In Beautiful England

A Brief Account of our Pleasant Experiences with The Canadian Weekly Newspaper Party of our Trip abroad

London, July 5.—To-day at the invitation of The Admiralty our party visited Weymouth to see the great North-Atlantic squadron. Our party left London by special train at about 9 o'clock. The train was made up of the latest pattern vestibule cars, and two up-to-date dining cars were attached, as we were to have lunch en route. The weather was not very promising, but although it rained at intervals, these showers fortunately came while we were in the train or under cover.

When our special train arrived we were greeted by the Lord Mayor, and members of the city council. We were escorted to motor cars and driven to the Municipal pavilion. This pavilion is almost entirely built of glass, and all the public functions were held therein.

Here the Lord Mayor tendered our party a gracious welcome to the old port of Plymouth. Mr. Harold Hale, editor of the *Orrilla Packet*, made a fine reply on behalf of our party. Before stepping into the tugs to go out to see the fleet we were shown something of Weymouth which is quite a picturesque summer resort.

Though the town is an ancient one the spirit of enterprise prevails there. The town forms a crescent around the bay and the esplanade circling around the shore is very fine. Recently the town had the width of the esplanade doubled with asphalt, making it much more attractive. A handsome pavilion has also been erected within recent years at the end of the esplanade. It is a beautiful summer resort and we were only sorry that our stay had to be brief.

When we reached the dock and looked out over the great river and outer harbors, crowded with warships of every description, we began to fear for the prospects of our Queen Elizabeth as promised. Sure enough a signal came from the Admiral's ship that the weather is too rough to attempt it, consequently our invitation from the Admiral to take afternoon tea with him had to be passed by, much to our disappointment.

We were assembled here we were told over one hundred vessels ranging from the superdreadnoughts to submarines. The sea was dirty and our little boat bobbed up and down like a peanut shell. We began to fear for the prospects of our Queen Elizabeth as promised. Sure enough a signal came from the Admiral's ship that the weather is too rough to attempt it, consequently our invitation from the Admiral to take afternoon tea with him had to be passed by, much to our disappointment.

We continued to sail through the fleet now and presently came to a flock of submarines. We were impressed by their large size. The subs appeared to be about 350 feet long and had crews of twenty to thirty. One of the subs while we were watching it, submerged. It took only a few seconds after she started to go down. We could see the periscope yards away. After staying down a few minutes she emerged, an operation that appeared as simple as the going down.

Our visit to the fleet being somewhat curtailing the good ladies of Weymouth hurriedly got up an afternoon tea which was ready to serve as the pavilion when we arrived. Some of those wonderful English strawberries with cream, cakes, and a cup of tea, just touched the spot after blowing around the channel for a couple of hours. By the way I must not forget to mention the extraordinary phenomenon that though many of our party had developed sea sickness with the slightest provocation on the ocean, bouncing around like on a scenic railway as our small boat pitched over the waves that afternoon, hadn't the least effect on anybody.

At Weymouth one of the oldest Masonic lodges in England is located. When the W. M. and members were informed that our party could not have afternoon tea at the Queen Elizabeth, they hurriedly gathered together the makings for a repast; cold ham, bread, strawberries, cake, cream etc. and invited thirty of the Masons of the party to visit their historic lodge room. There was such a rush to join the ranks of these fortunate that about fifty had the pleasure of going with this party. Here we were shown many rare and quaint objects familiar to the craft, and enjoyed one of the most entertaining hours of our entire trip. Here we saw one of the rare "breches bibles," and another, which was in use in the town printed in 1707.

which is celebrated the world over. Our special train left for its return trip to London at about 7 o'clock, and en route we were again served with a full course dinner on the train.

Friday morning we departed for London. We started at St. Pauls, then over to the Royal Exchange,

then to The Bank of England and later spent a couple of hours in the Tower of London. On our way back to our hotel we passed through Chropside and the ladies as usual did some shopping, but we cannot remember that they made any purchases.

At the invitation of the Port authorities of London we were invited to see the docks of the world's greatest port. A large steam tug awaited us at Westminster wharf on a bright sunny morning to convey us around the docks. Our hosts were represented by two directors, Mr. J. D. Gilbert M. P. and Sir Cyril Jackson K. B. E., and the Manager, Mr. Estell.

We steamed down the river at low tide past miles and miles of wharves until we came to the new King George V. and Royal Albert docks. The former dock is about a mile long and 600 to 700 ft. in width. With its general equipment of floating cranes, electric trucks and other modern appliances the dock cost four and a half millions of pounds sterling. The Royal Albert is also a wonderfully equipped dock with three miles of quays and 86 acres of water area.

It is interesting to note that the Port of London authority controls and administers docks and tidal portion of the Thames for a distance of no less than 70 miles. The area of the various dock estates totals 3,238 acres, with lineal quays of 32 miles with the largest enclosed water area in the world. No less than 630 giant cranes are utilized in handling freight and there is warehousing accommodation for a million tons of freight. Since 1910 the sum of 10 millions of pounds sterling has been expended in improving the port.

Every day 1,000 vessels of all descriptions pass Gravesend and vessels drawing 36 feet navigate the river as far as the King George dock, a distance of 40 miles from the seaward limit of the port. Twenty millions of tons of goods enter the port annually. The principal imports are grain, timber, frozen meat, wool, fruit, liquor, tea, rubber.

The above figures are appalling but one must remember that London is not only the commercial centre of the British Empire but the market and financial centre of the world. It is an encouraging fact that though business has been dull, the figures of tonnage handled for 1923 slightly exceeded the greatest previous record. In 200 years the trade of London has increased by 6,500 per cent.

Immense stacks of goods are held for merchants by the Port Authority. Tremendous modern warehouses are used for this purpose. We were shown through some of them by Mr. Estell, the manager of the Port of London. In the refrigerating warehouses where mutton from Australia, is stored, we saw muttons by the tens of thousands hanging in cold storage. Great Britain requires a tremendous supply of meat. Nearly fifty per cent of her consumption in this line is imported. The Smithfield meat market, London, is the greatest in the world. Less than 400,000 tons of meat of all descriptions were dealt with there in 1923.

London is also the world's greatest wool market. During 1923 bales of wool representing 67 millions of fleeces passed through the public sales. And not only for wool and meat but for almost every other commodity, is London an international market where goods can always be sold.

What we saw during our visit convinced us that no effort is being spared to maintain London's pre-eminent position as the Port of the Empire and the Market of the World.

ROCKS ALONG BAY CHALEUR AND RESTIGOUCHE ARE RICH IN INTERESTING FOSSILS

Fine Collection Brought Here from Maguasha—Containing Fossils of Ancient Fish and Plant Remains—Numerous Fossil Beds Discovered in These Parts Years Ago—Geological Survey Made on Shores of Restigouche and Bay Chaleur in 1880.

Although comparatively few of the young generation may know it, the shores of the Bay Chaleur, Restigouche, Cascapedia and Matapedia Rivers are, in places, rich in fossils, fauna and flora of fish and plant remains. Recently a most interesting collection of these fossils was secured by Mr. G. C. Woodward, American Consul here. These were obtained on the shore near Maguasha, Que.

The collection contains fossils of both plant and fish remains and also solidified fish bones. To one interested in geological research, these fossils are more interesting. Doubtless an extensive examination of rocks along the Restigouche and the Bay Chaleur would disclose many even more remarkable fossiliferous concretions.

For the information of our readers we have obtained a very interesting item dealing with the discovery of these fossils. It is an extract from the book by Thomas Chesmer Weston, F. G. S. A., published by Warick Bros. & Rutter of Toronto in 1899 under the title "Reminiscences Among The Rocks." The extract follows:

Part of the summer of 1880, was spent in the examination of the shore rocks of Baie des Chaleurs, Cascapedia and Matapedia Rivers, Campbellton and other localities in that district. The shore rocks of the Restigouche River near the back of Campbellton Bay Station and those on the opposite shore are highly interesting, containing as they do, a remarkable fauna and flora of fish and plant remains of Devonian age. Many fossils were collected from this locality by myself and later by Mr. Foord.

On the 11th of June, I crossed from Dalhousie to the north of Saumeneac Bay where I got board and lodging at a farm house, the occupants of which were an old couple and grown up son and daughter. My field of research here was along the shore towards Pt. Maguasha, Baie des Chaleurs, but chiefly on the shore of Saumeneac Bay. Here high cliffs of light yellowish grey sandstone occupy the shore. The rocks are of Devonian age and underlie the lower carboniferous conglomerates of the north shore of the Restigouche river. It was in these Devonian cliffs of Saumeneac Bay that Mr. R. W. Ellis of the Geological Survey in 1879 discovered the curious crustacean *Perrinitia*, or fish belonging to the Ganoids-whichever it is. This discovery led to my present researches and during the next summer to those of Mr. Foord, also of the Geological Survey staff.

Some of the beds of these great sandstone cliffs contain nodules, or concretionary forms. The following description from my notes on concretionary forms published in Transactions of the Nova Scotian Institution of Science will suffice:

"The Upper Devonian fish and plant-bearing beds of Saumeneac Bay, Quebec, are prolific in fossiliferous concretions, which are composed of calcareo-arenaceous rock, and take various forms according to the shape of the nucleus, which, when a fish, is often so well preserved that every bone can be seen. One of these concretions obtained by A. H. Foord measures over twenty inches in length, and contains the skeleton of a fish almost as long. It is *Chirolepis canadensis* (Whiteaves). In other concretions from this locality the writer and Mr. A. H. Foord found: *Clypeolepis microlepis* (Agassiz), *Phanerolepis curtip*, *Perrinitia canadensis* (Whiteaves), *Eusthenopteron Foordi*, etc."

These concretions are scattered along the shore, being washed up by the waves of the bay. It was in one of these I discovered the first fossil fish known to the Survey, from these rocks.

The following day I collected from these same fossil fish-beds, fossil plants, among which were specimens of and old fashioned fern-which Sir William Dawson has since named *Archaeopteris Jacksoni*.

Dr. Campbell was one of those named with Sir Richard Spedden, former Premier by a commission which investigated Newfoundland governmental affairs early this year.


An autopsy was held last night by Dr. M. T. Sullivan and Dr. Dan McNeil and their findings will be available for the coroner's jury this afternoon.

Of Interest to Women

Five Easy Recipes For the Fish Course

Codfish Tarts
Boil a pound of codfish and carefully flake it with a fork. Make a rich cream sauce and add to it the juice of an onion, juice of half a lemon, a teaspoonful of chopped parsley, a tablespoonful of washed capers halved, pepper, salt and a quarter teaspoonful of sugar. Add the fish. Line deep tartlet pans with the mixture, lattice the tops with tiny strips of paste and bake until the crust is done. Garnish with a spray of fresh watercress. Serve deviled eggs with the tarts.

Savory Sole
Select a thick, heavy flounder and have it filleted. Rinse the fillets, then poach them in hot water to which add a half teaspoonful of salt and a tablespoonful of vinegar. When done lift with a skimmer to a buttered dish that will stand over heat. Sprinkle with the juice of a half lemon and a half onion. Bake five minutes, dredge with a little flour and cook until a delicate brown. Serve in the dish that the fish is cooked in, and garnish with sliced lemon dipped in chopped parsley. Serve mint jelly and broiled potatoes with the dish.

Salmon Fritters
Flake finely a small can of salmon which should yield about a cupful. Have ready a batter made of a level cupful of flour, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, a teaspoonful of cornstarch, a salt-teaspoonful each of salt and sugar, one beaten egg, a tablespoonful of melted butter and a half cupful of milk. Beat the batter very smoothly, then add the flaked fish. Drop by spoonfuls in hot fat and cook a delicate brown. Serve the fritters in a napkin with tartar sauce.

Scalloped Fish in Ramekins
Take cold fish left from boiled or broiled fish and flake enough to make a full cup or a little more. Add to the fish a half cupful of crumbs, a beaten egg, juice of an onion, a chopped hard boiled egg and a teaspoonful of finely minced red pepper. Fill buttered ramekins lightly with the mixture and add a tablespoonful of cream to each one. Bake ten or twelve minutes or until they are a delicate brown. Garnish with parsley.

Cod in Tomato Jelly
Cook a can of tomatoes with celery, parsley, peppers and seasoning.

Add a half packet of gelatine and when melted strain the mixture over a cupful of cold flaked fish. Turn into individual moulds and set to harden. Serve on lettuce leaves.

To Solve the Problems of New Household Fabrics

There is no reasonable excuse for shabby curtains, hangings or furniture coverings in these days, for materials are more fascinating and offered at prices that fit all pocket-books. If one wishes to be individual, she may get plain linens, crash, casement cloth, cotton materials or upholstery canvas, and her own stencil after individual designs and thus achieve effects that are distinctive.

The stencil outfit is simple and cheap to acquire. The stencils are to be had at art shops in many designs, but if cut at home the paper for them may be purchased already prepared, or it may be done at home by taking a cartridge paper and treating it to a coat of varnish. The stencil should be cut carefully with a sharp stencil-knife. The edges must be cut sharply and not ragged. A round brush is used like a stiff shaving brush, and the stencil plate must be kept wiped clean with a soft cloth so it will not blur the pattern in any way. Satins and shiny surfaces are hard to stencil, for they do not absorb as readily and it takes a practiced hand to be successful with them.

French percales are attracting attention among curtain materials and show many charming patterns. English chintzes are more popular than ever this season and many have most interesting and softly colored designs taken from Chinese porcelains and old tapestries. Early colonial linens show the familiar thistle, wheat and corn-flower designs on soft nut-brown backgrounds. One-tones are suitably patterned for nearly all uses and the dark well covered grounds are serviceable where they are likely to have hard usage.

Bedroom curtains made of white organdy or muslin are daintily ruffled with organdy in sunset colors. Ruffled top and bottom with rows of narrow ruffles between, they are dainty. Net curtains applied with cut-out flowers of organdy are new and quite unusual in appearance. To have the curtains individual they must be done at home, the work is easy to do and can be done in border formation, or in all over design depending on the style of the cut-outs.

The rubberized chintz that comes for bathroom curtains and for the shower curtain, may now be had in several patterns and it can be made to order to match the color scheme of the bathroom. Tie-dyed curtains in a light weight quality of cotton crepe are among the unusual things of the season. Art shops and individual makers are creating designs that are unique and in colors that are not to be had in any other way. Shaded curtains are a fad and they are very effective if the shading is not too dark, though the dark set part is always placed at the bottom of the window shade. Cotton crepe is just the material for this use as it comes in cobweb texture.

Curtain trimmings and tie-backs are of importance in the finishing of modern curtains and they are a study for those who know the subtleties of their use. One decorator who used pansy-shade tie-dyed curtains, cut the flowers from large sized pansy cretonne and mounted them on a stiff backing of the crinoline for the tie-backs and secured a most charming effect which made the windows look unusual and French in conception. It is these odd touches that make a room attractive.

Where chintz is used in the bedroom, the dressing table is trimmed with it and it is used for a bedthrow as well. The chintz spreads are frequently trimmed with ball fringe dyed to match the most prominent color in the pattern.

A curious profession for a woman is that of a dinner taster. She is a product of Parisian refinement and spends a portion of each day visiting houses and tasting dishes intended for dinner. She suggests improvements and shows the cook new ways of preparing dishes. The duties are pleasant and the compensation ample.

Report of Hon. Dr. Foster, Chairman of Executive Committee

St. John, N. B., Oct. 12.—Hon. Dr. W. E. Foster, chairman of the executive committee of the "Buy-At-Home and Maritime-Made" campaign submitted a report on Friday showing that the movement was receiving strong support from merchants and various organizations and was meeting with gratifying success.

The Board of Trade, Retail Merchants' Association and the Maritime Manufacturers' Association have endorsed the movement which has proved popular in the three provinces.

A. Macaulay had been well received in Halifax and A. L. Crooby, also acting on behalf of the committee, obtained strong endorsement from the St. Stephen Board of Trade and Mayor De Wolfe.

Representative men have spoken publicly on behalf of the campaign, business houses have distributed campaign literature in their mail matter and in a number of towns there have been displayed cards advocating the buying of Maritime-Made Goods.

Marked co-operation had been received from Mayor Potts and J. D. McKenna, M. P., and support had been given by Sir Douglas Hasen and Hon. Fred Magee, Hon. J. A. MacDonald, Minister of Public Works and Hon. J. E. Byers, Minister of Agriculture, P. E. I., had greatly benefited the movement. Hence J. Logan, M. P., had been a strong supporter and although in its infancy the movement had already been responsible for improvement conditions it appeals both to reason and sentiment of our people and endeavored to inspire a resolute desire to support and encourage our manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers, by purchasing the products of our own industries from our own business organizations. It inspires the consumer to make a real effort to spend as much of the yearly outlay in such a manner that the money spent will remain currently active within the Maritime Provinces. It impresses the fact that prosperity and expansion depend upon ready markets for the products of our workers and that the home market is of first importance.

LINER CUT BIG WHALE IN TWO

Berengaria Struck Giant Fish Death Blow, Off the Banks

The officers of the Cunarder Berengaria and Cherbourg, recently told how a mammoth fish met the mammoth liner at the tail end of the Grand Banks, Wednesday morning and what happened.

According to Chief Officer E. J. Rodgers, the whale was a 20-tonner and fully 80 feet long.

The Berengaria was steaming at 23 knots and with the weight of 78,000 tons of steel and iron behind her stem, struck the giant fish a death dealing blow just behind its midships. The shock was not felt at all on the liner. He believed the whale had died and was coming to the surface when the Berengaria struck it. The sea was dyed red for several feet and the whale was bent like the letter "J" as it passed along the star-board side, and was only hanging together by a few feet of blubber and skin. The incident occurred just before 8 o'clock in the morning when there are not many of the first cabin passengers on deck.

Capt. Irvine, the master of the Berengaria said that he had been nearly 40 years at sea in sailing vessels, warships, and steamships, and it was the first authentic case he had ever known of a big liner striking a whale.



CARIBOU INCREASE NOW APPARENT

Protection of Animals is Having Effect—Herd of Nine Recently Seen on Tobique

(Fredericton Mail)
Reports of Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon indicate that caribou are showing signs of increase this season. The animals have been protected for some years and still are protected. The possibility is that in time the caribou will become plentiful enough to permit hunting. Game Warden Gough of Tobique has informed the Chief Warden that he recently saw a herd of nine caribou in his territory. That was about a week ago and earlier in the autumn the caribou were seen in the same section. It is three years since they were first observed in the Tobique country. The increase which has been noticed is believed to be the result of breeding and not of migration. This is very encouraging.

Originally the caribou returned to New Brunswick from Quebec via the Matapedia Valley. It is believed that they came from the Gaspé Peninsula. Some years ago New Brunswick was an excellent caribou country and a migratory instinct and frequently changes its district of habitation. A theory which is strongly supported by fact is that with the increase in the number of deer the caribou move out of deer infested country.

ASKS INFORMATION OF LOST BOAT

Sailed from Iceland in August and Has Not Been Heard of

Campbellton, N. B., Canada, October 14, 1924.

Gentlemen:
Mr. Harrison Smith, editor of the Motorboat, a nautical publication issued in New York City, has requested through the Department of State at Washington, D. C., that any possible information be furnished regarding the whereabouts of the Norwegian yacht "LIEP ERICSON." Mr. Smith states in part as follows:

The LIEP ERICSON is a 40 ft. Norwegian double-ender equipped with an auxiliary engine, purchased by Mr. Nutting in Norway in the Spring. When last heard of the LIEP ERICSON was on the point of leaving Iceland about August second. In newspaper despatches from the world-fliers dated from Iceland this vessel and her crew were mentioned. Since leaving Iceland this yacht has not been heard of although Mr. Hildebrand was to cable the writer of this letter at the first opportunity. Since the coast of Greenland seems to have been surrounded by a considerable ice-sheet at that time, it is probable that they did not put into Greenland but headed straight for the coast of Labrador, the nearest point of land, in that case, being Cape Farewell. The yacht is now apparently a month or more overdue.

I will appreciate being advised of any information that may come to the attention of any of the readers of your paper regarding the above.

NEW PAPER PLANT FOR EDMUNDSTON

Fraser Companies and Others Interested in New Venture on St. John River

Fredericton, Oct. 22.—Fredericton men who were in Edmundston during the week-end report having seen engineers making surveys for what was said to be development of the project for construction of the proposed new paper mill across the St. John river from Edmundston at Madawaska, Me. Edmundston people told them, they say, that the survey which was being made along Church street and across what is known as the Stevens property was not for the town or for either of the C. N. R. or the C. P. R. but for Fraser Companies, Limited. The impression seemed to be that the route was being mapped out for an overhead or underground carrier, by which pulp, manufactured at the Fraser plant at Edmundston, can be carried to the proposed new paper mill, which apparently is to be erected across the river at Madawaska.

Reports which are current in business circles are that the Frasers will be one of the three interests identified with the new plant and that the project will be of extensive proportions. In this connection it is again reported that the Brown Corporation, whose interests are said to represent \$60,000,000, and which include extensive holdings in pulp, paper and hydro interests in the province of Quebec, are one of the interests to be identified with the project.

Ranger & Aroostook Railway, which has made elaborate changes in its yard facilities at Madawaska, apparently in anticipation of extensive industrial development there.




