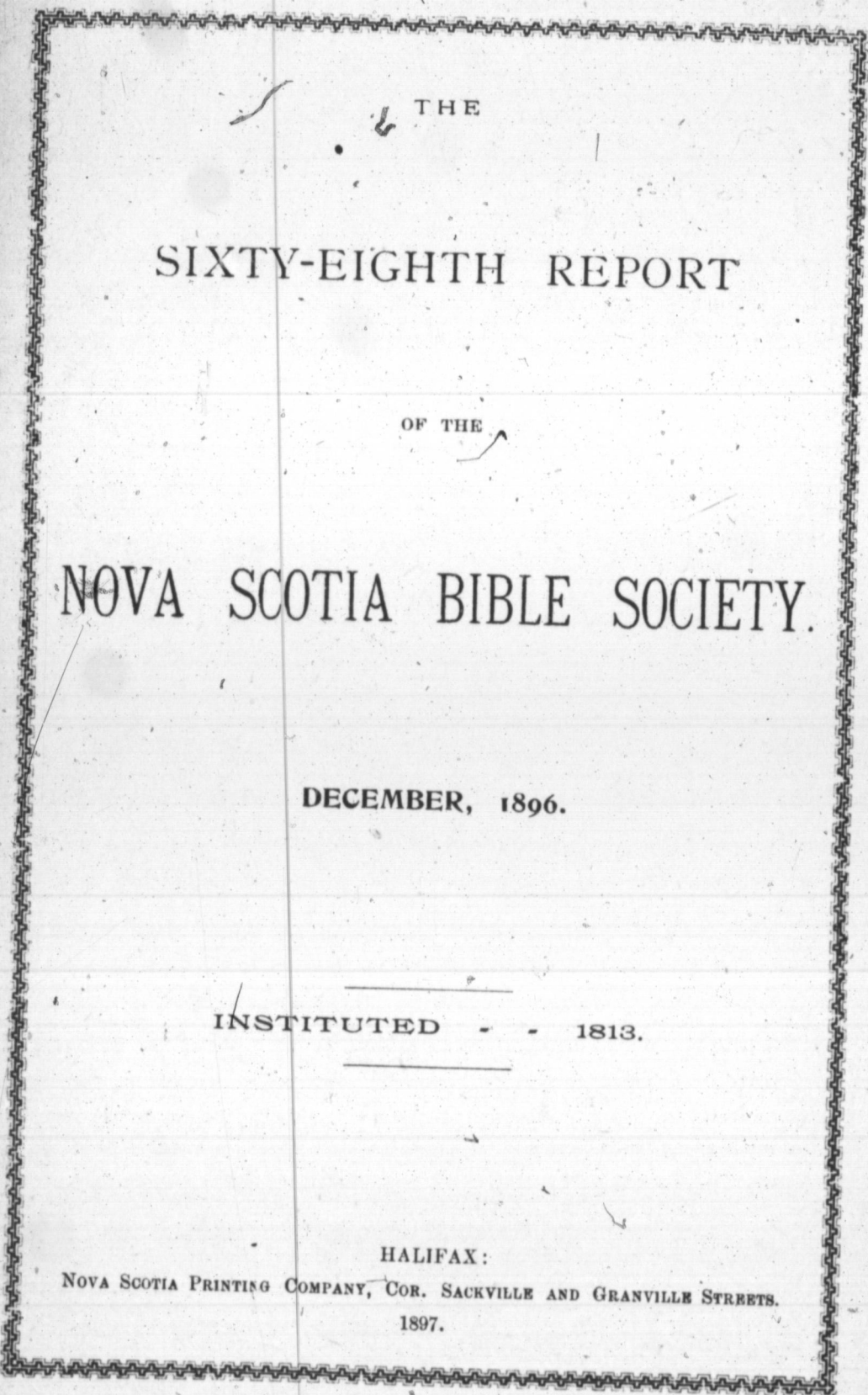

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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

British and Foreign Bible Society.

I. The designation of the Society shall be THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY, of which the main object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment; the only copies in the language of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society, shall be the authorized Version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies; for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominion; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mohammedan or Pagan.

III. Every subscriber of One Guinea annually shall be a member.

IV. Every subscriber of Ten Guineas at one time shall be a member for life.

V. Each subscriber of Fifty Pounds at one time, or who shall by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to Fifty Pounds, shall be a Governor for life.

VI. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, shall be a member for life; or, of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for life.

VIII. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six laymen, six of whom shall be foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number,

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who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all officers except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

IX. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the directions of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

X. The annual meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday of May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year presented.

XI. The President, Vice-President, and Treasurer shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XII. Every clergyman or dissenting minister who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIII. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XIV. At the general meeting, and at the meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence the Vice-President, first upon the list then present; and in the absence of the Vice-President the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be voted for the purpose, shall preside at the meeting.

XV. The Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday of every month, or oftener if necessary.

XVI. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential service to the Society, either Members for life, or Governors for life.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating Honorary members from among foreigners who have promoted the object of the Society.

XVIII. The whole of the minutes of every general meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

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REGULATIONS

Adopted at the Annual General Meeting of the Society in 1826 and 1827.

- I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scripture, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.
- II. That in conformity to the foregoing resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.
- III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, be made by the Society, the books issued be bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.
- IV. That all grants of Scriptures to the Society which circulate the Apocrypha, be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition; and that the proceeds of the sale of any such copies of Scripture be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
NOVA SCOTIA BIBLE SOCIETY.

- I. This Society shall be called ~~THE BIBLE SOCIETY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND ITS DEPENDENCIES~~; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz., to encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment, and to furnish copies of the Scriptures gratis to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.
- II. The business of the Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee.
- III. In order to give effect to the designs of this institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.
- IV. Every person contributing annually ten shillings at one time, or a donation of ten pounds, shall be considered a member of the Society.
- V. A general meeting of the members of this Society shall be held every year, before which will be laid the accounts and proceedings of the preceding year.
- VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting the incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.
- VII. Every member of the Society shall be entitled to purchase, under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.
- VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of this Society as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their number as occasion may require.

SUGGESTIONS

FOR THE COMPLETE

ORGANIZATION AND WORKING

OF A

BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

ANY BRANCH, which, in the past, has not attained eminence as a tributary to the AUXILIARY—whose annual grant has not compared favorably with others in districts of less note as to population, wealth or religious privileges, is earnestly requested to consider the following suggestions of means whereby its latent resources may be made more available in the blessed cause of Bible dissemination.

1. The Bible Society being undenominational, care should be taken to preserve its character, as such, in its Branch organization and operation, and to this end the *committee* and *collectors* should, as far as possible, represent every Christian denomination in its district. The *sheet* in the *Auxiliary's Report* containing the *list of Branches* is divided into four columns: one for the name of the Branch and three for the *chief members* of Committee, viz.: *President Treasurer* and *Secretary*. Where there are more than three denominations in any district, they can be represented by *Vice-Presidents*. When a branch embraces an extensive district, its outlying sections should also be represented by *Vice-Presidents*, who could superintend the work of collecting in their respective localities.

2. At every ANNUAL MEETING (which it is desirable should be held during the *Agent's visit*) the COMMITTEE, if necessary, should be re-cast and *collectors appointed, competent to present the Society's claims, and earnestly interested in the work*; for to zealous collectors, rather than to Committee or contributors, belong the honor of placing the silver and the gold at the service of the Redeemer.

3. Should a Committee be impaired by the death or removal of any of its *chief members*, notice of such should be furnished the Agent at the earliest opportunity.

4. Each Branch should decide upon always carrying on the work of collecting during that month most favorable for such in its district, (of which, also, the Agent should be informed) and, previous to the collector's canvass, the annual reports of the Auxiliary should be distributed among the *best* subscribers, and placed in the hands of other persons likely to become valuable supporters. And during the canvass *all* ministers of the gospel should be notified of the same, and asked to encourage their congregations in a liberal response to the collector's call.

5. When a Committee receives notice from the Agent of his intended visit, no delay should be made in appointing the place of meeting and making such known from the pulpit and press; for the delay of a day may possibly result in the preclusion of the meeting by another of merely local interest, whose object might as well be attained at any other time, whereas *the loss of one day means the loss of a whole year*, in so far as a due visitation of the Branch by the Agent is concerned. All ministers in the district should receive special invitations to be present on the platform, and should also be requested to call the attention of their congregations to the meeting, and urge upon them their attendance. The editors of local newspapers should also be asked to insert a brief notice of the meeting.

6. As the annual accounts of the Auxiliary are *closed on the last working day* of December, it is desirable that remittances, with lists of subscribers, should be forwarded to the Secretary or Treasurer in Halifax, not later than Christmas.

7. Any Branch can, if necessary, have *its* DEPOSITORY, but such should be under its own care. During the Agent's visit, a statement of all Bibles in stock should be duly rendered and payment made to him or the Committee. The Depository may be paid a commission of 10% on his sales. *All orders for the supply of Bibles for the Depositor should be sent by the Secretary of the Branch to the Secretary of the Auxiliary in Halifax.*

8. In view of the transcendent aim and ever growing work of the British and Foreign Bible Society, it is hoped that in every locality a *few persons* may feel moved to espouse its cause as their *special Christian work*, and use their influence in making their Branch an institution deeply established in the popular heart.

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EIGHTY-THIRD ANNIVERSARY

OF THE

Nova Scotia Auxiliary Bible Society,

MEETINGS AT

ST. ANDREW'S, PARK ST., AND KAYE ST. CHURCHES.

The annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society was held in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, January 7, 1897. J. C. MACKINTOSH presided. REV. DR. BLACK read the lesson from the Holy Scriptures. REV. PRESIDENT FORREST offered prayer. The Chairman, in the course of his opening remarks, said that the British and Foreign Bible Society had now been in existence 93 years. For some time their meetings had not been well attended in Halifax. But greater interest has been taken in their work during the last two or three years. Mr. Mackintosh then read extracts from the Secretary's Report, accompanying them with appropriate remarks. He complained that while in Russia the Agents of the Bible Society had free transportation over the railways, yet their Secretary had to pay full fare over the I. C. R.

The Annual Report was presented by the Secretary, REV. F. H. AEMON, an abstract of which is as follows:

The Committee of the Nova Scotia Bible Society, in presenting a brief abstract of their Report, would first refer to the report of work accomplished by the British and Foreign Bible Society in 1895. These words of thanksgiving and praise may well head the story of the Bible Society's 92nd year:—"O taste and see that the Lord is good; let us exalt His name together."

Has not the goodness of the Lord been experienced in needful funds provided? in more Scriptures sent forth? in

fresh translations begun and revisions advanced? in agents raised up and in souls led by the Bible to Christ? In the vast Russian Empire the circulation of the Holy Book still grows; in Mohammedan lands an accustomed readiness to read the Bible is seen. Eastern wars have improved the prospects of Bible diffusion. Eastern martyrdoms have given a sacred influence to a new translation. Eastern Bible Women have let Gospel light fall on more inmates of dark zenanas. Students of the Bible in Uganda increase by thousands. On and on goes the living book. "Our labor is not in vain in the Lord." Four years of heavy deficits have been followed by four years which have cancelled those deficits and left a surplus.

This has been achieved by careful management and by the aid of generous donations and some large legacies. Plans adopted some years ago have had time to tell, and the newest resources of art have been turned to account to the effect with safety the reduction of the Scriptures stored in sheets and in the size of the editions printed at one time. A fourth European Protestant country, Denmark, has been left to provide the sacred Scriptures for itself. The general fund or really new income of 1895-96 was £126,372 11s. 11d., £11,403 7s 9d. less than that of 1894-95. A fall of £9,555 7s. 0d. in legacies accounts for most of the decrease. At the same time the receipts from the sales of Scriptures stand at £87,590 2s. 1d., as against £93,552, 18s. 1d., in the previous year. A large part of this decrease is attributable to the depreciation of silver in so many countries where the Society is circulating the scriptures. There is a large consequent loss under "exchange" in adjusting the accounts for sales effected in such lands. The gross receipts of the year from all sources came to £213,962, 14s. 0d., and the falling off in the whole is £17,366 3s. 9d. Decreased receipts have been met by decreased expenditure for the time being. Measures have been taken for the developing of the work in India, China and elsewhere. This will increase the charges of the current year, and no relaxation of effort must be made in order to avoid future years of deficit. Issues for the year show a total of 3,970,437 in Bibles, Testaments and portions. A figure higher than that of last year by 133,270 copies, and one that all but reaches four millions. For three successive years the wave of circulation has advanced. The issues of the Society from 1804, its commencement, now amount to 147,366,669 copies. There is still scope for many more issues and translations, before the world's needs are met.

When the population of British Protectorates is added to that of the Empire proper, the number of souls now alive under the British flag outnumbers the above issues of Scriptures in these ninety-two years by two hundred millions. The forward evangelistic efforts which are now

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being made both at home and abroad will also suffer, if the Bible Society does not keep step with them in its ability to furnish the Scriptures in the many new languages they require. The translation, printing or distribution of the whole or part of the Bible has been promoted by the Society—directly in 268 languages or dialects, indirectly in 65. Total 333. Six new revisions have been added to the Society's list, but the great work of the year has been the continuation of versions already begun, and the revision of translations long in use. In India and other eastern lands where millions of women are shut up, ignorant of God's Word and its life-giving truth, and prevented from attending Gospel preaching, four hundred and seventy-three Bible Women subsidized by the British and Foreign Bible Society are devoting themselves to the work of carrying to the inmates of the Zenanas that story so certain to interest, of the love and death of our Saviour and Lord. When they cannot read, and few can, the Bible Women will read to them, and will teach them to read. Within the past year 1,455 native women had been thus taught; almost 30,000 have, week by week, been visited; 4,223 copies of the Scriptures have been given, and 14,425 copies sold. Such is the world-wide work the Nova Scotia Bible Society is collecting for. In March, 1896, our Treasurer sent free contributions £300, for purchase account £249 6s. 8d. in all \$2,685.05. As our Treasurer's account is not closed till March 31st, 1897, we cannot state amount of contributions, but we hope they may exceed those of previous years. The sum received at the Halifax Depository for Bibles and Testaments amounts to \$597, an increase of over \$83.60 over the year's receipts of 1895. Eighty-nine Branch Societies are united in the Nova Scotia Bible Society. In Pictou and New Glasgow separate societies are contributing to the British and Foreign Bible Society. Our esteemed and zealous travelling Secretary, Mr. McKelvie, reports: "You may be assured that our cause will continue to be liberally sustained by the country branches. Responses to my appeals at public meetings often express the avowal that of all Christian philanthropies the Bible Society is the noblest and ought to be the last to suffer for lack of support. Still, as the number of benevolent societies seems to increase in every part, the difficulty is greater in maintaining our former measure of financial aid. In the southern parts of the province and in Cape Breton, there is a falling off in contributions, but elsewhere there is generally an advance so far as the returns have been made.

In conclusion, we ask our friends for increased and liberal support, because of the work the Bible Society has done for the long neglected Indians of our Dominion, having given them the Bible in whole or in part in sixteen

languages or dialects, and published 81,967 copies of God's Word for them. Because the Bible Society is helping missionary societies in their ever-increasing work by providing them with translations of the Holy Scriptures, and because of our individual responsibilities as Christians to increase the circulation everywhere of God's Word, and thus diffuse the light of truth and avail ourselves of the increased facilities this century affords of enabling each one of earth's inhabitants to read or hear in his own language the message of the Gospel, that "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that whoever believeth on Him should not perish, but have everlasting life."

REV. MR. DOBSON moved the first resolution :

"That the report, a portion of which has been read, be received and published; and that this meeting thanks our Heavenly Father for the widespread circulation of His holy word; and asks all Christians to pray that the blessing of the Holy Spirit may accompany its perusal."

MR. DOBSON said that he would say little concerning the first part of the resolution. Regarding the latter part he would say that he thought the work of the Bible Society was perhaps the greatest work that had been undertaken for the evangelization of the world since the beginning of the Christian era. The great questions asked by men are: Whence am I? What relation do I bear to humanity? What relation do I bear to the universe? What relation do I bear to God? The conscience, that great inward monitor, keeps perpetually admonishing individual man, telling him what he ought to do and what he ought not to do. Now, the Bible answers this great question, "Whence am I?" It answers it for all the nations of the world. Hence it is by far the greatest book of this or any preceding age. It indicates, too, the relation in which our race stands to the universe, to each individual member of its fellows, and lastly, its relation to God. Justinian, Blackstone and others had epitomised the different duties of the race—but a greater than any human legislator had said, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, with all thy soul, and with all thy strength," and "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

REV. DR. SAUNDERS seconded the resolution, interspersing his remarks with many happy illustrations. He said

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the question of the circulation and perusal of the Bible was such a great one that it enobled and uplifted all those who considered it attentively. The Bible is now translated into no less than 330 different languages. The statistics of the British and Foreign Bible Society are so great and extended that they are difficult to grasp by the ordinary mind. But yet the unpublished statistics, i. e., the effect of the distribution and reading of the Bible, are greater still ; but they are only known in their fullness by Almighty God. Who can tell what effect the widespread dissemination of the scriptures has had upon the growth and development of foreign missions ? Who can tell what effect it has had in curbing the lawless and unruly passions of the various nations of the world ? Who can tell what effect the Bible has had in establishing homes and consecrating and enobling the home life ? But it has had and has attained to yet higher aims. In fine, it has evangelized many of those by whom it has been read. The Bible, unaccompanied by any commentator, has poured light into many a dark spirit.

REV. MR. WILKINSON, of Christ Church, Dartmouth, introduced the second resolution as follows :

That this meeting recognizes that the B. and F. Bible Society, by its numerous translations of the Holy Scriptures, has proved itself to be a most valuable auxiliary to missionary enterprise, and should be aided by prayers, sympathy and willing gifts.

In illustrating the actual working of the B. and F. Bible Society, the mover related the experience of an English rector as told in the *Monthly Reporter*. This clergyman had never sympathized with the work of the Society, but as time rolled on he found himself a missionary in a heathen land, with an English Bible which was valueless until translated into the native language. Returning to England he now found that the Bible Society would supply him with the needed translation, and that without charge. Thankfully accepting their offer, he made a special visit to his old parish to tell of the good work of the Society which he had for so many years misunderstood. In this illustration the valuable assistance which the Society may render to all missionary societies was readily seen.

In 90 years, sixty (60) million dollars have been spent

in circulating the whole or parts of the Bible. Thirteen thousand Bibles, or portions, are sent out every day. The speaker referred to the valuable work the Society had done in Canada. The first issue of the Society in a foreign language was one of the Gospels printed for the Mohawk Indians in 1804. It produced the Scriptures in the syllabic characters invented about sixty years ago by the Methodist missionary, Rev. James Evans. It has published 81,967 copies of God's Word for the native tribes of Canada in sixteen languages or dialects. Reference was made to the valuable help rendered the missionary societies working among the Maori tribes in New Zealand, and also to the immense aid given to the work of such men as Dr. Paton, of New Hebrides, and the famous MacKay, of Formosa. The Society had lately accomplished a great work in the free distribution of 100,000 copies of the Bible, or parts, among the army and navy of Japan. By its aid, also, a portion of the Bible has been placed in each of the fifty thousand dwellings in the city of Nagoya, the missionaries being the distributors. The value of the Society to missionary work was also shown in the fact that the people of Uganda now possess their completed native Bible; and it must be remembered that this country was first visited by Speke and Grant about thirty years ago. In closing his remarks the speaker referred to the work of the Rev. C. A. Sadleir, which he had lately taken up in Cholchol, Chili, among the Araucanian Indians. From this place would soon come the call for Bibles in the native tongue, and the Bible Society would again be looked to as the ready and invaluable assistant to Foreign Missionary work.

PROFESSOR FALCONER seconded this resolution as follows: Though Christianity draws its power from the present life of its founder, it is yet in a very real sense a Book religion. In the earliest days when the wistful hopes and tremulous expectations of the brethren that Jesus might be the Messiah were crushed by His death, their despair was succeeded by a deep delight, and at the daily love feasts they would strengthen one another's faith by proving out of the Scriptures that Jesus was the Messiah. Even then Christianity had its Scriptures of the Old Testament. But Time's sickle was busy, and before all the eye-witnesses died

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our gospels were written to record for us in full the life, words and meaning of Him who is our life. There He is as He was on earth, as He died, as He rose, as He lived in the hearts of those He left behind, or as He must ever be for us. And as men went out to the Egyptian, to the Arab, the Armenian, the Goth, the Teuton, the Latin races of the West, the kindling love of the missionary soon caught and tamed the silent, moody, keen, impetuous or thoughtful barbarian, and he began to ask who is this Jesus whom you love though unseen, who nerves you to a life of such wondrous faith? So the preacher turns the gospel of Jesus into the stranger tongue, and we have the versions of the early centuries. Soon under Constantine and the Popes of Rome, Christianity takes on the lust for empire, and capitulates to the spirit of this world. Men forget to compare themselves with their Master and tradition stifles faith,—the Bible becomes unknown to common folk. Here and there, however, a Wycliffe or some continental reformer discovers the buried treasure and puts it again into the speech of simple men. There are burnings, hatreds, much cruelty, but these are the birth throes of faith, freedom and stalwart nations. All through history the tale repeats itself—the Bible in the vernacular means revival of faith, intelligent worship, stringent conduct according to the pattern of Jesus. Hide Him, blur His features by tradition or man's imperfect testimony, and religion begins to perish or to send out unhealthy growths. So will it always be. Christ, as He stands for us in the New Testament, is the secret of all missionary success. His sad lonely life, His pity and compassion, His words so few and yet throbbing with life, His assurance, His deeds, with their calm masterful command over the world of men, His sorrow, His anger, His cry for the men who killed him, His agony, His death, His triumph—these things men must read at first hand, and let them prove that He is the Son of God. It is absurd to talk of missionary enterprise without the Bible. Faith cannot live long without an objective source of power in the Scriptures. Christ it is who consecrates, who delivers the captive, restores sight to the blind, makes a people, and Christ is known by His word. The Holy Spirit is the spirit of this Christ, and the words and deeds of Jesus are the eternal

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If we treasure these Scriptures we must have interest in the magnificent enterprise of the Bible Society. If Christ has solved for us the riddle of life, if He has spoken to us in all His beauty, has rolled back by His strength the burden and despair of a world so hard to comprehend, has persuaded us that a holy God can yet forgive him who repents, and receive him as His son; it is through the Bible that this has been done. And ours is the penalty of privilege. Here, as in every other spiritual domain, the truth of life holds—He that saveth his life shall lose it, but he that loseth his life for the gospel shall save it.

The third resolution was moved by the REV. F. H. ALMON: "That the following gentlemen be appointed to form the committee for the present year." (See page 2.)

REV. ALLAN SIMPSON presided at a large meeting at Park street church. The speakers were Rev. Dyson Hague, of St. Paul's; Rev. A. Gandier, of Fort Massey; Rev. F. H. Wright, of Brunswick street, and J. Burgoyne of the First Baptist church, who delivered forceful and pointed addresses in speaking of the resolutions as adopted above. The choir of Park street church rendered several appropriate selections of music between the addresses.

REV. DYSON HAGUE, in moving the first resolution, said it was a most wonderful thing that the Bible, the great cosmopolitan book of the ages, had come from the country of the Jews. There are a great many Bibles in the world. There is the koran of the Mohamedans, which to them is the inspired book of God. There is the bible of Confucius, the bible of the Buddhist, the bible of the Hindoo, all of which contain many excellent precepts and principles; but none of these is the living, quickening word of God. The Bible is like a key which fits into a lock; it fits into every activity of life and enters the human heart to bring comfort and peace. Wherever it goes it brings certainty. It speaks as one having authority. It brings joy and peace into the life of everyone who follows its sacred teachings.

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REV. A. GANDIER, who seconded the resolution, said he would begin his address by giving a few statistics. Statistics are said to be dry, but a man who has a large fortune invested in various stocks finds statistics intensely interesting. The returns of the Bible Society are so profitable that no man can afford not to have something invested in it. During the past year 3,970,439 Bibles and portions were distributed, making a grand total of 47,366,669 since the founding of the Society in 1804.

Protestant christendom being now pretty well supplied with Bibles, a large share of the circulation is now in Roman Catholic countries of Europe, in Russia, and in heathen lands. During the past year 20,000 copies were sold in Belgium, 142,197 in France, 75,892 in Spain, 11,294 in Portugal, 158,194 in Austra-Hungary, and 145,407 in Italy. In addition to these a large number of copies were given away. Only a small proportion of these are whole Bibles. The common people of these countries are very poor, and frequently purchase a half-penny copy of the Gospels, when they could not afford a more expensive book.

The work of the Colporteurs is very difficult in these countries. In Spain they are still frequently persecuted by priests and people. But being persecuted in one city they flee to another. In Spain and Portugal they have to contend against the ignorance and superstition of the people, where only about 25 per cent of the people can read, and where they know nothing of the Scriptures, which they have only heard of as the book of the Protestants, a bad book forbidden by the priests, and only fit to be burned.

On the other hand, especially in France and Belgium, they have to contend with the deadness of infidelity and indifference—multitudes in their revolt from priestly tyranny, having revolted from all religion, and looking for help to atheistic socialism. All the Colporteurs speak hopefully, however.

The aroused activity of Romanism shows that their work is telling. The Church of Rome, as she exists in these countries, can't stand an open Bible. Old superstitions are revived and mingled with new ones. The clergy are intensely active in organizing pilgrimages and processions to various sanctuary's far famed on account of some

miraculous image of the Virgin or St. Joseph, or some other saint. But this will not long hold a people once admitted to the light of modern days.

Colporteurs all speak of a general state of unrest. "We are living in unsettled times. Changes are inevitable." There can be no permanent cure for the unrestful heart of these nations except in the Gospel. Society never can be normal, stable, hopeful in these countries until it rests upon an intelligent knowledge of God's Word.

In Russia, including Siberia, 538,897 copies have been distributed—one in six of all issued. Work in Russia is difficult because of vast distances and imperfect means of communication. But government officials, railway and steam boat companies, as well as the people, welcome and assist the Colporteurs. Free carriage for Bibles and free tickets for Colporteurs have been granted again and again. Even in Siberia both government and merchants have granted free carriage to men and books. It is the testimony of Colporteurs that the Russian people are peculiarly susceptible to spiritual truth, and in no country does work tell to better advantage.

The agents of the Bible Society distributing the Scriptures without note or comment are welcomed, whereas the agents of any particular Protestant Church would be refused admittance. No other missionary organization could possibly do the work in Russia that the Bible Society is now doing. In addition to work in the countries mentioned, the British and Foreign Bible Society have their Colporteurs in Turkey, Greece, Algeria, Tunis, Morocco, West Africa, East Africa, South Africa, Egypt, Syria and Palestine, Arabia and Abyssinnia, Persia, India, Burma, China, Japan, Korea, Madagascar, Polynesia and Melanesia, West Indies, Mexico and South America—in fact the map of the world is thickly dotted with the agencies of this Society. Then not only is the British and Foreign Bible Society one of the greatest of missionary organizations, it has assisted all other missionary societies in giving the Bible to the different tribes and races of men in their own tongue. During the past five years the number of languages and dialects into which some portion of the Bible is translated and published has increased from 329 to 381.

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It is the distinctive glory of Protestant missions that everywhere they teach the people to read, and put the Bible in their hands. Take one example of missionary work as aided by the Bible Society—Uganda. Less than 20 years ago Stanley's letter in the *London Daily Telegram*, describing the sad condition of the people and King Mtisa's willingness to receive Christian teachers, touched the heart of Christian England. To-day 100,000 persons have been brought into close contact with the Gospel, 50,000 are able to read, there are two hundred church buildings, 200 native evangelists and teachers supported by the native church, 10,000 copies of the New Testament in circulation, and the people so eager for the Word of God, that they will give a week's wages for a copy, and the demand cannot be supplied.

It is the fact that the converts in our Foreign fields are learning to read the Scriptures for themselves and to love them that gives us hope for the future. The Bible read and studied by the people is the only guarantee of the permanency and purity of the Christian faith in any land, Otherwise the ministry becomes a priesthood, and the people fall back into a condition of ignorance and superstition. little better than their original heathenism. Their Christianity is little more than a baptized Paganism. One has only to look at such countries as Mexico, South America, the Philippine Islands to see what a sad parody results after centuries of missionary effort, when the Scriptures are not taught to the people.

The distinctive work of the Bible Society to-day is to bring each individual into direct contact with Apostolic Christianity as presented to us in the New Testament—to have each person read for himself the wonderful words of Jesus, which are spirit and life.

REV. F. H. WRIGHT, the mover of the second resolution, said nothing so strongly commended the work of the Bible Society as that it is a valuable auxiliary to missionary enterprise. It is good for us to remember that the time will come when the gospel will be known all the world over. So at the end of the 19th century it is good for us to view the consummation of the work of propagating the gospel. But there is work for us yet to do. God's purposes will un-

doubtedly be accomplished, but by our disobedience and sinfulness we may hinder the work of God. Now here is the power, here is the Bible; are we going to utilize it? This century has been a century of preparation. All through this century the agents of the Bible Society have been translating the scriptures into the various languages of the world, until to day we have an open Bible of every man's tongue. This has been the preparation. Now, what is our duty? There are thousands of men ready to go to the foreign mission field, but there is not money to send them. The evangelization of the world in this century depends upon the church. It has the men, the money, the means. Will it use them?

Mr. Wright believed that the time will soon come when young men will go into business as "missionaries." Unable to go to foreign fields, they will enter business life at home determined to conduct it only on missionary principles. Extracting only a living wage from their business, they will devote the remainder of the profits to the conversion of their fellow-men.

JOHN BURGOYNE expressed his great pleasure at being present. He was sure the audience had learned something new about the Bible from the addresses which had been delivered, and would hereafter love the good book more and more. The great circulation of the Bible had been due to the liberality of just such congregations as he was addressing, and he hoped this liberality would continue. He said that in Russia the government transported colporteurs and carried Bibles free, and suggested that the government of Canada might learn something, in this respect, from the much despised Russia. The week of prayer subject for the day was for the revival of missionary spirit, which harmonized with the purpose of the Bible Society meetings. This Christian Bible was the first complete book printed, and since that time there has never been an hour in which a Bible was not on the press, being printed. As the purest and best water came from deep down in the rock, so to appreciate the value of God's word we must dig deep down into it, and get the water of life direct from the heart of God himself. Mr. Burgoyne was glad a layman had the opportunity to

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second the resolution and say amen to the words of three clergymen. He felt great satisfaction to stand up as one of the congregation and say, "these are our sentiments."

If we give in aid of this great work we shall receive the reward and blessing. Prayer, he thought, is not complete without giving. The large attendance at the meeting was an earnest of the increased interest in the work of the Bible Society.

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. H. H. MACPHERSON.

A meeting, fairly attended, was also held in Kaye street church, and presided over by Rev. Mr. Hockin, the pastor, and was addressed by Revs. J. McMillan, A. C. Chute, N. I. Perry, and Capt. Winn, R. E., all of whom earnestly advocated the claims of the Bible Society. As no report of their addresses was furnished, we are unable to give them.



AGENT'S REPORT.

To the President and Committee of the Nova Scotia Bible Society:

GENTLEMEN,—I began my visitation of the Branches on March 16th, taking with me the Kalopticon and views descriptive of the history of the Bible and Bible Society achievements. I continued to use the lantern until I made a full circuit of the Branches not similarly served last year. I may again, before the close of this year, adopt the same method of illustrating Bible work, if I succeed in obtaining a full set of views suitable to my object. Although these lantern lectures were everywhere appreciated, it would not be judicious to continue them regularly from year to year, —perhaps even alternate years would be too frequent for the best form of visitation work.

My first meeting was at Truro, and was fairly attended, notwithstanding three other meetings and a flaringly advertised concert were the attractions on the same night. Collection \$3.09. On calling there again in December, I learned that there was a good gathering at the annual meeting, at which the esteemed President and some ministers of the town did good platform service, the result of which materialized in our treasury. \$186.49 is the best tribute ever offered by Truro to the Bible Society.

Although the following day was very stormy, and the streets deep with mud, we had a good meeting at Lower Stewiacke. Collection \$2.50. Since then your treasurer received \$17 from that little village.

The next three days I was engaged at South Maitland, Maitland and Selma. The plate collections were \$2.65, \$2.65 and \$3.01, which, added to my personal canvass of that Branch, made \$29.68.

At Noel I had a small meeting. Collection \$1.93, and subscription of O. & E. O'Brien \$5. At the present writing no further returns have appeared from that place.

On Monday, 23rd, at Walton. The plate collection of \$2.86, and collectors' cards \$7.90, were handed me. This from Walton shows well.

At Chevaree meeting I was handed plate collection, \$3.14, and collectors' cards, \$13.43. At Somerville—another place in this Branch—I obtained \$4.51, making in all \$21.08. For this good gift, which is double that of last year, I thank our kind friends on that pretty road by the sea.

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At Burlington meeting I received \$2.59. No further contributions have appeared.

At my meeting in the Presbyterian church, Newport station, I received the plate collection, \$4.75.

On 1st April I had a small meeting at Shubenacadie. Collection, \$1.75, and by personal canvass, \$8.50. We have a few names still in Shubenacadie—names which unfailingly appear in our list of subscribers; if these few kind friends would only adopt our ideal line of work, and appoint collectors, thrice the above sum could be annually raised. We have a committee there; will two or three Christian Endeavorers respond to this suggestion, and, under the committee's direction, canvass the district. This work, if cheerfully undertaken, will prove a source of blessing to collector and contributor. I am told that the name of the place means "abounding in nuts." May it also abound in grace and good work—furnishing the bread of life—the word of God—to those perishing for lack of this knowledge.

Although the roads were now at their worst, we had fair meetings at Middle Musquodoboit and Elmsvale. The collections were \$1.68 and \$1.01. As yet I have not heard the result of the annual canvass.

I was at Upper Musquodoboit on Saturday night and Sunday morning, at Dean Settlement on Sunday afternoon and Monday night. The collections there were \$1.32 and \$2.33, and were afterwards supplemented by collectors' lists \$7.77—in all \$11.42. Mr. James Creelman kindly met me at the latter place and conveyed me to his home at Newton Mills, where I had a meeting and received 93 cents. Since then we have received from this good Branch of Springside \$21.52. By some mistake the last year's contribution, remitted to Halifax on January 9th, 1896, did not appear in our printed Report.

At Upper Stewiacke Village I received \$1.59 and collector's list with \$28.16, and since then they sent to Halifax \$29.75.

We had a good meeting at Middle Stewiacke on the 9th. Collection \$2.30, and subscription lists of \$25.83—in all \$28.13. The following night at Brookfield the meeting was fair. Collection \$2.25, and your treasurer lately received \$10.75—in all \$13. This shows quite an advance from Brookfield, and that if our friends there are few they are liberal; indeed the whole Stewiacke Valley has been a staunch supporter of the Bible Society from the first year of its history, yielding annually over one hundred dollars.

I was at Onslow and Belmont on Saturday, Sunday and Monday, and received \$20.50 as the annual offering of the Presbyterian congregation there. Ever since my first visit there our cause has been well sustained, and your agent most generously treated.

At Oxford we had a good meeting at which I received \$4.82, and also \$5 from Mr. Wells as his annual subscription. I hope that this sum will be amply supplemented by the collectors of that busy village. At Pugwash meeting I obtained \$3.10.

I held two meetings in Wallace Branch and received \$6.70, and you have lately received \$36.08—in all \$42.78. This is a commendable advance of about 50 per cent. over last year's gift.

At Tatamagouche, owing to the over-heated hall and packed audience, my lantern views were a failure, but the collection was \$5.

River John meeting gave \$2.93, and the collectors have since then remitted you \$15.53—in all \$18.46. I think that this is the first canvass made by that Branch. I hope that our friends there will continue the work thus begun, and rejoice in the good-fellowship of our world-wide evangelistic society.

I held three meetings at Merigomish and vicinity, and received \$8.34, but failed in obtaining meetings at New Glasgow and Ferrona.

We had a very small meeting at St. Paul's (Sunny Brae Branch). Collection 78 cents. This Branch remitted last winter \$17.50, but too late for our Report. I hope its gift this year will be in time.

We held two good meetings at Springville and Bridgeville. Collection at the latter place was \$2. Since then that good Branch has remitted you \$28.75—in all \$30.75. From Sunny Brae to Ferrona, the East River valley of Pictou is sweetly picturesque to the eye, hospitable to your agent, and liberal to our cause.

On Friday, 1st May, I held a meeting at Middle River, on Saturday at Glengarry, on Sunday in St. Columba Kirk, and on Monday in the Presbyterian Church at Hopewell. The plate collections were \$7.79, and I subsequently received \$13.42—in all \$21.21 from the Hopewell Branch. Here I wish to record my indebtedness to the friends in Hopewell for their many kindnesses shewn me since my first visit, and their readiness of response to my appeal.

I held a meeting at Stellarton and received \$3.70. There I had the pleasure of organizing a Branch. I was informed that some good people there had occasionally contributed to the New Glasgow Auxiliary. On the 21st last March the Sharon Presbyterian Church remitted your Treasurer \$17.06. When you next hear from Stellarton you will, I trust, rejoice in a gift worthy of the united Protestant population of that town.

I tried to obtain a meeting at Westville, but the times were not propitious—will try again.

I held two meetings at Green Hill and Durham. The collections, about \$4, I left to be remitted to the Treasurer of Pictou Auxiliary, of which these places are branches.

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On Sunday I addressed meetings at Scotsburn, Millville and Plainville. One of these places also contributes to Pictou Auxiliary. I received \$6.55 at Scotsburn and \$5.25 at Plainfield.

On Monday, 11th, I addressed a meeting in Amherst, received \$5.10 and also \$5.10 with a collector's card, in all \$10.20. This finished my first trip of two months of the season in Nova Scotia.

After some work in New Brunswick, I resumed my travels in Nova Scotia on August 6th, holding meetings and collecting at Glace Bay, Bridgeport, Reserve Mines, Sydney, North Sydney, Sydney Mines, Baddeck, St Peters, Whycomagh, Mabou, Port Hood, Hawkesbury, West Bay, Guysboro, Canso, Antigonish and Lochaber. My collections at meetings and by personal canvass during this trip, which appear in due form in the contributors' list, amounted to \$303.40. My collections at Sydney and North Sydney were much less than on the previous year. Business at Sydney was very dull, and I missed some good old supporters at North Sydney, at other places I was fairly successful, but everywhere I found a hearty welcome, and such generous treatment as any well accredited collector for a Christian mission is sure to obtain in Cape Breton. Elsewhere I have heard that countenances fell and heads dodged behind screens at the approach of a collector. Not so in my experience of Cape Breton. There, all have the courage of their convictions, meet one half way with a smile and ready hand, for they know the Bible Society to be the greatest philanthropy on earth, and are glad to be sharers in its work. On this trip, without incurring great expense, I was unable to visit Glenelg and Sherbrooke, but our friends there have again responded to my written appeal, as our list bears testimony.

My last trip in Nova Scotia began on October 19th. On the 20th we had a good meeting in Dartmouth and a plate collection of \$4.62, which added to the collectors canvass make a grand total of \$188.52, a gift even greater than that of last year. Truly the ladies of Dartmouth who manage their Branch merit our deepest thanks for this labor of love so cheerfully undertaken from year to year. Their work is indeed beyond praise, and while they do not look for any expression of our gratitude—for they know how much they are esteemed—would it not be well if the Christian ladies of Halifax would observe the success of their sisters across the harbor, and think of what transcendent possibilities could be achieved in their capital city of 40,000 population. If little Dartmouth can gather up almost \$200 for the Bible Society, what a grand sum might be contributed, by the same method, in the rich and populous city of Halifax.

We had a fair meeting in the Presbyterian Church at Brooklyn (Newport Branch), collection \$1.64. I am glad to see again the hand of its active secretary in its large subscription list of over \$43. Every family in that district seems to contribute to our cause.

The meeting at Windsor was smaller than expected. Collection \$2.56. I have not heard whether that Committee has since accomplished a canvass of the town. On account of a heavy storm when at Horton we had no meeting.

We had a good meeting in the Baptist Church at Wolfville. The plate collection and my canvass of that town realized \$25.06.

Church Street Branch has again done well, and our thanks are again due to Mrs. E. Chase and the esteemed collector for their deep interest manifested annually in our cause.

Our good President and friends at Canning have again gladdened our hearts with a large contribution, but as yet I have not heard from Canard or Kentville.

In little Somerset our friends are few, but their gifts are good.

Our esteemed collector at Berwick deeply deplores that his solicitations were not more liberally responded to.

Aylesford still keeps up her wonted contributions.

Middleton shews a falling off.

Two families in Lawrencetown form our constituency there, and are unailing in their good annual gift.

The meeting at Bridgetown was fair and the contribution the best ever made for our cause in that nice little town. Deep indeed is our gratitude to Mr. FitzRandolph for his devotion to the Bible Society. \$53.48 is this year's token of Bridgetown sympathy.

At Round Hill, since my last report, our Society lost a good friend in the death of Mr. James Fullerton. His aid was invaluable, his platform service inspiring, while the hospitalities were to me most cheering. The lady collectors, by assiduous effort, have gathered \$23.80—a goodly sum for this scattered district.

Annapolis Royal has not been so queenly in her *largesse* this year as in the past; may she be inspired to nobler effort henceforth by the achievements of her rural neighbor to the east.

The collection at Digby meeting added to Mrs. England's subscription list, amounted to \$15. If that kind lady could obtain some co-laborers from the ranks of the various churches, the annual contribution might be greatly enlarged.

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From an unavoidable cause there was no meeting at Weymouth, but the esteemed President of that Branch extended to me his wonted hospitality, and has remitted to your Treasurer the annual contribution, which is about double the value of that of last year.

In Yarmouth I collected \$54.97, and the Ladies Association remitted you \$148.18. Business there was very dull and money scarce.

I addressed two meetings on Sunday at Barrington, and received \$1.63. Since then Mr Arnold Doane kindly collected and remitted to you \$8.08. Barrington could do better than this.

At Port LaTour I obtained \$6.28 contribution.

I was delighted to see such a large and representative meeting at Shelburne. The Rev. A. D. Morton had kindly led the way in this advanced movement, secured platform service from every minister of the town, and obtained a thorough canvass of town and adjacent settlements which realized \$39.63. It was there decided that about half of this sum should be invested in Bibles for the local depository.

Our meeting at Liverpool was very small.

At Mahone Bay we had a full house, and a profitable meeting. Our receipts from that Branch is the best on record, namely, \$29.47.

When planning my route in this district I had hoped to reach Lunenburg on Saturday morning, but it was evening when I arrived. My meeting was arranged for Sunday night in the Methodist Church at the close of usual service, and only a few from the other churches came in. Having to leave by daybreak for La Have the following morning, I had too little time to see our friends in Lunenburg. I obtained from the Treasurer \$80. This is \$21 less than last year, and doubtless is chiefly due to the scarcity of money at that time. The fish catch was abundant, but the exceedingly wet weather prevented their due preparation for market.

Arrangements were made for two meetings in La Have Branch, but owing to a heavy rainstorm only one was held. The subscription, which is an advance of last year, shews that every section of the Branch was well canvassed.

New Dublin has again done well for the cause. By the death of Mrs. H. Crawford, my kind hostess there in former years, and the still dangerous condition of her daughter during my visit, that shore seemed to me as under a strange and gloomy cloud. Our meeting was on this occasion held at the upper end of the district. I was kindly welcomed at the Church of England Rectory, and conveyed by the Rev. K. Richardson on the following very cold day to Bridgewater.

We had a splendid meeting in the Lutheran Church at Bridgewater. All the ministers of the town did good platform service, the music of the orchestra was classic and thrilling, and the plate collection was \$10.32. This sum added to the good subscription list gave us \$71.38—a good advance on that of last year, and a grand gift during a dull season.

On December 2nd, I was at Acadia Mines and obtained the plate collection of \$6.66, and two contributions—in all \$17.66. In this place we have one of the most liberal supporters in Nova Scotia.

Our Springhill meeting was good. Collection \$3.87, and subscription list later on \$35.36.

At Parrsboro I obtained, chiefly by canvass, \$17.82; at Five Islands, \$5.84, and at Economy, \$2.67. Since then you have received from Economy \$17.22. At this place, since my last visit, our society has lost, in the death of Mr George Murray, a president and life-long friend.

At two meetings in Bass River and Portauisque Branch I obtained \$3.59 and 63 cents—\$4.22. From the Bass River district we have since received \$16.57, and perhaps this will be supplemented by a gift from Portauisque.

I held three meetings in Folleigh Branch, at which I received \$4.47, and \$1 from Uriah Morrison. I hope that the result of promised canvass may be remitted soon.

Great Village shows an increase and will likely continue to do so.

On 21st and 22nd I addressed two meetings in Clifton Branch. The plate collections were \$5.55. A canvass of the district was promised later on.

On January 31st, at River Hebert, I addressed the Baptist congregation in the morning and the Presbyterian in the afternoon, and received respectively \$3.67 and \$6.05—in all \$9.72.

I did not obtain a meeting at Milford, but the Presbyterian congregation there sent your Treasurer their offering of \$12.97.

My efforts to obtain a meeting in Amherst in December or January proved futile. I will avail myself of the first favorable opportunity for a meeting, and for a personal canvass of that town.

This closes the record of my travels through Nova Scotia during the year. My financial account in due form was rendered some time ago to the treasurer, and the full result of the year's work can be better gathered from the contributors' list, which I now forward duly prepared for the printer's hand. To myself some of these figures are cheering, for they tell of *sacrifices* made by the poor, that through their offerings the travail of the Redeemer's soul may be

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brought into the fold. On the other hand, many of these subscriptions are disheartening, for they bear sad witness of much withholding of what could not benefit the withholder—which could have been better spared than kept. The world is yet largely in darkness and spiritual destitution. 'Tis strange that one has to plead so strenuously with Christians in affluence, on behalf of the blind and diseased in soul—plead that those groping in darkness may, through the Bible in their own mother tongue, be led to Him who is the light and life of men—the only Saviour of our sin-stained world. Still, and notwithstanding the pain under such reflections, I have very great pleasure in the prosecution of this work committed to me, for it is good. I hope that my future efforts in this agency may be more highly blessed in future than in the past—that I may soon see the day when every town and village, every church and home will heartily support this society which so freely renders indispensable aid to every Protestant mission at home and abroad.

Extracts from Abstract of Report of Parent Society.

FRANCE, ITALY, PORTUGAL and SPAIN. These may best be taken together; their 92,000,000 of population have prevailing community of blood, and still more they have community of faith. And the aspect of the year, which is common to all, and which is perhaps the most notable of all others, as we see it from the standpoint of the Society's Agents, is the increased activity of Romanism—one might almost say its revival. In France M. Monod notices it most evidently in the political sphere; in Spain, and still more in Italy, it is seen in new pilgrimages, in missions and processions, in the rehabilitation of neglected saints, in a system of Church socialism which includes every aspect of popular life. To this must be attributed to some extent, though not exclusively, the somewhat lower circulation of Scriptures in the Latin countries—for every clerical movement is instinctively anti-Biblical—and the 421,000 copies of 1894 have been reduced to 375,000 in 1895. In Spain, however, there has been a noteworthy increase from 51,000 to 75,000 copies. But there are other aspects of the case, and the policy which stirs to ecclesiastical activities is no indirect testimony to the influence of the patient and devoted men who year after year in cities, in the quiet villages, among the cottages of the people, are placing in their hands the Word of God. It is indeed the Bible,—read in silence, suggestive of new impulses, which often explains so much we cannot otherwise understand. “*I am leaving the Church of Rome,*” writes an ecclesiastic quoted by M. Monod, “*not by the door of scepticism, but because I have found in Jesus Christ my only Saviour and Mediator. I have a conviction that the pure Gospel alone can save the world, and that the Church of Rome cannot, without committing suicide, give the Gospel to the people*” But, whatever may be the motive of a Romanist revival, the spirit which sustains the colporteurs and inspires the more serious minds of the people is of a far higher kind. There is indeed nothing more tender, nothing more beautiful, than the incidents which form the common material of the inner history of the Society's work, whether in France or Italy or Spain. “We want the religion of the Gospel, not of the priests—hat is a very common saying,” writes one of the men at work in the South of France, and many an incident confirms the sincerity and the prevalence of the wistful complaint. Nor could there be any more unfortunate mistake than to interpret the increased opposition or the temporary lowering of circulation in the direction of despondency. “I think,” writes Signor Meille, “That, in spite of somewhat diminished issues, the past year has seen a most comforting progress in the Society's work in Italy.” Mr. Stewart concludes his report of the Peninsula in an expression of delight for the “cloud of witnesses that testify, and the harmonious message which comes from many mouths, of the deep impression which is

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being made by the Word of God, and the great salvation which is being received by many." And M. Monod, taking the longer retrospect of the twenty-five years of his service, sums up the review in words of peculiar significance:—"Every day of my life I am more and more persuaded of the great importance of our work, and convinced that, amidst all the perplexing variety of means offered for the elevation of mankind, there is nothing to be compared with the wonderful Gospel message which it is our high privilege to be engaged in putting into the hands of the people."

From these Latin countries let us pass to those of the Teutonic races, and with GERMANY in this review may be united AUSTRIA-HUNGARY. When we have entered Germany we are in the Homeland of the Reformation and of the origin of modern Missions: almost every name is associated with the deeper life and the history of Christianity; and in the Austrian Agency Moravia and Bohemia, if suggestive of times of persecution, recall much more distinctly many of the most inspiring memories. But although among the 93,000,000 of the united populations the circulation of Scriptures for last-year has approached a million—it has been over 851,000—Mr. Morrison warns us that even in regard to Germany many years must elapse before the Bible Societies at work there can say that they possess the land. In the year 1895, the total circulation of all the Societies amounted to 692,000: to this total the British and Foreign Bible Society contributed 245,000, and on both sides there has been a considerable increase. "Yet, after all, this represents an average circulation of 13 copies to the 1000, while in Switzerland, where the Cantonal Societies are nobly pursuing their work, the average is 25. And if, leaving the Protestant population, we compare issues to the Roman Catholic we find that among them not quite 5 copies per thousand are circulated. Among this population the Bible Society is practically the only agency at work, and while its activities are yearly being increased it is evident, how much yet remains to be done."

In the Austro-Hungarian Agency the ratio of average circulation is naturally much lower than in the north: and for a moment the mass of work to be overtaken may seem to overshadow that which has already been done. But if, even for a moment, any sense of depression touches the spirit it must be moved by a study of the pages of Mr. Millard's unique report. Unique it may surely be said to be, for it has the rare peculiarity that, while in almost every section the writer enumerates reasons for discouragement, the actual sense of discouragement is never felt. So sensitive is his kindly spiritual temper to the value of spiritual success, and so rich and redolent are his chapters with instances of developing Christian work and individual renewal, that there is no cloud in the flood of sunlight, no interruption in the consensus of happy gratitude. The secret of the charm of Mr. Millard's report is less the profusion of the inspiring stories with which the colporteurs furnish him than the way in which he realizes the immense value of the individual. It is indeed one of those open

secrets which all might have learned long ago from the words that tell us that there is joy in Heaven—and that surely is the native land of joy—over *one* sinner that repenteth,

Leaving the Latin and Germanic countries, let us turn to those where the dominant faith is that of Mohammed. In this group may be included not only the TURKISH AGENCY and that of EGYPT with SYRIA and PALESTINE, but also the PERSIAN, and—along the Mediterranean coasts—those of MOROCCO and ALGERIA.

Islam is a declining and retreating power, but it is significant that it still possesses the countries which it won and dominated in its prime. In the later Middle Age it was the mistress of Palestine: it had subdued Antioch, that had once stretched its Patriarchate over the East and fostered churches as far as the Wall of China; it had silenced the Christian schools of Alexandria; Hippo and Carthage and Tagaste and every sacred spot of the African Church, the memories of Augustine, of Alypius, of Cyprian and Tertullian, of Monica and Perpetua—the regions that had been hallowed by innumerable martyrs, were all overrun by the teachers of Mohammadanism. Even in Europe Christianity was assailed, and the cry of the Muezzin was heard from a hundred minarets in the city where Chrysostom preached to Christian Emperors. Besides these there was Arabia, and especially there was Persia, with its mediaeval universities from which the culture and the literary influences of Mohammadanism extended over the civilized world.

But all these countries are now centres of the Society's activities; in all of them the Scriptures, in polyglot variety, are being freely circulated, and from all of them, within this latest year, comes a testimony—clearer from some, less emphatic from others—but distinct in its unanimous agreement, that never has the Mohammadan mind been more open to read the Evangel than now, or more ready to respect the claims of the Son of God.

The total population of these Mohammadan countries is about 50,000,000, and the total circulation of Scriptures from the various centres during 1895 has been close upon 100,000 copies. This number, in one sense comparatively small, is in another inspiringly large. How different were the returns but a quarter of a century since! And it is not merely a circulation which will most deeply encourage those who are most fully acquainted with the various fields, but there occur in all of them most welcome evidences of the liberalizing and the saving influences of the Gospel. "The deepest interest," writes Mr. Weakley, "which attaches to the work of the Egyptian Agency"—the Agency includes along with Egypt, Arabia, Syria, and Palestine—"is the share it has in the opening of a new chapter in the history of the peoples whose spiritual life has been well nigh extinguished by the rise and rule of Islam. The restoration of the Word of God as a living voice to these lands, speaking to all men, whether Muslim or Christian, is a fact of great significance and far-reaching consequences." He adds that the circulation of 28,000 copies in fifty-eight languages

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indicates not only a notable extension of the linguistic sphere, but the highest total ever reached in the Agency. In the Morocco Agency the circulation has also considerably advanced, and Mr. Mackintosh speaks with unusual hopefulness of the work he so devotedly carries on. Of Algeria and Tunis Mr. May writes with similar consciousness of steadfast gain on the slowly retreating mass of unspiritual darkness. Mr. Hodgson in his report on Persia contrasts the 2,000 copies of five years ago with the circulation approaching 10 000 of to-day, and, beginning with the old religion of Mesopotamia, where the nomad Arabs "pitch their tents on the debris of forgotten empires," passing southward by the Bassorah of the Arabian Nights to Bushire, thence climbing the mountain stairs of the Khotals to Shiraz and Isfahan, bids us notice at every step evidence of encouraging spiritual advance. The report from the Turkish Agency is Dr. Thomson's last; he can announce an increased circulation, a growing liberality of thought, many instances of success: the brightest pages are perhaps those which describe the Society's work in Smyrna—once the home of the Apostle John, and in those Ionian islands from one of which he watched the panoranic vision of world-shaking conflicts and the victory of the Lamb of God.

To pass from the lands of Mohammadanism,—where to-day is shadowed by the despair of yesterday, to the RUSSIAN EMPIRE,—where, from east to west, to day is brightened by the hope of to-morrow—is to enter another world. No one can speak with fuller or more appreciative knowledge of the Slavonic race than Mr. Morrison, and in his report for last year, he reverts, though dealing with Germany, to the scenery and the people he has left. He speaks, as he has often spoken before—as Dr. Nicolson has spoken—of "the rich, warm nature of the people,—with their mysterious musings and imaginings which must yet powerfully affect the West: of the illimitable steppes, the new wealthy lands, and, further east, the great mountains and their silent valleys, with the remnants of ancient races bordering their slopes, and civilizations older than history again reviving and preparing to play their part in the world and history of to day." With hardly less enthusiasm Mr. Davidson writes of the immense Siberian region now forming the Agency under his care—of the the astonishing progress which is being made—the ever-widening flood of immigration—the opening up of the natural treasures of the country. Even more significant is the way in which he describes the measures which are being adopted for the education—and specially for the spirital education—of the new populations: of the genial temper of the common people among whom the Colporteurs labor; and especially of the practical expressions of goodwill to the Bible Society and its work which he has everywhere received from bishops, from civil governors, and not less from steamship proprietors and influential private friends. These most welcome accounts are repeated within his own great Western Agency by Dr. Nicolson. The circulation in both the Agencies for the year has considerably increased on that of 1894: and that was more than

half a million copies, or almost one-seventh of the entire circulation of the Society. The significance of these pleasant statistics is greatly emphasized by what Mr. Morrison incidentally says about the Russian circulation:—"It is certain that there are not half so many readers in Russia as in Germany, and yet the circulation of the Scriptures of that vast land, where the means of communication are so imperfect and the distances so enormous almost equals that effected in Germany." With one copy in every seven issued by the Society going to Russia,—with a people so remarkably susceptible of spiritual truth,—with the courteous co-operation and encouragements which everywhere welcome the work of circulation of the Word of God—there are surely hopes of no usual kind to be entertained about the future of this great empire.

Eastward and towards the south from Russia lie two of the most potential of all the Society's Agencies; and the reports of 1895 are the turning of that leaf which so many feared to anticipate of the spiritual history of CHINA and JAPAN. With a war so wide and devastating, so intense in its passion, so unexpectedly involved with political interests of both east and west, it might not unreasonably be feared that the page when turned might be darkly filled with accounts of religious hatred even more bitter—of doors closed to Christian entrance—of the progress of the kingdom of peace delayed for generations. But in this, as in so many other cases, fear has been disappointed, and hope has been more than fulfilled. Round some of the very darkest scenes of loss and sorrow there has sprung up, like the bloom and sweetness of flowers on a grave, a strange tenderness of popular feeling: already the honeycomb has been tasted which came from the skeleton of Death. In China the issues have been exceptionally large, and the circulation, though naturally lessened as regards the field of war, remarkably high, and—"what is still more interesting," writes Mr. Bondfield—"for many years we have seldom, if ever, had so many cases of real blessing, so many tokens to cheer and encourage." One of the cases to which Mr. Bondfield perhaps refers is the formation of a Native Book Lending Society at Canton, which supports its own agents—nine in number—which has carried out a visitation of 4,000 villages and 5,000 schools, and put into circulation, in a most effective way, many copies of the Scriptures. It has been said that "for three and twenty centuries Confucius has been the friend and guide of one-third of the human race," but there are signs, which the most casual reader cannot misunderstand, that the Mongolian race is coming under the influence of another Teacher as much higher and wiser, as He has become, to multitudes of those who have found Him, more unspeakably dear.

From Japan the report of the year is, if possible, more inspiring—there is pervading it a sense of half-expressed, half-silent wonder at the events which its own pages describe. The circulation, which in 1894 was 114,000, has more than doubled: the returns for last year have risen to a quarter of a million. Of this number one-half has passed by special grant into the hands of soldiers and sailors,

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and 100,000 copies for free circulation otherwise, but the good-will of the authorities, who at once permitted and encouraged the distribution, and the readiness with which the copies were received, is much more significant than their actual amount. It will be extremely interesting to watch how far the normal work will be influenced by circumstances so exceptional, but, whatever may be the future of the Bible in Japan—and all Christian history is more or less intermittent in its development—nothing can alter the past, or take away the hope that so liberal a sowing of the Word of God will be heard of with rejoicing, though after many days.

With the Chinese and Japanese reports, which everywhere allude to war, the accounts from INDIA are in almost marked contrast—they describe a year of quiet work, of gradual and undisturbed progress: the colporteur has pursued his village tours as before; the translators have carried their revisions a stage further; the missionary has observed with deepened pleasure the entrance of new disciples into the fellowship of Christ, and learned, as he has long been taught to expect, that many have received their first impulse from a gospel read in silence, with no teacher to explain its strangely attractive mysteries, which—mysteries though they seemed to the intellect—had made themselves somehow comprehensible to the heart. Perhaps the most interesting part of Scripture circulation in India is that among the graduates of the universities—those young professional men who so easily make shipwreck of their gifts and opportunities, but who, when consecrated by a higher learning, are so sure to become centres of deep and wide influence for good. Of this important movement Mr. Wynkoop, in connection with the Allahabad Auxiliary, gives many memorable facts. But, in whatever way carried forward, the advance of Bible knowledge is irresistibly sure, and the ascendancy of Christian truth incontestably certain. The past religious history of the Hindu peoples shows that they have passed through many changes and have been deeply influenced by each. The tides of thought which are seen in the Vedas and the Puranas, in Buddhism and Brahmanism, have left permanent results behind them, but they have ebbed as well as flowed; and it cannot be seriously doubted that, with the ocean voice and the ocean fullness and power, another tide drawn from a deeper source is rising on the shore. With the subtle refinement of his race a leading Hindu scholar recently said that, while he could not say that Christianity had at all conquered India, or that in its western form it would ever conquer it, he dared to say that Christ had conquered India already. The balanced antithesis may seem more rhetorical than seriously true, but there are evidences to which the Bible Society Reports of every succeeding year are a remarkable contribution, that the time is conceivably near when the innumerable sects of India shall have at last become of one mind, and a population from the Himalayas to Cape Comorin shall have accepted Christ.

From India the transition is natural to MALAYSIA, and along with the Malaysia Islands may be reckoned MADAGASCAR, for the

dominant race there also is of Malay blood. It was in Sumatra and Java that the early Dutch settlers made the strange experiment of Christianising the natives by force, and till the jungle swallowed them, there were once hundreds of churches and a nominally Christian population approaching half a million. The unhappy method has long since been discredited, and it is on far different lines that Mr. Haffenden, with his band of young English Sub-Agents and his native colporteurs, seeks to commend the gospel. He has often emphasized the receptiveness of the Malay character, and he has approached it only by the persuasiveness of the message of divine love. There are few more interesting Agencies than this—few narratives are more full of life and colour than those despatched from Singapore. The year has been, as every one hitherto has been, more or less one of encouragement; though, principally from the weakness of the European staff, the circulation has been considerably lessened. But it can hardly be doubted that during the current year the deficiency will be more than made up. Miss Leader has been compelled to return home—the strain has been too heavy—but one Muhammadan Malay has been led by Bible reading to Christ, and other fruits of her exhausting labor will no doubt be reaped by other hands. In Madagascar the circulation in the northern district has been naturally less than that of 1894, but it is reassuring to know that the French rule has till now been studiously conciliatory, and that no serious obstacle has arisen to the Society's work beyond the inevitable disturbances of war.

In the Society's Report America holds no space corresponding to its extent, for the American Bible Society has long ago accepted the responsibilities of Scripture supply in the United States as well as in other parts of the great continent. But Mr. Jetto's annual letter on the ARGENTINE is the latest chapter—from his hands unfortunately the last—in a most interesting history. Mr. Dos Santos continues his unpretentious chronicles of Bible work in BRAZIL; and further north Mr. Heath, with a versatility and singleness of purpose he may well have inherited from Moravian ancestors, describes the affairs of his WEST INDIAN Agency. Among the Auxiliaries of CANADA, in Toronto and Ontario, in Quebec and Montreal, the work to a large extent resembles that carried on in England, but here also colportage is writing page after page of its engaging history; and in that great book of the human heart there are few more instructive chapters than those devoted to the fisher folk of Newfoundland, or to the new settlers who among the New Brunswick pine woods welcome the colporteur as a friend, and, reading the Gospel he has left with them, seem to hear their mother's voice again, and unite in the same devout thought both heaven and home.

A survey necessarily so rapid as this may convey some impression of the vast fields and the numberless races which the Society includes in its plan—of the largeness of its conceptions, of the many-sided influence which it exerts. As if from some "specular mount" one seems to see an outspread panorama of nations and countries, and feels the natural inspiration of the thought that

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either through its own Agencies, or aided by the Societies which have more or less directly sprung from it, the Bible Society occupies literally the whole world. But if it gain in conveying large and general impressions, such a survey necessarily fails in enumerating or emphasising details. There are a hundred matters of interest which appear only to a closer view and within a narrower field of vision, and these cannot be given here. But to one or two of them before closing, some, if the slightest, reference may be made.

First—there is the *work of the Bible-women in the Zenanas of India and the East.*

The chapter which, in the larger Report, is devoted to this subject is one of the most statistical and compendious, but at the same time one of the most strangely suggestive and impressive. From it we may learn that 473 women, already connected with various organizations, have been subsidised by the Bible Society in order that they may devote themselves to the ministry—surely one of the most beautiful and sisterly—of carrying to the listless inmates of the Zenanas that story, so certain to fascinate and inspire, of the love and the death of Christ. When they cannot read—and only too few can—the Bible-woman will read to them, and she will teach them—with what patience and painstaking she only understands—the difficult process of reading for themselves. Within the past year 1,455 native women have been thus taught: almost 30,000 have week by week been visited: 4,223 copies of the Scriptures have been given, and 14,425 copies sold. What statistics these are when translated into the real things—the new conceptions, the startling knowledge, the dawn of immeasurable hopes, the unthought-of interests, which they represent. For a thousand years that place of the Eastern home which should have been the happiest—the centre of the busiest and the gentlest concerns—has been the darkest and most uninspired. But in the kind ministry of these women, with the light in their own hearts and the Gospel in their hands, there has dawned a new and warmer season. One day the passage which was being read seemed to possess some strange and unusual power. As she listened the Hindu wife became absorbed: the dark eyes glowed—a new light shone out of them:—“*A woman wrote that!*” she exclaimed at last, “*no one but a woman could know what you say.*” But it was the story of the Magdalene who bathed our Lord's feet with her tears, and the words were those of the Son of God.

There is another subject entirely different, but with a peculiar interest of its own—it is *the relation in which the Bible Society stands to the various Missionary Societies at work in the home or the foreign field.*

During the past year there have been applications to the Bible Committee from many of these Societies for supplies of Scripture indispensable to mission work; and there have been few more welcome and more cordial letters received than those which acknowledge the grants when made. And these expressions of obligation form year to year a kind of annual supplement to detailed statements of indebtedness and explanations of mutual

co-operation, which in several instances have been already published. To study the work of the Bible Society within its own limits is sufficiently interesting: but to examine its relationships with every other active Christian agency is perhaps more interesting still, and it can hardly fail to be exceedingly pleasant. It is important to know that the Society's own work is good, but to know that upon it vitally depends the work of all the great Missionary Societies is perhaps better. And, that the Church Missionary Society owns this friendly dependence, and, along with it, the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and the Universities' Mission, and the Wesleyan Missions, and those of the Baptist and the London Missionary Societies—all this is an argument and an evidence of the most pleasant and instructive kind. The Bible Society is indeed debtor to all: for from the trained and gifted scholars of the Missionary Societies it has received, and is still receiving, many of its most admirable versions; but it is a delightful compensation that by restoring these and every other version they need into their hands it makes them all its debtors in return.

A closing reference may be made to the always interesting subject of *the Society's translations*.

An earlier section has given some details of popular interest on the subject of the year's work. We learn that several new languages—their very names are strange and unfamiliar—have been added to a long roll, and that the list of versions is now over 330. As one turns over the pages of the *Specimens* of these bewilderingly numerous forms of speech, still more when their sounds fall on the ear, one cannot but feel that the doom of the confusion of tongues still rests upon the race, and one sometimes wonders how far even the triumphs of translation have removed it, or succeeded in transmitting the single clear ray of scriptural truth through languages so darkly and so confusingly dissimilar.

There is a volume on the shelves of the Society's Library which may suggest a reply. It is the Genevian Bible of 1560.

Two hundred years ago one of the most devoted of the northern ministers was on his death-bed, and in the early morning his brother, with the Geneva Bible before him, read the tender words—"Christ is to me both in life and death advantage." The dying man reverently moved his head—"that," he said, "was a true sentence to me once before: my father spake that when he was dying." The words of the Old Version do not occur in our present one; we find instead: "For to me to live is Christ and to die is gain." The difference at first seems not inconsiderable, yet in the mighty truth to which they give expression both are substantially the same. And what is partially true of these two English versions is entirely and accurately true of all the three hundred and thirty. What a variety indeed is there—what endless differences—in vocables, in structure, and in style! Between the guttural Sechuana and the musical Italian every chord of the harp of human vocal sound might surely be exemplified. But, after all, they carry a single message, and to that they are entirely true. And that message, which in every land the people hear—each man in his own tongue wherein he was born—is that **GOD LOVES THE WORLD**

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WHEN the amounts given through the various auxiliary Branches of this Society in Nova Scotia and Cape Breton and Protestant churches of Halifax are considered, the conviction is forced on the mind that a very few only of our people are really interested in the great work of the Bible Society. From the many, therefore, who do nothing to aid us, and the many who do but little we ask the careful and prayerful consideration of this address of Major-General Hutchinson, G. B. :

It is said of Cardinal Manning that when the Rev. Fathers were on one occasion assembled around him in solemn conclave, he impressed upon them that they had to bend the will of an imperial race, meaning the English race, to the Church of Rome. They would thereby, he said, gain for their Church adherents who would give as they are taught,—liberally, increasingly, and as a privilege—for the support of the work of the Church of Rome.

Now we have to attempt to bend the will of an imperial race, not to a Church, but to Christ. We have to put before them all that the cause of Christ—which is in truth the work of this Society—demands, that they may give to it liberally, increasingly, and as a privilege. Let us consider—

Why have we not for this great work more support than we have? Is it not because the work that this Society does is not fully known to the country? We have then to tell the people everywhere that the Bible Society is not only a very efficient, large, Translating, Printing, Publishing, and Distributing Society for the spread of the Word of God, but that it is a great Missionary Society; or, as the late Mr. Spurgeon said at the Annual Meeting of this Society in Exeter Hall in 1890: "It is a Missionary Society of the first water." Tell them this Society is a mighty bulwark of Protestantism, not only in this country, but all over Europe; that it creates a demand for the Bible everywhere, and that it supplies this demand.

Do the people know that the Bible Society works, throughout European nations, amongst Romanists, non-Christians, and members of the Greek Church, and that it works, therefore, in a field where none of the great Missionary Societies of this country work?

Do they know of the work this Society has done? How it has issued the Scriptures in 333 languages, and in the last eighteen years has issued twice as many translations as were brought out during the whole of the eighteen centuries previous to 1804?

Do they know of the great unifying work done for China in the preparation of one Union Bible for all China under three forms? The importance of such a work can hardly be realized. But when it is completed the 400,000,000 of China will have one version common to them all. And this great Society will, it is hoped, yet be able to send forth its Colporteurs in far greater numbers throughout that great land.

Do they know how this Society has founded self-supporting Societies, which I call Gospel Lighthouses, in Sweden, Holland,

Norway, and Denmark--Lighthouses which not only give out light to penetrate darkness, but which give out that Divine light which dispels all mists and darkness? Do they realize the great importance attaching to the work done in Holland, inasmuch as Holland, with only 5,000,000 of people, controls in Malaysia a population of some 32,000,000 in the Islands of Java, Sumatra, Celebes, and many smaller ones?

Do they know of our army of over 500 Colporteurs who are real missionaries—if to be a missionary is to be zealous for the cause of Christ, self-sacrificing, persevering, amidst constant suffering and ill-treatment? These men bear patiently beating, imprisonment, contempt, ridicule, and all the bitter hostility of the Roman priesthood, and of ignorant, superstitious peoples, and of a sceptical press. Year by year they face bravely all the sufferings of the Arctic climate and snowstorms of Russia, to carry the Scriptures to outlying villages; often amidst snowstorms of extreme severity struggling for miles and miles—through heavy snow and bitter winds to take the Bible to certain villages.

Do they know of their difficulties and how they overcome them? How they are truly wise as serpents and harmless as doves, how they have at times persuaded even priests of Rome to buy the Bible? Do they know of the great work being done by these Colporteurs in distributing the Gospel of Christ all over Europe and of our Depots, a'so, and of the great work they have done?

Do they know of our Bible-women, a work begun thirteen years ago, as a separate branch of our great missionary work, and how their gentle, persuasive, but powerful influence, is borne witness to by Missionary Societies in the East.

Do they know how the Bible has been proved over and over again in all parts of the world, where it penetrates and a Protestant mission would not be tolerated, to be its own missionary? How, for instance, in Spain it has created, through the agency of our Colporteurs, numerous groups of readers all studying the Word of God, which hitherto had been to them an unknown book?

Do they know of the urgent need of the Gospel light in all Romanist countries? Have they realized to what an extent priests and people alike are ignorant of the one and only way of salvation and how the people receive and handle with delight, and hear with astonishment, this, to them, absolutely *new Book*, the Gospel of Christ Jesus; ay, and are anxious to try and deny themselves food and clothing to save up money to buy the Bible? Truly the Society is carrying on a great missionary work, and it takes care therefore, only to have spiritual agents for spiritual work.

Let us then be of good courage, and be "not weary in well-doing, knowing that in due time we shall reap if we faint not," and that if the work is truly vast, stupendous, unending, and the difficulties seem at times overwhelming, we have the presence of Christ to encourage us. "My grace is sufficient for thee." Let us go on with ever-increasing energy and confidence, sending forth this living water, this mighty regenerating force to all races of mankind.
