all spray and sucked me under for at least ten seconds. I was in a dazed condition, and could not swim from that time until after I got into the whirlpool. I could hardly get my breath in the spray and water. When the second wave struck me it nearly knocked the life out of me. I could tell that was being tossed about and tumbled around, and once was dashed so near the rocks on the American shore that I would have sold my chances of getting ten feet further alive for three cents. Yet I was powerless to do a thing to save myself. This was down below Buttery's elevator. I struck the whirlpool on the Canadian side, and after turning several complete somersaults was sucked under. I thought that was the last of me, but I came up just out of breath within fifty feet of the centre. I tried to swim and could not. A moment later I saw another suck hole bigger than the other, and made a battle for my life. I did not have strength enough left to pull myself out, and I must have laid there for a quarter of an hour. I had a big fight to get there. I saw no rocks or logs in the whirlpool. I lay there grasping the rock, and I could not have swum two more strokes. 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NEW BRUNSWICK GRANITE.

A correspondent of the Montreal Witness, writing from the Colonial Exhibition, devotes nearly half his letter to New Brunswick. Our province is not very large and there are larger exhibits than ours there, but we are getting fully our share of notice. This is largely due to Mr. Cornwall's energy, who loses no opportunity of bringing the province forward. One of the principal points urged by the correspondent of the Witness is that touched upon briefly in THE GLEANER recently, namely the English market for granite. The demand in England for granite is very large and constant. For curbing alone the importations are enormous, and they come principally from the Baltic. In New Brunswick some of the best granite quarries are upon the sea coast, and it has been said that granite could be carried as cheap from St. John to London as from Aberdeen to London. What remains to be proved is whether New Brunswick granite can be delivered in England as cheaply as the Baltic granite can. The matter is worth looking into.

FREDRICKTON AND MIRAMICHI.

The first load of through freight has been sent over the Northern and Western railway, and this should remind the business men of Fredericton that this new road is about ready for traffic between this city and the North Shore. It is time that the full significance of this was considered, and general attention should be given to the question. What can Fredericton sell to the North Shore counties? We have already indicated lines in which a trade can be done; that is, in fruits and small, and in agricultural produce generally. Some of our merchants would do well, probably, if they began the shipping of early fruit to Chatham and Newcastle. We suggest to the business men of the city that they appoint a committee out of their number to go over the Northern and Western railway and report upon the trade of the district which it intersects and connects with. There must be several lines in which a good trade can be opened up. The railway management will give every facilities possible to the development of trade between the two terminal points along the route.

THE MIRROR.

Sir Charles Tupper wishes it to be understood that he is coming to Canada to consult with the government about the establishment of a Canadian museum in London. This seems a very small matter to bring our very high, in fact altogether too high, commissioner across the Atlantic for, and although Sir Charles has emphasized the truth of his declaration of intentions by eating a lunch on the strength of it, whereas a very nice lot of people made speeches, still there are some who do not believe it, and who insist that a Macdonald cry has gone across the waters. Certainly the house of commons needs a leader. Sir John is no longer fit for the post, Sir Hector never was; Mr. Costigan is out of the question. Mr. Pope is as deficient in the rules of parliament as in those of syntax; Mr. McLean knows he cannot fill the place; Mr. Chapleau has lost heart; Mr. Caron, or rather Sir Adolphe, is too much in love with himself; Mr. Thompson has been proved unfit, and no one thinks of Mr. Foster for the place. Last session the commons practically had no leader, but with Sir Charles as minister of finance and leader of the house, when Sir John by reason of sickness or some less excusable trouble, was compelled to stay at home, things would go along better. The museum which Sir Charles has in his mind is most likely the toy cabinet of political curiosities.

TO BE HANGED.

All the accused Chicago anarchists are to be hanged, with one exception, and he is to be imprisoned for fifteen years. English papers, commenting upon the issue of the trial, express the liveliest satisfaction, and it is conceded that a powerful blow has been struck at the organization. Proof has been given to the instincts of self-preservation are strong enough to secure the punishment of all who set established law and order at defiance. The anarchists themselves on both sides of the water show by their violent expressions of opinion that they too feel the force of the blow. They appreciate the full effect of the proof that in Chicago, probably the worst democratic city in the world, their plans are as liable to be frustrated, and their nefarious schemes meet with as little sympathy as in the capitals of the most absolute sovereigns.

CAVES OF VULTURES.

Abodes of Death and Desolation Found in the Seeps Mountains. A letter in the Ventura Free Press says: The writer has, for the last few years, offered a liberal reward for a set of vultures and, numerous have been the attempts of both hunter and archer to procure them, with one common result—they were unable to find where they nest. Believing that the Pacific condor nests somewhere in the Seeps Mountains, I determined to make one grand effort, if possible, to obtain the eggs. After considerable search, I finally discovered the locality where these birds bring forth their young.

High up in one of the deep, dark gorges that put into the turbulent Seeps, a few miles above Devil's Gate, on the west side of the stream, at an altitude of more than four thousand feet, the house of the vulture was discovered. With all its strange and peculiar features. Climbing up the rocky gorge to a point where a perpendicular wall of rock fifty feet high stopped any further progress, and following along the base of the rocky cliff a few yards, I observed a cluster of pine trees that grew near the base of the cliff, and among them, at about the level of the projected rock some fifty feet, being full of limbs that projected at right angles to the cliff, I determined to climb the tree and, if possible, get on top of the rocky shelf that, like a terrace, extended for hundreds of feet around the rocky bluff.

With but little exertion I climbed to the top of the bluff, and, with careful attention walked on one of the projecting limbs six or eight feet and stepped down upon the terrace. Here I found a rocky shelf some ten feet wide, about three feet high, and covered with an overhanging wall, arranged something after the manner of the Cliff Dwellers of Arizona. The entrance to the cave was large enough for a person to comfortably pass in, being on an average ten feet deep.

On the floor of the cavern I scattered around a very Golconda of bones, while near the back I observed a pile of sticks, grass and other debris resembling a wood's nest, about three feet high, and containing in a uniformly pointed hollow. Taking a dry stick that lay near by, I proceeded to the back of the nest, finding that I had found a vulture's nest, and that the birds had covered up the eggs before departing in the morning. Denuding the pile a few inches, I came to the heads of half-decomposed, cases of numerous small animals, in which I recognized the head of a pig, or squirrel, and the skin of a small mammal. The stench was so great that I was compelled to retreat.

Entered a second cave where I found a similar pile, and pursuing my further investigations I entered a fourth cave, containing one of the most peculiar nests, in which I observed a hole at the base about six inches in diameter, and at the point of thrusting a stick into the hole, out came a most miserable looking creature, remaining for a moment before then darting back again. It once more appeared at the hole, completely filling the opening, and this time I discerned that it was gazing upon a young vulture, and that these piles were in reality vultures' nests, the sole object of my expedition. Stepping around the hole in the second chamber I began to tear down one of these holes, believing that I would find the eggs somewhere within the hollow pile.

Just then, casting my eyes upward, I beheld far to the northward the old bird sitting in the hollow nest, and with renewed vigor I hastily demolished the pile, and when about one-third of the top had been torn off, protruding from the partially decomposed carcasses of small animals, to my horror and surprise, there lay half buried in the heap, protruding from beneath, torn and lacerated, the head and neck of a small mammal, sufficiently intact not to be mistaken as to its identity. Appalled at this ghastly sight, I hastily retreated, and, looking backward, I beheld the old bird approaching the cave.

Knowing as I did that they would sweep down in a few minutes, I sprang to the edge of a rock, seized a protruding limb and rapidly descended to the foot of the tree, just in time, for that moment, like a great avalanche, with the velocity of lightning, they came pouring down the very earth I stood upon. Simultaneously they alighted upon the protruding limb, when, with their great wings still outstretched, they seemed to know at once that some daring intruder had ventured to enter their home of death and desolation.

Quickly rendering my gun and outfit and casting a look in the direction of the cave, I beheld that there were unmistakable indications of turmoil in the camp—the ground that I occupied was now a scene of confusion for the range of my rifle. Hurriedly retracing my steps down the dismal and rocky stream, with the horror and strange discoveries ever vividly before my eyes, it was not until I was past the Devil's Gate, where I halted, that I once more regained my normal condition of mind, determining that at some future day I would again visit the Vulture Caves of the Seeps.

A THOUSAND LIVES LOST.

Terrible Flood and Distress in Mandalay. Mandalay, Aug. 24.—One of the embankments of the Irrawaddy river burst in this city yesterday. The breach was 600 yards long and so rapid was the flow of water that in a few moments the full district was flooded from 4 to 20 feet deep. Fifty thousand persons are homeless in the city. Many of the food supply stores were swept away. The result will be an approach to famine among the homeless population. The damage done already amounts to \$5,000,000. Many dead bodies are being washed ashore. It is estimated that 1,000 persons lost their lives.

Editor Cutting's Address to the People of the United States. Editor Cutting last evening published an address to the people of the United States in which he thanks the citizens of El Paso, the press of Texas, and particularly Consul Brigham for the interest taken in his case and assistance rendered him during imprisonment. He says the main issue, that of Mexico's rights to exercise territorial jurisdiction over foreigners, is not at all settled by his release. He finds no violence about Mexico's her institutions, and expresses the hope that the United States will soon invade and conquer the whole country.

POWDERLY DEMONSTRANCE ANARCHY.

He Tells the Knights of Labor that the Ballot is Their Great Weapon After All.—An Anarchist Replies to Fowler. WILKESBAUR, Aug. 23.—The Knights of Labor of Luzerne and Lackawanna counties turned out en masse to-day to attend a great picnic held at Luzerne Grove. General Master Workman Fowler was present and delivered an address. He said now that the Democratic State Convention had met and done its work, and didn't nominate Powderly for any office, he was free to speak his mind. "I never desired any office," continued Mr. Powderly, "from either of the great political parties. The office I hold to-day is a grander and a nobler one than any in the gift of the American people, and so long as I occupy that position I shall keep my hand from politics. This should not be the case with Knights of Labor in general, however. The ballot is their great weapon after all. It is superior to the boycott and strikes. It strikes with telling effect, and I hope every Knight of Labor will make use of it this fall when he votes for Congressmen. There is one great growing evil in the land, and that is the land question. Congress should pass a law forbidding any man to own an acre of ground in this country unless he is an American citizen, or intends to become one. Let your duty this fall be to vote for men who will pass such a law. The foreign land sharks must go. I would also have you, as members of a great labor union, to drop all class and religious issues, and act in common brotherhood. The intricacies of the country are not yet prepared for an eight-hour movement, and the Knights of Labor must not force it upon the country. Anarchy is destructive of everything that is good, and men who destroy life and property and the torpedoes and dynamite are the worst kind of enemies to honest labor."

THE ANARCHIST'S REPLY.

CHICAGO, Aug. 23.—The late speech of Powderly, Grand Master Workman of the Knights of Labor, denouncing anarchy, has evoked a reply from A. H. Parsons, one of the convicted anarchists, which was sent as an open letter from his cell at night. He challenges Powderly to find a man who can truthfully say that he, Parsons, as socialist or anarchist, ever advocated or countenanced destruction of life or property. Parsons, in his letter, says the foundation principle of socialism or anarchism is the same as that of the Knights of Labor, the abolition of the wage system and the substitution in its stead of the industrial system of universal cooperation, making every capitalist a laborer and every laborer a capitalist. A HORSE TO GO OVER NIAGARA FALLS.

Forepaugh's Blonidin to Make the Attempt to Walk Across on a Tight Wire. Buffalo, Aug. 22.—The heroic performance at Niagara whirlpool have inspired the world-renowned animal trainer, Adam Forepaugh, Jr., with the belief that he can do something in a similar line which will not only make him famous, but present an unrivaled card for his father's great railroad show. It leaked out at Niagara Falls last evening that a horse was to walk a tight wire over the falls within a week or two. This afternoon a correspondent of THE GLEANER interviewed Thomas H. Davis, one of the managers of the show, who said: "The horse is a Morgan colt, Adam Forepaugh, Jr.'s, trained rope walker, and he is to make the attempt. The show is in Paderborn, Ont., and from there Mr. Forepaugh telegraphed me he had decided to make the attempt on Sept. 13, the day we come out of Canada and about at Suspension bridge. The idea is to stretch a two or three inch steel cable across, either on the brink of or a little below the falls. The wire will have to be wrapped with cotton cord so that Blonidin's rubber shoes will stick to it. Blonidin is a Morgan colt, Adam Forepaugh, Jr.'s, bought near West Chester, Pa. three years ago. He was four years old last spring. He is fourteen and a half hands high, is comely built, and weighs 800 pounds. Adam began training him at Philadelphia early last fall to walk the rope. At first the rope was placed only two feet from the ground, and Blonidin walked it for three days, and then to a two-and-a-half-inch rope, thirty feet long and twenty from the ground. He has walked a well-worn path in the establishment in both fit and workmanship, guaranteed by any establishment in the trade. RECESSION OF NIAGARA FALLS.

In 2,500 Years, at the Present Rate, the Rock Will Have All Worn Away. BUFFALO, Aug. 23.—The American Association for the advancement of science continued its session work to-day. The largest attendance in any session was that devoted to geology and geography. Much interest was manifested in a paper of Prof. R. S. Woodward, of Washington, on "The Rate of Recession of Niagara Falls." The professor has lately made a survey of the falls and deduced figures therefrom which he explained at length. He said that the area of the rock worn away at the Horseshoe Falls between the years 1842 and 1876 was 15,600 square feet, equal to 425 acres between 1875 and 1886, 60,000 square feet, or 1,377 acres. The mean length of the contour of the falls is 2,500 feet. The time required to recede one mile, if the rate is 2.4 feet per year, is 2,500 years. The minimum values for the yearly rate of recession, that is, the average rate along the whole contour are: From 1842 to 1876, 2.4 feet; from 1876 to 1886, 2.35 feet.
