

TO USE SURPLUS OF **RED TRIANGLE FUND** TO TRAIN VETERANS

Money Will Be Distributed To "Y" Branches For This Purpose.

A considerable money surplus *emaining in the hands of the national council of the Y. M. C. A., representing the unexpended balance of the Red Triangle Fund subscribed for work among the Canadian troops during the war, is to be distributed among the various "Y" branches to be used in educating rebranch, which will apply it to retraining courses for veterans. The schooling, which will be given, will follow the general lines of the D. S. C. R. courses, but will not be only for men who are unable to follow their former occupation owing to disability.

Instructors will be procured for the courses, which will not be confined to a certain number, but will conform to the wishes of the men as to what courses they wish to take. It is considered too late now to commence the classes this winter, so they will be held over until next fall.

The soldiers will be required to pay a certain deposit on starting the course. If 75 per cent of the lectures are attended the money will be refunded; otherwise 25 per cent of the cost of the training will be charged up to the student.

Commercial and technical classes will be held at night, so that the men will not have to leave their present work to attend the school.

The decision as to the disposition of the fund was reached by the national council after considering the best way of helping the returned man to re-establish himself, as the fund was originally subscribed for him.







It states that Canadian railways now have 16,000 cars in the United States. The facts are that United States railways had at February 1, 57,034 Canadian cars on their rails, and 16,000 only representations. today in regard to the car situation as on their rails, and 16.000 only represents the excess balance of Canadian box-cars on United States lines over the number of United States cars on

8.019 that should have been turned over.

This failure of the United States Railways to meet their obligations has made it necessary for the individual Canadian carriers to prohibit the loading of their cars to points on United States lines in order to protect domestic traffic, and has placed Canadian shippers of paper, pulpwood, timber and mine products to points in the United States in a most secous situation which can only be relieved by energetic action on the part of the United States railroad authorities to have Canadian cars returned to their owners or to send United States cars to Canada to offset the heavy excess balance of Canadian cars in the United States.







Who Will Help Rebuild THE BURNED CHURCH?

On February 7, at 4 o'clock in the morning, fire broke out in the beautiful new Egerton Street Baptist Church at London, Ont., and in two hours all that was left was a heap of smoking ruins.

The church was dedicated only five years ago, since when the people, composed exclusively of wage-earners, have made an heroic struggle to pay the interest and reduce the principal. The building cost some \$30,000. Insurance amounted to \$20,000, which must all be paid over to the original contractors. The congregation is left with nothing-must start again at rock bottom.

Yet immediately upon the heels of their disaster, these people insisted upon playing their part in the great forward movement, and have raised one-half their objective,

AND NOT A MONEYED MAN IN THE CONGREGATION

Before the ruins were cold came offers of help. A check for \$50 from a local Methodist layman was the first tangible expression of sympathy. A prominent Anglican and a Presbyterian each sent checks for \$100. Last Sunday, a little girl of three presented the minister with her savings bank containing coppers gathered for months, and insisted upon the acceptance of her \$3.52 to help build a new church.

Two soldiers at Guelph Military Hospital sent \$5.00 and \$1.00, respectively. A retired minister from a small Ontario town sent \$25, regretting what he termed the smallness of his gift, and stating that his salary had stopped last April. To date, something over \$2,000 has been received without any appeal having been made, but the people of this church will have to raise many times that sum, and

The one good feature about the election was that after years of fight and much work Mr. Dewart had got Sir William Hearst to admit the women of Ontario to the ballot.

Mr. Dewart scored the presentmethods of preparing the voters lists. In certain Toronto constituencies 25,900 names had to be added to the lists after the lists were supposed to be prepared and corrected. In Toronto and the surrounding constituencies 35,000 names were addednames left off the lists by the Government's partisan enumerators.

MORE FOR HOUSING

TORONTO, March 5.—The cost of constructing houses in the province of Ontario is about 125 per cent greater than it was before the war, according to J. A. Ellis, director of the bureau of municipal affairs, in a report to the Ontario Government on housing for last year. Lumber prices have increased so much, Mr. Ellis states, that it is almost as costly to erect a frame house as a brick building.

"If all the requirements of the various municipalities for 1920 are met, about \$8,000.000 more will have to be appropriated in addition to the \$10,-629,000 already appropriated," says the report.

WASHINGTON ISSUES






