"But what can you expect from such a Government that had no more spine than a jellyfish. They are just tools in the hands of blame Borden-that spineless fellow." (Laughter). He declared that in the hands of a strong executive the industrial disputes act, with some amendment, would be of great service.

Want Act Abolished.

The principal opposition came from Delegate Rees of Fernie, B. C., and David Irvine of Ladysmith, representing mine workers. Their experience of the act was such that they wished for its speedy abolition. Joe Gibbons of the Toronto Street Railway Union pointed out that the act was not drawn in the interests of the workers or employers, but was primarily for the protection of the public and designed to avert the disruption of public utilities.



PARIS, Sept. 26 .- A semi-official account of the battle of the Somm from its beginning (July 1) appearing in the Bulletin Des Armees says that the French have conquered 180 square kilometres (about 70 square miles) of territory, captured 30,000 unwounded prisoners, removed 4,503 wounded and taken 144 cannon, most of them of heavy calibre, 500 machine guns and other material

It is pointed out that the Allies have broken the spirit of the Germans at Verdun, definitely deprived the enemy of an initiative and turned it in their own favor. Since the opening of the battle, the account says, the Germans have thrown into the battle sixty-seven new divisions and seventeen battalions, of which thirty-four divisions were on the English front and thirty-three divisions, with the seventeen battalions, were on the French front.
