## Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, April 17.—The House met at 3:30, and after routine in answer to Boase.

Sir John said the Government recognized the importance of a bridge over the St. Lawrence at Quebec as connecting the interior of the Province with the North Shore Railway and the necessity for its construction in the near future, but until the Canadian Pacific Railway is extended to Quebec, he could give no further information.

In answer to Mitchell, Sir John said the Grand Trunk had pledged itself to the Government to expend five million dollars out of the proceeds of bonds under this session's Act, in double tracking the road between Montreal and Toronto.

On the third reading of the amended Liquor License Act, 1883, Mr. Carrey moved the restoration of the words "Hotel or" in the second section of clause 25 of last year's Act.—Carried, 75 yeas, 62 nays. An amendment by Girouard was lost, 49 yeas to 58 nays.
