MR. PARK'S SPEECH IN ASSEMBLY.

(From the Freeholder Farmer.)

MR. W. A. PARK.—I shall occupy the attention of the Committee in particularly calling attention to the first section of the Bill. My duty, as one of the Members for Northumberland, interested in the proposed amendment of the Miramichi Valley Railway, is to put forward my views on this point, and to endeavor to show the other representatives of the County of Northumberland, in particular, that it is not a party measure. I quite admit that the simple plan proposed by the Bill is to give the Government the power to decide hereafter on the route of the river the route of the railway shall be, but I think that while that matter is left to the Government to decide, still the vote to be taken on this question will ultimately decide the route of the line. If this section of the Bill is passed the route will be on the southern side of the river, and it is this important fact that we have to face. I would draw the attention of the Committee to the fact that this is not a party measure, it is not a measure upon which hangs the fate of a Government, and Government supporters should not vote for the Bill simply because it is brought in by the Administration. If they vote the other way and the Bill is lost, it does not follow that the Government have lost the confidence of the House. The members of the Committee should exercise their best judgment, and not blindly support the Government. I would like to know the true state of the case, I must take them back some time prior to the contract of the 30th of August last, but I will try to be as brief as possible so as not to trespass on the time of the House. My first object is to show the members in possession of all the circumstances of the case so that the Members may have a perfect knowledge of the subject, and I will try to do so in a few minutes. I will give an intelligent vote on the question.

out the work. It was, from estimates made, found that the subsidy of \$3,000 a mile was too small to construct the line, and what did the old Company then do? Knowing that further aid must be obtained, they opened negotiations with the Dominion Government to try and obtain a further subsidy from them, if not for the whole of the line, for part of the line. In 1881, just one year ago, my honorable friend (Mr. Gillespie) introduced a bill asking for the amendment of the Subsidy Act, and that amendment, if it had been passed, would have decided that the route of the line would have been on the southern side of the river. The matter came before the House on the 15th of May last, and was discussed by my honorable friend and myself, the other members for the County of Northumberland not being present in the House. After the whole matter had been fully debated, this House decided by a solemn vote of 19 to 9, not to change the route of the railway, and the bill was consequently lost. The purport of that bill was precisely the same as the one introduced last year, there is not any doubt but that if the bill passes, it will lead to the southern route being adopted so far as the Government are concerned. So the members of this House last year voted that it was not advisable to change the route of this railway from the northern side of the river to the southern side of the river. It does occur to me that when a company comes in like this, asking this House to subsidize itself, that the honorable gentleman who introduces the bill in direct opposition to the vote recorded last year. This committee will stand by the position they took last year, and will do so with the bill in a correct manner. Shortly after the failure of the proposed legislation, the committee had been put forward to obtain a subsidy from the Dominion Government, and which had been so ably seconded by Mr. Peter Mitchell, were actually crowned with success and we were informed that the Dominion Government would grant a subsidy of \$3,000 for thirty miles of the railway. The route was found to be the most that could be obtained from the Dominion Government, for they had a vast number of claims upon their treasury, and were obtaining subsidies from them. The result of that agitation was that it awakened capitalists to the fact that there was a market for the route being built, and the old company were again enabled to put forward their claims with every prospect of success. On the 8th of June, 1883, a meeting was held, and it was decided then to ask the Local Government to enter into a contract for the construction of the line, and I was directed to enter into negotiations with them having that object in view. I accordingly came to Fredericton, and met the Hon. Mr. Frederickton, and met the Hon. Mr. Frederickton on the 24th and 27th June, 1883. I explained the position of the company, and asked them what security they would give for the performance of the contract. They would not or could not say. The Hon. Attorney General asked me instead, what security the company offered? I could not get any further information from him until he asked me if the company had complied with the 4th section of the Act of 1875, and I said that they had. Now I will read this section to you, it is as follows:—

adopted, as it was entirely a new one, until it was too late to act. 2nd, The Minister's next objection to giving aid, was that as I had alleged, the principal ground upon which I claimed that a subsidy should be given, in addition to the local benefits, and promotion of lumbering facilities and necessary Trade and Commerce, which latter I claimed were Dominion questions and which they were bound to promote—viz., The increased trade that it would give to the Intercolonial Railway by carrying the traffic of the whole West-Brant and the adjoining Parishes. He answered, by saying that there would be something in this argument if I only proposed to build the Railway part of the way, say to Donkton, or that vicinity, that it would make that portion of the County through which it passed, and its trade, tributary to and increase the traffic of the Intercolonial, but that as we had asked for a subsidy the whole way through to Fredericton the effect of that would be to give the Government a road which would be a great advantage to the American, as well as the Canadian markets, it would draw to rival roads in the Western part of the Province and in the neighbouring States the local trade which the Intercolonial already possessed.

Up to this time I had never thought of any desire on the part of anyone to locate a road in the County, and certainly no one approached me with that view, and it was not until the resolutions were printed and sent to the House that I had an intimation that there was likely to be any division, as to the location of the road, but I was not prepared to receive a telegram from a large number of my influential constituents, including the Hon. Mr. Loggie, the Hon. We find on reading the World the following:— "The withdrawal of the subsidy on the recommendation of the representative of the county, after the company and the route had been established by three-fourths of the Legislature of Northumberland, is a blow so treacherous, so unparliamentary and unexpected, that every body concerned has to take a breathing spell to consider the situation."

Canadian Constitutional Law. What promises to be a most valuable work is shortly to be published, the Ms. being now in the printers' hands. The work is by J. Travis, Esq., of the Law Office of Messrs. J. Travis & Co., of St. John's. "So much confusion and contradiction have grown up in connection with the Constitutional Law of Canada that it has become very desirable that some attempt were made to overcome and remove it. "On the one hand, we have the extreme views of Mr. Blake, Mr. Moser, Judge Henry, the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, and others, laying down principles of construction, which, carried to their logical result, would virtually deprive Parliament of all legislative power; while, on the other hand, we have judgments from Justices Strong, Taschereau and Gwynne, and from the Supreme Courts of British Columbia and New Brunswick, which, carried to their ultimate consequence, would denude the Local Legislatures of all legislative power. Neither of these sets of views is right. It is to be demonstrated this fact, and to make an attempt to bring Order out of chaos, which this treatise has been written."

Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, April 17.—The House met at 3:30, and after routine in answer to Resolutions.

Sir John said the Government recognized the importance of bridge over the St. Lawrence at Quebec as connecting the Interior of the Province with the North Shore Railway and the necessity for its construction in the near future, but until the Canadian Pacific Railway is extended to Quebec, he could give no further information.

In answer to Mitchell, Sir John said the Grand Trunk had pledged itself to the Government to contribute five million dollars out of the proceeds of bonds under this session's Act, in double tracking the road between Montreal and Toronto.

On the third reading of the amended Liquor License Act, 1883, Mr. Carrey moved the restoration of the words "Hotel or" in the second section of clause 25 of last year's Act.—Carried, 75 yeas, 62 nays. An amendment by Girouard was lost, 49 yeas to 83 nays.

McCarthy moved in amendment, that in places where Provincial acts were in force, no prosecution should take place for infraction of the Dominion law and that penalties would be suspended only where the act is not employed.

Further provision that a reference of the simple question of the constitutionality of the Dominion Act should be made to the Supreme Court, which would be final, unless the Governor in Council or the Lt. Governor of any Province, joining in reference to the Supreme Court of Canada, decided to appeal to the Privy Council.

This amendment was carried, after a debate by Mills, Davies, McCarthy, Oulmet and Sir John, and the bill as amended passed its third reading.

OTTAWA, April 18.—Routine business was finished up today, and the House will adjourn tomorrow.

OTTAWA, April 19.—The Speaker took the chair at four o'clock Friday afternoon and after concurring in several bills brought down from the Senate with amendments which in most detail, the House adjourned.

At three o'clock today His Excellency the Governor General, with the members of the Commons having been summoned to the bar of the Senate, His Excellency was pleased to prorogue the second session of the fifth Parliament, with the following speech:

Hon. Gentlemen of the Senate: The assiduity and zeal shown by you in the performance of your important duties have my best thanks, and I desire to convey them to you.

There is every reason to anticipate that the liberality of the loan given to the Canada Pacific Railway will secure the speedy and satisfactory completion of that great national work.

I congratulate you on the adjustment of the matters of the Province of the Dominion and the Province of British Columbia.

By the legislation of this session the larger appropriations made for the furtherance of Railway construction may be expected to result materially in the development of our commerce both foreign and domestic as well as to open up for settlement extensive fertile districts, hitherto almost inaccessible.

The several measures for the benefit of the Indian communities and for their encouragement to assume self-government are well adapted for the purpose, and the amendments to the Dominion lands will give additional facilities for the advantage of settlers in the Northwest Territory.

The readjustment of the annual subsidies to the several provinces while adding to their resources will place their pecuniary relations with the Dominion on a satisfactory and permanent basis.

The several important measures which occupied your attention and now will become law, must all tend to the benefit and improvement of the country, and the numerous private bills with industrial objects submitted to me indicate the existence of a healthy spirit of enterprise among our people.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons: I thank you in Her Majesty's name for the supplies you have granted for the public service.

Hon. Gentlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons: In bidding you now farewell until next session I trust that when next we meet I may be able to congratulate you on the continuing prosperity of our country.
