Hector's Cross-Examination Continued.

Perley Made the Scapegoat for Ministerial Delinquencies.

OTTAWA, Aug. 13.—Sir Hector's cross-examination was continued yesterday afternoon. He said: "This morning there was a

Personally he knew no more about the details of that work than of all the other works in the Dominion. He did not know of the reduction for the plant at Esquimalt until he saw it stated here. Mr. Perley took it upon aimself to deduct the \$19,000 on the final estimate. He did not remember Thomas McGreevy complaining to him about Bennett. He was not aware that anyone spoke to him upon the subject except Mr. Perley. Ho admitted that corruption was no doubt charged against Thomas McGreevy, but denied that anything of that kind was imputed against him. The only thing against himself, he submitted, was the testimonial, and that coald hardly be considered a very heinous thing.

LISH PRESS COMMENT ON THE SCANDAL. ENGLISH PRESS COMMENT ON THE SCANDAL. A London cablegram says: The Ottawa Scandals continue to be much discussed in he newspapers and in the clubs. Everywhere one hears such remarks as, "Well, Goldwin Smith was not far wrong in his criticism of Canadian political methods." The Chronicle, the Advertiser, the Pall Mall Gazette, the St. James' Gazette and the Canadian Gazette approve of Sir Hector Langevin's resignation, though some of the journals ask why it has been so long delayed. McGreevy has for many years carried and paid the interest on Sir Hector's notes for \$10,000 given to covey the expense of contented elections in 1876 and 1877. ACCIDENTAL DEATH.

Verdict on the Steel Fatality by the Coroner's Jury-The Evidence Ad-duced-Was Drink the Cause?

duced—Was Drink the Cause?

The inquest on the body of the late Wm. Steel, the London township tarmer killed at the Hyde Park crossing of the London, Huron and Bruce Railway Tuesday afternoon, was held Wednesday morning before Cornor Smith, of this city, at the residence of Thomas Finnegan, in the village. The jurors were: Thomas Routledge (foreman), John Brown, Daniel Cummings, George Dickie, Thomas Skippen, Thomas Skippen, jun., George Nixon, John H. Wade, Peter McNames, George T. Tremeer, Donald Barelay and John Wood. The prominence of deceased in the locality caused a great deal of interest in the investigation, the place being crowded. Following is a summary of the evidence:

John Fletcher, the engineer on the train in question, saw deceased when about 100 to 140 yards from the crossing, whipping his horses. The engine was about 150 yards from the spot. Witness made every effort to stop the locomotive, blew the whistle and rang the bell. If deceased had been drinking moderately the cars would have got a full length of the train past the spot before he would have got on the track, but he whipped the horses right up to the crossing. Witness had been an engineer for 42 years and never knew of anything particularly dangerous about the crossing.

Fireman John Dixon did not see the victim until he was thrown from the front of the engine. He heard the whistle blow eight or nine poles from the crossing and rang the bell. The engine seemed to strike The inquest on the body of the late Wm

eight or nine poles from the crossing and rang the bell. The engine seemed to strike the wagon in the middle.

Dr. Waugh made the post-mortem examination and found the serious wounds principally on the head. The bones of the skull had been fractured in several places; this was the cause of death.

Wm. Schwab, the conductor, saw nothing before the accident. He heard an unusually long whistle and the air brakes being applied. The train was going between 20 and 25 miles an hour. Edward McKenzie was in the baggage car and heard the whistle given, but learned nothing until the engine had struck. Fletcher was considered a very careful en-

gineer. Brakeman Walter Raley could not see anything from where he was standing at the time. Afterwards he saw the horses

going up the road.

Thomas Finnegan, section foreman, heard a crash and saw the horses a short distance west of the track, but from where he was could not see the team approaching. There was nothing to prevent a man coming from the east seeing a train approaching from the junction after passing the C. P. R. crossing.

and heard no signal from the train before or after passing the crossing.

Wm. Sampson, section foreman, was also in the house, and heard signals given; could not say, where.
