Franco-American Forces Attack On Champagne Front; Bulgaria Now Invaded By Allied Troops

Enemy's Territory Opposite Kosturino Is Occupied by the British Forces-First Bulgarian Army Is Placed in a Precarious Situation—Ser bs Sever Germano-Bulgarian Communications.

Saloniki, Sept. 26.—Bulgaria has been invaded by Allied troops, according to a British official statement issued here today. British troops entered Bulgarian territory opposite Kosturino, about six miles south of Strumitza, the enemy base in this region.

#### BULGARIAN ARMY IN DANGER

London, Sept. 26.—The position of the first Bulgarian army claimed in Sofia, according to on the Allied left in Macedonia, is dangerous, according to reports reliable news printed in the Gerreaching here, but it is not believed that the army is faced with immediate disaster. # PREFERS BRIDE OF HUMBLE BIRTH TO THE TOTTERING THRONE OF HIS COUNTRY

Crown Prince Charles of Rumania Refuses to Listen to His Father's Plea That He Ab andon His Morganatic Wife-King Ferdinand Had Similar Love Affair in His Youthful Days.

Amsterdam, Sept. 26.—In answer to pleas that he desert his bride of humble birth, Crown Prince Charles of Rumanian has replied that thrones are so unstable nowadays that he preferred the certainty of having the wife he wanted to the chance of losing the wanted to the chance of losing the succession.

The escapade of the crown prince in going to Odessa and marrying Cecilie Lambring, the daughter of a major in the Rumanian army, reopens the question of the Rumanian dynastic succession. When King Ferdinand heard of the marriage he ordered that the crown prince be given 75 days solitary confinement for absenting himself without leave from his garrison. King Ferdinand also sent an emissary to Bender, Bessarabia, where the young couple are spending their honeymoon, with instructions to try to undo the new nuptial knot, but to no avail. The bride refused to part with her wedding ring, and the crown prince declined to leave her.

Ferdinand's Love Affair.

Crown Prince Charles has not yet voluntarily renounced his rights of succession, and the king is reported to be very angry. The Rumanian constitution does not contain a clause barring a morganatically-married crown prince from succession to the throne.

The present case has a piquant feature in that it recalls that King Ferdinand, in his youth, had a love affair with his mother's lady of honor. Premier Catargiu threatened to resign if the king did not veto the proposed union, and it came to nothing. Should Crown Prince Charles renounce his rights of succession, his brother Nicholas is 15 years old and physically weak.

Mackensen, who is now in Bucharest, to take the command of his armies so as to block the advance of the Allies in Old Serbia and preserve Bulgaria from invasion, according to information received here from Switzerland.


Independent Air Force Makes Raid Over German

## REACHES MONTREAL

Montreal, Sept. 26 .- An outbreak of Spanish influenza has occurred among school children in Montreal. So far only a few cases have been reported and these all have been isolated. The provincial health authorities report that there are probably several thousand cases in Quebec, and twelve deaths have occurred from it.

Foch's First Big Thrust In This District Is Opened Against Teuton Lines Early Today---Allied Forces In Palestine Have Captured More Than 45,000 Prisoners.

Paris, Sept. 26.—French and American troops began a joint attack this morning on the Champagne front and in the region beyond it on the east, today's war office statement announces. Renewed German attacks north of the Aisne have been re-

pulsed. At one point, where the Germans gained a foothold upon the French positions, they were ejected by a counter-attack. The text of the statement reads:

"Between the Ailette and the Aisne the Germans renewed their tacks last evening in the region of Allemant and Moulin-Laffaux. The enemy succeeded at the latter point in penetrating the French lines, but after energetic counter-attacks by the French re-established the situation.

"Further south, the French have enlarged their gains east of Sancy and have taken prisoners.

"This morning at 5 o'clock French troops attacked on the Champagne front in co-operation with the American army operating further to the east.'

The Franco-American attack on the Champagne front is the first Allied thrust made on that sector since Marshal Foch assumed the initiative in July, and is the logical result of the Allied success in Picardy in driving the Germans back to the Hindenburg line from Arras to Laon.

A drive northward in Champagne threatens the communication lines in the rear of the Hindenburg defence system, where the Germans are struggling to keep the British and French from breaking through. While the length of the front of attack is not disclosed, it is probable it extends a good part of the distance from Rheims to Verdun, and probably beyond.

Military critics have pointed out that the Champagne front was the logical place where an Allied effort, intended to destroy the effectiveness of the Hindenburg line, could be made. For some distance east of Rheims the terrain is fairly level and open, and an Ottawa, Sept. 26.—The new price advance of some distance here would outflank Laon, and possibly nxed by Paper Controller Pringle for newsprint manufactured by the Fort Francis mills is \$73 per ton, not \$74, as previously announced. #### fembers of Supreme Council of U. S. HAIG CAPTURES ENEMY STRONG Pass Vigorous Resolution. POINTS IN ST. QUENTIN REGION

London, Sept. 26 .- Northwest of St. Quentin British troops continued their pressure against the German defences and have captured enemy strong points in the neighborhood of Selency and Gricourt, Field Marshal Haig reported today.

In Flanders, the British line has likewise been advanced, progress being made in the sector to the north of La Bassee. North of Gricourt, on the St. Quentin sector, the British re-

pulsed German counter-attacks. The text of the statement reads:

"Local operations were continued successfully yesterday afternoon and during the night northwest of St. Quentin. English troops progressed and captured certain strongly defended localities in the neighborhood of Selency and Gricourt, together with a number of prisoners. "In addition to the counter-attacks already reported, which

were launched by the enemy yesterday northwest of Fayet, his troops twice attacked the positions-north of Gricourt. These attacks were unsuccessful.

"A successful minor operation was carried out yesterday by English troops northwest of La Bassee, as the result of which the line was advanced and over 100 prisoners were taken. A counterattack launched by the enemy in this locality during the night was repulsed and several prisoners were left in our hands.'

"We improved our positions slightly yesterday and during the night northwest of Armentieres. In patrol encounters and raids between Armentieres and Ypres we captured several prisoners."

#### SERBIAN TROOPS REACH ISHTIB AN IMPORTANT BULGARIAN BASE

#### MANITOBA CROP REPORTS

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 26.—The Manitoba Free Press publishes today a report of crop conditions in Manitoba at this time of the harvest. Only a few fields of late flax and green crop on reseeded land remain uncut in the province. Threshing is more than half done in Southern Manitoba, and is beginning in the north. Speaking generally, says the Free Press, the sample of wheat will be good. In many places late oats, barley and flax have been damaged by September frosts, and this may affect the quality of seed oats for next spring.

The average of estimates as to yields is as follows: Wheat, 18 bushels to the acre; cats, 38 bushels; barley, 30; flax, 10½; Rye, 17.

#### HOME FOR CHILDREN GIVEN AS MEMORIAL TO RONALD M. GRAY

Father of the Fallen Soldier Makes Institution Possible.

FOR THE SALVATION ARMY

Memory of Beloved Young Londoner Will Be Kept Green For All Time.

February, 11, 1917, Ronald Maxwell Gray laid down his life in France that the world might be made safe for democracy. In the years to come in this, the city of his birth, his youth and young manhood, as a memorial to his gallant sacrifice, scores of little abilders will be given a chance to live to his gallant sacrifice, scores of little children will be given a chance to live and grow up to enjoy as worthy citizens the peace and freedom for which he has died. In memory of his beloved son, James Gray has made possible the securing of a building for a children's home for the Salvation 'Army, a place where hapless toddlers and infants in arms can receive tender care.

In this way the work of the Children's Aid Society and the local orphans' homes will be supplemented. Eventually children of soldiers who become orphans, or who for some reason are neglected, will be the special care of this institution, which is to be known as "The Ronald Gray Memorial Home."

Had Ronald Gray lived until the 23rd of October he would be 25 years old. If it had been possible to secure possession of the property early enough and to have the necessary alterations completed, the wish would have been realized that the formal opening might take place on the birthday date. This, however, will be out of the question, and it will be the 28th of October before all is in readiness.





The official statement reads:

"On September 24, Serbian troops achieved a very important success, reaching Krivolak and the outskirts of Ishtib (18 miles east of Veles on the Vardar and 38 miles northeast of Prilep).

North of Prilep, the Serbians are pursuing the Bulgarians, who are in complete retreat, and are approaching Izvor, midway between Prilep and Veles. Outskirts of Ishtib.-In this region we captured a colonel

commanding a Bulgarian regiment and a considerable number of prisoners, as well as four howitzers, three mountain guns, a hundred horse wagons, with teams and other material.

Gradsko Station, which was defended by Germans, has fallen into our hands with enormous quantities of supplies, including nineteen guns, mostly heavy ones of 210 millimetres. To the number of prisoners we already had taken, we added two German officers and several soldiers.

On the right of Prilep our troops have obtained very fine results. Near Izver (15 miles north of Prilep), we are pursuing the enemy, who is completely routed and in retreat.



Mine Operators and Importers Controller Fixes Rolls at \$69 Must Rotate Orders. and Sheets \$70.50

OTTAWA. Sept. 25.—Regulations providing for the more uniform distribution of coal needed for industrial uses in Canada have just been approved by the governor-in-council at the instance of the fuel controller.

It is provided that all mine operators in Canada and importers of industrial coal into this country shall rotate deliveries of such coal among their customers in proportion to their requirements, so that no one industrial consumer shall at any time have advance supplies on hand, while others are undersupplied.

A preferential list of coal consumers is also outlined in the regulations. These preferred consumers include railroads, military and Government buildings, public utilities, retail dealers and manufacturing plants, chiefly engaged on war contracts. These must be given preference in supplies over all others in the order named.

Very drastic provision is also made against the unnecessary holding of coal on the part of industrial users, and heavy penalties are provided. Those whose operations require large advance stocks at the end of the present coal year must obtain a special permit from their customers as to tonnage of coal on hand, and required for each month, so that an intelligent distribution may be made of all coal mined and received in Canada.



If every man held these views there would be no distinction between Catholics and Protestants. London has had many Catholics as Liberal as Protestants, such men as the late Senator Coffey, Patrick Mulkern, Chris. Fitzgerald, Thomas J. Murphy, Barney McCann and many others. Still the dividing line continues to be very strong.

Among Protestants, the different denominations show signs of dying out. The Anglicans are probably the most Liberal and least prejudiced. It is not necessary to live better than the Bible requires you to live to be a good Anglican. There is no reason why all the Protestant denominations should not unite in every way. There is no reason why there should be any divisions

in Christianity.

Ireland seems to be the hardest nut to crack of all. Some of the best minds in the world have tried to solve the problem. Gladstone in England and even Lloyd George, who has held the Allied nations and all their powers in the palm of his hand, has needed quite a bit of agility to avoid very serious consequences, so near the very heart of Great Britain. Canada gave one of its ablest

sons, Edward Blake, to Ireland to endeavor to solve its problems. He died disappointed.

The Advertiser has always favored "home rule," but what home rule means has never been clearly defined. The fault lies in the past. Irishmen live too much in the past. The key that would unlock the door of happiness and prosperity for Ireland is to forget the past. 





A.—He is entitled to the furlough A.—He is entitled to the furlough from the citizens' point of view, but it is a lamentable fact that the Government cannot see its way clear to allow such war scarred veterans as your husband a brief respite in Canada, which they have earned. The authorities stated that no furloughs would be considered at present, owing to the pressing need for men, so you will have to carry on as you have been during his absence, and like hundreds of other Canadian wives and mothers wait and hope for a change of policy in the near future.

The war trade board, import license epartment, has advised the local board of trade that certain import restrictions have been removed on a number of commodities much needed from Great Britain by Canadian manufacturers. They are as follows: Burlap, cotton and manufactures of cotton, furs and manufactures of fur, glass and glassware, optical glass, manufactures of glasses, textiles and vegetable fibres. jute, oilcloth and linoleum for floors. wool and manufactures of wool. For goods that are not included in the above list it will be necessary for importers to apply for permission for their importation on form O, copies of which can be secured at the board of trade

The removal of restrictions referred to will affect textile manufacturers, manufacturers of men's and women's ware and binder twine, straw braid for hats and flax yarns, and it is calculated, will bring about a freer movement of commodities from Great Britain to Canada according to Secretary Gordon ada, according to Secretary Gordon Philip of the board of trade.
