The Editor of The Advertiser:
A short time ago a letter appeared in the press criticising the residents around Victoria Park on account of the condition of their roadways. As far as the block in which I live is concerned, the blame rests with the city, as we sent a petition to the council some years ago asking to have our road scarified, graded, graveled, rölled and oiled at our expense, but the council turned down our request, though none of us were able to see that there was any good reason for doing so. Every resident to whom I spoke at that time wanted a good street, and was willing to pay for it, but hardly any of them wanted the dusty asphalt pavement, and we felt confident that a well-graded road with a good surface would stand wear and give good satisfaction. There is no doubt that an oiled macadam road is much freer from dust than a pavement; in fact, I have heard bitter complaints from housekeepers about the dust raised from pavements, and that person will do the city a great service who can persuade the engineer's department to experiment on a few blocks such as ours with a road built as perfectly and as evenly as possible, and after that run a grader over it a few times a year when the road is wet. When hard gravel is put upon a sandy foundation, such treatment should keep it in good condition for many years.

There are no streets on which such treatment would be were ascertable.

Philadelphia, June 15.—Convinced, according to counsel for the plaintiffs, that organized baseball had entered into no conspiracy to wreck its business, the Baltimore Federal League Club today dropped its \$900,000 anti-trust damage suit against the American and National leagues, the national commission and other defendants. Swoboda is accused of re-cruiting spies to work against France, and is alleged to be in close relations with a Geneva businessman who was recently sentenced to life imprisonment in Paris for espionage.

When arrested in Paris in March, 1915, Swoboda had an American passport, and claimed to be an American citizen. At his trial it was said his name was Schwind, and that he was a German reserve officer. He was finally discharged and ordered expelled from France.

The British steamer Caithness was torpedoed without warning on April 19 while 240 miles from land. The captain and twenty men were drowned, and the remainder of the crew were found in a capsized boat on which they had drifted for sixteen days without food. Only two were alive when the boat was picked up.

PARIS. June 15.—Four French ships of more than 1,600 tons, one under that size, and three fishing boats were sunk by mine or submarine during the week ending June 14. Six ships were unsuccessfully attacked during the same period, while 1,034 vessels of all nations entered French ports and 1,015 left.

TURKISH STRONGHOLD ON RED SEA COAST TAKEN BY BRITISH

LONDON, June 14.—Fort Saliff, on the east shore of the Red Sea, has been captured by British warships, it was officially announced this evening. The announcement says:

"The commander-in-chief in the East Indies reports that Tuesday morning his majesty's ships under his command captured the fort at Saliff, after a resistance of three hours.

"The fort is situated on the eastern shore of the Red Sea, in the Kamaran anchorage, 180 miles north of Perim, between Loheiya and Hodeida.

"Ninety-four prisoners, three machine guns and two mountain guns, and military stores, camels, and the harbor plant were captured.







HOUSEKEEPING IS A BUSINESS. ECONOMICAL COOKING IS A SCIENCE.

All the time during the past six months that there has been so much talk throughout Western Ontario about conservation of material resources, planting backyard gardens, and extending farm acreage under cultivation in order to increase the food supply, conserving time and conserving money, people have been to busy with an infinite number of things they have scarcely been able to give attention to such an important subject, as the conservation of the future citi zenship of Canada, as represented by the infants in arms. True, a survey of boy ife has been in progress a the city for days past, which has as its aim the conservation of boy life, boy power and boy ability. It has also been stated that a Standard Efficiency Tests Program is in process of preparation for girls, in order that Jenny may have the same opportunity to be conserved as her brother Bobby But what of a "Standard Efficiency Tests Program" for His Majesty the

His Majesty isn't given to exceiling in organized sports and intellectual stunts during the first 18 or 24 months of his existence, no matter, what his doting parents may testify to the contrary. Authorities seem to be fairly unanimous, for their clan, in the opinion that the less Master Baby is encouraged to develop the characteristics of an infant prodigy, the better for his after welfare. The chief contribution he is expected to make to the world in those early days of his career is to grow normally, and lay the foundations of vigorous, healthy boyhood and manhood.

To be sure, he is expected to be good mannered. But those who are supsed to know are emphatic in their insistence that good morals are closely related to good health. Who would expect an infant suffering from chronic in-digestion and other ailments, not to mention improper clothing, to be always sweet and good-tempered? You wouldn't be yourself, gentle reader The Canadian Standard Elliciency Tests Program for boys has been built with a view to meeting the needs of the teen age at every point. This aim will also doubtless be carried out in the program for girls.

But one fact that cannot be ignored in planning any program for the conservation of boy or girl life is that fact of "First the Infant."

This isn't a criticism of standard efficiency tests or anything possible that can be done to raise the standard physically, mentally, socially and spiritual of boys and girls of teen age. It is a plea for beginning of conversation several

The United States for years past has had its standard efficiency tests for ies, known as the "Babies' Welfare" department. Patterned after this, various sections of Canada have held child welfare exhibitions and established child welfare work in order to wage war upon what iterally amounts to ruthless destruction of child life annually through ignorance

Addressing the London Methodist Conference a few days ago, Rev. Dr. 3 Albert Moore, secretary of social service and evangelism of the Methodist Ch n Canada, referred to what he termed the "appalling death rate among children

Could a more worthy and useful way be found by women readers to exerci lon, or wherever they are located? There is one city in Canada where a crusade reduced the infant mortality something like 75 to 80 per cent in one summer, and a trying summer at that. "Taken by the will of Providence" is one way to be removed from this life. It is quite another to be slain by impure milk, improp food and a lack of knowledge upon the part perhaps of the ones who love th

THE UP-TO-DATE BABY SHOW.

A recognition of the close relationship existing between the physical well eing and the mental and moral welfare of boys and girls has been responsible the establishment of medical inspection of schools and the school nursin tem, which has been adopted in London as well as in other cities, towns an ural places up and down the length and breadth of Canada. Certain people who waste a lot of time and energy accusing "the church" (meaning any church), of not doing anything practical in the world, and not being in touch with real conditions, may be surprised to know that while they have been doing their armchair criticizing, more than one evangelical church in Canada through its social service department, has been engaged in the mission of reducing infant mortality and conserving citizenship through education and practical help in the way of co-operating with officials in obtaining pure milk

Prof. Hugh Dobson, one of the social service and evangelism secretaries of the Canadian Methodist Church, a year ago took a most active part in the or ganizing of a child welfare conference in the capital of Saskatchewan, attended by citizens from all parts of the province. Such good evangelism was "bab saving" considered that the Sunday preceding the conference, the subject was preached upon in practically every church of the city, the clergymen. Roman Catholic as well as Protestant, meeting with medical men and others promoting the conference early in the week in order to obtain definite facts, and also with a view to presenting the subject in a uniform way.

movement or exhibition. It is quite probable that many babies on the farm where there should be abundance of fresh air and plenty of nourishing food, haven't any better chance for life, so far as care is concerned, than the infants born in

One of the progressive members of the club had been reading all about welfare standards for babies as published at the time in an American magazine. She hadn't any babies of her own, but because of her love for children, she had some years before adopted two. She talked so much about those standards that the other women began to get interested, and finally they decided to hold a Babies' Welfare exhibition in connection with the Horticultural Show.

A doctor was on hand and a nurse, both of whom knew their business, and had primed themselves with full information concerning the standard tests for had primed themselves with full information concerning the standard tests for bables. Never had there been such a baby show in all the history of Canada as was held in that community. Beauty didn't count one bit, and the most fascinatingly be-frilled morsel of humanity was powerless to goo-goo the business-like doctor into giving her first prize. Age, weight, measurements, and general condition were what counted. If her little ladyship hadn't been making th gain considered due her, no amount of bias could induce the doctor to give he an Al grading. More than one infant learned the valuable lesson that day that beauty wouldn't take the place of efficiency. Efficiency in his case meant being a properly developing animal.

ONE PREVENTATIVE OF INFANT MORTALITY.

An illustration has come to the editor of this department of the way which scientists disagree in matters great and small.

Two or three doctors have verbally taken exception to the championship of skim milk for babies on the part of "Medicus," who, by the way, has made a special study of dietetics. One or two, at least, have announced their inentions of sending in letters to Our Consumers' League department when they

In face of the statement from "Medicus": "Cream upsets the baby's stom ach, and in my experience cases have come under my observation where babies have begun to thrive only when put on a skim milk diet. The fat has been responsible for vomiting and many cases of diarrhoea are caused by excessive fats." the following recipe for oatmeal gruel, made with sterilized cream for the baby has been sent in by a reader along with this explanation:

"In view of the importance of the subject of prevention of infant mortality, I am sending you a recipe for bables' food given to me by a trained nurse of some years' experience with delicate and teething babies. She assures me that she has found it beneficial when all other foods have failed, and that it is especially good during the summer months. It has also the advantage of being inexpensive and only requires extreme care and cleanliness in the making. have been thinking that some inexperienced young mother might be glad to know of this safe, inexpensive and nourishing food. Here are the directions as

"Oatmeal Gruel-Soak two cups of oatmeal in cold water for an hour. Pass through a wire sieve of medium mesh and then boil for three hours after it has come to the boiling point. For a very delicate baby the gruel should be boiled twelve hours. When done, add two teaspoonfuls of sterilized cream (from certified milk) to two tablespoonfuls of gruel, and increase as the baby grows stronger. If the child's stomach is inclined to be sour, add two teaspoonfuls of lime water when the gruel is cold. Add to all the gruel made from the two cups of oatmeal a pinch of salt and two tablespoonfuls of sugar. Keep one saucepan separately for this food and keep it spotlessly clean. Clean well always after each time the gruel is made.

"To sterilize the bottles, wash each time after they are used, in cold water, empty out and fill again with cold water and set the bottle on its side in a pan of water. When the water comes to a boil, continue boiling for five minutes. One person should be responsible for making this gruel, and pour what is not used in the first later. used in the first bottle in a clean gem jar, and keep in the refrigerator until

"To Sterilize the Cream-Pour about two tablespoonfuls of cream from cer tified milk in a gem jar, then place the jar in a pan of cold water with water enough to come above the cream. When the water boils, continue boiling for twenty minutes."

On the contrary, the statements made by the prime minister, taken in conjunction with the information I gleaned while in Washington the week previous, all went to demonstrate that the need of the hour was not men at the front so much as food for the people in our motherland, France and Italy, the means of transportation for the same by overcoming the submarine menace, and the manufacture of all war supplies and building of ships.


