Italy on the Brink of War

Everything points at this writing to a rupture between Italy and Austria, and by the time we go to press we expect to hear that Italy has declared war. Austria, and Italy have asked the United States to look after their diplomatic interests in Vienna and Rome; troops are being massed on the Italian frontier; the Austrian and German Consul Generals have left Rome, and war is imminent.

WAR NEWS

The British forces have captured the east bank of the Canal, the Germans bringing up large bodies of men and artillery.



HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

SYNOPSIS

Wednesday, April 21st.

The House met at 8 p.m. pursuant to adjournment.

Various members tabled documents, gave notice of questions, etc.

Bill to amend the Customs Act, 1898, was read the third time and passed.

Mr. HICKMAN moved the House into Committee of the Whole to consider the following Resolutions: (1) That the importation and sale of spirituous liquors and wines be prohibited; (2) that the manufacture in the Colony of spirituous liquors and wines be prohibited. He said that temperance was making progress throughout the world; Russia and Sweden were totally prohibitive, and even in England it was being talked about. It was said that to prohibit the liquor traffic would interfere with the liberty of the subject; but all the trouble that might be caused by stepping this trade, would not compare with the misery caused to a wife and family by a drunken husband. It was drink which made most of our insane, criminals, and paupers. It was a curse and a hindrance to every class and trade in the community. We would be told that we could not afford to do without this revenue; but, if we could not run the country without liquor revenue, we had better give the country up. As a matter of fact, we would lose nothing, because our people's earning power would be increased. Our drink bill to-day was one and a quarter million dollars. How much would that buy if spent on prevention? Crime, insanity, and disease would all diminish, and our expense with them, if drink were done away with. He believed, although he was not a teetotaler himself, that prohibition would make Newfoundland a new country.

Mr. MORRIS seconded the resolution.

Hon. Mr. EMMISON opposed the resolution. The House had no money date from the people to introduce so drastic a measure. He did not say he was against prohibition; but, until the people had voted on the matter, and until a time when we were in a better financial position, the matter had better be let stand. He quite agreed with much that Mr. Hickman had said.

There was not the slightest doubt that the majority in this country were crying out for this legislation.

Mr. EMMISON said there was no need to discuss the evils of strong drink; everybody had been agreed on that for many years past. It was only for the House to satisfy itself how best to cut out this cancer. But we must not lose our heads; we must remember everybody's rights and the public views. It must be remembered that the votes for legal option were given to prevent the public sale of liquor, not to forbid its private use. He did not agree with Mr. Morris that the matter should not be referred by means of a plebiscite. That was a course which had been taken in a number of cases. Further, he thought it would be found that the consumption of liquor in this Colony was more like three quarters of a million, instead of one and a quarter million, as had been said—a small consumption for our population compared to other countries. There were many nations on which there was no need for the House to consult the people deciding, but this was one on which it was usual to take their opinion. This the Government proposed to do, and then if the public wanted prohibition they could have it.

Mr. MORRIS asked if the proposed bill would actually provide for prohibition upon majority being obtained.

THE PREMIER said not at present. If the plebiscite went in favor of prohibition, there would still be legislation required.


Mr. MORRIS said the whole thing should be done as one. What promise had we that we should have this legislation, even if the vote went in favor of it?

Mr. COAKER said that if drink was such an evil as both sides had agreed, why should the House wait for a moment? Why not destroy the evil, and have done with it? He would vote for any such measure. He was prepared to say that all the Northern Districts that voted for Legal Option were strongly in favor of Prohibition; it was nonsense to try to draw distinctions between the two. He did not believe that the Government would have proposed any measure at all until they were driven to it by Mr. Hickman's resolutions. He was a temperance man—a prohibitionist; drink did no good to any man. He moved an amendment to the effect that a bill should now be passed, by which a vote would be taken, and prohibition automatically follow, if the vote went in favor of it. That would settle the matter one way or the other, and there would be no chance for anyone to defeat the measure.

Mr. CURRIE said he was personally aware that a bill had been prepared by the Government some time ago on this question, and that he was prepared to support it. He was himself a strong

temperance worker, and favored taking a plebiscite on the matter.

Mr. DOWNEY was strongly in favor of temperance, but would support the proposed Government bill, not the present resolutions, which he considered imperfect.

Mr. CLIFT said we must not forget that those who did desire to use drink had rights, and should not be dictated to unless by a majority of the people of the whole country. He favored a plebiscite on the subject; then, if a majority favored prohibition, that would settle the question. He would prefer to wait and see what was in the Government's bill, and these resolutions might be deferred until then.

Mr. LLOYD had not made up his mind on the main question; but he agreed with Mr. Morris that members were not more delegates, to express the views of their constituents. They were representatives, free to exercise their judgment to the full on every question. Members did not represent their Districts only; they represented the whole Colony, although particular districts might elect them. A man, who shaped his views in the House merely with an eye to pleasing his constituency, was not doing his duty. But, in this case, he was prepared to vote for a plebiscite, and for prohibition, if the plebiscite favored it. And the bill should be so drawn that prohibition would come into force, if the vote favored it.

Mr. KENNEDY was a lifelong supporter of temperance, but would prefer to wait and support the Government bill.

Mr. F. J. MORRIS agreed that no one could doubt the evils of liquor. But we must be careful to do nothing that had not the full support of all sections of the public. It was not clear that these resolutions had this support.

Mr. KENT said that he held now, as he had said last year, that members of the House had a full right to deal with any question that came up, without referring back to the people about it. But, in this matter, we must be sure we had the support of the people. Our assembly was a sober one compared with most. But all we were asked for was to agree to take the public opinion of the country on the matter; and this we should do.

The Committee rose at 6.30, and resumed at 8 p.m.

Mr. GRIMES considered that the matter should be referred to the people. He supported the principle of the referendum. He was sure that the people were strongly in favor of prohibition; and the matter should be submitted to the people next November. The people would not mind a little taxation on other things, if liquor was done away with.

Mr. CURRIE would not vote for Mr. Coaker's amendment, because the Government had promised a bill to deal with the matter, for which he would vote.


Mr. MORRIS said the Government bill was insufficient, because it would require further legislation to produce prohibition, even if the people voted for it. There should be a bill now which would provide for prohibition, actually to come into force, if the vote of the people was favorable. If the Government said they would introduce such a bill, the Opposition would withdraw the resolutions. If temperance people had to work hard and get a decision by the people, they Continued on third page.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of 20 words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Conso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient telegraphic service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.20.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round on British and American steamers, which are equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radius of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.

Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Carriers on British and American steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P.M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Public Notice

Censorship of Telegraphs, Cables, and Wireless Stations

By direction of the Chief Censor, London, the following Regulations will be in force on and after Friday next, January 15th, namely:
1. Cablegrams in authorized editions of A.B.C., Lieber's, Scott's and Western Union Codes only may be exchanged between British, Allied or Neutral Territory or extra European Telegraph System, on one side, and British or Allied Territory, wherever situated, on the other side.
2. The term "Extra European Telegraph System" means the places outside the Telegraph System of Europe. Besides the places in Europe proper, the following are also counted as being on the European Telegraph System, namely:—Russia and Asia; the following French possessions in North and West Africa, namely:—Algeria, Mauritania, Senegal, Upper Senegal and Niger, and French Morocco. The island of Cyprus is regarded as outside the European Telegraph System.
3. Until further notice cablegrams in the following three Codes, namely:—Meyer's Atlantic Cotton Code, Thirtieth Edition; Bentley's Complete Phrase Code, not including separate Mining and Oil Supplements; Broadhall's Imperial Combination Code, not including Special Rubber Edition, are allowed only between United Kingdom and places in Extra European Telegraph System.
N.B.—As all messages sent under the above Regulations have to be decoded and censored the carrying out of this work will be greatly facilitated if persons sending such messages would hand in at the Telegraph Office, at the time of presenting the message, the translation of the same.

ought to have a clear issue to put before the people, and a guarantee that, if the people gave their voice, prohibition would become law.

Mr. HIGGINS said he had confidence in the intentions of the Government. If the people gave their voice in favor of prohibition, how could any Government refuse to bring in legislation to give effect to it?

Mr. MORIN said he had no doubts that the Government could refuse, as had happened in other countries, or the Upper House might throw out a bill if it passed the Lower House. A bill should be guaranteed now.

Mr. COAKES referred to a suggestion by Government members that it would be necessary to get a full majority of the electors in the country in favor of prohibition at the plebiscite. He held, with Mr. Morin, that it should require only a vote of those who actually went to the polls; otherwise it was counting all who were dead, sick or indifferent, as voters against temperance. He did not believe the Premier's promise. He had had experience of the lack of principle of the Government. Prohibition would be a blessing to the country; not a man in the House could deny it.

Mr. DEVEREAUX thought the proposition would mean a heavy loss of revenue, and also a tremendous expense in enforcing the law. We should not be too hard on those who did not see eye to eye in this matter.

Mr. HALYARD supported the resolutions on principle. Prohibition would be a blessing to the country. He quoted some powerful utterances of Bishop Wilberforce, C.H. Spurgeon, John Bright, Moody and other eminent persons, on the subject of the evils of drink. He also quoted Customs Statistics, showing the immense amount of money thrown away every year on liquor. He had no doubts of the feeling of his District on the matter, and did not feel it necessary to consult them. We should do what other parts of the world are doing and abolish drink.



A larger market than usual has been secured in Great Britain, Middleboro in former years was the chief receiving port; this year the ore will be sent to several ports. Loss profit on ore shipments this year may not be so satisfactory as former years, due to the prevailing high freight rates.

Local Labor

(Trade Review.)
The Blue Ruiners, who have been earnestly intoning their Jeremiahs of woe the last few months, will be surprised to learn that there is likely to be more work for laborers and mechanics in and about St. John's the coming summer than for many years past. We have this on the authority of one of the largest contractors in St. John's—a man who knows what he is talking about. To begin with there is a large number of men working at the Marconi Tower, and the new Bank of Nova Scotia Building is giving employment to a good many. The new building for the Commercial Cable from Quidi Vidi to Water Street, will mean a good deal of work for laboring men, and the new building for the same will add eighty thousand dollars to the city's earnings. The new Methodist Church to be erected on Cochrans Street is going to cost \$100,000—a nice sum to be spent in the city.

Women Ready to Replace Men

London.—Women are crowding to register for employment at the labor exchanges here and throughout England at the rate of about 150,000 per day. It is estimated that already one million women have shown themselves ready to fill positions now occupied by men if the men will go into the army. The Government has expressed its approval of this movement, but no definite action has been taken. However, women are now being employed as clerks in the censor's office and elsewhere in Government work that was formerly performed by men.

All railway and tramway companies throughout England have received letters from the Government asking them to do all they can to employ women and release able-bodied men for fighting.

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71 Montreal Hotels Will Close Bars

Montreal, May 1.—Seventy-one hotels will close their doors at 11 o'clock to-morrow night, not to reopen them as licensed places, this cut being in accordance with legislation passed at Quebec some time ago calling for the reduction in places licensed to sell liquor until the minimum of 400 was reached.

Certain Things Are Revealed

The People Informed

What the electors of this country don't know about his general affairs would certainly fill a book. There is no one hiding the fact that the people generally are in the dark almost completely. Only now and then a small fragment of light has come across their mental vision, and this has usually caused amazement.

It is pitiful enough when the people are in the dark, but it is even sadder still when their representatives are in a somewhat similar position.

These thoughts came to us as we read a report of Mr. W. E. Howley's objections against the enactment of the Products Corporation agreement on behalf of four lumber and timber companies which he represented.

Some ago and long we were informed that a company had purchased large areas in the Deer Lake section. They were given a charter by the Government and had raised \$7,000,000 in London to establish a large paper mill at Deer Lake. We were jubilant over the prospects of another large industry being established in this country when, lo! everything is dropped and we hear nothing more about the Deer Lake proposition.

Now we are informed by Mr. Howley that this company had been compelled to drop the proposal because LOCAL INTERESTS DEMANDED A BIG GRAB OF \$1,250,000 FOR THEIR INTERESTS, and the Deer Lake Co. had decided not to be bled to death by local interests, and therefore they abandoned the establishment of the industry.

Such are some of the things that the general public are ignorant of. A big industry abandoned for the simple reason that certain individuals holding certain areas which cost them precious little "demanded a big grab of \$1,250,000 for their interests."

Were we not right when we declared some time ago that it was high time for the Government to stop granting any more timber limits in Newfoundland or Labrador to private individuals? Is it not time for the Government to exploit our timber limits and mineral areas in the interests of the revenue of the country?

Over \$4,000,000 has got to be found to run this country for the

coming fiscal year. Where is it coming from? Chiefly out of the taxpayers' pockets. And if conditions remain much longer as they are now, we can whistle for the \$4,000,000.

There is very little retrenchment taking place. New jobs are being created bringing with it extra expenditures. Retrenchment is most important. There are far too many civil servants in some places in this country with practically nothing to do. In some other places civil servants are very scarce. And so the thing goes on. But we are wandering a little from the subject.

We are not in a position to state whether Mr. Howley's statements before the House were absolutely and entirely correct. They may or may not have been. There may have been other reasons, not mentioned by him, for the Deer Lake company not going ahead with their proposed undertakings.

It occurs to the average layman that "there are far too many so-called representatives of the people representing other interests with which the people's interests very often conflict." "No man can serve two masters."

It is very questionable whether a man can represent a company seeking certain concessions and the country at the same time.

Anyway, the Products Company Bill now before the House is a colossal venture and not the work merely of a day. We honestly believe that their plans will not be still-born, like a number of other ventures have been. The men composing the company are men noted for their energy and ability, and if satisfactory arrangements are made with the Government, who ought to consider the matter from every standpoint, throwing as many safeguards as they possibly can around the contract, then the industry should assume large proportions and be of great benefit to the country and its people.

We are trying to force the Dardanelles and we have done good work so far. I expect before you get this letter you will know more about it. I will be able to tell you more when it's all over. Remember me to all friends. So good-bye and God bless you, and may He give you back your health and strength, but if we never meet on earth again I trust we shall meet each other in that bright world above where there will be no more sin nor sickness nor sorrow. From Isaac Snow, Coley's Point.

April 23, 1915.

Dear Mother,—I received your letters and was glad to hear from you. I have been on different ships and in various places. I have been on board of nearly every kind of ship. I have seen some very large shells explode and heard their roar. I have been on board the Queen Elizabeth to work. She has 15-inch guns, and the shells weigh 1900 lbs. Just imagine what would happen if one of them hit Coley's Point. I have been to the Dardanelles on a destroyer. I saw one of the biggest German ships going down, but I am now back to the barracks. There have been times I would not give five cents for my life. It takes all the pluck of a Newfoundland sailor to stand it. ISAAC SNOW.
