policy of Canada's picture theatres, large and small. The miscellaneous programme with minor stars is giving way to a wealth of big productions with the world's most notable players in leading roles. Furthermore, the field of grand opera is now being invaded and large theatres with the proper instrumental equipment, will soon be presenting such works as "The Carmen" (with Geraldine Farrar) to the full operatic score by large orchestras. Programmes will consume two hours and longer, seats will be booked in advance and people will attend in evening clothes. Russians Break Through Von Hindenburg's Line

Britain at War With Bulgaria—Khaki Position in West Improved—Civilians Take up Recruiting Work in England

London, October 15.—Along the western front there has been heavy fighting in the Artois, Champagne and Vosges regions. An official despatch from Sir John French late this evening flatly denying the German official statement of the afternoon in its claim that several trenches won by the British yesterday in the vicinity of the Hohenzollern redoubt had been recaptured by the Germans today, but on the contrary, the British had improved their position, was received with a great satisfaction. The French lost some trenches in the Champagne, but had some new gains to report in Lorraine.

In the east the Russians have turned to the offensive in the region of Drinsk, where the chief Teutonic effort is centred, and although the Germans claim that they have repulsed most of the Russian attacks they admit that the Russians penetrated their lines at one point for the width of a whole battalion. Such an admission is taken to indicate a serious reverse for Von Hindenburg's forces.

London, Oct. 15.—A British official report, received under date of 9:45 o'clock tonight from Field Marshal Sir John French, commander-in-chief of the British army in the field, says with reference to the German official statement of today: "The only change in the situation south of La Bassée canal is that we have further improved our positions in the Hohenzollern redoubt. We hold all the ground gained on the 13th."

The British foreign office announces that in view of the fact that Bulgaria has announced she is at war with Serbia, and is an ally of the Central Powers, His Majesty's government has informed the Bulgarian government, through the Swedish minister at London, who is in charge of Bulgarian interests, that a state of war exists between Great Britain and Bulgaria, as from 10 p.m.

London, 15.—British submarines have now cleared the Baltic Sea and the Gulf of Bothnia entirely of German merchant ships, says a despatch to the Star from Copenhagen.

Despatches to the Copenhagen evening newspapers say that a second German torpedo boat was sunk by the British submarine E-19 near Flaxa.

That twenty-four German travelers have been captured and taken into Grimby since September 15, is disclosed in an official statement printed in the London Gazette tonight.

ALONG THE BRITISH FRONT.

Scribner's Magazine for October has an illuminating article on the war from the pen of Mr. E. Alexander Powell, who is also correspondent of the London Daily Mail and New York World.

"They are not talking much, they are not singing much, they are not boasting at all, but they have settled down to the herculean task that lies before them with a grim determination, a bull-dog tenacity of purpose, which is eventually, I believe, going to prove the deciding factor in the war.

Mr. Powell says he has been asked many times why the British are holding so short a portion of the western battle front, and gives the following answer: "It should be remembered, in the first place, that the British army is composed of green troops, while the French ranks, thanks to the universal service law, are filled with men all of whom have spent at least three years in the colors.

"The fighting along the British sector is of a more desperate and violent nature than elsewhere on the Allied line, because the Germans have a deeper hatred for the English than for all their other enemies put together. It was against the British, remember, that the Germans first used their poisonous gas.

"The story that Mr. Powell tells of the effects of the gas is of a nature to make the reader long for an opportunity to take some part in the punishment of devil in human form who invented and used such a system of warfare. The whole article, which takes up more than a dozen pages of Scribner's, gives a very realistic picture of the conditions as they were along the British front when it was written.

There is indication that the United States is to adopt a policy of better preparedness for eventualities which may affect the national life. Had she been as hurriedly thrust into the conflict of nations as were some of the European belligerents she would have been found fairly well equipped as to navy, but woefully lacking in land fighting force.

ing of war vessels. In all, it seems probable that Congress, at its next session, will be asked to vote some four hundred or more millions of dollars to increase the United States' fighting power.

Closely following upon this news comes the report of an alleged interview with the discredited Dr. Dumba, former Austrian ambassador to the United States, in which he is said to have held out a threat of declaration of war by the Central Powers against the United States unless she cease selling munitions to the Allies.

"The Blue Danube" promises ere long to run red.

The resiliency of the Russians again is being exemplified.

The situation in the Balkans daily demands more and more of the world's attention and interest.

With enemies attacking her on two sides, little Serbia has a hard fight ahead until the Allies' expeditionary force makes its power felt.

As the days pass more and more young men in New Brunswick are thinking deeply of their duty to their homes and their country.

The call from the trenches grows more insistent. We cannot expect those who have already been fighting to end the war themselves. Others must be ready.

The Zeppelin raids on London are not war. They are expeditions undertaken for the simple business of murder—women and children preferred.

The healthy man who reads the daily news from the front and does not feel a desire to have one go at the Germans is not likely to make much stir in the world.

The only real business in Canada today is war. Upon the issue rests the fate of every other business, and all others are therefore incidental or subsidiary.

Col. Fowler's battalion, the 88th, should contain several platoons. It is up to the young men themselves to organize these platoons, as Halifax young men did for the 56th.

The British casualties at the Dardanelles amount to almost 100,000 men killed, wounded or missing. That has been a very costly business, with little as yet to show for it, and the diversion created by Germany in the Balkans makes the task to be accomplished still more difficult.

To those Canadians who say—to their shame—"Let England do her share in the fighting first," the statement of British casualties at the Dardanelles is commended. It shows more than 96,000 up to Oct. 9. That is at the Dardanelles alone, while Australians suffered to the number of 29,000. Canada's casualties to date are something more than 10,000.

St. John lost a worthy citizen yesterday in the death of Mr. Thomas H. Adams of the Dominion Public Works Department. In earlier years he was identified with the milling business in Carleton, where the firm name of Zachariah Adams & Sons recalls pleasant memories. Mr. Adams had given good service in the position to which he was called.

THE DAWN OF NEW DAY FOR RUSSIA

Pardoned Revolutionary Bourzoff Radiant With Hope For Empire's Future

London, Oct. 15.—Vladimir Bourzoff, the Russian revolutionary, who returned to his country at the outbreak of the war was sent to Siberia and recently allowed to return to European Russia, where he is now living, expresses high hopes of a New Russia in an interview published in the Petrograd Bourse Gazette.

"During the whole term of my imprisonment in Siberia," said Bourzoff, "I never doubted I would be set free the moment Maklakov and Tsheglovitov were dismissed and the news that they had to resign gave me greater joy than even the news that I had been pardoned. The discharge of the two ministers signified for me the death of Old Russia, and revived my hopes that the impending catastrophe was dawning would avert these evil omens of Russia had gone.

"All that followed filled me with the most radiant hopes, I witnessed with intense joy the animation of public spirit in Russia and the instant resolve to come to the much needed settlement of important internal problems. I only regretted that such questions as the independence of Poland and abolition of restrictions for Jews had not been settled a year ago. It might have saved millions of Russian lives, and might have advanced far beyond Galicia.

Questioned as to what he thinks of the prosecution of the Duma Bourzoff said it was a great blow to him but he firmly believed the sittings would be resumed very soon and "I am confident at the present hour," he added "that the Duma and the country are closely united. Our salvation depends on the Duma. We begin to breathe freely. We live an intense political life and I do not doubt for a moment that Russia stands at last on its way to real social progress and will march on in close contact with the whole civilized world. I am also convinced that the triumph of all we have fought for is a thing of almost the immediate future."

But meantime, let no one make the desirability of some such ultimate plan an excuse for present withholding of needed contributions. He (passionately)—I would go to the end of the earth for you! HYPHEN-AMERICANS GOING TO GERMANY

Emigration of 4,000,000 U. S. Citizens After War is Predicted—Drop English Tongue

Buffalo, Oct. 15.—Investigations carried on among the German-Americans of this city have disclosed the fact that thousands of them since the beginning of the war have been utterly estranged from their former friends in this country and may return to Germany as soon as the war is over. It is now estimated from many interviews had with citizens of German parentage or extraction in Buffalo, Cleveland and other cities that some four million American citizens may at that time return to Germany and Austria.

It appears that only about five per cent of the German-Americans in Buffalo and Cleveland gave their first allegiance to the United States rather than to Germany. More than half of them have begun to drop speaking the English language and use again the tongue of the Fatherland. Even among many of the prominent business men of German blood in these two cities it is not difficult to encounter outspoken bitterness against the United States.

SALMON WILL ASCEND WATERFALLS IN LIFT

Ottawa, Oct. 15.—The Department of Marine and Fisheries is coming to the assistance of the salmon. On many of the best salmon streams in Canada power development works have been constructed or are being constructed. Dams have been built across the streams, barring the salmon's way to the spawning grounds. In times past it has been the practice to overcome ordinary constructions, such as natural waterfalls, etc., by the construction of fishways, but no salmon on an egg-laying mission can climb past a big power dam by means of a fishway.

The Dominion Biological Board has wrestled with this difficulty, and an experiment is now being made by the fisheries commissioner, Prof. Prince, with a new contrivance. The thing is nothing more nor less than an elevator, which, for the benefit of the more cultured fish, may be called a lift. The fish arrives at the foot of the dam and finds his way into the elevator shaft. It is then taken up on a tray to the upper level and permitted to glide into the upper stream. The tray goes up because another tray, which has been filling with water at the top of an adjoining shaft, gets heavy and comes down. The process goes on repeating itself perpetually. One of these salmon elevators has been built at St. George, N. B., and it works. The fisheries officials believe that this will mean millions of eggs which even the best-intentioned salmon would otherwise take elsewhere.

BELGRADE A SHAMBLES AFTER BOMBARDMENT

Nish, Serbia, Oct. 15.—The official story of the bombardment of Belgrade shows that the Germans are pursuing the same plan of extermination adopted in Belgium. Begun on the fifth, in the afternoon, the bombardment continued until the eighth without ceasing. Tens of thousands of shells of all calibres were thrown methodically with the object of making as many victims as possible and creating a panic.

Before the bombardment the enemy opened a barrier of fire on the roads leading out of the city, killing many persons who were fleeing. During the bombardment enemy aeroplanes flew over groups of refugees, signaling the route to the batteries. The southern part of the city, where the inhabitants had taken refuge, was bombarded all the night of the sixth. The number of victims was great. From a military standpoint the bombardment has had no effect on the plan of operations drawn up for the Serbian troops.

FRENCH SURGEON SEWS SEVERED SPINAL CORD

Paris, Oct. 15.—An operation unparalleled in surgical practice, for the removal of the splinter of a shell embedded the whole width of the vertebral canal and the suturing of the completely-severed spinal cord, has been successfully performed by Dr. Emil Girou.

In communicating the details of his achievement to the Academy of Medicine, Dr. Girou said he had undertaken the operation when the man apparently was dying, and that it had resulted in a manner exceeding his greatest hopes. The patient, Dr. Girou said, was now able to move his legs, his sensory powers were gradually returning, and the wound, which ordinarily should have killed the man, was healing. The patient, the doctor added, was now entirely without fever.

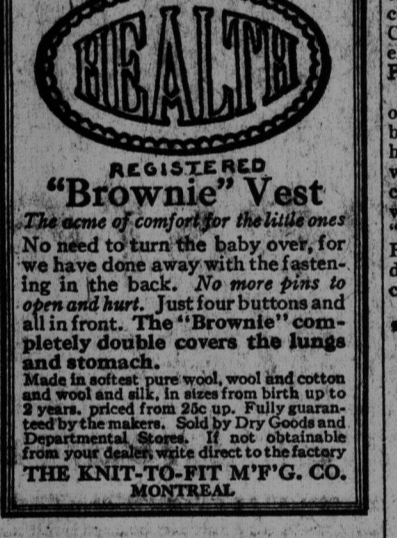

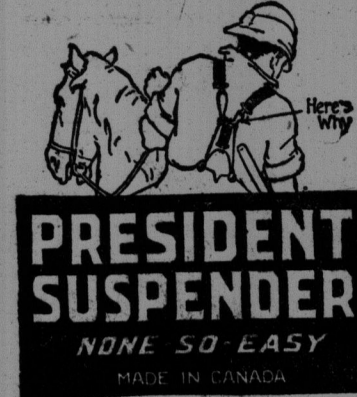

What It Cost to Be Square.
When the Boston Red Sox wound up the World's Series and precluded the possibility of another game in Boston, it cost the Boston club close to \$400,000 and the Philadelphia club the same amount for this reason. There is \$85,000 or so in the Red Sox club's treasury received from purchasers of tickets for a three-game series; which must be re- funded, and of this amount the National Commission would have received 10 per cent in the event of a third Boston game and the clubs would have split the rest 50-50; the same thing would have applied to the sale of the various admission tickets on the day of the game. Consequently, the Red Sox owner is actually \$35,000 to \$40,000 out of pocket in real money because of his team cleaning up. Yet some benighted persons—only a few to be sure—have to "be shown" each year that the players try to win up this series in short order!

The Braves That Are No More.
Just a year ago the Braves won the World's Championship, and more than half of the twenty-five men then on the roster who were eligible to take part in the series have ceased to be members of the Braves' squad. The first to leave the old champions were Whitted and Dugger, in a trade for Magee, and their departure was followed by that of Leslie Mann and Charley Deal, who stepped to the Federal League. When the team was working its way north after the spring training trip Stallings sold southpaw Emig Cottrell to the New York Yankees, who later relegated him to Richmond. Pitcher Gene Cochrane was sold to Toronto while the season was still young. Later the Maple Leafs turned him aside, and where Gene, a member of the world's champs a year ago, when he collected \$2,708 for his world's series share, is today nobody knows. The veteran, Otto Hess, late in the spring was released unconditionally and is now pitching in the Southern League. "Little Dick" Crutcher was the next to go. His stop was Jersey City and that team. When the Braves were going badly early in June, President Coffey let outfielders Larry Gilber and Ted Cather go, sending both to Toronto. Ted later was moved to Jersey City, Bill Martin, a month later, was unconditionally released, and celebrated the event by getting married. Catcher Bert Whaling and outfielder Herbert Moses were sold to Venice of the Pacific Coast League, and others who were prominent a year ago may make a change. The Braves of a year ago still on the job are Evers, Rudolph, James, Gowdy,

Tyler, Smith, Maranville, Davis, Strand, Connolly, Schmidt and Fred Mitchell. Tom Hughes joined the team a year ago last month, but was not eligible to play in the world's series. In the big league you have to keep delivering to stay up. If you doubt it, ask any of those ex-Braves.

Willie Ritchie and Promoter Billy Gibson were badly injured in an automobile accident in New York on Wednesday.
Joe Berger, amateur featherweight champion of Chicago is going to quit type sticking and box professionally. A benefit that was to be tendered Honey Melody in Boston next week has been postponed indefinitely.
Gus Christie has been matched to box Tom Burke in St. Louis Oct. 26.
Battling Nelson is after a bout with Freddie Welsh, but even though Welsh is the champion, Nelson does not propose to agree to Welsh's exorbitant demands. The manager of Welsh, replying to Nelson's message offering Welsh \$10,000 to box him at Juarez indicated that he and not the Dane would make the terms.
Nelson can have a match with Welsh for half the money Ritchie was paid in the substance of his wife. Welsh will fight 20 rounds for \$10,000. SHORT WEIGHT BUTTER
 A Market Instance of Today That Demands Attention
 Do you weigh your prints of butter when you get them home? Two purchases of butter made in the city this morning, show that there are dealers who sell butter at full weight others do not mind a trivial matter like a pound or so. One of these purchasers brought three packages of butter, each for "one-pound" and he paid thirty cents for each. When he arrived home he found that the three weighed together two pounds, and he immediately returned to the dealer. The latter offered to make good the difference, but the purchaser, a well known local citizen, preferred to have his money shortage returned, and got it.
 This may perhaps have been an isolated instance, but it shows the necessity of action being taken. A pound of butter should weigh a pound. On the other hand in another purchase referred to it was found that the prints were good weight.
 The market today was supplied only fairly with poultry and dairy products, but vegetables were plentiful. Eggs sold as high as forty-five cents for henner; butter ranged from thirty to thirty-four cents; chickens \$1.25 to \$2 a pair; turkey thirty-five cents a pound; fowl twenty-five cents a pound; mutton and veal, twenty cents a pound and beef, lamb, veal, pork, etc., about the same as last week.
