MOULD ON BUTTER.

Complaints are received from ime to time at the Dairy Division Ottawa, regarding the appearance of mould on the parchment paper linings of butter packages. In some cases it is said to have pon trated, the butter for some distance. Mould is a minute and low form of plant life. It grows from seeds which are called spores, and which develop only in the presence of moisture and where they have a supply of suitable food. Movid will grow readily on damp wood; hence the necessity for keeping the interior of a creamery and especally the refrigerating room, lry as possible.

Poorly constructed refrigerators are apt to be damp, because the arm air which gets in from outside carries moisture with it, which is deposited on the cooler surfaces of the walls, floors and packages. Frequent and prolonged orening of the doors also causes lampness.

It would be a good thing for the eamery owners, as well as for the trade generally, if it were compulsory to have all creameries horoughly disinfected, every spring before operations begin. The spores of mould, and other germs which cause bad flavors, are destroyed if the work is properly done. It is comparatively simple and inexpensive operation, if the following plan is adopted.

Wash the whole interior of the reamery including walls, ceilingfloors, posts, shelving, etc., with solution of one part bi chloride of nercury to one thousand parts water. Apply with a brush and scrub well wherever applied. The bi-chloride of mercury (corrosive sublimate) may be procured in tablet form, of the right strength to make the above solution by adding one tablet to every pint of water used. This substance is deadly poison and must be handled with every care and precaution. Formalin may also be used either as a sray or by being allowed to aporate from a sheet of cotton pended in the room when the doors, windows and other openings are tightly closed. It requires about five ounces or pure formaling

disinfect 1000 cubic feet. As a preventive of mould on outter, the following practice is ighly recommended:

Soak the parchment paper linings, immediately before using in a saturated brine to which has been added one ounce of pure formalin to three gallons of brine place the paper in the boxes without drying; keep the brine in a special covered vessel; boil the orine every week and add fresh formalin in the same proportion as at first. This treatment has been found effective in the government reameries in the Northwest Terri ories where there was a great deal of trouble with mould at one time, and has given good satisfaction wherever it has been properly carried out.

Probably much of the mould or butter is due to the infection of the parchment paper as it lies about the creamery without any protection and not always in a dry place. The spores do not develop on the dry paper, but as soon as it


