Fredericton, April 8.—The following official statement was issued by the government tonight:

"The government called their supporters in the legislature together this evening and announced to them that they had determined to have the fullest and most searching investigation of all the charges pertaining to both the Crown Land Department and the St. John Valley Railway which have been preferred in the House by Mr. Dugal.

"The announcement of the course to be pursued by the government received the most emphatic approval of the members present.

"The house will be adjourned on Thursday for the Easter recess until some day next week which has not as yet been definitely decided upon."

There will be the fullest and most searching investigation of all the charges which have been made in the legislature by Opposition Leader Dugal impugning the personal character of Hon. J. K. The government met in the executive council chamber this afternoon following the six o'clock recess of the house and this evening there was a caucus of the government supporters when the announcement was officially made that the charges carried on.







"I ask all living professional base ball players to join me in raising our shats to the memory of William A. Hulbert, the man who saved the game!"

So wrote A. G. Spaiding in his histomy of baseball, and there is no better time for paying this tribute than tomorrow, which will be the thirty-second anniversary of the death in Chicago of the maß who, more than any other, perhaps, deserves the title of "father of the National League." The Hon. Morgan G. Bulkeley, of Hartorf, was the first president of the oldest major circuit when it was or ganized in 1876, and, while he was a staunch and able foe of the evils that had fastemed themselves on the game, his various other interests required a larger part of his time, and he resigned after serving one year. Hulbert was elected as his successor in December, 1876, and held the job until his death, his six years of service coming at the most critical period of the game, when professional baseball was on trial for its life, with the American public as the fury.

"To him," wrote his friend Spaiding "came the great struggle that attended the early days of the league. Upon

Ganzel did his full share of his catching on the Boston team, often filling in at first base. He was also a sure man in the outfield. He was a deliberate and accurate thrower to bases, a rangy backstop with a sure pair of hands.


