## DILKE ATTACKS FOREIGN POLICY

A Warm Debate in the British **House of Commons** 

OVER THE FAR EAST QUESTION

Lord Cranborne Says England Is Not Getting the Worst of It in Manchuria.

London, July 24.-When the House of Commons was in committee yesterday on the foreign office vote, Sir Charles Dilke (Advanced Radical) assailed the foreign policy of the Government which, he said, was strangely inconsistent. He compared the recent visit of King Edward to France and President Loubet's return visit to England with the Government's attitude towards Germany and accused the Government of cringing to Germany in the Venezuelan matter and "allowing themselves to be hoodwinked." But, Sir Charles added, when there was a popular cry against Germany, the Government had "hatched up the Canadian tariff grievance and lately the ministers had used language of absolute ferocity against Germany." The Under Foreign Secretary, Lord Cranborne, replying, said the German Emperor had nothing whatever to do, directly or indirectly, with the communications in regard to the co-opera tion of Great Britain and Germany in the Venezuelan affair. He vindicated the policy of the Government in this natter and said Great Britain was on friendly terms with all the powers.
Continuing, the Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs denied that Great Britain was getting the worst of it in Manchuria, where, he said, Great Britain recognized the open policy. Referring to the Canadian tariff question Lord Cranborne said they must put their own colonies first

The Under Foreign Secretary, Lord Cranborne, in reply, said that British trade in China was still increasing at a satisfactory rate, and he confident of securing a full share of railway and other valuable concessions. The Government, he said, was fully aware of the situation in Manchuria. The great difficulty up to the present time in negotiating with Russia was that Great Britain had not been able to ascertain exactly what the Russian Government wanted, and the fact remained that Manchuria was still oc-Russia's failure to fulfil her undertaking, he said, was satisfactory neither to Great Britain, Japan nor the United States. "Our ally, Japan," he said, "is becoming uneasy at the prolengation of the occupation of Manchuria, and we are equally anxious for some kind of a settlement. They are certain elements out of which an agreement ought to be possible, and if Russia is prepared to give due weight to our commercial rights and commercial cilable to compromise.

## LATE PONTIFF'S WILL IS OPENED

Leo Leaves All His Property GREAT to His Successor

FOR THE USE OF THE CHURCH

Valuable Presents for Members of His Family and His Regular Physicians.

Rome, July 23.-From sunrise until sunset today thousands passed before the body of Leo XIII., lying in state in the Basilica of St. Peter's. It was originally intended that this opportunity to publicly view the remains should extend through three days, but tonight it is learned that the time is likely to be curtailed, and that the funeral may occur on Friday, instead of Saturday, owing to the evidences of decomposition. This is due to today's 175 only Black Sateen Waists, elasevere heat. The will of the dead Pope was opened at today's meeting of the congregation of cardinals. It consists of 36 pages in the handwriting of Leo XIII., and leaves all his property to his successor for the use of the church. To each member of his family he leaves a present, to be chosen from the valuable objects in his apartment. Similar presents are bequeathed to his physicians. The total amount of his property is not yet known. The prevailing impression of those who today passed before the iron gates of the chapel of the sacrament to view the remains was one of intense pity, combined with a certain sense of horror. The body was tilted up on the catafalque in order that all might see the terribly shrunken face. An ordinary skull in a frame of gold, lying in the midst of a mass of red robes, could scarcely have been more typical of death. Except at sunrise when the crush threatened a panic, ali those who wished had an opportunity of entering St. Peter's. An important political factor was introduced into the ceremony by the entrance into St. Peter's of Italian solidiers, who remained there throughout the day to preserve order. Their presence is important as an indication of better relations between the Government and the Vatican.

#### LATE ROBT. MCCUTCHEON

He Was One of the Best-Known Ploneers of West Nissouri.

At his late residence, lot 25, con. 4, West Nissouri, there passed away on July 17, one of the pioneers of this township, Robert McCutcheon. He was born in 1839 near Killaloe, Ireland, and, with his parents, came to this country in 1843, settling on a farm about a mile from the village of Thorndale. He was soon inured to all the hardships incident to the life of the early settler, but the rugged constitution with which he was endowed made hard work only a pleasure for him. The men of the present generation can have but little idea of what farming meant in thos days of chopping, logging, cradling binding, and in all that work Robert McCutcheon was surpassed by few. In 1871 he married Margaret Powell, of Newbury, and settled on the farm, where he resided till his death. Of late years physical weakness prevented his active participation in the duties of the farm, but he retained his mental vigor to the last. On July 15 he was stricken with aparalysis, and lingered but two days, passing away at the compar atively early age of 64 years. He was lifelong member of the Methodist Church and was a man of sterling integrity, and open-handed generosity and was always active in his sympathy with every good cause. A very large number of his friends and relatives gathered on Sunday, July 19, to pay their last respects as he was laid to rest in Brown's Cemetery.
