



Mayor Potts yesterday afternoon brought up at the council meeting the matter of dear milk in St. John and, after some discussion, appoint ed Commissioners Wigmore and Harding a committee to bring in a report on the cost of doing business and the spread between the price paid the producers, said to be 41-2 cents per quart at Sussex, and the amount which the consumer in St.



said that lack of milk, due to its high
price, had resulted in the death of
wo children. He did not know wheher there was any machinery at

Commissioner Wigmore said this was a very important matter and he felt the present price of milk to the consumer was out of all proportion to what the producer received. He pointed out that in wartime, when this matter was investigated by the cost of living commission, the spread to the dealer had been placed at four cents per quart, and he did not think the cost of handling was any greater now than it was then.

He had been told, and he regarded the authority as good and reliable, that milk was being sold to the dealers at 41-2 cents per quart and that milk was being sold to the dealers at 4.2 cents per quart and they were charging the St. John consumers 14 cents a quart. He recalled that when compulsory pasteurization was advocated it was said the pasteurization would not cost the dealers any more than caring for the milk did before that, and he could see no justification for a spread of 9.1-2 cents to the dealer.
