"One of the first things we have to impress upon newcomers in this busi-ness," remarked a dealer in fine prints, "is to take the utmost care in handling prints for the simple reason that the ink used in printing engravings and ink used in printing engravings and etchings practically never dries. Of all the men whose works in this line we handle it can be safely said that on the prints of only two of them— Rembrandt and Durer—has the ink really dried. And you know it is a long time since they were alive. It has been our frequent experience to have prints fully 200 years old show signs that the ink still had some mois-ture in it, as we have learned to our cost in seeing them rubbed.

"An expert, whether he be a profes

sional or amateur collector, can tell at a glance that a print has had another one pulled across it, for to his accus one pulled across it, for to his accus-tomed eyes the telltale marks of the ink having been drawn across a blank place on the paper are as clear as day-light. 



Toronto, July 13.—Yesterday goes down in the Orange annals of this city as "the greatest day." Nearly 100,000 people witnessed the parade, which contained about 4,000 Orangemen. The procession was two and a quarter miles long and took an hour to pass a given point. 



The matter of the coasting trade of the United States was brought before the Intercolonial Conference by Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

According to the coasting laws of the United States, no foreign vessel can proceed from port to port of the United States.

Those entitled to such privilege must have been built in the United States, and carry the United States flag.

States, and carry the United States flag.

The coasting trade of Great Britain is open to all vessels. The restriction in the United States goes as far as to declare a voyage of some 12,000 miles from New York around Cape Horn to San Francisco to be a coasting voyage, and as such restrict it to vessels earrying the United States flag. When the United States took Porto Riea they immediately applied the coasting laws to it, so that no mails or passengers could be carried between that island and the United States, mleas the United States flag were carried.

In local shipping circles, not a great deal of importance is attached to the matter. The policy is frankly a selfish one, intended to encourage the growth of native shipbuilding. Canada, according to a member of the Shipping Federation, suffers somewhat from it on the upper lakes, where the United States boats out-number ours; but even if there were reciprocity, which Sir Wilfrid Laurier desires, the United States, with their greater facilities for shipbuilding, could easily swamp us. It may be greater facilities for shipbuilding, could easily swamp us. It may be said, however, that the Shipping Federation is in communication with the important European Governments on the question.

Gave Mutual Privileges. Gave Mutual Privileges.

In connection with this subject, it may be stated that in 1815 a favored nation treatment was entered into between the United States and Great Britain, giving mutual privileges as to the use of ports, rivers, free communication, etc. And yet, notwithstanding this treaty, while an American vessel could proceed to London and take cargo for India, an English vessel could not go to New York and take a cargo for any other portion of American territory.

England, in fact, gives access to the American to all her ports in any part of the Empire, while the latter refuses reciprocity of treatment.

Washington, July 13.—An agreement has been reached between the United States Secretary of War and the representatives of the Catholic Church in the Philippines Islands regarding a number of important matters of controversy which will obviate the necessity of prolonging threatening vexatious litigations.

These properties are valued at \$2,066,000.

The church relinquishes to the Government of the Philippines all claims and demands upon the estate of Santa Potenciana and upon the hospital and foundation of San Lazaro, except that the archbishop is to retain possession of the block in which the present Santa Cruz Cemetery is situated, and of fifty hectares, north of the hospital.

CREW OF SINKING SHIP PLAYED ON UPPER DECK.

Thrilling Experiences and Heroic Res cues Had Suffered Severe Privations-Sprung Bad Leak - Vessel Rendered Helpless In Boisterous Seas-Went Back for Cats- Rescued by the Lucifer.

ed by the Lucifer.

After drifting about in mid-Atlantic for a week with her deck awash and her crew suffering severe privations, the oil tank steamer Lucifer, 2,473 tons, belonging to the Bear Creek Oil and Shipping Company, Liverpool, sank. Her crew of thirty-three all told, and three cats, were saved, and have been landed at Falmouth. The Lucifer left New York for Dublin on April 5, and four days afterwards it was discovered that there was a leak under the stokehold. Steam pumps were set to work, and coped with the inflow, and Captain Wilson was confident that his men could discover the leak and stop it. On April 12 an American liner was sighted, and Captain Wilson signalled asking his condition to be reported, but declining assistance. That night he had reason to lament his independence, for a assistance. That night he had reason to lament his independence, for a heavy gale came on, the leak increased, filling stokehold and engineroom, putting out fires, and rendering his vessel helpless. Fortunately the steam pumps were kept going by means of a donkey boiler on deck, but the water sained so rapidly that steam pumps were kept going by means of a donkey boiler on deck, but the water gained so rapidly that the erew had to assist by baling out with buckets. Over eight hundred tons of oil were pumped into the sea, and by this means the Lucifer was lightened, though seas swept her deck and the plight of the crew was pitiable in the extreme. Signals of distress were flown by day, and flare burnt by night, and two vessels passed without apparently noticing the signals.

Boats Were Got Out.

All the boats were made ready for launching and provisioned for twelve days, but as the mountainous seas continued Captain Wilson realized that it would be imprudent to launch the boats except at the last extremity. While the vessel was being buffeted about two steamers hove in sight. Rockets were fired, but both steamed away without attempting to offer assistance. On the night of April 16, seven days after the Lucifer had sprung a leak, the steamer Sagami made her welcome appearance. The seas were still too boisterous to attempt a rescue that night, and Capt. Wilson signalled that he thought he could keep his vessel afloat till daybreak if the Sagami would stand by. This the captain of the Sagami consented to do, and at daybreak called for volunteers to go to the rescue of the distressed crew. Third officer Wallace and five seamen responded. That a boat would live in such a see was doubted, but the gallant fellows never hesitated, and those on board the Lucifer, anxiously watching their would-be rescuers, were momentarily dismayed as they lost sight of the boat.

But it came up again on the crest of a wave. The work of getting along-side was hazardous, for it was feared that the little craft would be smashed against the partly-sunken steamer over whose decks waves were sweep ing. A boatload of the Lucifer's crev ing. A boatload of the Lucifer's crew was safely transferred to the Sagami, and a second trip was made, again successfully, amid the cheers of their shipmates. One of the Lucifer's life-boats took off the remainder of the crew, the captain being the last to leave. Though the men lost all 'their belongings, they remembered the dumb creatures and brought off three of the ship's cats. Before leaving steps were taken to ensure the sinking of of the ship's cats. Before leaving steps were taken to ensure the sinking of the Lucifer, and the vessel was seen to go down stern first. With his normal crew of 42 increased to 75, the captain of the Sagami found his stores seriously taxed, and short rations were ordered.
