A reporter who visited well-known firms to learn the extent of this craze for magnified adornment was met by the information that the demand for exaggeration is likely to increase. "Picture hats are assuming the most extraordinary proportions," a Bond street milliner confessed, "but the most noticeable point is the gigantic shape of the floral trimmings. A cabbage rose in pink velvet is becoming perilously near the size of a real cabbage Bunches of grapes adorn the newest hats, each grape being about double "Veils are following the fashion in hats. The minute chenille spot is re-

placed by black velvet patches the size of a six-penny piece, and as for hat-pins, I doubt if they can increase in size. Most of the latest patterns are adorned with knobs which would not make insignificant doorhandles."
