ST. JOHN MEN VICTORS AGAIN

Crack Signallers Once More Lead All Canada

SIXTH SUCCESSIVE YEAR

No. 3 Section Men Made Very Near the Possible Number of Points—The Standing of Signallers of New Brunswick Regiments

For the sixth successive year the crack body of signallers from St. John, N. B., Co. No. 8 section, commanded by Lieut. Allan Leavitt, have captured championship honors in competition with corps from all Canada. This company, though small in numbers, has made an enviable record for itself in the field of practical signalling experience and tactical work, and since its organization a few years ago by Captain T. E. Powers, divisional signalling officer for the maritime provinces, has rapidly advanced in honor and rank.

To win championship honors is really becoming nothing more than a habit with the members of this corps and they are being heartily congratulated upon having done so again, for the sixth time. They have a total of 2410 points, which is very near the possible aggregate, while their nearest competitors are No. 8 section of Kingston, another crack corps, with 2291 points.

Other New Brunswick regiments are well up in the list of honors in the divisional militia list, and to another city body, the 62nd regiment St. John Fusiliers, in command of Lieut. Col. J. L. McAvity, are given the honors of being in a twelfth position out of a total of more than 180 regimental bodies. This is a particularly creditable showing, and it is expected that after the new armory has been put in active use, the Fusiliers will make even a better showing. Their points numbered 2041. The leaders in this division are the 21st Regiment of Essex Fusiliers with a total of 2800 points.

Daily Hints For the Cook

Plain Cake. One cup sugar, one egg, one cup sour milk, a little salt, one egg, one teaspoon soda, if milk is real sour, if not, a little less; one heaping tablespoon shortening, nutmeg. If you have sour cream use it instead of milk and omit shortening.

Irish Pound Cake. Two cups sugar, one cup shortening (one-half lard and one-half butter), two eggs, one cup sweet milk, four cups flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons cream of tartar, three-quarters teaspoon soda. Flavor to taste. This makes two loaves, not sheets, and is a good foundation for nut, fruit or chocolate cake.

CANADA AT THE PANAMA PACIFIC EXPOSITION NEXT YEAR IN SAN FRANCISCO

San Francisco, Feb. 10.—The final plans for the Canadian pavilion at the Panama-Pacific exposition in 1915 call for one of the handsomest among the buildings representative of foreign nations and states. Construction is being carried on under the supervision of Colonel William Hutchison, of Ottawa, Canadian exhibition commissioner.

The pavilion, which will cost approximately \$300,000 will be the largest exhibition building ever erected by the Canadian government. It will be 240 feet long, 240 feet wide and fifty feet high. The whole sum expended upon the building and its contents will amount to \$600,000 or more.

A portion of the products that will form the exhibit will be shipped several weeks ago from Ghent, where they were exhibited at the recent exposition in that city, a portion coming by ship by the way of Cape Horn, and the remainder by the Isthmus of Panama. Further exhibits, however, will be added. It is probable that there will be additional exhibits by some of the provinces.

While the exhibit will cover all agricultural, manufacturing, and educational interests, great emphasis is being laid upon the importance of the Canadian live stock exhibit.

OFFERS HERSELF FOR DISSECTION TO HELP HUSBAND AND GIRL

St. Louis, Feb. 10.—With a child ill and her husband out of employment, with bills for which the grocer and the coal dealer are demanding their money and with a physician calling for his fees an installment furniture house threatening to remove the furniture for nonpayment, Mrs. Edward Hart could see no way out of her difficulties save by selling her body to the dissecting table. Following is a letter received at the College of Physicians and Surgeons: "President Anatomical Laboratory: "I am badly in need of money for my husband, a railroad man, who lost his position because of being in a wreck and who is unable to find employment. Without taking her husband or any of her relatives or friends into her confidence she wrote the letter. The Hart home is in three small but scrupulously kept rooms. "I would rather die and thus keep the home for my husband and our 3-year-old daughter, Dottie." She admits she was ready to commit suicide. Aid has been extended to the family.



A WORD OF CHEER

One would like to speak a word of cheer to those despondent citizens who appear to find food for sad reflection, and a degree of pessimism, in all that relates to the affairs of this city, as administered by the present city council under the commission plan of government. But perhaps they are happiest when they are most miserable. It may be that they could not possibly, without serious injury to themselves, take a cheerful view of anything. Perhaps it is quite useless to point out to anyone in the words of the city controller that "the city's financial position the past year was a very easy one compared with the majority of other cities in Canada."

It might hurt their feelings to remind them that the city's assets exceed its liabilities by \$2,878,000. Their grief might be made greater by telling them that the city has made great progress during the past year; has better paved streets, a better lighted street, handsome new and greatly improved old buildings in the business centre, some extension of the street railway system, and the promise of greater activity in general construction this year than last. Of course the city council is not responsible for all these evidences of progress, but it has always been within easy reach of the citizen who wanted to know what was going on, or who had a grievance to air or a suggestion to make. There are many citizens who through the financial statement of the city published yesterday will be regarded as an evidence of fairly prudent administration. The council did not spend all it might have spent, but had about \$105,000 available for general purposes at the end of the year. There is reason to believe that a return to the old method of city government would not produce results as satisfactory as have been produced under the commission plan. Critics there will be, and doubtless they have their uses; although there may be some doubt as to the usefulness of the man who always condemns and never commends. On the whole, St. John is a well governed city. Doubtless we could each govern it better if we had the chance, but it is doubtful if a discriminating public would grant the necessary permission. In any case, it is fair to extend an invitation to those who sit in gloom to come into the sunshine, and hope for the best.

ANOTHER STEP FORWARD

The board of school trustees are to be commended for taking thought of the foreigners who are citizens of St. John and who may be unable to read and write the English language. In all the cities of Western Canada, and all through the United States, special opportunities are provided to teach school children the English language. It helps to make them better citizens, and it is absolutely necessary in Canada if they are to be assimilated and converted into real Canadians. When the St. John board of school trustees receives the report of the investigator it will no doubt be convinced of the need of providing school opportunities for adult foreigners, and of course the school buildings would be utilized for this purpose, and it would necessarily have to be done in the evenings. To that extent, therefore, the board would be acting in harmony with the views of those who urge that the school buildings should be much more widely used. The foreigners would appreciate the use of these buildings as social centres quite as much as for evening school purposes. In American cities foreigners appreciate the social centres even more than the native citizens.

But if it is worth while to take thought of the foreigner who cannot read and write English, what about those natives who cannot read and write the English language—and those who read and write it so poorly that they are in great need of more instruction? There are illiterates among the native population, and there are working boys and girls who have left school and ought to be given an opportunity to take lessons in the evening. The number in attendance at the evening classes in St. Malachi's school shows that there is need for such classes.

Having taken into serious consideration the case of the foreigner, the board of school trustees cannot do less than consider also the case of the native, and the general need there is for a wider use of the school buildings of the city.

AGAINST PROTECTIVE POLICY

Mr. Bonar Law's tariff reform policy, which would leave the farmers out of the count, has caused a decided split in the Unionist party. An organization known as the Unionist Tariff Protest League has been formed, and is asking Unionists generally to pledge themselves either to oppose the election of, or abstain from voting for any Unionist candidate who does not pledge himself to oppose the present fiscal policy of the Unionist party. Mr. Bonar Law, by his

willingness to sacrifice the interests of the farmers for those of the manufacturers, has thus created a division in the ranks of his own party. The secretary of the new league, himself a Unionist, has issued the following letter, which shows very clearly the growing unpopularity of the tariff reform policy enunciated by Mr. Bonar Law in Edinburgh:

"There is a widespread feeling of dissatisfaction in the Dominion with the present fiscal policy of the party leaders. Many Unionists affirm that Tariff Reform bars the way to the party's victory at the polls, and that it should be abandoned or postponed, at least until after the next general election. Other Unionists are convinced that the maintenance of Free Trade is in the best interest of the country. Under the present fiscal proposals agriculture is left out in the cold, and this important industry threatened with heavier burdens. The suggested 10 per cent average duty would single out importers of manufactured goods to bear the whole brunt of fresh taxation. This would not only be unfair, but it would ruin many established businesses. While injuring importers, a severe blow would inevitably be dealt at the general community, to whom unrestricted competition in trade means a cheap market for many necessities of daily life. Hardship would be inflicted upon a vast number of clerks and other classes of employees, and also upon persons of fixed incomes and small means. It is, moreover, debatable as to whether the working classes generally would benefit. Tariff Reform can only be regarded as an experiment, which it seems folly to try when the trade of the country is in a healthy and prosperous condition. The fiscal question is the least urgent of all the problems which confront the Unionist party, and in the opinion of a large number of Unionists, besides being bad tactics to press it forward at a time of booming trade, the party should devote itself wholly to the task of attacking the policy of the present government. Unfettered by fiscal schemes which create division in their ranks, the Unionist party would appeal to the electors with more prospect of success, and would enlist an enormous amount of support which will be withheld from them so long as they persist with Tariff Reform. Dissatisfaction with the policy of the party leaders is growing, but passive grumbling among those opposed to their fiscal plans is useless. To be effective it must be translated into active resistance. The Unionist Tariff Protest League has been formed to oppose the present fiscal policy of the Unionist party. All Unionists who are dissatisfied with this policy or who think it an opportunity to proceed with it at the present time, agriculturists, and those whose business or private interests would be injured, are invited to communicate with the secretary of the Unionist Tariff Protest League, when further particulars will be given."

The harbor revenue in December and January was \$6,639.97 less than in December and January last winter. This is one of the fruits of switching the Empire steamers to Halifax. The revenue received from the Royal steamships is a mere bagatelle. Thus, not only is there less work for longshoremen, less trade for the merchants, less business for the hotels and laundries, but less revenue for the city, as a result of the government's action in permitting the Empire steamships to go to Halifax after they had announced their sailings to St. John.

The Gutelius agreement was discussed in parliament yesterday, and Mr. Borden made it evident that he is satisfied with the deal which deprived St. John of the Empire steamships. Mr. Haas was not there to speak for St. John, but the case for this port was admirably set forth by Mr. F. B. Carvell. Hon. Mr. Emmerson's statement that the Canadian Pacific had an eye on the Intercolonial with a view to securing running rights over it on terms wholly advantageous to the C. P. R., and which would give it practical control of the I. C. R. in the maritime provinces, is fully justified by recent events; and the people are justified in entertaining a fear that if the present government remains in power long enough the trade interests of the maritime provinces will be handed over to the tender mercies of the big railway corporation.

Dr. R. A. Falconer, president of the University of Toronto, who is forty-seven years of age today, is said to have been considerably surprised when he was informed that he had been selected as head of Canada's largest university. There were nearly 100 names under consideration by the committee of governors. He was unknown to nearly all the members of the committee and under the circumstances it seemed hardly possible that he would be appointed. On the Mediterranean, he was sent for and went hurriedly to Toronto, where he was only "inspected" nothing was done at the time, but when he was in Italy on his vacation journey, he was apprised by cable that he had been chosen president. Doctor Falconer was born in Prince Edward Island, brought up on the island of Trinidad and educated in Edinburgh.

The flames enveloped one half of the building completely and it was impossible to save any furniture and practically everything belonging to the tenants was destroyed. Mr. McDevitt sustained a loss of about \$750 with about \$800 insurance. Mr. Dorman's loss will amount to about \$1,000.

The building itself was badly gutted and Mr. Dean's loss will amount to about \$5,000, with no insurance. The adjoining building was also injured and Mr. Dean's store on the ground floor was drenched with water.

Mr. McIntyre in the lower part of the house saved a good deal of his furniture and carried it into St. Stephen's church. The Chinaman in whose place the blaze started lost between \$300 and \$400 with no insurance.

The fire was completely subdued by one o'clock and the firemen received much praise for their work.

If we were to spend a day at our summer house during the winter, we have to leave St. John at 6:45 a. m., and arrive back about 11:30 p. m. This too, is only possible at Grand Bay, Westfield Beach and Westford stations, because the Boston train does not stop at the smaller stations.

During the summer months, residents along the line are granted the trip-tickets, and folks desiring to spend the week-end in the country are allowed a one-fare ticket. During the winter months neither of these privileges is granted, which means quite a neat sum to people who do considerable traveling. During the holiday seasons—Thanksgiving and Christmas—the enormous sum of five cents was deducted from the regular fare.

If some of these things and many others were remedied by the C. P. R., there would be no doubt that more city people who are living in cramped apartment houses, would see to the beautiful spots along the C. P. R. in the winter months as well as the summer.

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HOME RULE IS PROMINENT IN THE SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

(Continued from page 1) chief inspectors of the Metropolitan police, who discarded the royal robes generally carried and replaced them by modern electric torches as a sign to make good the motto of the House of Commons, should outfit them.

A Brilliant Scene King George with picturesque ceremony, opened the session. Accompanied by Queen Mary, who, as well as the king, wore her crown and brilliant royal robes, His Majesty drove in the state coach of gold drawn by eight Hanoverian cream colored horses from Beckingham Palace, through the Mall, over the Horse Guards parade and then along Whitehall to the king's entrance to the House of Lords. Great crowds assembled to witness the procession, which was carried out in ideal weather.

In the House of Lords the scene was a picturesque one as Their Majesties, accompanied by members of the royal family and by members of the royal household, were seated on the throne. The king read his speech outlining the government's programme for the session.

Very few distinguished strangers were admitted to the house and those included, besides members of the House of Commons, most of the foreign diplomatic corps.

The Speech Two subjects, those referring to the recent conference on safety of life at sea and to home rule for Ireland, stood out in bold relief in the speech from the throne. The address for the most part was a colorful recital of events already recorded and which had developed since the opening of the session.

Referring to the conference on safety of life at sea, His Majesty said: "I am glad to see that the international conference on safety of life at sea, which recently met in London, has resulted in the signature of an important convention which will, I trust, result in the protection of life, especially on ocean-going passenger steamers. A bill to enable me to fulfill the promise of the convention, will be laid before you."

Home Rule In regard to home rule for Ireland, which for the moment is the subject of parliamentary discussion, His Majesty said: "I regret that the efforts which have been made to secure agreement of the government of Ireland have so far failed. In a matter in which the hopes and fears of so many of my subjects are so keenly concerned, and in which the interests of the good will and co-operation of many of my subjects are so vitally involved, it is a matter of course that I should be desirous of a lasting settlement."

The king referred to his forthcoming visit to France, as affording an opportunity of testifying to the cordial relations between the two countries.

His Majesty also mentioned the legislative proposals for the reconstruction of the second chamber, a bill providing for imperial naturalization measures dealing with the housing of the poor and education.

She will be brought out early in the spring. The ferry, called the Leonard, after Major Leonard, is 829 feet long, 65 feet beam, and has a draught of 18 feet. It will be an ice breaker. There will be a tidal deck with gearing so that trains may be taken on or off at any stage of the tide. It is capable of carrying a locomotive and train of 1,400 tons.

Government Defends Gutelius Agreement

Hon. Mr. Hazen Sat Speechless in Face of Charges of Neglecting Interests of Constituents—Hon. H. R. Emmerson, F. B. Carvell and Others Denounce the Contract

Ottawa, Feb. 9.—In the house this afternoon the Gutelius-Bosworth agreement was read and its inequities bared by F. B. Carvell, Hon. Mr. Emmerson and others.

Mr. Carvell asked Hon. Mr. Hazen why he did nothing to prevent the side-tracking of St. John as Canada's winter port, but the minister sat dumb under the onslaught.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson declared that the Gutelius agreement is illegal, as tolls cannot be charged on the I. C. R. without authority of government-in-council.

Hon. Mr. Borden and Pelletier denied that Pelletier had anything to do with switching the steamers from St. John to Halifax and shielded themselves behind Mr. Gutelius.

Notwithstanding that the full text of the agreement was ordered to be tabled in parliament it has not been done.

In introducing his motion for the production of all papers bearing on the adoption of St. John as the winter port of the steamers of the Royal Line, A. K. MacLaren, Liberal member for Halifax, complained of the "unnecessary and unjustifiable interference of the government with the trans-Atlantic service."

fluenced the government in making its small contract was to better the steamship service across the Atlantic and to provide for the most speedy and satisfactory conveyance of the mails between Canada and the Motherland.

Mr. Pelletier—It was only a temporary agreement. Mr. Emmerson—It makes no difference. There was no authority for changing tolls on the government without an order-in-council.

There has never been a case in railroad on the continent, declared Mr. Emmerson, continuing, "No parallel in the case of this illegal agreement."

Moreover, Mr. Emmerson charged, I. C. R. trains are held up from time to time in order to give C. P. R. specials the right-of-way.

"The government," he said, "did not dare make a choice between the port of St. John and the port of Halifax. The ministers take refuge behind the improper arrangement made by a subordinate. They have not been plucky."

Mr. Emmerson said that the government's administration of the I. C. R. is working hard with the business of the route. As for this Gutelius agreement, let me say, in closing, that it was made improperly, illegally, and is outrageously wrong doing, tantamount to injury to the business of the I. C. R. and the business of the people.

Hon. Robert Rogers moved the adjournment of the debate, and in doing so said that Hon. J. D. Hazen, who was unavoidably absent from the house to-night, would take an early opportunity of replying to the charges which were made, and would discuss the whole question fully and frankly.
