YOUNG, POIRIER AND BURNS LOOKING AFTER THE INTERESTS OF THEIR COUNTY.

In a quite unostentatious manner the Gloucester County Members are working industriously in the interests of their constituency. They have interviewed the Government on the matter of providing a subsidy for a steamer running between Canquet, Shippegan, Lemeque and Miscou and have received assurance that the matter will receive their serious consideration. They are also to be heard shortly in a petition presented to the Government by the Salmon Net Fishermen of their County.

An iron ore deposit has been lately discovered in Gloucester County by Mr. Burns, M. P. P. and Wm. Hursey. They have had interested in this property the Dominion Iron and Steel Co. of Sydney, C. B. The Company sent members of their mineral staff to look over the property. Their Mr. C. A. Meissner head of their Mineral Department on examination of the ore in a first class. The result of his report was that the company sent and had the manager of their Wobbas Iron Mine of Newfoundland come over and make a report on it. His report was better than Mr. Meissner's and the percentage of Iron in his analysis of the ore ran as high as 58 per cent of magnetic Iron ore.

Mr. Marster was then sent by the company to look over the property. He built a cabin, employed a number of men, and during his two months stay he spent over one thousand dollars, and uncovered and exposed a vein of ore one mile in length and from 10 to 40 feet in width. The depth of the vein has not been determined but it is thought by the Engineer that it is of great depth as the quality denotes a quantity.

Mr. Burns is now asking the Govt. to grant a charter and subsidy for a railroad to the mine.

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Local Legislature

FREDERICTON, March 24.—Mr. Tweedie took the floor this afternoon to support the continuation of the Attorney General's assurance from Sir Wilfrid Laurier regarding the readjustment of provincial subsidies.

Mr. Hazen again insisted that Sir Wilfrid Laurier had given an entirely different statement in the House of Commons, while Mr. Pugsley insisted there was no contradiction. Mr. Pugsley made the assertion that Mr. Hazen had opposed the Eastern Extension claim, and Mr. Hazen denied this. Mr. Tweedie attacked Mr. Hazen for his attitude.

The House went into committee on the highway bill. Mr. Camp in the chair. Sub-section 4, placing the title to highways in the King, was adopted on the following division.

Yeas—Hon. Messrs. Tweedie, Pugsley, Labillois, Sweeney, Hill, Messrs. Allen, Whitehead, Campbell, Burden, Barnes, King, Rudbeck, Lantana, Purdy, Legere, Young, Burns, Burgess, Poirier, Clair and Martin—21

Nays—Messrs. Osman, Tweeddale, Hazen, Morrissey, Glasier, Loggie, Hart and Morrison—8.

Mr. King asked in regard to the ownership, as provided in the bill, for windows and signs projecting over the highway.

Mr. Labillois said this section meant only the soil of the highways.

Mr. Hazen proposed to divide the province into highway districts.

Mr. Labillois said he proposed to divide the province into highway divisions. In some cases one parish is large enough for a district. In some cases, where there are towns or cities in the parish, it is necessary to have two districts, and the only satisfactory method is to leave it in the hands of the public works department.

Mr. Hazen thought the section leaving the payment of superintendents entirely in the hands of the government is most objectionable. The government can then pay any sum they choose and at any time. The legislature should lay down some general principles as to the payment of the salaries of superintendents. For instance, the superintendents might be paid on the commission of the agency they expend, but it would be better for the house and the government some general principle be laid down in regard to the remuneration of the superintendents.

Mr. Labillois said the act provides that the work shall be done by sale or day's work. If the former the department will be warranted in paying the superintendent by commission. If the latter he will have to give his attention every day and will have to be paid by the day. It must be left to the department to decide. There will be much better results from day's work.

The committee passed all the sections of the bill except those relating to winter roads, the amount of the tax, breaking highways in winter, and one or two others.

Mr. Burns asked if the chief commissioner had been approached on the subject of breaking winter roads for double teams. This can be done with a single team with shift. The roads in Gloucester are narrow, few of them being four rods wide, and they are fenced with cedar rails. If wire fences were used, drifting would be obviated, and such fences might be adopted if the government would stand part of the cost.

Mr. Labillois said the suggestion was important and would be dealt with when the section relating to winter roads came up.

Mr. Tweedie thought the county treasurer should be required to send a statement to the chief commissioner of road money assessed and collected in each parish.

Mr. Hazen asked what the government proposed to do about the St. John parishes road act.

Mr. Tweedie said the matter has not been decided, but he did not think it would be wise to disturb them. The places are really towns and raise large sums of money for road purposes.

Mr. Hazen said the great distinction between the St. John act and this act is that in St. John the councilors control the money and spend it.

Progress was reported. The bill releasing the estate of the Hon. John Boyd from any claim of the crown was agreed to in committee.

HIBBERT TUPPER.

INTERVIEWED IN LONDON ON PREFERENTIAL TARIFF.

He Said That Canada is Strongly in Favor of it. Iron and Steel Bounties. The Alaskan Boundry.

Montreal, March 21.—The Star's London cable says: Sir Chas. Hibbert Tupper, who is now in London in connection with the Yukon case, in an interview with the Star correspondent said that English people should understand that Canada was unanimous for preference. That fact would be more clearly shown during the debates of the present session at Ottawa. The conservative party were absolutely united on the subject. The reason that more had not been said is that Canadians do not want the British people to think that Canada cannot do without preference. Preference is desirable from a wide imperial standpoint, and would be a powerful incentive to British sentiment in Canada. And if the colonies made too much of a fuss just now, the British electorate might think the preferential movement was solely for the benefit of the colonies.

Discussing Canadian bounties on iron and steel, Sir Hibbert Tupper said that Canada could not, of course, agree to destroy her industries, but would give a fairer field for British manufacturers than for foreigners. If the British people valued preference at all there ought to be no difficulty in negotiating the whole question. The colonies had already made such tariff concessions as preclude any notion of their selfishness.

Regarding the Alaskan decision, Sir Hibbert condemned the Canadian government for laying the blame on Lord Alveston. Lord Alveston probably had an explanation, and could give it if he cared to or if the British government so desired. Sir Hibbert ridiculed Laurier's treaty-making demands, and said that the government making a treaty must have the power of enforcing it.

THE NEEDED DREDGING.

We have repeatedly urged upon those in authority the great necessity of improving the North West branch of our river by dredging or otherwise the bar or shoal which is located about one mile below the Redbank wharf. And the insistence is again renewed at the urgency of business men and others to whom the services of the steamer Rustler is invaluable. Mr. Daniel Airon has just completed the erection of a new steam saw mill at a point below the wharf and above the bar, and unless something is done, and done quickly too, the hindrance resulting from the presence of this obstruction will prove a great drawback to his enterprise.

Moreover, now that the establishment of a large furniture factory in this town is assured and as the intention is to procure most of the hardwood lumber for its consumption from above this impediment, the impracticability of having the channel deep enough for the passage of tow-boats is obvious. And in addition to this it may be added that there is nowhere on the continent a more beautiful river for an afternoon's excursion than the North West Miramichi, and the crowds of children and those adults whose health is such that sea-sickness or its possibility must be avoided who patronize the steamer Rustler attest the fact that this is appreciated.

We have it on the best of authority that this hindrance to navigation and the development of our county can be removed at a cost of less than \$1000, (one thousand dollars) and when we consider that expenditures are annually made for the inducement of tourists to come here and sojourn during the summer months, the wisdom of the expenditure must be apparent to all who would add to the attractiveness of resorts which are unequalled otherwise.

NATIONAL STRENGTH.
 Egotism and complacency are not easily distinguished from confidence and self-reliance. Canada may learn the difference at the present moment by studying the difference between Russia and Japan. Russia represents egotism and complacency, Japan confidence and self-reliance.

Russia is a despotism with all the weaknesses of that form of government—incompetency in public service, favorites in high places, lack of administrative systems suited to modern conditions, huge public debt, oppression, ignorance. Japan has all these weaknesses no doubt, but she has reduced them to such small proportions that they are not to be considered beside the great virtues which she has struggled to acquire.

Canada may learn the lesson. This country needs a fresh baptism of national spirit. We are somewhat egotistic and complacent. We imagine we know much more than we do. We have no national literature, no national library, no national museum, no national art gallery, no national navy, no army that is worth mentioning, comparatively few public men without eye-lid weakness. There are the beginnings of all these things—but they are only beginnings. Our sons should go abroad more than they do to obtain inspiration, knowledge and breadth of view. Our statesmen should think less of political patronage and more of national progress. Let us emulate Japan, rather than Russia. 
New laid eggs, six a foot. Crack 'em and try 'em.

Mr. A. T. Dickens Defends His Father. The London Chronicle has received a letter written by Mr. Alfred Thompson, a son, who has lived in Melbourne for many years. As the eldest surviving son of Charles Dickens, he strongly protests against a paragraph copied into the Commonwealth papers, from some London source, alleging that "Dickens, who never liked Thackeray, told a friend he could do nothing to admire in one of Thackeray's novels that was being serially published at the time." Mr. A. T. Dickens, "with every possible candour," gives this statement a most emphatic contradiction. He recalls the fact that his father was the chief mourner at Thackeray's funeral in St. Paul's, and also wrote a biographical sketch of Thackeray in The Cornhill, of January, 1864, which "did full justice to the genius and merits of the author of 'Vanity, Fair and Worldliness.'" Mr. Dickens adds that many a time he has heard his father speak in glowing terms of Thackeray's wonderful versatility. "More than this, I can truthfully say that I never heard him make use of any unkind or indirect expression in regard to any author or authorship of his time."

An Epitome of Events Gathered by ADVOCATE Reporters.

BATHURST.

The weather during the past week has been rather soft and spring like, in fact it has been the first sign of real fine weather we have seen since last fall, and we hope we may now dismiss the cold weather from our notes by saying that the weather since last fall has been the coldest and most disagreeable anyone has seen in Canada for many years.

The men hired to look after indiscriminate killing of moose and caribou have been very active during the past few weeks and our worthy stipendiary magistrate has been kept busy listening to complaints and arguments on the subject. Several convictions have been secured and the majesty of the law upheld. Many of the older lumbermen who were in the habit of bringing home a quantity of venison when coming from the woods in the spring think it is hardly fair that Americans and others should be allowed to kill moose by calling in the season set apart by the government, when the meat is so good to eat and they, the lumbermen, and others are prevented from killing an animal when meat is good. There does appear to be something in the argument, if the argument that the meat is good at the present time holds goods, which however, we doubt.

Nearly all the lumbering parties are finishing or have finished their winter's work, and we notice a few idle men about the town.

There are not the same number of men waiting for spring work there used to be in years gone by for certain reasons. Soon, however, we will see the smooth tongued river driving boss cornering his men on the slippery sidewalk under the drip from the roof, and gradually increasing the day's pay until the usual agreement is made.

We are glad to hear that roads are being cut out, and operations resumed at the opening of the iron works near Grand Falls on the Nepequin. This is the property in which Mr. T. M. Burns, M.P., is interested with the Sydney people, and we think there is no doubt it will prove a very valuable investment for all concerned.

Mr. Dan Daley, the famous comedian who was so well known on the American stage, and whose death has just been recorded, was a native of Bathurst. It is many years since the celebrated family of Daleys left here, but old friends on the North Shore kept the run of them, and watched their career with interest. Relatives of the famous dancers still reside in the vicinity of Bathurst and other points on the North Shore, among whom are the sons of the late Pilot Timothy Daley, and Mr. Theo. Keary who once kept the Robertson House at Bathurst.

The Carquet train has at last got down to Carquet and the men are now working her back to Bathurst. They have had a very severe job, the ice on the track hindering work very much. For nearly two months merchants and others have had to move their goods and supplies by team to and from points in the eastern part of the county.

We notice that Mr. Fred Landry has induced Mr. Fred G. Robertson, late of the S. A. C., to loan him his collection of curios, which will be exhibited in Mr. Landry's windows. These are very interesting including quite a number of native arms, etc.

Quite a number of people are suffering from Grippe, and not a few are rather dangerously ill.

Mr. John C. Turner, aged 82 years, died at Tracadie, Gloucester County, on the 22nd inst. He conducted a store and lumber mill at Tracadie for many years. Mr. Turner leaves seven daughters and two sons. The daughter's reside on the north shore, and the sons, Cliff and Leonard, live in St. John. Brothers of deceased were the late Joshua and James D. Turner of St. John.

PERSONALS.

R. W. Wing, the obliging manager of the Tracadie Lumber Co., was in Bathurst on Friday. Mr. Wing reports a very good and successful winter's operation for his Company, and with a good sawing season they should make quite good dividends this year. It will certainly not be Mr. Wing's fault if the concern does not turn out very successful as a harder working man in the interest of his employers it would be difficult to find.

W. F. Copp of Newcastle started from Bathurst on Tuesday to drive to Campbellton.

JANEVILLE.

March 29, 1904.—We had quite a rain storm on Saturday, which made a start in taking the snow away, but made the roads very bad, being flooded with water in many places, the hauling will not be good again for the rest of the spring.

A new engine arrived for the Carquet Railroad about three weeks ago, and ever since they have been endeavoring to open up the road to Carquet, but have not succeeded yet owing to the quantity of ice which accumulated over the rails and there is no way of removing it except by picking it by hand. The train is beginning to be needed now as the fishermen and merchants need their spring supplies. The rail comes by team yet from Bathurst and is a very inconvenient and uncertain way.

The object of the meeting is to consider the advisability of contributing out of the Society's funds towards the proposed Burns Memorial Statue at Fredericton. A full attendance is requested.



MOULD ON BUTTER.

Complaints are received from
time to time at the Dairy Division
Ottawa, regarding the appearance
of mould on the parchment paper
linings of butter packages. In some
cases it is said to have penetrated
the butter for some distance.
Mould is a minute and low form of
plant life. It grows from seeds
which are called spores, and which
develop only in the presence of
moisture and where they have a
supply of suitable food. Mould
will grow readily on damp wood;
hence the necessity for keeping the
interior of a creamery and espe-
cially the refrigerating room, as
dry as possible.

Poorly constructed refrigerators
are apt to be damp, because the
warm air which gets in from out-
side carries moisture with it,
which is deposited on the cooler
surfaces of the walls, floors and
packages. Frequent and prolonged
opening of the doors also causes
dampness.

It would be a good thing for the
creamery owners, as well as for
the trade generally, if it were
compulsory to have all creameries
thoroughly disinfected, every
spring before operations begin.
The spores of mould, and other
germs which cause bad flavors, are
destroyed if the work is properly
done. It is comparatively simple
and inexpensive operation, if the
following plan is adopted.

Wash the whole interior of the
creamery including walls, ceilings,
floors, posts, shelving, etc., with a
solution of one part by chloride
of mercury to one thousand parts of
water. Apply with a brush and
scrub well wherever applied. The
bi-chloride of mercury (corrosive
sublimite) may be procured in
tablet form, of the right strength
to make the above solution by
adding one tablet to every pint of
water used. This substance is a
deadly poison and must be handled
with every care and precaution.
Formalin may also be used either
as a spray or by being allowed to
evaporate from a sheet of cotton
suspended in the room when the
doors, windows and other openings
are tightly closed. It requires
about five ounces or pure formalin
to disinfect 1000 cubic feet.

As a preventive of mould on
butter, the following practice is
highly recommended:

Soak the parchment paper
linings, immediately before using
in a saturated brine to which has
been added one ounce of pure
formalin to three gallons of brine;
place the paper in the boxes with-
out drying; keep the brine in a
special covered vessel; boil the
brine every week and add fresh
formalin in the same proportion as
at first. This treatment has been
found effective in the government
creameries in the Northwest Terri-
tories where there was a great deal
of trouble with mould at one time,
and has given good satisfaction
wherever it has been properly
carried out.

Probably much of the mould on
butter is due to the infection of
the parchment paper as it lies
about the creamery without any
protection and not always in a dry
place. The spores do not develop
on the dry paper, but as soon as it
comes in contact with the butter
there is sufficient moisture to
encourage the growth of the mould.
The parchment paper and empty
packages should be kept in a thor-
oughly dry, clean place.

Only the very best pure veget-
able parchment paper should be
used. Inferior paper encourages
the growth of mould and does not
protect the butter. Much of the
paper used is too light in weight.
A ream of 500 sheets measuring
50x12 1/2 inches should weigh not
less than 40 pounds, and the sam-
e number of sheets 38x12 1/2 inches
should weigh not less than 30
pounds with other sizes in propor-
tion.

DON'T SELL WHEN THE REST ARE SELLING.

It is difficult to understand why farmers should go on year after year in the same old ruts, content to market their poultry in October and November and selling the bulk of their egg crop when eggs are the very cheapest. A writer in the Massachusetts Ploughman Review offers the following suggestions which it would do well to ponder carefully:

"The best season in which to sell chickens is from the first of January to the first of November. Every farmer seems to want to dispose of his poultry during November and December, and consequently the market is always overstocked at that time. The surplus young roosters should be sold during September and October as they will bring more money than later. If it is impossible to market them until after that time, it is best to hold them until after the first of January, for prices are always low the intervening months. Turkeys are most salable around the holidays. Old turkeys and large young gobblers should be marketed for Thanksgiving and Christmas; poor stock should never be sent to the market. All should be well fattened before being shipped. The

hens and small young gobblers should be kept until after the holidays, but should be marketed by the first of February.

Capons sell best from the first of January to the first of March. The larger they are the higher price they will bring per pound. Birds that weigh less than seven pounds

each will bring no more than the price of common chickens. Live geese sell best in September and October, and dressed geese any time after the first of December to the first of March. There is a particular season in which to sell ducks.

Broilers bring the most money from the first of March to the first of July, the highest price being obtainable from the middle of April to the first of June; they should weigh from one and a half to two pounds each the first of March, and as the season advances from two to two and a half pounds each. They should be shipped alive from the first of March until the first of November.—Farmer.


