McMillan, who risked their lives to save 50 of their fellow workers from the clutches of a fire in the Brooklyn plant of the American Steel Co., has been rewarded by the appellate division of the supreme court in Brooklyn by the award of \$20,000 damages to each of the men, with interest and costs.

His Worship Mayor Frink, when asked by a Times reporter to give his views on the commission movement, said: "It is hardly necessary for me to state that I am in favor of civic government by commission, as my views were very clearly set forth three years ago, and I have not seen any reason to depart from them. In fact my experience at the council has only strengthened the views which I held then. My personal relations with the members of the council have always been most friendly. The charge very generally made that the members of the council are in it for what they can make out of it, in my opinion, has absolutely no foundation, and as a whole, as far as honesty and probity go, I think they stand equally good as many who profess to be much more so."

Queen City Also Has a Mysterious Shooting Case, in Which Two Men Were Wounded—Drowning at Inroquois, Ont

Cobalt, Ont., April 15.—Never in the history of Northern Ontario has there been a more spectacular race for gold than that which culminated when G. D. Gratton and D. Perigo returned from Kookeo country after being three days on the trail with but four hours' sleep. Perigo and a former partner were in the Kookeo country in January and found a five foot vein with free gold on the side of a cliff. Both had staked to the limit at the time and had come out to get more permits.

When Perigo received the money and saw his partner wanted to get ahead of him he rushed to Gratton in Cobalt, showing him the gold samples and said they had to get out that night. They could not get out, but piled bacon and flour on a tologuen and set out in chase. They slept neither day nor night and one day out met an Indian who said he had been with Perigo's former partner but had to quit him because he wanted to overland his dog sleigh. He was taking his time, not dreaming of the money.

Great Waste of Time "Many men have entered the common council full of energy and determination, intent on doing something to improve conditions in the city, but it is not very long until they find themselves tied up and helpless to obtain the objects desired, for they come when they can to attend meetings, and there are many of them, and they find, like myself, notwithstanding the names and labels that it is almost impossible to get anywhere. RICH AND NO ONE KNEW IT Bangor, April 15.—Living so frugally that his neighbors never dreamed that he was rich, the death of William H. Badeson of Fiskhill, New York at the age of 83 has brought out the fact that he possessed a large fortune. In his safe deposit vault at the Mattawan National bank, Mr. Badeson had hoarded and mortgaged one and a half acres of land. A list of these securities and their value is being prepared but it is believed that the total value of the property valued at \$500,000, and in addition to this it is expected that his holdings in realty will foot up many thousands more. It would not be surprising if he was worth more than a million.

NOVA SCOTIA GOLD MINE HAS BEEN SOLD (Special to Times) Truro, N. S., April 15.—A change in ownership of one of the Nova Scotia gold mines caused quite a stir in financial circles here. The mine was owned by J. J. Spook and the estate of the late Dr. H. MacKay. The price paid is said to be about \$45,000.

G.P.R. TRAIN RUNS INTO A WASHOUT Ottawa, April 15.—(Canadian Press)—The C. P. Barge is Sunk Nantaganess Pier, R. I., April 15.—(Canadian Press)—The barge Sallor, in tow of the tug Salvation, which had three other barges, bound from New York for east of the tug, sank four miles off Point Judith during the night. It is not known whether or not any lives were lost.

ARMCHAIR REFLECTIONS

By H. L. Spencer

To the young whose surroundings are congenial, this world is a suitable paradise. Winter, spring, summer and autumn, each has its delights, and few privations which are thought worthy of consideration. To the young this world seems very large and life very long, and though they sometimes see Old Age huddled in the chimney corner or hobbling by on its staff, they feel that a better fate is in store for them; that they will never succumb to infirmity—will never grow old. They hear or read of men struggling and falling in the battle of life, but they are sure that any battle in which they may be called upon to engage will be short and they will be the victors. Youth is the golden age of human existence, and in most instances the old recall this time with tender regrets that it was not better appreciated and enjoyed while it lasted.

I recall the story of Rupp, a German philosopher, who founded a community in western Pennsylvania, about 100 years ago. Some members of which were pious, some youth of heart and happiness while life lasted, if they would accept the gift. Their idea was to abjure the world, to have nothing whatever to do with its religion, politics, squabbles or schemes of ambition. There was a pastoral care, with moderate hours prescribed for labor and long hours for rest. The community was the owner of all the property of its members, of whom two or three who were thought fit to cope with the outside world were chosen to sell the surplus products and purchase such supplies as they required that were not produced among themselves. I visited them some sixty years ago. They had the best cultivated and most productive farms of 2,000 or 4,000 acres in western Pennsylvania. Their village was laid out like a checker board, and consisted of about fifty dwellings and workshops, all built of brick, all exactly of the same dimensions, and not one of them had a window or door on the side facing the street. This the wayfarer regarded as a hint that the community was sufficient unto itself, and they prospered. Exceedingly, but the serpent found his way in as he did into the Eden of old. Some became dissatisfied and withdrew with the proceeds of the sale of their share of the property; others became "undisciplinable" and were expelled, taking with them the amount of cash to which they were entitled. Then, about 29 years ago, came the explosion, and the wilderness sank into the past and forgetfulness. Here another "Happy Valley" like that described by Dr. Johnson was clouded by disaster, and its story has been repeated thousands of times in the world's history. "They who choose wealth, fame, power or love for their god, and we all sooner or later, that our god has feet of clay. My friends, Little Laura, Little Fred, and all other little friends, gather round, while ye may, for life has but one spring, and its roses soon fade.





THE BATTLE LINE. S. S. Lejeune, Captain Hilton, from Philadelphia, arrived at Havana today. S. S. Alhena, Captain Lechart, for New York, sailed from Antilla yesterday.

AT FORT HOWE. Several city workmen were engaged this morning at the perilous task of removing a large boulder from the main street, side of Fort Howe next the police station. It became loosened and was in danger of falling.

SIX DEATHS. The board of health reports six deaths for the week, as follows:—Meningitis, pneumonia, erysipelas, cardiac failure bronchopneumonia, infantile convulsions, one each.

EVERY DAY CLUB. Frederick Campbell, the eminent English journalist and lecturer, will speak at the Every Day Club tomorrow evening at 8.30 o'clock. The club's orchestra will play a special programme of Easter music from 8 till 8.30. Miss Evans will sing solo. Miss Blanch will be the accompanist.

THE RIVER. Reports from up river districts are to the effect that the ice is still very solid, in spite of the recent rains and mild weather. The river is open for a short distance in the vicinity of Gaspoint and also in the vicinity of Hagan's Island at the head of the Resch. It is still predicted that the opening this season will be quite late.

EASTER IN ST. PETERS. The Easter music in St. Peter's church will be, at solemn high mass, at 10.30 a. m.—Hymn, "Christ is Risen" (Harmonized); Kyrie and Gloria; Missa Angelorum; Regina Coeli, V. Hymn; Sanctus and Agnus Dei; Missa Angelorum; Marche. At solemn vespers at 7.30 p. m. the music will be: Psalms (Harmonized); Regina Coeli; O Salutaris (Harmonized 4 parts); Wigel; Tantum Ergo (selected); Berge; Hymn, "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name."

FROM WEST WITH BRIDE. Albert E. Whittier, formerly of St. Martin's, N. B., but now engaged in the C. P. R. offices in Winnipeg, arrived in the city on the noon train today, on his way to his old home. He was accompanied by his bride, who was formerly Miss Lesnie Witt, of Winnipeg. With in the city, Mr. and Mrs. Whittier will be the guests of Rev. and Mrs. J. H. A. Anderson.

UNVEILING IN ST. LUKE'S CHURCH TOMORROW. Features of particular interest in connection with the Easter morning service in St. Luke's church tomorrow are the unveiling of a brass memorial tablet and the dedication of a brass alms basin. Both are for deceased church wardens. The tablet is the gift of the family of the late W. H. Smith who died on Good Friday, 1900. It is placed in the north aisle in the vestry bay and is of fine workmanship. The alms dish is the gift of George A. Hayward, son of the late Henry Hayward. He speaks very highly of the west, but says that the people down this way should get out and boom their country, as the people in the west hear little or nothing about it. Mr. Johnston is a strong believer in reciprocity and thinks that the agreement will result very favorably for Canada.

HE WILL SPEND A MONTH IN HALIFAX and will likely be here for a few days when returning. He was formerly mayor of Halifax.

FORMER RESIDENT URGES COMMISSION. Rev. R. G. Fulton, formerly of this city, passed through the city yesterday on his way from Woodstock, going east. He said he had been watching the progress of the movement for commission government in St. John with a great deal of interest, and he hoped it would carry at the elections to be held on Tuesday next. He said he still felt a strong interest in the welfare of his native city and he thought that St. John had been too long in a suit and that the citizens should vote for a more progressive and businesslike administration.

POLICE COURT TODAY. Joseph Dixon was this morning remanded in the police court after having pleaded guilty to a charge of drunkenness, but not guilty to one of interfering with the police by attempting to draw a knife on Policeman Hamm. The latter and Policeman Smith were taking him to the north end lock-up when, it is said, he drew a jack-knife from his pocket and tried to stab the officer. Joseph McArthur was remanded on drunkenness charge, and John Donnelly on charge of wandering about Union street without giving a satisfactory account of himself. Joseph Fleming was ordered back to the steamer Lake Erie, from which he had absented himself without leave.

C. P. R. WILL START WORK IN FEW DAYS

Here Are the Plans of the Railway Company for Newly Acquired Property in the North End—A 25 Foot Roadway

Within a few days workmen will commence tearing down the old buildings in Mill street to make room for the new terminals to be erected by the C. P. R. and the appearance of that section of the city will undergo a marked change. The plans of the railway company provide for the erection of large warehouses and the laying of a number of freight tracks and the improvements should place the railway company in a much better position for handling their business here. One of the first things to be taken up in connection with the work will be the filling in of a large portion of the property and for this there will be required about 100,000 yards of material. The buildings along the eastern side of Mill street will be removed and a new roadway built, twenty-five feet wide, running parallel with the present street. One building situated at about the centre of the block, may not be taken down this year as the lease does not expire until next year, and the two buildings on the corner of Main and Mill street will not be interfered with, as they have not been purchased by the company.

Room for 130 Cars. The plans show that there will be room for 130 cars on the new sidings. A warehouse, 40 by 400 feet, will be built now, and will probably be extended 110 feet in length next year. It is found that the business requires it. This warehouse will be principally for handling inward freight and possibly an outward freight shed will be erected later if required. There will be eight delivery tracks for cart freight and two tracks running to the freight shed. These tracks will run to within twenty-five feet of Mill street. There will also be a track running to the cold storage building from the westward, in place of the I. C. R. track, which will be removed. The mill on the Liberty property will be removed, but little change will be noticeable in Main street.

It is expected to have all the work completed within four or five months, as it will be rushed as quickly as possible. The tracks will be between Mill street and the ends of the tracks will be a roadway for teams going to and from the cars and there will be a slight incline leading from the Mill street end to the roadways between the tracks so that teams will be on a proper level for handling freight easily. While the majority of the buildings will not be vacated until May 1, the company will probably commence the work of filling in before that time, but it is likely that a large number of men will be employed there very soon.

NIobe WILL BE IN PORT NEXT WEEK

Citizens of St. John will have an opportunity next week to see their sister Niobe, the first vessel of the Canadian navy. H. H. Brown, naval recruiting officer at this port, received word this morning from Commander McEwen, of the cruiser, that he would visit St. John with the warship on Thursday, April 20. The Niobe is now at Halifax. This will be the first visit of a Canadian warship to this port.

SAYS POLICEMAN USED PRISONER TOO ROUGHLY

Clarke Says he Did Not do More Than Resistance Made Necessary. The complaint of Wm. Waugh that Policeman George H. Clark had ill-treated him when playing him under arrest for drunkenness on Tuesday night last, was dealt with this morning in the police court and several witnesses had been examined, adjournment was made until Tuesday next. S. Skinner appeared for Waugh and Recorder Baxter for the policeman.

Evidence was given by Bartholomew McEwen, head checker for the Allan line, that he saw Clarke take hold of Waugh's head and knock it forcibly against the cobblestones in the gutter, causing the blood to flow freely, also that he struck him with the handcuffs. He did not see Waugh offer resistance, and told the patrolman that he was a witness to his actions.

Mrs. Hannah Godse and Mrs. Eleanor Clark corroborated Mr. McGaffney's evidence. Dr. Kenney told of examining the wound in Waugh's head. It was an inch and a half long, and in some places had gone almost to the bone. There were marks on the throat near the wind-pipe. Policeman Clark admitted having used considerable force in arresting Waugh, saying that it was necessary, because of his trying to get away. The prisoner had resisted and kicked in his efforts to get away. He denied having struck him several times with his handcuffs, and said that he had simply held his head down in order to keep the defendant from escaping, and had not knocked his head repeatedly or willfully against the cobblestones.

Serjt. Finlay said that he had always known Waugh to be a capable policeman and looked upon him as being, if anything, lenient in fulfilling his duties.

THE MARYS FUND. The Queen Mary fund will close on April 21 owing to the Montreal fund closing at a later date. All local signs, however, must be in on Wednesday evening or by Thursday morning's mail of next week as it will take some time to settle up the fund. There are now 280 names and the sum of \$67 has been collected. Owing to so many names being sent in this week it will be impossible to publish any names until the final closes.
