## Will the Tail Wag the Dog?

The serene quietude which had brooded over the offices of the Opposition organs was rudely shattered on Saturday, when through the columns of his personal organ, the Fishermen's Advocate, a heart-rending appeal was issued by W. F. Coaker to Sir Robert Bond to come out of his hole and lead a nondescript aggregation to which Coaker attaches the name 'Liberal-Union'. The Telegram, which has seemingly abdicated its former position of chief Opposition mouth-piece in favor of the more explosive and pushing Coaker, copied the Advocate's appeal with additions of its own, thereby betokening its willingness to play second fiddle to Coaker, and apparently acquiescing in the F. P. U. President's desire that Sir Robert Bond should occupy a like role in the proposed coalition. It is impossible to place any other construction upon the proposition made by Coaker to Sir Robert, for he specifically names the constituencies in which he expects nine of his straight Union candidates to be returned, while seven other candidates designated as Liberal-Union are also acclaimed as certain of victory.

All these rosy expectations are based upon Coaker's estimate of the sentiment which he claims to have found existing in his favor in the course of his motor-boat tour to the North. Coaker complacently invites Sir Robert Bond to attach himself to the tail of the Coaker kite, and requests a reply to the public through the columns of the Advocate. The Telegram plays the parrot to this remarkable screed and joins in urging Sir Robert Bond to form this jug-handled alliance with Coaker as a last despairing hope of defeating the Government. Thus the Telegram asks its former leader to retract his own repeatedly-expressed opinion of the President of the F. P. U. and to overlook life over a political and disastrous ally for any politician to adopt.

It will be interesting to see if Sir Robert Bond listens to the voice of the charmers and allows himself to be made the appendage to the manufactured boom which Coaker has been sedulously engineering for the past three years. Any combination with Coaker can have but one result, and that would be the annihilation of the so-called Liberal party and the relegation of its leader and chief members.—Daily News.

### The Shortcomings of Jimmy

### Thaw Escapes

(Matthewan, Aug. 18.)

Harry K. Thaw, slayer of Stanford White, escaped from the hospital for criminal insane at 7.45 this morning. The dash for liberty was through an open gate, and then a dash for the open doorway of a powerful auto which stood quivering outside. In a flight like a rocket for the Connecticut State line, 30 miles away, he accomplished his escape. To-night he is still at large, and the hospital authorities feel certain he is outside the State. Once beyond the boundaries he is free. Only months, perhaps of litigation can bring him back to Matthewan, and then only in the event he is adjudged insane in the State to which he has fled.

Five confederates manned the car in which Thaw escaped and the big black Limousine which trailed it past the asylum gate. The hospital authorities believe Thaw fled to the shore Long Island Sound, boarded a yacht waiting with steam up to rush him to Europe. A reward of \$500 for Thaw's apprehension has been offered by Dr. Keith, Superintendent of the Asylum. Howard H. Barnum, attendant at the gate, past whom Thaw flashed in his break for freedom, is under arrest. Other arrests are expected to follow the rigid investigation, begun by Dr. Keith. Shades were drawn in the dormitories. The inmates were getting their second sleep when Thaw left his room in the morning. He was fully dressed. A milkman's cart was rumbling along the outside, as he walked through the store room into the outer court or yard of the asylum grounds. Barnum, the gate attendant at the rear gate, was packing back and forth when Thaw closed the store room door behind him. He apparently did not grasp the significance of Thaw's early rising. A 08 horse power auto followed by a limousine also black, loaded lazily along the road as the milkman drew near the gate. Thaw standing a few feet away apparently unconcerned waiting till Barnum unlocked the gate and swung wide to let the milkman enter; at the same time two cars drew upon the further side of the road opposite the gate. The touring car stood still, its engine throbbing. As Barnum stepped aside for the milkman to pass into the grounds, he heard the gravel crunch beneath Thaw's feet. Looking up he saw the madman flash past him with the speed of the wind straight for the waiting car. With a stout Barnum started in pursuit, but a flying leap landed Thaw safe within the car. They were throwing up a cloud of dust before he had gone twenty feet. Down the roadway dashed in a white cloud of dust, spread over their trail.

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### All Lost Money

Victoria Sports bet on Rev. J. E. Starr making Retort.



**At Whitbourne**  
 Coaker Visits Sir Robert

The Telegram is authority for the statement that Mr. Coaker took the 8.45 train out of St. John's en route to Whitbourne on Monday morning last. The object of his visit was to call on Sir Robert Bond and see if he could induce him to ally himself with the Union Party and lead what the Advocate is pleased to call a Liberal Union Party. Later the Telegram announced that Mr. Coaker arrived at Whitbourne safely, knocked at the Incurruptible Commoner's door and was graciously received by the ex Premier. We are not told if there were any embraces or kissing, but it is just possible that there were, in view of the numerous rumors in circulation regarding Sir Robert's attitude to William F.

Mr. Coaker took lunch with Sir Robert and was afterwards shown around the farm, returning to St. John's by the night train.

Dr. Lloyd announces that the visit was a pleasant one, and that some announcement would be forthcoming within a few days. In view of the efforts that Lloyd and Coaker have been making to induce the ex-Premier to LEAD the opponents of the present government, it may be interesting to note what Coaker's opinion of Sir Robert Bond was some time ago. He (Coaker) published the following in the Paper, the Advocate, in 1910:

"While we are compelled to condemn the regard to their own pensions, we must observe that words sinners respecting pensions. Bond is much blacker. Very little is expected from Morris except at the point of the bayonet, but nothing is expected from Bond, FOR HIS NINE YEARS OF RULE PROVED HIM TO BE COMPLETELY INCAPABLE OF IMPROVING THE FISHERMEN'S CONDITION. If the Opposition Party wishes to oust Morris from power they must find a new leader, for unless this is done Morris will hang on for many years. Had Morris remained in Newfoundland and continued to be a supporter of the Tory Party, a change of Government would never arrive. The Opposition Party is in the same position as the Tory Party was for years under Morris's leadership. A change of leaders brought defeat to Bond. A change of leaders will be required to defeat Morris. Who the leader will be is hard to say now. He is a long way from sight at present. No doubt opportunity will find the man."
