VISEING OF INVOICES WILL APPLY ONLY TO FOREIGN MADE GOODS

Customs Act Is Explained Made in the Empire.

In view of considerable misunderstandng existing with regard to the establishment of the proposed system requiring that all invoices covering goods to the value of \$100 or more, when im-ported into Canada from foreign coun-tries, shall be vised by an officer ap-pointed by the Canadian Government, the department of trade and commerce through the local chamber of com-merce, has issued the following state-

ment:
Legislation empowering the Canadian Government to institute the proposed system was passed in an amendment to the customs act at the last session of parliament. The scheme is to be brought into force by proclamation when the necessary arrangements are made to that end. This will require some months.

Only Foreign Goods.

It will be observed that the scheme is to be applied to goods imported from foreign countries only, viz., outside the British Empire.

As is well known, many consular officers of other countries are established in Canada. For years they have been collecting fees on invoices covering exports from Canada to the various foreign countries. In some cases no fee is charged, in others a rather heavy fee is imposed. Some have adopted a flat rate, others charge a fee on an ad valorem basis. The fees which have thus been collected in Canada in the aggregate amount to a very large sum.

Had Canada imposed an invoice fee on exports from all foreign countries to the Dominion during the year 1920, a very large revenue would have been feel in the feel the first time in years that we can get all the coal we can handle. 





These donations of food from meagr rations, or of piles of almost worthless soviet ruble notes, are described as pitiful in comparison with the needs of the starving in the Volga region.

He declared: 'The great calamity is welding together the whole soul of Russia."

#### A GUARANTEE OF PEACE.

Lloyd George's vision of an alliance between Great Britain, Japan and the United States as a deciding factor in the world's peace is one which should appeal to the imagination of all. The prime minister of Great Britain considers that if the present alliance with Japan could be merged into a greater understanding with Japan and the United States on all the problems of the Pacific, it would be a guarantee of universal

One can readily visualize what co-operation between these three powerful nations would mean. With Pritain on the extreme west of Europe, with Japan on the extreme east of Asia, with America looking across to both from the Atjantic seaboard on the one side, and from the shores of the Pacific on the other; with the southern half of the world guarded by South Africa on the one hand and Australia on the other, it is not hard to see that a triple alliance formed of these countries, not for the carrying on of war, but for its abolition, would have the effect which is adumbrated by Lloyd George's far-seeing policy. Every ocean would be patrolled, every continent have its outpost.

These ideals are so intimately associated with those of the League of Nations that it is impossible to detach them, and their consummation cannot possibly take place without the full concurrence of that great parliament of peace. It is with these ideals in view that Britain values the friendship of Japan while clinging to that of the United States. The part that both countries played in the titanic struggle for justice and equity is duly recognized, but that of Japan has been more in the background.
