Fatal Fencing in Paris. Paris, Nov. 8 .- A shoemaker named ouberty was in the habit of taking fencing exercise every morning at his shop with exercise every morning at his shop with his workman, Theephile Ouisset. Yesterday they were fencing as usual. Suddenly, in the heat of the combat, when Huberty was acting on the offensive, the button of Ouisset's foil fell off. Huberty received the steel full in the face. The point penetrated the rear of the nose and went through the brain. Huberty fell dead on the spot. The unfortunate man was married and the father of eight children.

Paris, Nov. 8.—The first account greatly underrated the havoe wrought by the explosion caused by Anarchists. When the consternation had subsided a search was made of the station, and the dead bodies of four men were found. So violent was the explosion that the houses in the vicinity were shaken to their foundations.

The British Navy. LONDON, Nov. 8.—The declaration by Lord Wolseley, commander-in-chief of the forces in Ireland, of his belief that the British navy could not be depended upon to prevent an invasion of England, has started a controversy which two or three recent events will help along. The demonstration of the great superiority of American armor plate and the stupidity shown by the wreck of the battle ship Howe have discredited with the public even the compliment to the navy for its efficiency with which Wolseley accompanied his warning. The loss of the Howe was distinctly due to the rule which has already cost the American navy so dear, namely, refusing the services of a pilot which were offered by the Spanish authorities.

A Dearly Bought Lesson. London, Nov. 8 .- The disaster to the Scotch express has revived, as nothing else could have done, the agitation in favor of abandoning the little boxes on wheels in which Englishmen allow themselves to be trundled about the country. The Pullman car near the head of the train not only preserved the lives of its occupants, but it saved all the cars behind it. The whole English press is emphatic in recognizing the superior strength and safety of American rolling stock, and in demanding a radical reform in car construction. American summer visitors have little knowledge of the disconforts of English railway travel in cold weather. The cars are not heated, and travelers go about encumbered with rugs to keep from freezing. It is necessary to shut out all fresh air from the little compartments. A GREAT WESTERN INDUSTRY.

The Ontario Dairymen's Association was organized in 1867 by a few of the prominent dairymen in the neighborhood of Ingersoll for promoting and developing dairying in the Province of Ontario. Its offorts at first were confined altogether to its annual conventions, where addresses were delivered by practical dairymen on the latest methods and thought on improved dairying and discussions took place on practical subjects, which were no doubt the means of laying the foundation of our present standing as producers of the best quality and highest-priced cheese outside of Great

In 1876 our cheese industry had assumed such large proportions, and our dairying interests had so developed, that it was interests had so developed, that it was thought that better work would be done by having two organizations instead of one, and consequently the Dairymen's Association of Eastern Ontario was organized to look after the dairying interests of the east, while the old organization remained in the west and became the Dairymen's Association of Western Ontario.

After this division of the work the West.

After this division of the work the West-After this division of the work the West-ern Association began to extend its sphere of operations and to make its work more instructive and practical. A competent in-spector and instructor was employed to visit the cheese factories in order to inspect the milk and to give instruction to the cheesemakers and dairymen in the best methods of manufacturing a first-class article of cheese. The importance of this work of instruction and inspection began to be recognized by dairymen as a means not only of improving the quality of the cheese and raising the standard of dairy products generally, but also of establishing the business on a firmer basis, and of making the work of the association more effective and practical. During the past five years four competent instructors and inspectors have been in the employ of the association, and have visited nearly all the cheese factories in Western Ontario, giving practical instruction to the makers, inspectacthods of manufacturing a first-class cheese factories in Western Ontario, giving practical instruction to the makers, inspecting the milk supplied to each factory and tooking after the interests of dairying generally. The results of their work cannot be too highly estimated, as the chief factor in improving the quality of the milk even in improving the quality of the milk sup-plied to the factories and in raising the standard of our western cheese to its pres-

investigation and practical information im-parted to the many cheesemakers who have availed themselves of its privileges.

Though this system of instruction has been widespread in its efforts, still there is one member of the dairy commission who has been neglected, and he is the patron of the cheese factory. It is quite as important, if not more important, that the man who supplies milk for the manufacturing of cheese should know how to produce it in



PHILADELPHIA'S WOMAN LEPER.

PHILADELPHIA'S WOMAN LEPER.

The Disease Contracted From a Mexican Family Thirty-five Years Ago.

PHILADKLPHIA, Nov. 8.—Philadelphia has three genuine cases of leprosy. Two of the subjects are Chinamen, and one is an aged white woman, whose name is withheld at her earnest request in order that her children may not be ostracized. All three are housed and cared for in an isolated building within the municipal hospital grounds.

Physicians say that it is rare that the disease has attacked one of the Caucasian race, and still less frequently any native of this country or climate. Such rare cases of leprosy as have been reported in people of American birth have usually been contracted in foreign lands by intimate association with other victims.

The condition of the woman in question was first brought to the attention of the health authorities of this city in Augustiast, up to which time none had suspected what her real affection was. It was then learned that 35 years ago she had lived with a Mexican family in this city. The head of this family suffered long with what was pronounced slephantiasis, and she had cared for him in his illness, which at last proved fatal. The Mexican's son also died during her service in the family from what leprous spot appeared on one of her limbs. It soon disappeared, however, and she felt no alarm. Her children grew to maturity and her hair whitened with age, all without further premonition of the dreadful disease. About three years ago a few blotches made their appearance, and last February they began to increase with alarming rapidity. Finally she came to Dr. Welsh, of the Municipal Hospital, wo pronounced it a case of genuine leprosy.


