

Stage Thunder and Lightning.

The reason why the mechanism for making the noises that give realism to play are never seen by the audience because the illusion would be comoletely destroyed if its operations were exposed to view, explains Franklin Fyles in the Ladies' Home Journal. The noise of the waiter falling down stairs with a tray of dishes, for instance, is simulated by dropping, as often as necessary, a basket filled with bits of broken china; and a cylinder of silk, turned with a crank, drawing the cloth over wooden flanges gives a perfect rain and wind storm. A lightning accmpaniment is made by touching an ordinary file to a bit of carbon both on live wires—and thunder by rolling ten-pin balls in a long, narrow, wooden trough. The rumble of 'the wheels of a carriage is imitated with a vehicle like a miniature freight car run on a wooden track, and the striking of wood or metal on hard or soft surfaces serves to convince an audience of the approach or departure of a horse. When there is war a single shot or two is usually the real thing, but a rifle volley effect is obtained by rapidly beating a dried calfskin with rattans, while heavy strokes on the bass drum will convey the idea of cannonading. If this mechanism were seen in operation by an audience it would make the whole performance seem ridiculous.





Five Hundred Refugees From There at Lorenzo Marquez

London, May 18.-A special from Lorenzo Marquez, dated yesterday, says the last 500 refugees who arrivrived there agree in stating that Mafeking had been relieved.

The end of the war is anticipated by the Queen's birthday, May 24, At the war office no news of the relief of Mafeking had been received up to this From Kroonstadt comes a story, at-

ributed to excellent authority, to the effect that a peace party is being formed at Pretoria, while reports from Pretoria indicate discouragement at recent reverses and the possibility of early suing for peace.
On the line of Roberts' advance the only news is that the Boers have blown up a bridge over the Rhenoster river, 37 miles north of Kroonstadt.

A special from Dannhauser, Natal, says: "Gen. Buller entered Dannhauser at 10 a.m. Thursday. The houses in the town were found not much damaged, owing to the sympathies of the Boer inhabitants. A house at Hattingspruit, however, was destroyed. The railway is little damaged, but several large culverts have been destroyed. eral large culverts have been destroyed, Boers north of Newcastle are falling back on Amajuba. Buller has re-

deived a message from the Queen congratulating him on taking Dundee and expressing appreciation of the work of the troops to which he has replied. The Boers left two doctors and an ambulance here."

Bread is Now Down to Three Cents a Loaf.

Grocers Will Not Handle the Small Loaves - Bakers Say the Grocers Want too Much Profit.

The City Grocers' Association met yesterday afternoon and decided to sell nothing but 2 lb bread and to pay only 4 cents for it. Some of the bakers wanted to and did make 1½ pound loaves which they sold to the grocers for 3½ cents and the grocers were forced to sell them at 4 cents. Other of the bakers refused to make any but they regulated beausy which they sell at but two pound loaves which they sell at four cents to the grocers and five cents retail. The latter the grocers thought their best friends and are standing by the the 2 pound bread bakers. The Grocers' Association agreed to quit handling bread rather than handle 1½ pound loaves. As a result a bread war opened this morning. The bakers are selling their 1½ loaves to everybody for three cents to-day and say they

bakers have been willing to do everything that was fair as between the public and themselves.

"To begin with, the cause of this bread war arose from the introduction of foreign bread. This bread gained a foothold here because it was offered cheaper to the con-sumer than the Chatham bread. Now, the reason of this was that the grocers insisted on having a cent profit on every loaf of bread. This we contend is too much,

"There is no money for the baker in a two

"There is no money for the baker in a two pound loaf of bread at four cents. Yet if the grocer is to make a cent a loaf profit and sell bread at five cents all was ould get out of it would be what it costs us. This would mean a profit of 25 per cent for the grocer but none for the baker. The public ought to agree with us that that is too much. The grocer ought to be satisfied with half a cent per loat, but he is not and that is what has kept the price of bread up to six cents for so long.

that is what has kept the price of bread up to six cents for so long.

"Three cents is the actual cost of production of a pound and a half loaf of bread and it cannot be produced for less. That is the price that bakers are spiling it at now, but of course that rate will not last after the present war is over. The bakers will in future when things settle down regulate the price of bread fairly in the interests of the consumer. Heretofore, as I have said, it has been forced up to permit the grocers to make large profits. A fair price to the consumer with flour at its present level will be four cents for a pound and a half loaf. Grocers and dealers will be supplied at half a cent less and if they want to handle our bread at that profit they may do so. That the people of Chatham should support Chatham made bread in preference to the outside article everyone will admit. The war is not now between the outside product and our own make but to reallet the profits of the grocers. Bread war is not now between the outside product and our own make but to re-ulate the profits of the grocers. Bread made here is as good and can be sold as cheaply as anywhere else in the world. Now that the bakers have tak-en the bit in their teeth they will see that the consumers no longer get the worst of it from the middlemen."

Another great advantage of Mount Clemens is, that it is situated near Detroit, and is in touch with all the lines of rapid transit. From

Detroit to Mount Clemens only costs 25 cents. "I haven't the slightest doubt that mineral baths here would be successful and a good thing for this city, provided, of course, a bath house is erected on a convenient spot near the centre of the city. It would be no trouble to bring the water to the centre of to bring the water to the centre of the city. THE COMING CAMP

Of the American Cance Associa tion will be Held This Summer

in Muskoka The American Canoe Association was organized in 1880 and comprises a number of enthusiastic canoeists from Canad'an and American Canoe Clubs, who met at Crosbyside, Lake George, N. Y., for the first gathering. They have held an annual camp every year since, for the purpose of camping, cruising, racing and enjoying out-ofdoor life generally. The membership is about 2,000. The annual fee is a dollar, and any canoeist over eighteen is eligible. The official organ of the A. C. A., is Forest and Stream.

The meet this year will be held in inland Canada in the famous Muskoka Lakes, from August 3, to Aug. 17, 1900. The Planet is in receipt of an enter-taining letter from Commodore W. G. MacKendrick, of Toronto, outlining the plans for this summer's camp.

The site leased for the A. C, A. meet was formerly the meeting point for the Indian tribes who hunted and fished there before the white man's arrival. It is now the summer residence R. R. Cockburn, ex-M. P., It is a nicely wooded point, five acres in ex-tent on the southwest end of Big Is-land in Lake Rosseau and is 112 miles

distant from Port Carling. The main camp will face on a white sand beach that for hundreds of years was the landing point for Indians, while the ladies camp or Squaw Point will be a secluded grove at the north side of the point about five feet above the water so that every tent will overlook the lake. At the point of the island is a large dock at which the steamers from and to lake Bossean and Lake Bossean and Lake Losenby arge dock at which the steamers from and to Lake Rosseau and Lake Joseph will call to meet incoming and outgoing trains to Toronto. Meals will be furnished at a dollar a day in the large house on the camp site. The bathing facilities are the best and the water salabriums. water salubrious.

The Grand Trunk railroad and other oads have furnished A. C. A. members a rate of one and one-third fare for the round trip-canoes, war canoes and camp duffle free. A steam boat will tow all the war canoes through the three lakes, devoting a day to each lake. The regatta committee have arranged a program of thirty-one event live of which are war canoe races for suitable trophies. Sterling cups will be offered in addition by Port Carling and the Muskoka Lakes Association

for a war canoe race.

Any one can join the A. C. A. and be Any one can join the A. C. A. and be one with them in their summer's out-in Muskoka. All that you require to do is to send a dollar for initiation fee and a dollar for camp dues for 1900.



Pritchett Makes Another Interesting Affidavit-fr. Richardson's Outspoken Views.

Ottawa, May 18 .- The time of the Hous was occupied yesterday by more discussion concerning the motion for further investiga tion into the West Huron and Brockville election frauds. Mr. Davin read a lengthy affidavit from John G. Prischett, the Lonaffidavit from John G. Pritchett, the London ballet manipulator, to show the connection of the Government with these frauds. Pitchett admitted being employed as an instructor for crooked deputy returning officers. He claimed he was paid by Alex. Smith, the chief organizer for the

Alex. Smith, the chief organizer for the Dominion and Ontario Governments in this province. In South Ontario he alleges he als, received \$50 from W. T. R. Preston, Government immigration agent. He also he declares received instructions from Vance and Threkeld, assistant Liberal organizers, and also had dealings with one Macdonald, an Ontario government employee. Pritchett goes into names, dates and delails at great length and implicates a large number of people. Mr. Davin on this basis proceeded to show Smith's connection with the ministers at Ottawa and claimed that Pritchett's confession involved them. that Pritchett's confession involved them also. 
