NEW BRITISH BLOW IN BELGIAN DRIVE

ORGAN OF FRENCH CLERGY WOULD KILL CONFEDERATION; WANTS QUEBEC INDEPENDENT

La Croix, Journal of French-Canadian Priests, Makes Furious Attack on English-Speaking Canadians, and Wants Quebec Province To Secede.

Montreal, June 15.—La Croix which circulates almost solely amongst the French-Canadian clergy, comes out today for the destruction of confederation. The editor, M. Joseph Bégin, writes that the confederation has been fatal for fifty years to French-Canadians. "We have been exploited and lied to as this political machine in the hands of the English majority has been absolutely disastrous. From being the pioneers of this beautiful country, we have become the valets of a race which pretends to be superior, but which is nothing more than the modernized product of the rapacious Jewish-Saxons. We have worked hard, and it has all gone to enrich the Jews-Saxons. We are already crushed by an enormous debt, and today they wish to impose by force a law as unconstitutional as it is unjust. Time, which will send our sons and brothers to the European butchery like

so many cattle, whose one use is to satisfy the appetite of its master. Wants Separation. "And no one speaks of breaking this odious regime which binds us to the chariot wheels of the conqueror. In fact, no one seems to have thought of it. How sweet it would be, in fact, to live in a Lower Canada separated from Upper Canada, yet subject as at present to the British crown. The qualities of our race would then develop normally on the banks of this beautiful St. Lawrence, in a country extending from the Ottawa to the Atlantic, and administered by a French-Canadian majority possessing the power to make all our laws, to treat freely with foreign countries, to fix our customs tariff, to control our immigration, our navigation, and our means of transportation. "This is not a hasty movement without head or tail, but a new political constitution based on our superior interests and our inalienable rights. The time, therefore, to plow the soil and to sow this immortal grain has come."

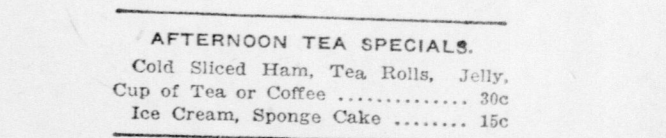

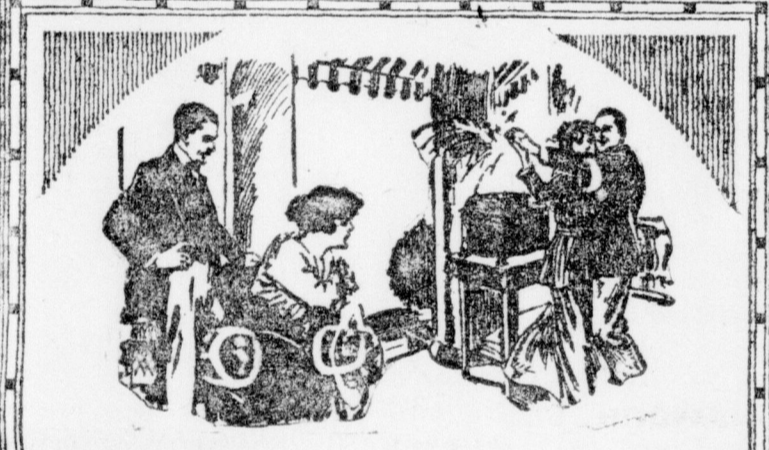

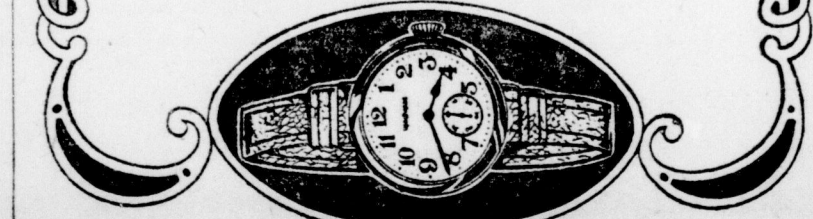

SWOBODA IS AGAIN PLACED UNDER ARREST

Paris, June 15.—Raymond Ruff Swoboda, who was held for some time by the Paris police in the spring of 1915 on suspicion of causing a fire on board the French liner La Touraine, has been arrested by the Zurich police, according to the Zurich correspondent of the Petit Parisien. Swoboda is accused of recruiting spies to work against France, and is alleged to be in close relations with a Geneva businessman who was recently sentenced to life imprisonment in Paris for espionage.

When arrested in Paris in March, 1915, Swoboda had an American passport, and claimed to be an American citizen. At his trial it was said his name was Schmidt, and that he was a German reserve officer. He was finally discharged and ordered expelled from France.

De JONGHE WAR MINISTER. The Hague via London, June 15.—Jonker de Jonghe, chief of the cabinet at the war office, has been appointed war minister. He is the first civilian who has been appointed to this post.

GERMANS UNABLE TO BLOCK THE FRENCH BY FLOODING LANDS

Nature Plays Into the Latter's Hands Along Oise.

NEW RETIREMENT NEAR

Germans Preparing To Leave Sheltered Positions Along the Ridges.

French Front, June 15.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press).—The Germans have not had so much success as the Belgians farther north in using floods as a barrier of defence along the line of the Oise. The river when it passes northward of the devastated town of Chauny, now in the hands of the French, takes a sinuous course through marshy, low-lying lands, and the Germans after their forced retreat endeavored by damming at various places to place a wide stretch of water between themselves and the pursuing French troops. Extending north from the forest of St. Jehan almost to St. Quentin the intervening country with water, and the French in covering it with heavy artillery, Brissay, Hamericourt, and Bertencourt stood on like islands. The nature of the soil and the dry weather of the spring disappointed their hopes of creating a permanent moat in front of their new positions and a tour of the French front lines in this vicinity today showed that scarcely a trace of the inundations remained.

Far away to the north and east spread undulating lands offering little opportunity for the construction of defensive positions, but to the south and east were the great forest-covered ridges of St. Gobain and the upper forest of Concy, behind which lies Laon. It was impossible to see the French in the light to penetrate the mysteries of these deep woods, where the Germans enjoyed splendid cover. The roar of thousands of cannon coming from farther south and east was the tense struggle in progress for the possession of the Chemin-des-Dames, which the French held firmly ever since it fell into their hands during the fighting of April, and where they have fought every day a series of counter-attacks delivered day after day and night after night. The German commander-in-chief evidently set great value on this position, for he had sacrificed thousands of men from his best formations in order to regain possession of it. French aviators have been able to distinguish far behind the German front lines certain indications that a series of intermediate works has in some places been begun, and in others completed. In view probably of a further retirement by the German army to another line. This retirement when it takes place will not be a voluntary one, but will be the result of pressure by the French army.

NO MILITARY VALUE IN GERMANS' RAID; JUST PURE KILLING

London, June 15.—In the House of Commons last evening James J. McPherson, parliamentary secretary for the war office, said that the air raiders crossed the Channel in twelve minutes Wednesday. He said he understood it to be true that one of them was brought down near Shoeburyness, near which is the practicing grounds for heavy ordnance, and where there is an extensive artillery barracks. Lord Derby, secretary of state for war, announced that not a single soldier had been killed or wounded in Wednesday's raid, which had been simply a killing and wounding of civilians, men, women and children, and from the German military viewpoint had absolutely no value whatever.

SINN FEINERS TO CONTEST EAST CLARE; REBEL NOMINATED

London, June 15.—The Sinn Feiners of East Clare have decided to contest the seat in Parliament vacated by the death of Major William Redmond. They have chosen as candidate Edward de Valera, formerly a professor in the Dublin University, and sentenced to death for his connection with the Sinn Fein revolt. His sentence was commuted to penal servitude for life, and he is now in jail.

DRIFTED 16 DAYS ON CAPSIZED BOAT

Inhumanity of German Methods Again Shown—French Losses Light.

London, June 15.—Two further instances of the inhumanity of German submarine methods have just been published. Ten members of the crew of the British steamer Kariba, which was torpedoed without warning 230 miles from land on April 13, were picked up after twelve days spent in an open boat. For seven days they had been without food, and two of the survivors died after their rescue. Another boat, with 21 men, has not been heard from, and it is feared it was lost with all aboard. The British steamer Calcutness was torpedoed without warning on April 19 with 240 miles from land. The captain and twenty men were drowned, and the remainder of the crew were found in capsized boats on which they had drifted for sixteen days without food. Only two were alive when the boat was picked up.

FRENCH SUB LOSSES.

Paris, June 15.—Four French ships of more than 1,500 tons, one under that size, and three fishing boats were sunk by mine or submarine during the week ending June 14. Six ships were unsuccessfully attacked during the same period, while 1,321 tons of supplies entered French ports and 1,015 left.

TURKISH STRONGHOLD ON RED SEA COAST TAKEN BY BRITISH

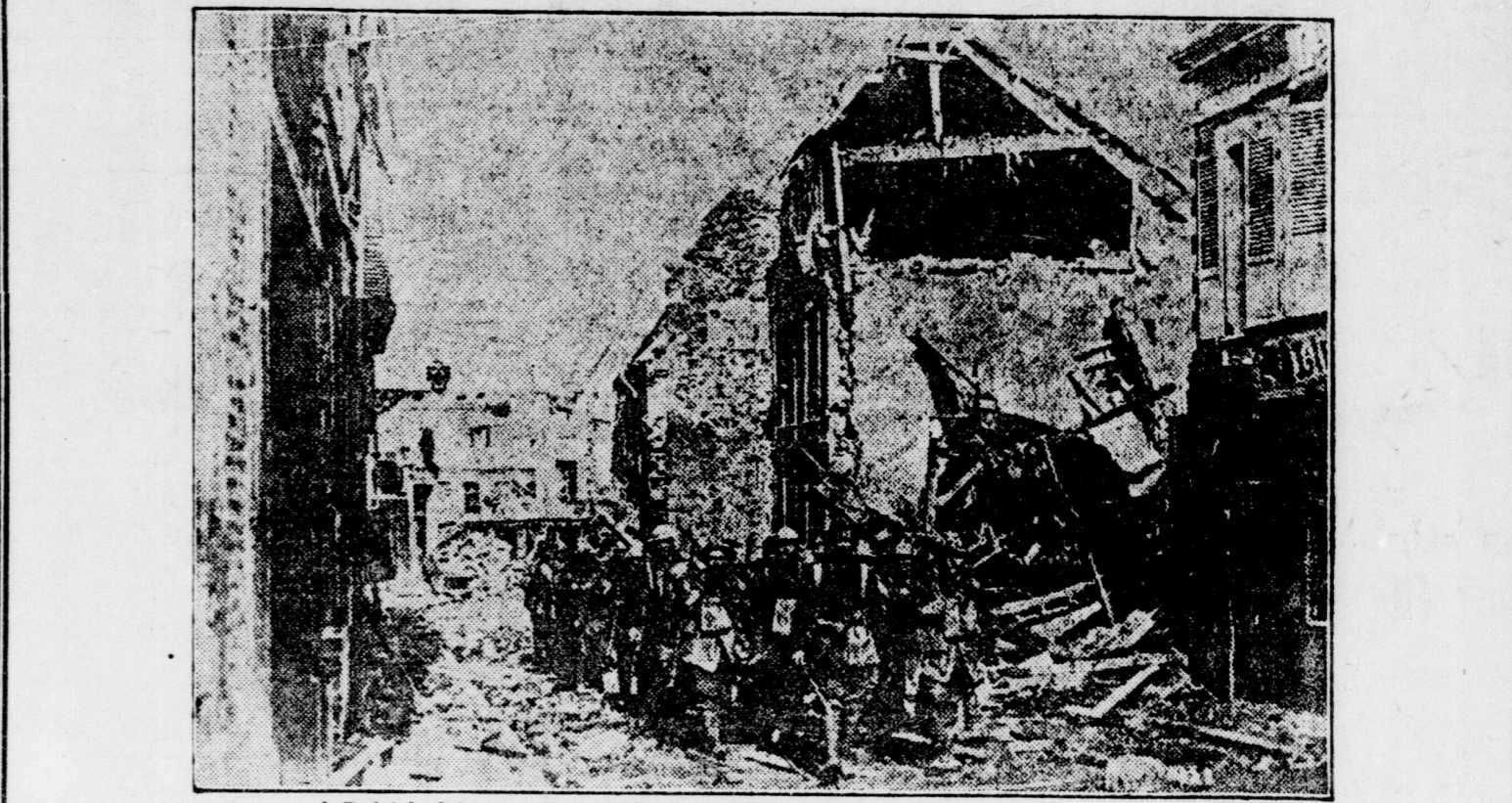
LONDON, June 14.—Fort Saliff, on the east shore of the Red Sea, has been captured by British warships. It was officially announced this evening. The commander-in-chief in the East Indies reports that Tuesday morning his majesty's ships under his command captured the fort at Saliff, after a resistance of three hours. "The fort is situated on the eastern shore of the Red Sea, in the Kamaran anchorage, 180 miles north of Perim, between Lohiyia and Hodeida. "Ninety-four prisoners, three machine guns and two mountain guns, and military stores, camels, and the harbor plant were captured. "One Britisher was killed."

Fort Saliff is on Kamaran Bay, in Yemen province, Southwest Arabia. Large rock salt works are located there. The captured fort lies about 115 miles north of the Gulf of Aden. A force of Turks to the north of Aden has been long in the way of the British, in attempts they have made to advance from that city. The purpose of the capture of Fort Saliff may be in facilitation of a movement to work in behind this force and capture or disperse it.

DOCTOR BLAMES DOCTORS FOR HIGH DEATH-RATE PIONEER OF WILLIAMS AND WEST NO MORE

MONTREAL, June 14.—"Our present burial service is a libel upon the Lord," said Dr. C. J. Hastings, medical officer of health of Toronto, in advocating the teaching of hygiene in the schools of Canada, at the annual meeting of the Canadian Medical Association at McGill University here today. Continuing, Dr. Hastings said: "Our ministers quote, 'The Lord give and the Lord take away.' He does nothing of the kind. We medical men are largely responsible for the death rate, and it is time that the Canadian Medical Association took drastic action in order to safeguard public health against the encroachment of diseases which endanger our citizens, and lower the standard of the nation's blood." A resolution was passed recommending that the teaching of hygiene be compulsory in all universities and in all faculties thereof, and recommended the organization of a practical course in all normal schools throughout the Dominion, and the adoption of textbooks on hygiene in all schools.

They could do this if it were arranged that the division should not come until a week after the motion for second reading. This would also have the advantage of allowing a week for debate, and limiting the debate to a week.

Prohibition also was brought up. Mr. Kite informed the Government that he was getting a lot of petitions from his people, asking for enactment of Dominion-wide war-time prohibition. 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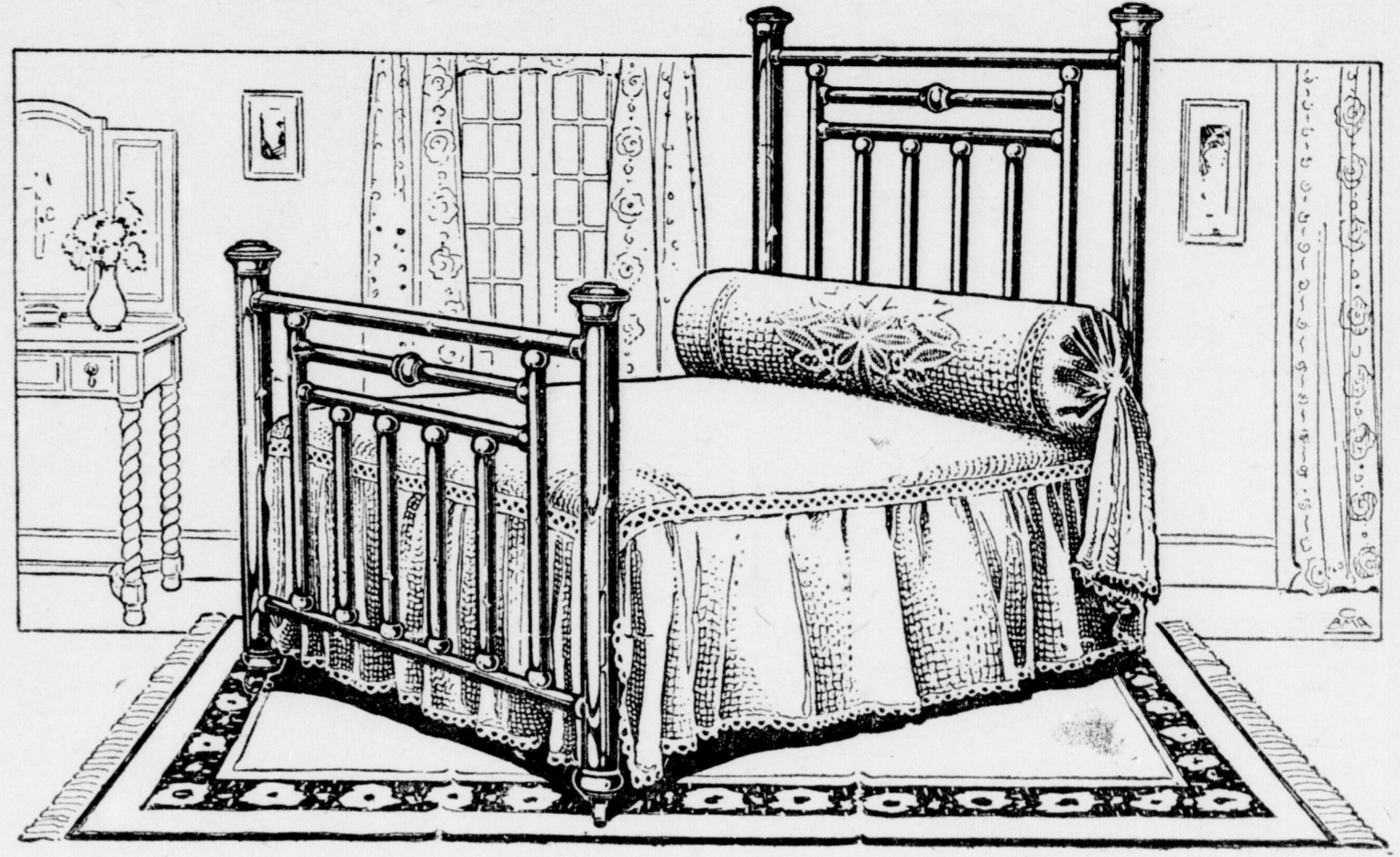
