the Red Sea, upon which the British teamer Dacca, from London to Brisbane, kruck on Friday last, is 400 miles from

Suez, and is directly in the track of naviga-tion. A lighthouse, the light from which is visible for fourteen miles at night, marks the reef, which is a few inches above the sea at low water.

The Daca struck the reef at 6 o'clock in the morning. The weather was fine and clear. The steamer's bows were stove, but she floated for 4 hours. There were twelve saloon passengers on board and a large number of emigrants in the steerage. A majority of the emigrants were young women. The passengers took refuge on the reef, a few of them being accommodated in the lighthouse, but most of them being forced to remain on the rocks. Many of the latter were compelled to stand in water up to their waists. Most of the passengers lost their clothes.

The steamer Rosar, from Bombay for Odessa, barely succeeded in rescuing the officers and crew of the Doca before she sunk. The steamer l'alameotta, from Greenock for Calcutta, took passengers off the reef, and afterward took the Dacca's officers and crew from the Rosario and landed all of them, 419 persons at Sungay ons, at Suez on Sunday

Meissonier's painting of 1814 was slld in
Paris on Wednesday for 131,000 francs. There have been violent earthquakes at Belizane and Mostagangem.

Five persons have been killed by an explosion in a powder factory at Kaipiais, a railway station 120 miles from Helsingfors. A riot was caused at Guelma, Algeria, by Arabs pillaging Jews' stores. The troops were compelled to interfere in order to re-store order. Several Arabs were killed.

A protest has been presented to the Bishop of London against the reredos in St. Paul's Cathedral, as "encouraging ideas and devotions of an unlawful, idolatrous and superstitious kind." The reredo includes a crucifix and the Madonna.

The following is the return of transceamings of the Canadian Pacific Railway: From 7th to 14th May, 1890, \$255,000; 1889, \$238,000; increase for 1890, \$47,000.

Work has commenced on the Southwestern Railway, that is, the branch of the Canadian Pacific leading from the main line at Caughnawaga to Valleyfield, passing themore, Chateauquay and Beauharnois. line at Caughnawaga to Valleyfield, passing through Chateauguay and Beauharnois. The greater part of the line has been located, and a portion of the right of way purchased; and the remainder of the line will be located as soon as possible. This line will be practically parallel to the branch of the Grand Trunk leading from St. Martin Junction to Valleyfield. It is said that this new C. P. R. line will connect at Valleyfield with the line to be constructed between with the line to be constructed between that place and Malone, N. Y., to connect with the American roads.

WASHED OFF ONE BY ONE! HAMILTON HAPPENINGS.

The Crew of the Capsized Schoone Jessie Breck Might Have Been

KINGSTON, May 20.—The schooner Jessie Breck, which lost her crew last Saturday off Nine Mile Point, has not yet been brought here. Mrs. Dunlop, wife of Franklin Dunlop, lighthouse-keeper at the head of Simcoe Island, saw more of the disaster than perhaps any other person. When her hasband leveled his marine places upon the yeared, he observed men When her busband leveled his marine glasses upon the vessel, he observed men clinging to the wreck. He turned to his wife and, giving her the glasses, told her to keep sight of them till he could have a message sent for help. She could see men on the vessel after it turned over. There were three or four holding on to the railing of the boat, and there was another in the rigging. The vessel disappeared from sight but a minute or so and then came to the surface. Three men ran along the side towards the cabin of the boat, and the man in the rigging kept waving his hat to those on shore. They held bravely on for fully three-quarters of an hour, then began to be washed off one at a time, the man in the rigging being the last

time, the man in the rigging being the last to disappear.

Had a life-saving crew been stationed at the point at Nine Mile Light it would not be necessary to chronicle the loss of so many lives. Fifteen minutes would have brought such a crew to the side of the Breek, and those clinging to the wreck would have been saved. THE MORMON CHURCH. Decision of the Supreme Court of Utah Affirmed.

Washington, May 20.—The Suprer Court of the United States has rendered a opinion of vital interest to the Mormo Church in the suit of the Church of t Church in the suit of the Church of the Latter Day Saints against the United States, which comes here on appeal from the decision of the Supreme Court of Utah in favor of the United States. This court affirms that judgment. The case grows out of the passage of the Edmunds! Anti-Polygamy Law by the Forty-ninth Congress. This law, among other things disapted the Mormon Church Forty-ninth Congress. This law, among other things, dissolved the Mormon Church corporation, annulled its charter, directed the appointment of a receiver to wind up its affairs and escheated to the United States affairs and escheated to the United States all the real estate owned by the church in excess of \$50,000 which was not on the date of the passage of the act held for purposes of worship or burial. When the United States under the terms of this act began proceedings to confiscate about \$750,000 worth of property belonging to the church the Mormons immediately entered suit to have the Edmunds law declared unconstitutional with the result above stated.

WOOSTER, O., May 20.—A severe cyclone, rain and hail storm passed over parts of this county Sunday afternoon, doing great damage. The storm swept a section three miles wide and eighteen long. In Congress every pane of glass facing north and west unprotected by blinds was broken by the hail stones, which ranged in size from a peato a hen's egg, and fell to a depth of eight inches on the level. Entire orchards and strips of oak timber were blown down or twisted to the ground. Many houses, barns and outbuildings were unroofed or blown down. Hail stones were driven through roofs covered with oak shingles. At Rowsburg hail fell to the depth of eight to twelve inches and drifted to the depth of 32 inches. Death of School Inspector D. M. Malloch. CLINTON, Ont., May 20.—D. M. Malloch, inspector of public schools for North Huron, died suddenly this morning of paralysis. BONES AT HIGHGATE. Excitement at the Discovery of an Ex-

Highgate is in a flutter of excitement Highgate is in a flutter of excitement over the discovery of the bones of son e extinct species of a monstrous animal. Some time ago in digging a ditch on the farm of Mr. William Raycraft a couple of bones were disinterred. A commercial man heard of the occurrence and became the possessor of the ancient ossifications. A few days ago he returned and paid Mr. Raycraft \$25 for the privilege of digging in the "swale" where the bones had been discovered. Several mer were set to work on Friday last, and before evening they discovered. Among these was a large jaw-bone which at the points of articulation measured 2 feet 2½ inches across, with six teeth in perfect preservation, 6 inches long and 2½ inches across. The shin-bone was 4 feet 6 inches long and 7 inches in diameter; a shoulder blade was as large as the top of a No. 9 stove. A number of ribs were feund varying from 4 feet 6 inches to 6 feet 8 inches in length. The monster to whom this frame work belonged was herbivorous and must have stood over twenty feet high. THE

LIFE AND PROPERTY.

An important change in the English criminal law has been decided on by the British Government, and the result is the ntroduction into the Imperial Parliament of a bill for the establishment of a Court of Criminal Appeal. The present cour of Crown cases reserved is to be abolished and provision is made to appeal questions the House of Lords. As the law of la now stands, the smallest case in ordinary civil law can be carried to the highest tribunal on matters of fact or of law, but when a person is sentenced to be hanged his appeal can only come before the Home Secretary, except in those few cases where the appeal may come within the provisions of the rules of Crown cases reserved. Under the new law the question of a man's life will be put on the same footing and rereceive the same consideration from the courts as is extended to the infringment of

rights of property.

The reform has not come any too soon. Most unsatisfactory has been the experience of referring the appeals regarding capital punishment to the Home Secretary. In two recent cases, in which Home Secreary Matthews has been called to act the outcry from the public has been most marked. The disposal of the Maybrick case caused a sensation, but it was nothing mpared with the reception given by the

public to the verdict of Mr. Matthews in the Davies brothers' case. It will be recollected that in the last named case, of their father, who had treated both them and their mother in a most brutal manner. The jury recommended the culprits to mercy, but the Home Secretary only saw fit to save the life of one of them. As the public had made up their minds that both were equally guilty, and that the crime, under the circumstances, was not of the worst character, the action of the Minister gave rise to widespread discontent. It does seem fair that the Home Secretary should be relieved of the unpleasant duty of reviewing the evidence in capital cases, and reprieving or confirming the sentence. He may be sub jected to pressure of a sort that is hard to understand, especially if he is of a pliable or sentimental disposition, and it is proper that but one consideration—that of justice should actuate those charged with the duty. There can be no doubt that the pub lic clamor has compelled the British Government to propose the new departure. It would not surprise us if the Do-minion Government follows suit, and determines to throw the onus of interfering with decisions in cases of capital punishment upon the Supreme Court of Canada. The present system of making the Minister of Justice the only agency to which appeal can be made in regard to the

death penalty has many disadvantages.

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
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

London West Wants Better Terms Be

A meeting of the ratepayers of London West was held in Collins' Hall last evening for the purpose of ascertaining the state of feeling with regard to the amalgamation of that village with the city. Mr. R. S. Murray was elected chairman and after a few emarks, called on Mr. D. C. Macdonald.
Mr. Macdonald reviewed the situation

and pointed out the many advantages that and pointed out the many advantages that would accrue to the village from amalgamation. Short speeches were then made by Messrs. W. H. Bartram, W. Smith, W. Scarrow, W. Nicholls, J. B. Allenby, Louis Ludwig and Reeve Lacey, Councilor Spence and Trustee Garrett, the majority of whom were opposed to amalgamation on the terms at present proposed by the city, but if better inducements were held out they would favor it.

After most of the speakers had expounded their views, Mr. Macdonald again took the platform to move the following resolution:

That this meeting of the ratepayers of the village of London West instructs the Village Council to submit a bylaw to the electors for the amalgamation of the village with the City of London on the terms at present proposed. or London on the terms at present proposed.

Speaking in support of the motion he
pointed out the unreasonableness of expecting the same differential rate that
London South secured. That suburb, he

London South secured. That suburb, he claimed, was free from debt, but the village was in debt by debentures to the amount of \$30,000. He produced a letter of recent date from Mayor Taylor to the effect that the City Council, not having rescinded their former offer, were still willing to take London West into the city on the terms at first proposed.

Councilor Spence objected to the motion. He thought that the village was better off as it was in the face of the terms proposed by the city. He was prepared to prove that the village enjoyed as many advantages now as it would as an outlying ward of the city. If it amalgamated it should receive better terms.

Mr. W. H. Bartram took the platform and moved in amendment to the m Mr. Macdonald: That this meeting of the ratepayers of the village instructs the Council not to submit any bylaw on this question until such time as a more equitable arrangement has been submitted by the city.

Several in the audience rose to second the amendment, which was carried by a large majority.
