

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

ELEPHANTS LUMBERING.

They Were Not Only Doing Man's Work, but Doing It Man's Way. The elephants round us were dragring the logs to the mill to be sawed. They were harnessed for this with a broad breast band and heavy chains. A native looped the chains round the ogs, and the elephant started off with them and deposited them on the trolley. Others were picking up the sawed planks with their trunks and carrying them across the yard to be piled.

A mahout sat on the neck of every elephant, and if the animal picked up too small a plank the mahout would hint, with his iron spike, that two might go to that load. Then, grunting, the elephant would pick up the second with infinite delicacy of balance, turn, march over and deposit them beside the pile, always returning for another load so long as there were any planks ready. When there were none he would take his ease in the sun and wait, or perhaps there were heavy logs to be pushed from one place to another, and if pushing would do, with his trunk curled against the log, no elephant would give himself the trouble of picking it up any more than a housemaid will pick up a chair on casters.

More fascinating it was than I can tell to see the jungle patriarch kneel down to a heavy log, twist his trunk round it, place it on the top of the pile and then calculate its position and push and pull until it was square in its place. The oddest because the most reasonable thing was to see the elephant, pushing against the end of a very heavy log, stretch out one hind leg to give himself balance and purchase. That seemed to bring him somehow very near to us. He was not only doing our work, but he was doing it in our way.

Presently, with one accord, all the elephants dropped work and moved in

the direction of the sheds.
"That means it's 11 o'clock," said the foreman; "dinner hour. Not for himself could we get them to do a stroke of work from now till 3. It's their off time. At 3 they begin again and work till dusk, and they start about 6 in the morning, but they don't understand overtime."

The Baby Beetle's Cradle.

If at almost any time of the year we walk through the woods where the red, scarlet, black or pin oaks are growing that is, where we find those that ripen their acorns in two seasons and therefore belong to the pin oak group—we shall probably find on the ground fallen branches that vary in size from that of a lead pencil to that of one's thumb or even larger. These at the broken end appear as if cut away within the wood, so that only a thin portion is left under the bark. Within the rather uneven cut, generally near the center of the growth, is a small hole tightly plugged by the "powder post" of a beetle larva. Split open the branch or twig, when a burrow will be seen, and the little, white, soft, hard jawed larva that made it will be found or per-

haps the inactive pupa. A Russian Bear Story.

Here is an odd hunting tale from Russia: A certain count was out for bears and, tracking a dam and cubs, shot one of the latter, had it slung into his sleigh and drove for home, about fifty miles distant. Immediately after his arrival his gamekeeper announced that a huge bear had scaled the wall of the park. The count went out and shot it—the dam of the cub which he had killed and brought home! The faithful creature had followed her dead offspring those fifty miles at the same pace as relays of post horses and arrived in time to share the fate of her cub and to have a monument erected where she fell.

Mercury and the Sun.

The distance of Mercury from the sun varies owing to the eccentricity of its orbit. When he is nearest to the sun he receives ten and a half times more light and heat than we do, but when he removes to his greatest distance the light and heat are reduced by more than one-half. Even then, how ever, the sun blazes in the skies of Mercury with a disk four and a half times larger than that which he shows to us on earth.

THE LAW OF FINDING.

Against All Save the Owner the Finder's Title Is Perfect.

In common law finding is a qualified source of title to goods and chattels. Briefly, the law is that the finder has a clear title against all the world, excepting the owner. The proprietor of a coach or a railroad car or a ship has no right to demand property found on his premises. Such proprietors may make, in regard to lost articles, regulations which will bind their employees, but they cannot bind the public.

The law of finding was declared by the king's bench more than a hundred years ago (when it was the supreme court of common law in England) as follows:

A person found a wallet containing a sum of money on a shop floor. He handed the wallet and contents to the shopkeeper to be returned to the owner. After three years, during which the owner did not call for his property the finder demanded of the shopkeeper the wallet and the money. The latter refused to deliver them upon the ground that they were found on his premises. The finder then sued the shopkeeper, and it was held, as stated above, that, against all the world save the owner, the title of the finder is per fect. The finder has indeed been held to stand in the place of the owner. Thus A prevailed in an action against B, who found an article which A had originally found, but subsequently lost. The police have no especial rights in regard to articles lost unless these rights are conferred by statute. Receivers of articles found are trustees for the owner or finder. In the absence of special statute they have no power to keep an article against the finder any more than a finder has to retain an article against the owner. A finder must, however, use every

reasonable means to discover the owner of found goods before appropriating them to his own use. It has been declared that if the finder knows the owner or knows that he can discover him he is guilty of larceny in keeping or appropriating to himself the arti-

THE OLD SAILING SHIPS.

Why the Wooden Ones Were Better Than Those Built of Iron.

The sailing ship when I knew her in the days of her perfection was a sensible creature. When I say her days of perfection I mean perfection of build, gear, seaworthy qualities and ease of handling, not the perfection of speed. That quality reached its highest excellence in the discovery of hollow lines and departed with the change of building material.

None of the iron ships of yesterday ever attained the marvels of speed which the seamanship of men famous in their time had obtained from their wooden, copper sheeted predecessors. Everything had been done to make the iron ship perfect, but no wit of man had managed to devise an efficient coating composition to keep her bottom clean with the smooth cleanness of yellow metal sheeting. After a spell of a few weeks at sea an iron ship begins to lag as if she had grown tired too soon. It is only her bottom that is getting foul.

A very little affects the speed of a ship that is not driven on by an untiring propeller. Often it is impossible to tell what inconsiderate trifle puts her off her stride. A certain mysteriousness hangs around the quality of speed as it was displayed by the old sailing ships commanded by competent sea-men. In those days the speed was still a matter for the seaman's care. Therefore, apart from the laws, rules and regulations for the good preservation of his cargo, he was careful of his loading, of what is technically called the trim of his ship. Some ships sailed best on an even keel, others had to be trimmed quite one foot by the stern, and I have heard of a ship that gave her best speed on a wind when so loaded as to float a couple of inches by the head.-Joseph Conrad in Harper's Weekly. 1. 13.85

Fishing For Sheep.

When sheep were first introduced in-to Cornwall, England, a flock which had strayed from the uplands on to Gwithian sands were caught there by the tide and ultimately carried into St. Ives bay during the night. There the floating flock was observed from the St. Ives fishing boats, whose crews, never having seen sheep, took them for some new kind of fish and did their best to secure them both by hooks and lines and by netting. Those they secured they brought home trlumphantly next morning as a catch to which even pilchards were as nothing.

A New Zealand paper relates that a settler noticed a hawk flying about in a peculiar manner and crying out as if in pain. The settler obtained a gun and shot the bird, and investigation showed the cause of its distress was a weasel which was perched on the hawk's back, with its teeth buried in the bird's neck. Apparently the animal had pounced upon the hawk when it was on the ground and was carried skyward with the flight of its prev the flight of its prey.

A GOOD COMBINATION.

How to Make a Window Seat and Shoe Holder From Boxes.

Scalded to Death.



It was really after nearly all the udience had left and the "we, sma" hours" were approaching that the Council did its most important business last night, viz., the disposition they made of the Aberdeen bridge

Synopsized the agreement is to the effect that, before crossing the bridge permanently the railway company should strengthen it, according to plans and specifications, to be approved of by the engineer. FOR CONSTRUCTION PURPOSES THE ROAD IS ALLOWED TO CROSS THE BRIDGE, such temporary use to continue for only two months. The company covenant, that they will use the bridge in this condition for construction purposes only—if they at

the bridge in this condition for construction purposes only—if they attempt to use it permanently or for other purposes they agree to let the city remeve the tracks.

And so Aberdeen bridge sinks for at least two months from the prominent place it has lately occupied in the eyes of the community—the cause of heated colloquy and the scene of turmoil and strife, and relapses into what it was in the beginning—an uninteresting structure of wood and steel. steel.

The Mayor called the attention, of the Council to the fact that no such requests should be entertained after the last sitting of the Court of Revision and suggested that a resolution to that effect be put on the books, the Clerk giving public notice of the decision. The residents of Joseph street com-plained of the triangular strip near Barthe street and the Finance com-

Barthe street and the Finance committee were instructed to see if they could not arrange to straighten out the street.

Ald. Westman read a report of the superintendent of the Electric Lighting Department who explained that the service on the circuit attended to by Lineman Samuel Moore was unsatisfactory, while that attended to by Jos. Moore was entirely satisfactory. The report was referred to the Property committee, who will deal vigorously with it. The report of the poundkeeper was presented.

The Board of Health recommended sewers on Wellington street, Ral-egh street and the market square. Referred to Board of Works. Lewis & R.chards wrote on behalf of the ratepayers on Third street complaining of the condition of the

complaining of the condition of the lowered walk on that street, pointing out that it is now three or four inches below the level of the ground, in which condition water will collect on it and cause trouble. Referred to Board of Works.

The Mayor reported he had wired the representative of the Steam Heating Company of the amended resolution of the Council, granting them a 25 year exclusive franchise, and had received their acceptance of these terms.



WILL NOT USE ST. CLAIR ST.

The Electric Road Will Enter the City From Dover via. Amelia, Joseph and Head Streets

Company Ask Permission to Change Their Route and a By Law to This Effect Will be Prepared By City Council

After all the lengthy discussions, petitions and hearing of deputations with the laying of the electric railway tracks on St. Clair street, it has been at last decided that the road may not go down that street

at all, but may enter the city v.a Amelia, Joseph and Head streets, to get to the Aberdeen bridge.

This conclusion was arrived at by the City Council last evening. In view or the dissatisfaction which would have existed on St. Clair street, no matter whether the tracks were laid in the centre of the street or on the westerly boulevard, this is probably a happy solution of the trouble.

is probably a happy solution of the trouble.

Ald. O'Keefe brought the matter before the Counc'l Board last evening. He presented a petition from the business men on St. Clair street praying that the railway company's tracks be laid on the west boulevard so as to prevent the tearing up of the street. Another petition to same effect was received from ratepayers. The Mayor pointed out that the matter would have to be re-opened, as it was settled that the road should go down the centre of the street. Ald. O'Keefe pointed out that if the road went down the centre of the street traffic would be diverted and business interests would suffer. Ald.

street traffic would be diverted and business interests would suffer. Ald. Ainsworth moved that the matter be reconsidered but met with no seconder, the Mayor refusing Ald. O'Keefe that priv'lege.

Later in the evening ex-Ald. Bell asked the priv'lege of addressing the Council regarding the route of the electric road in North Chatham. He stated that, owing to the heavy expense attached to the tearing up of St. Clair street, the electric road were considering the advisability of using Amelia, Joseph and Head streets to get in from the open country to the Aberdeen bridge. Before preparing plans, however, he thought it advisable to sound the Council on the matter to see what they thought of it.

Several of the aldermen expressed themselves favorable to this route, because of the fact that St. Clair street is the main artery of traffic from Dover into the city and the presence of tracks on that street would be a serious menace. Finally Ald. Austin moved that a bylay. Ald. Austin moved that a by-law be prepared amending the by-law respecting the electric road so as to allow of the route being changed from St. Clair street to the one proposed, his motion carrying. posed, his motion carrying.

11 OIL TANKS BURNING.

An Area of Three-Quarters of a Mile Square of Flames In Texas Oil Fields—Struck by Lightning.

Humble, Texas, July 25.—Covering an area of three quarters of a mile square, with a great canopy of smoke covering two miles, the oil tanks of the Texas Co. boiled and bubbled under the great heat of burning oil yesterday. When the fire can be extinguished is problematical. Certainly not until it has burned all of the oil in the eleven big tanks which held 2,500,000 barrels when lightning struck them Sunday af-

when lightning struck them Sunday afternoon.

Five negro workmen perished. There are hundreds of homeless people, many of them only awai ing a chance to go to Houston for shelter. During the whole of the night there was a heavy downpour of rain, and this covered the ground with a sheet of water coated with a thick film of oil.

Volcane of Oil,

Shortly after the big tank, which was struck by lightning, began to blaze, 200 workmen with seven y-five mules

200 workmen with seven y-five mules were hurried to the place to throw up earthen embankments to confine the fire to the tank where it originated. Suddenly the oil gave an upheaval, bubbled and lifted a great mass of the burning fluid bedily from the tank, and the fire were companied to the tank.

and the fire was communicated to three other tanks.

The burning oil caught the men and mules and hemmed them in. There was a wild scramble for safety, men dropping their scrapers and reins. Some of them mounted mules and escaped, but at least forty mules balked and were

At 4 o'clock the fire broke out in the tanks of the Texas Co. at the pumping station, a mile from the original fire.

The Loss.

Oil men place the loss at 2,500,000

Convenient Dish Drainer. Tishwashing is one of the greatest trials of the housekeeper, and any conwenience that will expedite this tri-daily sought. The particular housewife insists upon a thorough rinsing of the sishes after they have been washed, and for this purpose two dishpans are actually employed, thus necessitating a double thrusting of the hands into hot water, one of the most disagreeable Zeatures of the whole operation. A St. Louis housewife has adopted a dishwashing contrivance consisting of a supporting frame for the kitchen sink. It is a wire framework, with transwerse strands to give rigidity and strength, the ends of which members are bent or turned downward to form supporting legs. When the dishes have been washed, instead of being placed In a second pan and so rehandled they are placed on this wire frame and rinsed, either by turning on the hot water spigot or by being drenched by means of a dipper.—St. Louis Post-Dis-

Bead Lamp Shades. Those who have an inclination to do bead work, though not knowing enough about it to attempt the handsome bags and purses, will no doubt be pleased to go into shade adorning. Candle shades are simplest. The shade proper is made of little medallions or other forms so shaped that they will fit together. Each bead is strung on wire. One color effects are safest for the beginner. Another idea is to simply make a fringe for a shade. The beads used should be exactly matched to the shade. These tiny beads are not colored, but are rather lined with a color, the color being put in where the bead is pierced. For a candle shade the fringe should be made thus: Make a wire circle the size of the shade. Cover it with tape. String beads to a length of two and a half inches and sew them to the covered wire close together. It is well to have a number of needles threaded at once. In making fringe for a lamp shade the depth varies according to the size of the shade.

FANS TRANSFORMED.

NEW SPHERE OF USEFULNESS FOR JAPANESE TRIFLES.

Dainty Conveniences For a Summe Evening-Crape Paper, Chints, Silk and Ribbon Used-Holders, Screens and Other Devices.

It is always desirable to have an mple supply of fans in readiness to hand to your guests on a summer even ing, and for this purpose nothing could be daintier or less expensive than Japanese fans metamorphosed by the use of crepe tissue paper, a proceeding

the Designer describes as fol To begin the work cut from lows: brown paper the shape (whether circle, trefoil or diamond) which you wish the remodeled fan to assume. Paste this pattern smoothly upon the fan and cut away the Japanese paper and thin bamboo from around it; then paste over both sides firm muslin or duck. frimming into shape around the outer edge. This makes the fan strong and durable and also gives something to sew to.

Now cover one side of the fan with crepe paper, bringing it over the edges and pasting down on the other side.
If a ruffle be desired it is sewed around the edge, care being taken not to lose the outlines, and the back of the fan is then covered with crepe paper, doubled under a little and pasted down. handle may be silvered or gilded and design outlined on the fan center in liquid gold or silver or black ink, or crepe paper which comes already decorated may be used for the center and plain for the ruffle.

If preferred, pretty figured chintzes silks or cretons may be employed to cover the fans, and a silk cord may take the place of the ruffle as a finish for the edge.

The first cut shows a "photograph fan." The openings for the photos are first cut in the brown paper pattern, which is pasted on, and the fan then cut out to correspond. In the illustration the fan is of white silk; the edge is finished with a heavy blue silk cord. The scroll decorations are done in liquid gold. Blue ribbon, like that of the bow, is stretched across the back of the various openings to hold the pic-tures, which are slipped in between the ribbon and the fan.

The second fan shows a trefoil done in white crape paper. A design of gold scrolls and leaves ornaments the

center, and the handle and sticks are gilded. The bow is of old rose sating

A very pretty table screen may be fastening together three or four of these photograph fans with hinge bows of ribbon or silk cord, after shortening the handle two or three nches to form feet for the screen.

CANNING FRUIT.

in Experienced Housewife Talks to

"In June come strawberries, rhubarb and cherries; July brings red and black raspberries, gooseberries, currants, blackberries and blueberries. In August we have blackberries, peaches, plums, pears and crabapples. A September sun ripens quinces, grapes, barberries and citrons. When I am planning to put up fruit I make my preparations the night before. Fruit cans and lids are sterilized by putting them in cold water softened by borax and allowing it to boil for twenty minutes. I provide new rings. A rubber which has been used once is fit only to throw away. When the cans have been thoroughly cleansed fill each one with water, put on the rubber and lid, screw tight and turn upside down on a sheet of paper. If there is the slightest leak it will show, therefore discard that jar. There is a crack or chip in it somewhere by which bacteria will enter to make the fruit ferment later.

"Next morning I rise early and go to market at 6 o'clock, hiring a parcel

delivery man to carry home the fruit. This costs 15 to 20 cents, but it pays. I get the pick of the finest fruit gathered freshly the night before, and I have it at the house ready to begin work on after breakfast. Norah washes the dishes and leaves the beds to air till afternoon; then we both begin work on the fruit, getting it out of the way before lunch time. Now we have berries enough hulled to begin work." "Why are you sorting them over?" asked Margaret, while she watched her

neighbor separate the berries into two bowls. "The fine, large ones are for canning: the smaller berries are to convert into

When they had cooked to a pulp she squeezed them through a potato ricer, then added to one pint of juice a pound of sugar and half a pint of water. While it simmered for twenty minutes she filled the cans with the fine berries and set them into the wash boiler, which held a layer of excelsior and enough warm water to cover half of the cans. Fresh berries were added as the fruit sank into the can. Into the bottles was poured the ruby colored strawberry sirup.

When each can was filled to overflowing the lids were snapped on and hot water was poured into the boiler till it almost reached the top of the cans. The gas was lit underneath, the lid of the boiler was put on, then the water boiled slowly for half an hour. The cans were lifted out and covered with a thick towel to prevent cool air striking them. That might have cracked

AN UGLY PINE FLOOR.

The Way It Was Made Almost Equal

to Hard Polished Wood. "I moved into a cottage that had unsightly wide board, wide cracked floors of pine. They were badly stained and altogether hopeless looking when one realized that rugs were to be laid on them," says a writer in an exchange. "As there was no possibility of making them look worse, I decided to experiment. I scrubbed them clean then carefully puttied up all the cracks with the aid of a putty knife. After the putty was dry I applied oak col ored floor paint of a good, reliable brand. The first coat was thinly applied and well brushed in. This paint dried in twelve hours. Then the surface was lightly sandpapered, and a slightly heavier coat of paint was ap plied. After this was thoroughly hard it was sandpapered again and a thin, well brushed in coat of lacquered var-nish put on. This takes longer to dry than paint and must be perfectly dry before being sandpapered in readine

stained and despised floors were a rich oak color, with a very fine hard polished surface. This work I did in the spring. In the fall I gave the fina thin coat of linseed oil and turn tine (two parts oil to one turpentine), well rubbed in with a flannel, with the result that the floors took on their pristine freshness. Unless they have very hard use, painting and varnishing once a year is sufficient to keep them nice. To clean floors treated in this way it is only necessary to wipe them up once a month with a slightly oiled cloth drawn over a broom. I have seen floors painted black in the same manner and varnished with black floor polish that looked uncommonly well as a background for oriental or bright colored rugs. While I do not claim that floors treated as described herein are equal in effect to the beauty of vell waxed hardwood floors, I do say that they are very well appearing and, with rugs on them, greatly to be preferred to the insanitary carpet."

A STIRRUP RACE.

GUESSING DISTANCES.

& Good Way to Test Your Accuracy In Judging Dimensions.

Almost every one knows that the

head of an ordinary horse is as long as a barrel, but not many persons would have thought so without measur-ing. When you have a rainy day or a dull evening try a distance guessing contest. Let each player have pencil and paper and write down the list of things to be measured. All have a voice in making up the lists. Some one suggests height of the table. All then write "height of table" and each puts opposite his guess of the height in feet and inches. In the same way other objects are selected and the distances guessed-width of door, dimensions of room, length and height of mantelpiece, distance around a circular stand, distance around Claire's neck or Jack's head, dimensions of books and boxes, height of chairs, pictures and vases.

Finally the papers are signed and ex-changed and some one with tape line or rule measures the various distances The best guess for each object is marked by a cross, the poorest by a cipher. It will be amusing to see how wild some of the guesses are.

Hook Ringing.

Now tie a strong but light cord twenty feet long to a fairly heavy ring of about twice the diameter of a curtain pole ring. 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## "THE STORMY PETREL"

Sees Czar in the Interest of Peace and Harmony.

Czar Stayed on Kaiser's Yacht Till Early Mern-Official Statement Is That Nicholas and William Conferred as Brother Monarchs From 11 a. m. Till 1.30 a. m.-Komura Says Japan Desires Peace.

St. Petersburg, July 25.—The picturesque meeting of the German and Russian Emperors in the Finland guif, according to private advices, ended yesterday afternoon with a gala luncheon on board the German Imperial yacht Hohenzollern, after which Emperor William's yacht steamed seaward, escorted for a short distance by the Russian Imperial yacht Polar Star. Then Imperial salutes were exchanged, and the Polar Star put about and returned to Peterhof, where she arrived last night. A flotilla of torpedo boats, torpedo boat destroyers and small cruisers howered about the Imperial yacht from the time they met until they parted.

Details of Meeting Secret.

Beyond the additional fact that Em-peror William paid a visit to the Polar Star Sunday night, and that subse-quently Emperor Nicnolas went on board the Rohenzollera and remained

hoard the Rofenzollers and remained until long after midnight in the German Emperor's cabin no further details of the meeting are yet available.

The meeting of the two monarchs naturally created intense interest in diplomatic cheles. In some quarters there is a disposition to attach the deepest political significance to it, and all sorts of theories are advanced. But they are largely apeculation.

Strengthens Peace. It is officially announced that the visit was only a visit of couriesy, made by Emperor William to his brother monarch before leaving the Gulf of Bothnia, but under the circumstances the diplomats cannot believe that such a meeting was devoid of meaning to the world's political these board.

No matter what the ultimate result may be however, all the diplomats

may be, however, all the diplomats agree that its first effect would make for peace, as Emperor William is known to be strongly of the opinion that Emperor Nicholas should conclude peace and get his house in order.

In another quarter it was suggested that the German Emperor may have asked Emperor Nicholas to support a German prince for the throne of Nor way, King Oscar having announced that he would not permit a member of the House of Bernadotte to assume the sceptre, and the only other candi-date being Prince Charles of Denmark who is married to an English princess Official Statement

Official Statement.

The marshal of the court, Count Benckendorff, has sent the following from the Island of Bjorke:

"At 10 o'clock in the evening of July 23, the German Imperial yacht Hohenzollern dropped anchor near the anchorage of the Russian Imperial yacht Polar Star. Emperor William, accompanied by Prince Albert of Schleswig-Holstein, and his suite, was: rowed to the Polar Star. Emperor William was received at the head of the ladder by Emperor Nicholas and the Grand Duke Michael, and cordial greetings were exchanged. The German Emperor reviewed the guard of honor and the exchanged. The German Emperor re-viewed the guard of hopor and the yacht's crew, and the two-sultes were presented, after which Their Majestles retired to the salon, "At 11 o'clock at night, Emperor

New Proposal More Liberal.

The proposals of the Government for a national assembly, as amended by the Committee of Ministers, and now submitted for the Emperor's consideration, differ essentially from the origoutlined sion, headed by M. Bouligine, Minister of the Interior. They are more liberal, and are free from vexatious complexities, placing the assembly, on a more independent footing, and empowering its president to report direct to the Emperor, while the assembly may se-lect its own officers, including its presdent, and discuss any matters of a legislative character, with greater free-dom. Further, the commission of Min-isters recommends that the assembly be authorized to examine all appoint-ments to the different Ministeries, and to question Ministers on affairs with in its jurisdiction

Japan Desires Peace. Chicago, July 25.—Baron Komura arrived here yesterday. He authorized

this statement: "At New York we shall meet Minister Takahira, whom we expect to have word from President Roosevelt, invit-ing us to call either at Oyster Bay or ing us to call either at Oyster Bay or Washington. We desire peace, yet are not over anxious, nor are we over sanguine that the negotiations will be productive. A Japanese protectorate over Korea will open the way for Japanese immigration there and divert it from this country."



## BALFOUR WON'T RESIGN

Makes Statement to a House Literally Packed.

Thursday Last Does Not Warrant Either Resignation or a Dissolution-Opposition and Irish Leaders Adopt Heated Tone In Replying, But They Abstained From Forcing a Division

London, July 25.-The Governmen has so intention of resigning in conseof "hursday's adverse vote. This
was the gist of Premier Balsour's anticipated statement in the House of Comtoms yes, erday afternoon. Although it
had been gangrally recognised that
such would be the decision of the Premier there was feverish engerness on
all sides to hear the exact terms of his
statement. The House was literally
paoked. Every gallery available to the
peers and the public was crowded and
there had not been such an attendance
of members during the life of the pregent Parliament."

Mr. Balfour, who was heartily cheered by his supporters on rising, some-

ed by his supporters on rising, somewhat iried the patience of his hearers by a long disquisition on how former administrations had ignored defeats similar to that of Thursday. He desimilar to that of Thursday. He de-clared that such incidents had never-been regarded as ground for resigna-tion or dissolution and announced that the Government did not propose either to resign or dissolve Parliament because of Thursday's occurrences.

The Fremier considered that it would be a grave evil if the tendre of Minis-ters was made dependent on such votes as that of Thursday. He hoped the practice would never prevail of allowing a Government united in itself and possessing the confidence of the major-ity of the House to abandon its post ners'y in consequence of such a vote Will Be Hard Fighting.

Mr. Balfour sat down without perferring to the remaining business of the session, and Sir Henry Campbellannerman, the Liberal leader, immediately asked for an opportunity to discuss the Premier's statement. The Opposition, he said, did not propose to proceed with Sir Edward Grey's preced yets of course which obviously

proceed with Sir Edward Grey's proposed vote of censure, which obviously
was superseded by the occurrence of
Thursday. They wanted to discuss the
conduct of the Government regarding
the events of last week.

John Redmond, the leader of the
Irish Nationalists, took a similar line,
and the heated tone of both leaders indicated that the Government will have
to face the most determined opposition
during the balance of the session. Ultimately by arrangement with Mr. Baltimately by arrangement with Mr. Bal-four, the chief Government whip. Sir Alexander Acland Hood, formerly mov-ed the adjoutnment, and Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman opened the debate with a sharp attack on the Gov
