It appears from the details of the trial
and conviction in Paris of Charles A.
Perkins, formerly United States Consul
at Lisbon, that he and his wife (a daugh-
ter of Count Garowsky and niece of the
ex-Queen Isabella) were jointly charged
with inciting by fraudulent means, for
board and lodging and advances of money,
a debt of \$7,500, due to
Madame Melhan, proprietress of
private hotel in Paris. In order to
induce Madame Melhan to give him the
money and credit, Perkins had representa-
ted that he was about to make a large sum
of money by the concession of a subma-
rine telegraph between Spain and
England; also that he was raising a loan
for Don Carlos, from which he was to
obtain a large part, and that he had in-
herited the sum of \$10,000 in the United
States. He had given notes on two oc-
casions, which were subsequently dis-
honored.

At a meeting of the Permanent Com-
mittee of the French Assembly Friday
evening, M. Tirard, of the Left, inter-
preted the government's intention of the
continuance of its rigorous treatment of the
Press. He declared that the system intoler-
able and unequal in its application. Re-
publican journals alone were suspended.

He protested against a recent warning
addressed to the Journal des Debats. M.
Chabaud La Tour, Minister of the In-
terior, replied that the government was
determined to oppose the columns of
the test against the suspension of
the government. Viscount d'Ab-
ville, of Rights, interspersed a pre-
test against the suspension of
D'Abville, which, as he intimated, came
from foreign origin. The Duke De-
cazes, Minister of Foreign Affairs, pointed
out that the Spanish Ambassador was
still unaccustomed when the objectionable
article against Serrano was published by
D'Abville. He emphatically denied that
there was anything in his quarter.
In answer to another question from M.
d'Abville, the Duke stated that nothing
had been done in regard to the
drawing of the man-of-war Oreoqueque from
Civita Vecchia. He objected strongly to
the exposure of diplomatic business re-
quired by interpellations of this character.

Acrobatic Warfare—Dullness—Sneak— The Abbey—Curiosities—The Premier's Herald.

LONDON, Sept. 25th.
THE coming winter.
On Sunday last, for the first time dur-
ing the course of my uneventful career,
by way of variety, I visited a full-blown
Ritualistic church. I was not a little sur-

Saints, Clifton, of which the Rev. Mr.

the service which one gets there is quite
the reverse of that. It is trivial,
childish, and altogether unbecom-
ing. There is no idea of rest or re-
pose; all is perpetual shifting and shift-
ing about; a bow there, a courtesy here,
and so on, till one is quite weary of the

Forehanding of the Sixties.
The earliest suggestion of considerable changes in apparel is always observable in hats and bonnets. The first hint of spring or autumn is found in the slight, yet distinct, variations of head-coverings. Already the shop windows are filled with hats, bonnets, and wigs, and the window displays are brilliantly wreathed, which, were it a month later, would be the envy of the passing crowd. Now these milliners' forehandings are merely glanced at, and the fashion is for the time being, and there will be no essential variations of shapes during the early fall. For autumn, these hats have the under side of the brim faced all over with velvet, and have the crown of a long plume. On the side, around the crown, a band, flatly folded, or a loose-lying scarf of velvet fastens to the crown, and the crown, on the left side, not so far back as formerly. Mingled with the loops is a bunch of small feathers or a long plume. Under the curling edge of the brim, turned up against the crown, is a spray or lace, or a number of bright-colored leaves and berries. Ornaments of all metals, notably burnished silver, except oxidized silver (this has run its course), are sparingly placed upon the velvet garniture; and this, with insignificant variations, is the regulation model for an October hat. High authorities declare that plaids, stripes and figures are to be fashionable in all dresses, bonnets, for cool and cold weather, which is equivalent to saying that plain and simple shades and meager trimmings are to be the coming rule. Plaids, and stripes, and figures are so difficult to trim with any semblance of grace or beauty, that, when they are the mode, excessive garniture ceases to be practicable.

The pretty, old-fashioned Gabrielle dress, modified and improved, is re-introduced under the more pretentious title of the Princess. It is well adapted to indoor costumes, and like the long-loved and soon-to-be-forgotten polonaise, is quite becoming to most people. A good figure is set off, and a bad figure much helped, by the graceful Princess costume. However strongly fashion may declare in favor of stiffs with other than plain colored surfaces, there can never be a question as to the more genuine elegance of these. They are more refined and tasteful, and always more satisfactory and economical than any figured, striped or plaid goods can be. Outrives a less quantity of this material, which may be traced, according to necessity, up and down and inside out, that of fashion has an "up and down" or right and wrong side.

It is believed that the deep, rich shades of maroon, brown and blue will be quite as popular as black during the winter, but that in the latter part of the season a pleasant change from black, and there is much greater security in purchasing black, which has become so unstable that the largest dealers refuse to warrant even the best makes. Among women fabrics, cashmere, drap d'ete, and camel's hair cloth will, as heretofore, be the most widely worn; and a promised compromise between the light, cashmere and heavy drap d'ete will, as long as the winter goods, - Home and Society; Scribner's for October.

There is every prospect of the weather continuing fine, so that there need be no postponement on that account. Kater ran to a neighbor's house and borrowed a gun loaded with small shot, and fired at the Indians, whereby Glode was slightly injured, but Penell is badly wounded, having received nearly the whole charge in his face and breast. Glode has been taken to Lunenburg jail.—H. Recorder.
