 Making a total of 610 persons confirmed, of whom 562 received their first Communion immediately after their Confirmation. It is with sincere pleasure that I again bear testimony to the continued exertions on the part of the clergy to make the season of preparation for Confirmation one of real spiritual benefit to the candidates, and the occasion of its administration a solemn and impressive one.

During the past year I have admitted four persons to the Diaconate, promoted three to the Priesthood, and licensed twenty Lay Readers and Catechists. In October last I attempted the experiment of a Visitation of the Clergy, and delivered a Charge, in which I anticipated some points which concern the Diocese, and which I need not now repeat. The Visitation was followed by a Conference of the Clergy, in which papers of much interest, and written with great ability, were read and discussed. I think that I express the general opinion when I say that the

Visitation was a season of great spiritual benefit to us all, and that it is desirable to renew such meetings from time to time.

A meeting of the Bishops of the Ecclesiastical Province took place at Ottawa, which led to the calling a meeting of the Provincial Synod to take action with respect to a Missionary Bishop of Algoma. It may be expected that I should say something on the subject of the Algoma Bishopric, but I prefer not to do so. The Synod and its results are not such as we can regard with satisfaction, and I should be glad to think that the necessity for holding another session for the same purpose may be avoided by the Diocese of Toronto taking the establishment of the Algoma Diocese into its own hands, and dealing with it as a sub-division of the existing Diocese, of which Algoma is undoubtedly a part.

The general funds of the Diocese seem to me to be in a sound and healthy condition, with the exception of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund: but I need not particularize, as the several reports will be so full and detailed.

You will be called upon to adopt a scheme whereby the various missions receiving aid from the Mission Board will be classified, so that the grant may be made to each more in proportion to the wants and character of the missions than has hitherto prevailed. This is a wise step, but I wish that the Committee of Classification had been instructed to go further, and to give us their opinion as to what stipends the missionaries should receive from their congregations as well. The time has come, I think, when the whole question of clerical support in the Diocese must be considered, not only the subject of the stipends of our missionaries, but of the clergy as a body. I cannot continue an unconcerned spectator when I see the rule of life in the present day to be, increased remuneration for all kinds of labor save that of the clergy. The increased and increasing rate of wages is the fair and necessary result of the increased and increasing cost of all the necessaries of life; need I say that the consequence is that while the laity are getting richer, the clergy are getting poorer. Now it is absolutely necessary that a remedy be sought for this growing evil, for an evil it is. Not only must the conventional and stereotyped \$400 per annum for our missionaries be no longer the rule, but the measure of support of the clergy generally must be revised, and means adopted to bring before our congregations the urgent necessity of enabling the clergy to meet the increased cost of living, moderate though that rate may be. I shall be glad if a committee shall be appointed on this subject to report, if possible, to this present Synod. I shall be glad also to co-operate with such committee by my advice, and I am sanguine enough to believe that the laity of the Diocese will heartily respond to any well-founded appeal made to them by their representa-

At all events it will be competent for me, as parishes become vacant, to bring this matter earnestly under their notice before making an appointment: and should the Synod adopt some system by means of which the Bishop, if possible, or the Archdeacon, or some one else deputed by the Bishop, should visit vacant parishes, and endeavor to induce them to be more liberal than heretofore in the way of clerical support, I think much good may be done.

Regarding the subject of Mission Houses, I desire to say a few words. A very important report was read at the last Synod, but, owing to the late period of the session at which it was introduced, no action was taken further than to refer it back to the committee for fuller discussion this Synod. Now, if any action is to be taken at all, I think the present a most favorable opportunity for taking it. Owing to the missionaries at Camden, Sydenham and Lanark having removed to other fields of labour, the whole section of the Diocese lying between the parishes of Napanee and Perth is now unprovided with the ministrations of the church. This portion of the Diocese has always been the weakest part of it, at least since I have had any knowledge of its character, and I think it ought to be treated in an exceptional manner. The critical position of these missions may be realized if we consider that nine churches are now closed, and many out-stations besides deprived of the means of grace. To increase the difficulty, the stipends supplied in those missions are not sufficient to attract priests of experience and standing who alone are able to resuscitate them, and I am determined for the future to exhaust every expedient rather than place newly ordained Deacons in sole charge of Parishes or Missions. The practice hitherto, though excusable from necessity, has proved very disastrous, both to the Missions and the Deacons themselves, and therefore if the Synod purposes taking any action now in the direction of the establishment of Mission Houses, it seems to me that the country lying between the Rectories of Napanee and Perth affords as good a field for testing their value as we can possibly hope for. Should the grants hitherto given to Camden, Loughboro' and Lanark be concentrated in one Mission House, under the direction of a Priest and two or three Deacons, we should, I think, combine economy with that efficiency in work which union and co-operation afford, and we should avoid the fatal mistakes, which the inexperience, the isolation, and the consequent despair of newly ordained men, have so frequently made; and I would take this opportunity of saying that I wish the clergy would inform me if any of them desire to obtain the help of Deacons, so that I may be able to keep a list of the Parishes thus needing clerical help, and supply them in the order of priority of application.

But, my Brethren, whether any remedy for the state of things I have laid before you be found in Mission Houses or not, I would remind you that you are equally responsible with myself and bound to assist me in rectifying what experience has shown to be faulty. Some expedient must be devised which shall save me from the painful necessity of placing in the cure of souls young men just ordained, with little experience of human nature, often painfully sanguine, anticipating everything but failure, and when after a while that failure is but too evident and traceable to their own inexperience, a reaction sets in, and disappointment and sickness of heart result, to the great injury of the Church's Ministers.

Praying that God may direct us in the right path in this and all other measures, so that His glory and the edification of His Church may be promoted, I ask you now to proceed with the business before the Synod.

 AND INCREASE OF THE MINISTRY.

Your Committee beg leave to report that, following out one or two of the suggestions in the report of last year, an opportunity presents itself, from the liberal proposal of Rev. E. P. Crawford, a member of this Committee, to at once establish a Mission House, should it meet the acceptance of the Synod.

The proposal to establish a Mission House at Hawkesbury has been laid before the Bishop; the sum of about \$2,400 having been promised on condition of \$1,000 being raised elsewhere.

Your Committee beg respectfully to recommend strongly, in the interests of the Church, the immediate adoption of this Report, and that means should be taken to raise, at least, the balance required.

With regard to the other purpose for which your Committee was appointed, viz., the increase of candidates for the ministry, it is thought that that desirable object will be sufficiently achieved for the present by the practical working of the Mission House.

APPENDIX TO REPORT.

The proposal of Rev. E. P. Crawford mentioned above, is as follows:—

AUDITORS' REPORT.

We, the Auditors appointed to examine the accounts of the Treasurer and Secretary of the Synod of Ontario for theyear ending the 30th day of April last, submit the following report of our labours :—

We have examined the Securities belonging to the various funds under the control of the Synod.

Those belonging to the Clergy Trust Fund were ascertained by us to be in the joint possession of the Treasurer and the Secretary, with the exception of the London Debentures mentioned in the Auditors' Report of last year, which are still in possession of the City Bank of London for the purpose of conveniently collecting the interest accruing due upon them. The certificate of the Manager of that Institution, shewing the purpose for which these Debentures are held by it was produced to us. The total amount of the Permanent Clergy Trust Securities, not including interest, is the sum of \$275,625 95, showing an increase since last year of \$4,143 95.

We have also examined the Securities held by the Synod in trust for the undermentioned funds and have found that those transferable by delivery were in the joint possession of the Treasurer and Secretary and that the mortgages, with the exception of those in suit, which are but three in number, were in the possession of the Secretary. Vouchers were produced for those in the hands of the Synod's Solicitor.

The Assessment and Widows' and Orphans' Funds were at the above date overdrawn, the former to the extent of \$514.01, the latter to the extent of \$18.52.

We found that the various fund balances in the bank agreed with those in the books of the Treasurer and Clerical Secretary, with the exception of the Rectory Lands, the Mission, and the Divinity Students' Funds.

The Bank balance to the credit of the Rectory Lands Fund exceeded the Secretary's balance by the sum of \$28.02, the amount of a cheque issued by the Secretary but outstanding.

The Bank balance at the credit of the Mission Fund exceeded the Secretary's balance by the sum of \$558.34, the aggregate amounts of three cheques similarly issued, but not presented for payment.

The Bank balance to the credit of the Divinity Students' Fund exceeded the Secretary's balance by the sum of \$100, the amount of two cheques issued but not presented for payment.

We have examined the Clerical Secretary's books of account, and in doing so have availed ourselves of the assistance of Mr. Noel, a professional accountant. The payments were all vouched by cheque, and in other respects the entries seemed to be correct. The receipt book kept by the Secretary and the system of acknowledgment of moneys by publication in a newspaper now adopted, furnish satisfactory means of checking the amount of moneys received.

We have to congratulate the Synod upon the steady increase in the funds under its control. These funds are assuming enormous proportions, and their management must entail a great deal of labour. The Rectory Lands Fund in particular has largely increased the labor of the Clerical Secretary, the sales during the past year being apparently over \$35,000.

The Clerical Secretary's books and accounts are kept in a manner which does him great credit.

And that the above, with Mr. R. L. M. Houston, are the Students at present receiving aid from their fund, being a larger number than the Committee ever before had the privilege of reporting as upon their list of beneficiaries.

The Committee, in once more urging the necessity of greater liberality on the part of the members of the Church throughout the Diocese towards this fund, that they may be able to meet the applications which, they are thankful to say, are now rapidly increasing, must, at the same time, respectfully call the attention of their reverend brethren to the large number of cases in which, during the year just closed, no collections were made in behalf of this most important fund. Taking the returns as given in last year's Journal of Synod, as many as thirtytwo out seventyone stations, representing twentyone parishes, failed to send in collections, while no fewer than seventeen entire parishes, comprehending fortysix stations, sent in nothing whatever. Some of these parishes, it is true, were vacant, and the clergy of others where collections were made, did not always specify, as they should have done, the particular stations in which they were received, which circumstances will account in part for this state of things. Still, after making every possible allowance, it is very apparent that in by far too many instances the requirements of the canon have not been complied with, and serious loss has thereby accrued to the fund.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON 29-30 VICT., CH. 16.

The Committee to whom was referred the question as to the necessity and advisability of making certain alterations in Cap. 16, of 29-30 Vict. (on sale of Rectory Lands). beg to report as follows:—They have met and carefully considered the questions referred to them. They have also corresponded with the Dioceses of Toronto and Huron, and find that in the Rectory of London the surplus above \$3,000 is now—with the consent of the Rector—at the disposal of the Church Society of the Diocese to be divided among the incumbents of the other Churches in the City. In the Diocese of Toronto the Act has not been considered, but at their last Synod two motions were introduced, and now stand over for the coming Session, touching the advisability of petitioning the Legislature to alter and amend the portions of the Act directing the appropriation of the funds, and for an extension of the time for selling the Rectory Lands.

Your Committee are therefore unable to report anything definitely at this time, and would pray that they may be permitted to sit again and confer further with committees that may be appointed by the other Dioceses, and that their numbers be increased.

REPORT OF THE BOOK AND TRACT COMMITTEE.

The Book and Tract Committee, in presenting the Report for the year ending 30th April, 1873, feel it a cause of thankfulness that notwithstanding the very dull times during the latter part of the severe winter the amount of sales was very nearly the same as that of the previous financial year. The stock of books on hand is increasing; there is also a greater variety, and a larger number of those most in demand, or most

suitable, whilst the old dull stock is decreasing. The amount of unadjusted indebtedness is less than the balance in our favour in the Bank; and the Depository only wants the more hearty sympathy and co-operation of all the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese to enable it to enter upon a career of great usefulness. Some of the Clergy and a few Laymen enter heartily and really into the matter, and their periodical purchases promote the progress and efficiency of the Depository, as well as cheer the manager in his efforts to get the best and most satisfactory books at fair prices.

More branches established in the same hearty spirit would be a proportionate strength to Church work in the Diocese; the Clergy would find their work helped on by the leading and thinking laity of their Parishes, and the increased knowledge of the Church in her principles and Divine origin would bring, under God's blessing, more seekers and inquirers into the fold, to His glory and their own benefit and everlasting welfare.

REPORT OF THE MISSION BOARD.

It is a subject for devout thankfulness to Almighty God that the work of the Lord still continues to prosper amongst us. Shortcomings there may be, because, although the work is of God, still the earthly agents are but men; and where so many are engaged in the work it would be strange indeed if there were no failures. On the whole, however, the experience of the past year may well cause us to thank God and take courage. The receipts show a steady increase, and the Reports of the Conveners are generally of an encouraging character.

DEPUTATION No. 1—*Rev. J. W. Burke, Convener.*

The Rev. J. W. Burke, as Convener of Deputation No. 1, with whom were associated Revs. Messrs. Halliwell and Stanton (though the latter did not join them), commenced their labours at Salmon River, when the meeting, notwithstanding the state of the roads, was tolerably well attended, and the offertory amounted to \$4.00. Meetings were held the same day at Selby and Napanee. At the former place a beautiful little church has been erected, and at Napanee preparations are being made for the erection of a new church—a work very much needed. The Sunday School offertory was \$23.11, and the total was \$57.71. At Newburg the offertory was \$4.43; at Clark's Mills, \$16.18; at Tamworth, where there was a large meeting, the offertory amounted to \$8.25. The heavy debt which had long been an incubus on the Church, is likely to be speedily extinguished. The meeting at White Lake was almost a total failure owing to the heavy snowdrifts. At Odessa a successful meeting was held on the 10th January, and, including the offertory on the following Sunday, \$10.67 were added to the fund. In the beautiful little church at Waterloo the offertory was \$6.82, increased by the Sunday School offertory to \$12.32. On the evening of Sunday, January 12th, the meeting was held in St. George's Cathedral, when the sum of \$53 was contributed, increased by the Sunday School offertory of \$11.05 to a total of \$64, a gratifying increase on former years. At Barriefield, spite of the unfavourable state of the weather, the meeting was gratifying, and an offertory of \$15.28 cheered the Deputation. At Birmingham's the offertory was \$10.95, and the Convener was ably aided by the Rev. Messrs. Mulock and Kirkpatrick. The Deputation was gratified to find a good work going on in this parish generally. A hearty service at All Saint's closed the work of the Deputation. The meetings at Murvale and Sydenham were given up in consequence of the state of the roads, and the meeting at Wolfe Island was

Subsequently, however, through various agencies, meetings were held in Sydenham and Wolfe Island with a result in the former place of \$6 collected, and \$13 at the latter place. The total amount collected was \$236 19, being an excess of \$26.73 over the collections of last year.

DEPUTATION No. 2—*Rev. C. P. Emery, Convener.*

The Rev. C. P. Emery, as Convener of Deputation No. 2, reports that, in company with the Rev. A. Cooke who joined him four days afterwards, he commenced work January 14th. The meeting at Christ Church, Belleville, and at Trenton, received considerable damage in consequence of a huge tea-meeting at the latter place. The meeting at the Carrying Place was a grand success, one of the best indeed ever held in this place. The meeting at Picton was also most successful. Messrs. McQuaig and F. White, Esqs., made admirable addresses. Bath and Amherst Island also gave good meetings. The other meetings were also satisfactory, and the offertories on the whole were in advance of the past year, and a great improvement was observable in intelligent Church feeling.

DEPUTATION No. 3—*Rev. James A. Preston, Convener.*

The Convener of No. 3, the Rev. Jas. A. Preston, states that this Deputation also was greatly impeded in its work by the unfavourable state of the weather, which on one occasion detained them in the house two days, and in consequence of which they could not hold meetings at Frizell's Mills and All Saints, Tyendinaga. Two other meetings were also omitted, viz., Frankville and Empey's Settlement—the former as no sufficient notice had been given, and the latter on account of the state of the night. Of the other meetings, two only call for any special remark. The meeting at St. Thomas Church, Belleville, was very numerous attended, the music and singing were of the highest order, the services hearty, and the collection amounted to \$65, nearly double that of the preceding year. The other meeting alluded to was that of Tweed, where the Convener, who was now alone (Messrs. White and Caulfield having returned home), found hearty singing and responding, both of which appeared to be general throughout the congregation, and, as might be expected, the collection was liberal, amounting to \$10.20. The other places at which meetings were held, were Mill Point, Shannonville, Stirling, Marmora, Madoc, Queensboro, Thomasburg, and Roslyn. At Queensboro a neat and comfortable church has been erected free from debt. Twelve years ago the convener celebrated divine service here, being the first time that the Church service had been read in the neighbourhood of Queensboro; it was therefore particularly gratifying to find so neat an edifice erected to the Glory of God in this place.

DEPUTATION No. 4—*Rev. G. A. Anderson, Convener.*

Deputation No. 4 consisted of Rev. G. A. Anderson, Convener, and the Rev. E. Loucks. The result of the meetings was very satisfactory—a little in advance of the amount collected any previous year. The season at which these meetings are annually held is most unfavourable as the people are generally at the shanties and the roads so drifted that the meetings are generally small. The appropriation by the Mission Board of the Sunday School Fund to the intended Diocese of Algoma appeared to give general satisfaction, and it is much to be regretted that there is no Bishop to watch over the interests of the Church in that district. The amount collected at Missionary meetings, including those contributed by Sunday School children, was \$217.15

DEPUTATION No. 5—*Rev. J. S. Lauder, Convener.*

No report received.

DEPUTATION No. 6—*Rev. E. H. M. Baker, Convener.*

Deputation No. 6, consisting of Revs. E. H. M. Baker, Convener, and F. W. Kirkpatrick commenced its lengthy tour, comprehending in all twenty churches or stations, at Metcalf, January 21st, and in spite of unfavourable weather during a large portion of its journey was blessed with much success. In all the meetings held, save two, the offertories were in excess of last year. Almost everywhere the Deputation found decided marks of church life and progress—new churches built or building, old ones well filled, in many places well crowded, and the service always most inspiring. An incident in connection with the meeting at Duncanville:—on the offertory plate was found an envelope, inscribed "for the Mission cause, the proceeds of one day's work"—it contained \$5.00. Could we but persuade every member of the Church to go and do likewise, what an increase in our Missionary income would soon be witnessed. The total offerings amounted to \$312, being a gain upon last year's return of nearly 50 per cent. In this section of the Diocese it is advisable to hold the meetings in the Autumn, as during the winter men and teams are absent in the shanties.

DEPUTATION No. 7—*The Archdeacon Convener.*

Deputation No. 7, the Archdeacon, Convener; colleague, Rev. Mr. Lewin. The first meeting, held at Edwardsburgh, addressed by the Archdeacon alone, was a very interesting and successful one; the collection amounted to \$25.50, more than three times that of the preceding year. The meeting was held in the new Church, which, when finished, will be a very creditable monument to the pious zeal and liberality of the

small but faithful band of Churchmen in this portion of the Rev. Mr. Anderson's Mission. The meeting at Iroquois the next evening was also successful. Here the Convener was joined by his colleague, Rev. Mr. Lewin, and further aided by Revs. Mr. Loucks, both of whom made effective addresses. The collection amounted to \$16.60, further increased by the addition of \$11.00, the united contributions of the two Sunday Schools in connection with this Church. Total being \$27.60, or \$6.49 in excess of last year. The meeting at Williamsburgh was a comparative failure, in consequence of a storm having blocked up the roads, yet under the circumstances the collection was very large, amounting to \$28, but of this sum \$20 were contributed by one worthy lady, who, inheriting the spirit of her deceased relative, made this large offering to the service of God's Church. The meeting in Morrisburgh was a decided success, a large number present, and the result most gratifying, \$30 having been contributed. The Deputation were reluctantly obliged to give up their intended visit to Mountain in consequence of the state of the roads; the person previously engaged to drive them out from Iroquois positively refused to do so. At Prescott on Sunday evening we had a most interesting meeting, the congregation was very numerous, services hearty, and contributions liberal; \$61 were placed upon the plates, and the offerings of the Sunday School children, amounting to \$18, swelled the total to the goodly sum of \$79. The Convener was glad to revisit in Kemptville and Oxford Mills, the scenes of his earliest ministerial labours; very gratifying meetings attested that the members of the Church continue to take a lively interest in the cause of Christ and His Church. As usual at Kemptville the event of the evening was the presentation of the offerings of the teachers and children of the Sunday School, which amounted to the goodly sum of \$30. The total of the collections amounted to \$280, being in excess of the previous year's collections in the same places of \$61.56.

DEPUTATION No. 8—*Rev. Mr. Pettit, Convener.*

Rev. Mr. Pettit, Convener, states that in connection with Rev. Messrs. Mockridge and Low he commenced the deputation work at Merrickville, where, after a hearty service, they received from the offertory the sum of \$25. At Burritt's Rapids the service was very impressive, the Church tastefully decorated, and the sum of \$15 received. In the parish of North Augusta three meetings were held, attendance good, services impressive, and the collections exceeded last year by \$11.00. At Maitland, much interest was evinced by those present. The children of the Sunday School came forward in a body and presented \$14.00 for the Bishopric of Algoma. At New Dublin the contribution amounted to less than \$4.00.

In the new Church of St. Luke's, Yonge, the offertory was \$5.00. At Lyn, on Sunday morning, the congregation was small, the offertory \$5.53. At St. Peter's, Brockville, there was a very large congregation, and an offertory of \$65.33. At Lansdowne a good congregation contributed \$7.10. At South Lake the sum of \$5.25 was received. At Gananoque, after a hearty service, a collection of \$25.50 was received, and the Sunday School children added \$15. At St. Paul's, Kingston, the offertory was \$12.26, to which the Sunday School children added \$10.00.

DEPUTATION No. 9—*Rev. A. C. Nesbitt, Convener.*

This Deputation, consisting of Rev. A. C. Nesbitt (Convener), Revs. T. A. Parnell, and J. H. Simpson, reports a smaller amount collected at Missionary meetings this year than in the previous one, and that for the following reasons: 1st, the deputation work commenced too late in the season for this lumbering country; 2nd, Arnprior, formerly included in No. 9, was this year added to No. 5; 3rd, Renfrew Village, Horton, Douglas, Eganville, and Lake Dore are without a Missionary, and no Missionary Meeting was held except one in Eganville. The meeting at Pembroke was very large, and the offering nearly double the previous year. This is to be accounted for in part by the presence of the Bishop, who, though at the time far from well, came from Ottawa to attend the Pembroke meeting. The offering at St. Patrick's, Stafford, was a little in advance of last year; and at a little school-house in Alice, where a week-day service is held, after a most interesting and instructive address from the Rev. Mr. Parnell, the offering was nearly seven times more than ever before.

DEPUTATION No. 10—*Rev. Mr. Bleasdel, Convener.*

This deputation, of which Rev. Mr. Bleasdel was Convener, aided by Revs. J. K. McMorine and E. P. Crawford, had for its field of labour the Counties of Stormont and Prescott. Its first meeting was held February 4th, at Osnabruck Front, and the Deputation closed its eminently successful tour in the same townships in which it commenced its labors. The Convener cannot refrain from noticing with great pleasure and satisfaction the liberal contributions of the Sunday School children in Cornwall, Moulinette, and Hawkesbury Village, and contributed by them to the Algoma Diocesan Mission Fund. Another feature also deserving of notice is the apparent increased zeal of the members of the Church to aid in its work and labor of love. In Osnabruck, Moulinette, Cornwall, and everywhere in the County of Prescott is this conspicuous. In the latter County the Church is making itself a power through the Missionary zeal of the Missionary in charge. At Hawkesbury Village the Deputation

- 3rd. For the removal of the causes which lead to Intemperance.

SPECIAL OBJECTS AIMED AT BY THE SOCIETY

I.—For abstainers and non-abstainers.

1. The explaining and enforcing of existing laws.
2. The progressive diminution of the number of taverns and saloons.
3. The enforcement of the law for the closing of taverns and saloons from Saturday evening to Monday morning.
4. The strengthening of the hands of the authorities in the exercise of their power in dealing with the sale of intoxicating liquor.
5. The promotion of temperance hotels, Mechanics' Institutes, and other counteractions to the ordinary taverns.
6. The discouragement of the present system of "treating."
7. The diffusion of correct and reliable information by temperance literature, tracts, and other publications, and by missionary efforts in prisons and other places where the victims of intemperance are usually found.
8. The promotion of union for special prayer throughout the country for the divine blessing upon the temperance movement.

II.—For abstainers from intoxicating drinks.

9. The establishment of parochial temperance societies, guilds, and bands of hope based on the principle of total abstinence, under the superintendence or with the sanction of the parochial clergy, as the proved and most effectual human means of bringing the intemperate under the teaching and power of the Gospel, and so setting them free from the bondage of their sin and of preserving others from the abounding temptations of the day."

Deeply impressed with the need of definite action to meet a growing evil before its roots are too firmly set in the habits and customs of the country, your committee would strongly advise Synodical action based upon the report now respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PETITION FROM
CORNWALL.

The Committee to whom was referred the petition of the Rector of Cornwall and others, on the subject of the Bishop Strachan Memorial Church, now in course of erection in the Town of Cornwall, in this Diocese, beg leave to report as follows :—

That they find from information derived from the Archdeacon of Ontario and others interested in the completion of the Church referred to,

that the members of the Church in the Parish of Cornwall were induced to enter upon the work in consequence of an earnest appeal made by the Bishop of the Diocese to erect a Church in Cornwall to the memory of the late Right Reverend Dr. Strachan, the first Bishop of Toronto, who commenced his labours as a minister of the Church in the said Town in the year 1803, and who prosecuted those labors with great acceptance and good to the Church for nine years.

That the members of the Church in the Parish of Cornwall subscribed towards the laudable object referred to the sum of about \$10,000, of which between \$8,000 and \$9,000 have been made available for the erection of the Church.

That the contributions of the Bishops and Clergy of the Canadian Church towards the Memorial Church Fund, have reached the sum of \$1900.

Your Committee, in consideration of the facts above recited, recommend that the prayer of the petition should be granted to the effect that the Bishop should issue a Pastoral letter recommending the object to the sympathy of the members of the Church, and that the members of this Synod use their influence in their respective parishes in aid of the same, and co-operate with their Brethren in the Parish of Cornwall in order that the Church to be erected to the memory of the late Bishop Strachan may be completed with as little delay as possible.

received from the Rev. Mr. Givins, in which it was suggested *inter alia* that each Committee should send a delegate or delegates to a general meeting, to be convened by the Metropolitan.* Your Committee, therefore, appointed the Rev. G. A. Anderson as the delegate from this Committee, he having more personal knowledge on the subject than any other member. The result was communicated by the Chairman to Mr. Givins, but no such general meeting was convened. On the 18th April last your Chairman received a letter from the Rev. Mr. Givins, stating that the Metropolitan had expressed his desire that the several Diocesan Committees on the Algoma matter should meet as speedily as possible to discuss certain points;† that they should meet at Belleville or Kingston on Wednesday, the 7th May. Your Chairman immediately wrote back to say that our Committees met on the 7th, but that we could meet on the 6th, and that if that day would suit I would call the members of our Committee together. To this communication I received no reply until the 7th May, when I heard from the Rev. Mr. Givins that he had failed in getting a meeting of their Committee, and that having conferred with the Bishop and several leading members by letter, all agreed that the Committee could not do anything if they met, and that it was better to defer all proceedings till the Diocesan Synods were held. This was also the opinion of the Rev. Chas. Hamilton, of Quebec. I reported the result to the Metropolitan, and he seems much disappointed thereat. Under these circumstances nothing can be done by Synod but to reappoint a Committee which, with the Bishop, should have full powers to co-operate in any movement approved of by the other Synods. Such then is the present position of the affair, and it is hereby sufficiently apparent that there has been no neglect on the part of your Committee.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH TEMPORALITIES ACT.

But as it is possible that the respective Synods of Huron and Toronto may at the meetings of their bodies during the present and the succeeding week appointed such Committees, your Committee would respectfully suggest that they may be re-appointed.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PETITION FROM
KEMPTVILLE, HAWKESBURY AND MARYS-
BURGH.

The Committee to whom were referred the Memorials from the Rector and Vestry of St. James' Church, Kemptville, from the Incumbent and Churchwardens of St. John's Church, North Marysburgh, and from the Incumbent of Hawkesbury, and the Missionary in charge of Plantagenet, beg to report :

That as to the Memorial from Kemptville, they see no objections to the proposed sale of the east half of Lot No. 15 in the Sixth Concession of Oxford and the four building lots in Kemptville, and that the proceeds be applied as indicated in the Memorial.

That as to the Memorial from Hawkesbury and Plantagenet, they would recommend the sale of the fifty acres of the north half of Lot No. 18 in Seventh Concession of North Plantagenet, and not heretofore sold for taxes, and the proceeds to be invested in the manner asked for in the Memorial and that the Land Committee be empowered to carry out these sales in such manner and for such prices as they may deem advisable.

That as to the Memorial from North Marysburgh, the Committee do not deem it expedient to dispose of the property referred to, but would recommend that the matter be brought by the Incumbent before the Executive Committee.
