ARMCHAIR REFLECTIONS

To the young whose surroundings are congenial, this world is a suitable paradise. Winter, spring, summer and autumn, each has its delights, and few privations which are thought worthy of consideration. To the young this world seems very large and life very long, and thought they sometimes see Old Age huddled in the chimney corner or hobbling by on its staff, they feel that a better fate is in store for them; that they will never succumb to infirmity—will never grow old. They hear or read of men struggling and falling in the battle of life, but they are sure that any battle in which they may be called upon to engage will be short and they will be the victors. I visited them some sixty years ago. They had the best cultivated and most productive farm of 3,000 or 4,000 acres in western Pennsylvania. Their village was laid out like a checker board, and consisted of about fifty dwellings and workshops, all built of brick, all exactly of the same dimensions, and not one of them had a window or door on the side facing the street. This the wayfarer regarded as a hint that the community was sufficient unto itself. Did they prosper? Exceedingl

ago, came the explosion, and the community sank into the past and forgetfulness. Here another "Happy Valley" like that described by Dr. Johson, was clouded by disaster, and its story has been repeated thousands of times in the world's history. I have just read an appeal for fundsfor the London Fresh Air fund, which was sent to a Canadian newspaper (one of the most reliable in the Dominion), by C. Arthur Pearson, of 23 St. Bride street, London, in which he says:—







London, April 15—The Westminster Gazette says: "Coronation year is not to be without its comets, even if we cannot hope for such a brilliant visitor from space as Halley's comet. Of the five comets that are due to return, one has already run its, course, for it was due on January 8. RENT AND FOOD ARE
HIGHER IN STATES

London, April 15—Parliament has just received copies of a report on the cost of living in American cities based on inquiries made in twenty-eight representative towns by officials of the British Board of Trade.

The report makes a budget of 533 pages and covers the question of working class rents, housing, retail prices of commodities and rates of wages in the United States, compiled for purposes of comparison with the conditions of workers in Great Britain and other countries.

The conclusions reached are:

"The cost of food and rent combined is 52 per cent greater in the United States than in England and Wales, but these heavier relative charges on working class income have been accompanied with weekly wages which are as 230 to 100."

Here Are the Plans of the Railway Company for Newly Acquired Property in the North End-A 25 Foot Road-

Within a few days workmen will comnence tearing down the old buildings in Mill street to make room for the new terminals to be erected by the C. P. K. and the appearance of that section of the city will undergo a marked change. The plans of the railway company provide for the erection of large warehouses and the laying of a number of freight tracks and the improvements should place the railway company in a much better position for handling their business here.

One of the first things to be taken up in competion with the work will be the One of the first things to be taken up in connection with the work will be the filling in of a large portion of the property and for this there will be required about 150,000 yards of material. The buildings along the eastern side of Mils street will be removed and a new road, way built, twenty-five feet wide, running parallel with the present street. One building situated at about the centre of the block, may not be taken down this year as the lease does not expire until next year, and the two buildings on the corner of Main and Mill street will not be arge boulder from the Main street side of Fort Howe next the police station. 


