A BOOK OF WORSHIP.



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
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THIS Book of Worship is a modification of the

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FIRST SERVICE.

I The Minister shall say one or more of the following sentences, and then the address shall come after; all standing.

WHEN the wicked man turneth away from his wickedness that he hath committed, and doeth that which is lawful and right, he shall save his soul alive. *Ezek. xviii. 27.*

The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and a contrite heart, O God, thou wilt not despise. *Ps. li. 17.*

Rend your heart, and not your garments, and turn unto the Lord your God: for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and of great kindness, and repenteth him of the evil. *Joel ii. 13.*

The hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth; for the Father seeketh such to worship him. God is a spirit: and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth. *John iv. 23, 24.*

If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us: if we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. *I. John i. 8, 9.*

DEARLY beloved brethren, the Scripture moveth us in sundry places to acknowledge and confess our manifold sins and wickedness; and that we should not dissemble nor cloak them before the face of Almighty God, our Heavenly Father; but confess them with a lowly, penitent, and obedient heart; to the end that we

may obtain forgiveness of the same, by his infinite goodness and mercy. And although we ought at all times humbly to acknowledge our sins before God; yet ought we most chiefly so to do when we assemble and meet together to render thanks for the great benefits that we have received at his hands, to set forth his most worthy praise, to hear his most holy word, and to ask those things which are requisite and necessary as well for the body as the soul. Wherefore I pray and beseech you, as many as are here present, to accompany me with a pure heart and humble voice unto the throne of the heavenly grace, saying after me:

¶ A General Confession to be said by the whole Congregation after the Minister; all kneeling.

ALMIGHTY and most merciful Father; we have erred and strayed from thy ways like lost sheep. We have followed too much the devices and desires of our own hearts. We have offended against thy holy laws. We have left undone those things which we ought to have done; and we have done those things which we ought not, to have done. But thou, O Lord, have mercy upon us. Forgive thou them, O God, who confess their faults. Restore thou them that are penitent; according to thy promises declared unto mankind in Christ Jesus our Lord. And grant, O most merciful Father, that through him we may hereafter live a godly, righteous, and sober life, to the glory of thy holy name. *Amen.*

¶ Then likewise the Minister shall say; all standing.

O Lord, open thou our eyes.

People.—That we may behold wondrous things out of thy law.

Minister.—O Lord, open thou our lips.

People.—And our mouth shall show forth thy praise.

Minister.—Praise ye the Lord.

People.—The Lord's name be praised.

¶ Then shall be read by the Minister and people responsively, the following selections from the sixty-fifth and twenty-seventh Psalms.

PRAISE waiteth for thee, O God, in Zion ; and unto thee shall the vow be performed.

O thou that hearest prayer, unto thee shall all flesh come.

My iniquities are heavy upon me ; but thou wilt forgive our transgressions.

Blessed is the man whom thou choosest, and causest to approach unto thee, that he may dwell in thy courts. O satisfy us with the goodness of thy house, even of thy holy temple.

By wonderful things in righteousness wilt thou answer us, O God of our salvation ; who art the confidence of all the ends of the earth, and of them that are afar off upon the sea :

Who in thy strength maketh fast the mountains ; being girded with power :

They also that dwell in the uppermost parts are awed by thy wonders : thou makest the regions of the morning and evening to rejoice.

Thou visitest the earth, and waterest it : thou greatly enrichest it with the river of God, which is full of water : thou preparest corn, when thou hast so provided for it.

Thou waterest the ridges thereof abundantly : thou settlest the furrows thereof : thou makest it soft with showers : thou blessest the springing thereof.

Thou crownest the year with thy goodness ; and thy paths drop fatness.

They drop upon the pastures of the wilderness : and the little hills rejoice on every side.

FIRST SERVICE.

The pastures are clothed with flocks ; the valleys also are covered with corn : they shout for joy ; they also sing.

The Lord is my light and my salvation ; whom shall I fear ? the Lord is the strength of my life : of whom shall I be afraid ?

One thing I have desired of the Lord, that I will seek after ; that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the Lord, and to inquire in his temple.

For in the time of trouble he shall hide me in his pavilion. in the secret place of his tabernacle shall he hide me ; he shall set me upon a rock.

Therefore will I offer in his tabernacle sacrifices of joy ; I will sing, yea, I will sing praises unto the Lord.

Hear, O Lord, when I cry with my voice : have mercy also upon me, and answer me.

When thou saidst, Seek ye my face ; my heart said unto thee, Thy face, Lord, will I seek.

Hide not thy face far from me, put not thy servant away in anger : thou hast been my help ; leave me not, neither forsake me, O God of my salvation.

When my father and my mother forsake me, then the Lord will take me up.

Teach me thy way, O Lord, and lead me in a plain path.

I had fainted, unless I had believed to see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living.

Wait on the Lord : be of good courage, and he shall strengthen thine heart ; wait I say on the Lord.

Now unto the King eternal, immortal and invisible, the only wise God,

Be honour and glory, through Jesus Christ, for ever and ever. Amen.

Amen.

Collect for Grace.

O LORD, our heavenly Father, Almighty and Everlasting God, who hast safely brought us to the beginning of this day; defend us in the same with thy mighty power; and grant that this day we fall into no sin, neither run into any kind of danger; but that all our doings may be ordered by thy governance, to do always that which is righteous in thy sight, through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

For the Queen, the Governor-General, and all in Civil Authority.

O LORD, our heavenly Father, the high and mighty Ruler of the universe, who dost from thy throne behold all the dwellers upon earth, most heartily we beseech thee, with thy favour, to behold and bless thy servant, the Queen of Great Britain, the Governor-General of this Dominion, and all others in authority; and replenish them with the grace of thy Holy Spirit, that they may always incline to thy will, and walk in thy way: endue them plenteously with heavenly gifts; grant them in health and prosperity long to live; and after this life to attain everlasting joy and felicity, through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

THIRD SERVICE.

The Minister shall say one or more of the following sentences, and then the Address which comes after; all standing.

ASK, and it shall be given you ; seek, and ye shall find ; knock, and it shall be opened unto you : for every one that asketh, receiveth ; and he that seeketh, findeth ; and to him that knocketh it shall be opened. Matt. vii. 7, 8.

Not every one that saith unto me, Lord, Lord, shall enter into the kingdom of heaven, but he that doeth the will of my Father who is in heaven. Matt. vii. 21.

Wherewith shall I come before the Lord, and bow myself before the high God ? He hath shewed thee, O man, what is good ; and what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God ? Micah vi. 6, 8.

Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord ? or who shall stand in his holy place ? He that hath clean hands and a pure heart, who hath not lifted up his soul unto vanity, nor sworn deceitfully. He shall receive the blessing from the Lord, and righteousness from the God of his salvation. Ps. xxiv. 3, 4, 5.

DEARLY beloved brethren, again we rest from the active duties of our earthly pilgrimage to sing our songs of gratitude and adoration, and renew our souls at the fountain of life. We are not strangers or servants,

but children of the household of God. With humble and fervent spirits let us offer up our prayers to Him, who, though he dwelleth on high, yet never saileth to listen to the lowly and contrite who call upon him. And when we leave this place, may we all with fresh zeal and love go on our way rejoicing to the blessed and everlasting home.

THOU, O Lord most High, art our light and our life, our strength and our joy, our refuge in distress, our ever-present friend and helper. Inspire us, we beseech thee, with thoughts suited to thy most holy presence. As disciples of Jesus Christ thy Son, and with great love to him, we would come to thee: may it be also in his spirit. We would be mindful how far off from thee we should have been without him, and how near to thee he will lead us, if we humbly and steadfastly yield ourselves up to his guidance. Thou, Lord, hast made all things, and art wonderful in all thy doings; yet art thou most wonderful and glorious in thy works of love and mercy. Amen.

T *Then shall the Minister and the People say; all standing:*

Minister.—Blessed, O Lord, is the people that know the joyful sound of thy gospel.

People.—They shall walk, O Lord, in the light of thy countenance.

Minister.—Illuminate, according to thy good pleasure, all nations with the brightness of thy truth.

People.—O Lord, give the word, and great shall be the company of preachers.

Minister.—Create in us a clean heart, O God.

People.—And renew a right spirit within us.

Minister.—Cast us not away from thy presence.

People.—And take not thy Holy Spirit from us.

¹ Then shall be read, respectively, by Minister and People, the following extracts from the one hundred and third Psalm.

My feet tread in a straight path: in the congregation will I blow the Lord.

He that walketh uprightly, and worketh righteousness, and speaketh the truth in his heart.

He that back-biteth not with his tongue, nor doeth evil with his neighbor, nor taketh up a reproach against his neighbor.

In whose eyes a vile person is contemned ; but he honoreth them that fear the Lord. He that sweareth to his own hurt, and changeth not.

He that putteth not out his money to usury, nor taketh reward against the innocent. He that doeth these things shall never be moved.

T HE earth is the Lord's, and the fulness thereof ; the world, and they that dwell therein.

For he hath founded it upon the seas, and established it upon the floods.

Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord ? and who shall stand in his holy place ?

He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart ; who hath not inclined his soul unto vanity, nor sworn deceitfully.

He shall receive the blessing from the Lord, and righteousness from the God of his salvation.

This is the generation of them that seek him, that seek thy face, O Jacob.

Lift up your heads, O ye gates ; and be ye lift up ye everlasting doors ; and the King of glory shall come in.

Who is the King of glory ? the Lord strong and mighty, the Lord mighty in battle,

Lift up your heads, O ye gates ; even lift them up, ye everlasting doors ; and the King of glory shall come in.

Who is this King of glory ? the Lord of hosts, he is the King of glory.

Now unto the King eternal, immortal, and invisible, the only wise God.

Be honor and glory, through Jesus Christ, for ever and ever. Amen.

O Lord, let thy mercy lighten upon us : as our trust is in thee.

O Lord, in thee have we trusted : let us never be confounded.

Then shall be said such portion, or all of the following Prayers, or such extemporeous Prayers as the Minister shall deem expedient ; all kneeling and the People responding with " Amen."

O GOD most holy, who has abundantly assured us that, while thou art strict to punish those who continue in their sins, thou art a gracious and tender Father to the penitent, and wilt open thine ear in compassion to the prayers of all such as with heartfelt shame and sorrow confess their sins before thee ; show us, we beseech thee, our transgressions as they truly are : pardon us for the evil we have done : judge us not for the good we have left undone : work in us to will and to do thy good pleasure ; that being sanctified by thy Spirit we may serve thee in a religious and holy conversation, as true disciples of thy Son Jesus Christ.

People. Search us, O Lord, and know our hearts.

Minister. Try us and know our thoughts, and see if there be any wicked way in us.

People. And lead us in the way everlasting.

GOD our Father, we receive with all thankfulness the manifold testimonies thou hast given us of thine incomprehensible love and favour towards us through thy dearly beloved Son, and most humbly we bow our

Minister.—O Thou who madest water spring out of a rock for thy people in their thirst, draw from our stony hearts the tears of compunction, that we may truly bewail our sins; and as our consciences by sin are assained, so by thy fatherly goodness may we be pardoned, and received into the fellowship of Jesus Christ. Amen.

O HEAVENLY FATHER, thy word is a lamp unto our feet, and a light unto our path: we humbly beseech thee that thou wouldest be pleased to open and enlighten our minds, through Jesus Christ, who is the true light of the world, that we may understand thy word in its plainness and purity, and frame accordingly the whole course of our lives. Amen.

O GOD of infinite mercy, in whose loving-kindness we trust for the supply of all our wants; vouchsafe to us such a portion of temporal good as may be needful to support us in our journey through life; preserve us from sad accidents and all evil; sanctify our hearts and direct our ways, that we may be united to thee by the living bond of obedience and charity; and that, always feeling the presence of our gracious and merciful Father, we may become a holy family before thee, and be received hereafter into the family of heaven, for which thou didst send thy best beloved Son to prepare us. Amen.

O LORD God, Fountain of comfort and help of life and peace, of plenty and pardon, who fillest heaven with thy glory, and earth with thy goodness; we give thee the most humble and earnest returns of a glad and thankful heart for the blessings of grace, for the support of every minute, and the gifts of every day. Praised be the Lord daily, even the Lord that helpeth us and poureth his blessings upon us. Blessed be the name of his Majesty for ever, and let all the earth be filled with his glory. Amen.

A LMIGHTY and everlasting God, who by thy holy Apostle has taught us to make supplications and to give thanks for all men ; we humbly entreat thee most mercifully to receive these our prayers, which we offer unto thy divine Majesty, beseeching thee to inspire continually all thy sincere worshippers with the spirit of truth, unity, and concord : and grant that all they that do confess the name of Christ may agree in the truth of thy holy word, and live in unity and godly love. Give wisdom, O heavenly Father, to all the Ministers of thy holy gospel, that they may both by their life and doctrine set forth thy true and lively word. And to all thy people give thy heavenly grace, and especially to this congregation here present ; that with meek heart and due reverence they may hear and receive thy holy word, truly serving thee in holiness and righteousness all the days of their life. People.—Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness; for they shall be filled.

People.—Blessed are the pure in heart; for they shall see God.

Minister.—Blessed are the peacemakers; for they shall be called the children of God.

People.—Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness' sake; for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

All.—O Lord, may we inherit all these blessings through thy dear Son Jesus Christ. Amen.

Know that the Lord hath set apart him that is godly for himself: the Lord will hear when I call unto him.

Stand in awe, and sin not : communing with your own heart upon your bed, and be still.

Offer the sacrifices of righteousness, and put your trust in the Lord.

I will lay me down in peace, and sleep : for thou, Lord, only makest me dwell in safety.

Thy mercy, O Lord, is in the heavens ; and thy faithfulness reacheth unto the clouds.

Thy righteousness is like the great mountains ; thy judgments are a great deep.

How excellent is thy loving-kindness, O God ! therefore the children of men put their trust under the shadow of thy wings.

They shall be satisfied with the abundance of thy house, and thou shalt make them drink of the river of thy joys.

For with thee is the fountain of life : in thy light shall we see light.

O, continue thy loving-kindness unto them that know thee ; and thy righteousness to the upright in heart.

Now unto the King eternal, immortal, and invisible, the only wise God,

Be honour and glory, through Jesus Christ, for ever and ever. Amen.

To those who sing the following Psalm, all standing : Bilingual Deacon. Psalm Thirty-four.

I WILL bless the Lord at all times : his praise shall continually be in my mouth.

My soul shall make her boast in the Lord : the humble shall hear thereof and be glad.

Come ye to the Lord with me : and let us exalt his name together.

¶ Then shall the Minister and the People say the following Prayer, all kneeling.

¶ THOU to whom belong mercies and forgiveness, receive our humble petitions ; and though we be bound with the chain of our sins, yet in the pitifulness of thy great mercy, O Lord, help us, we beseech thee, that we may be set free, and be admitted to the glorious liberty of the sons of God, through thy dear Son, Jesus Christ.

If thou were strict to mark iniquity, O Lord, who could stand ?

Minister.—May we so remember our sins as to forsake them; and then do thou remember them no more.

People.—Hide not thine ear at our breathing, at our cry.

Minister.—Thou, O God, hast pleaded the cause of our souls; thou hast redeemed our life.

People.—O give thanks unto the Lord, for he is good: his mercy endureth forever.

7 Then the Minister shall say the following Prayer, or such portions of them, or such *admirable* Prayers as he shall deem expedient; all kneeling, and the People responding with AMEN.

HONOUR and praise be unto thee, O Lord, God Almighty, our Father in heaven, for all thy loving-kindness to us; for forming us after thine own image, for creating us anew by thy dear Son, for quickening us by thy Holy Spirit, for helping us in our necessities and dangers, comforting us in our tribulations and sorrows, and sparing us until this hour, the living to praise thee. O merciful Father, as we acknowledge to have received these benefits of thy great goodness, so we beseech thee to grant us always thy Holy Spirit; that we may continually grow in thankfulness to thee, and be led into all truth. O Lord, strengthen our faith; kindle in us a fervent love towards thee and our neighbour. Suffer us not, most gracious Father, to receive in vain the rich and precious treasure of thy word. May it purify us from evil, and increase in us those heavenly virtues which were professed in Jesus Christ. Hold thou us, that we may be delivered from all temptations, and may walk according to thy holy will until our lives' end. Amen.

O THOU who graciously acceptest the intercessions of thy children on earth; inspire the Ministers of thy holy gospel with great zeal for thy glory, for the honour of Christ, our Lord, and for the salvation of thy

people; and grant that all the members of the Church Universal may be joined together in the bond of a living faith. May we know and experience the blessedness of communion with each other in the rites of a holy worship, and in mutual acts of charity and kindness. Give us grace that we may persevere in the ways of godliness, and that at length we may enjoy the full blessedness of communion with thee, and with thy glorified Son, and with each other in thy eternal kingdom. Amen.

WE give thee thanks, O Lord God most holy, and praise thy glorious Majesty for all the graces and virtues thou hast wrought in thy servants who have departed this life in thy faith and fear, and have entered into their rest. God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in

Therefore will not we fear, though the earth be re-

Though the waters thereof roar and be troubled,
though the mountains shake with the swelling thereof.

There is a river, the streams whereof shall make glad
the city of God, the holy dwelling-place of the Most
High.

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to give us a heart to love and fear thee, and diligently to live after thy commandments;

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to give to all thy people increase of grace to hear meekly thy word, and to receive it with pure affection, and to bring forth the fruits of the Spirit;

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to bring into the way of truth all such as have erred and are deceived;

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to strengthen such as do stand, and to comfort and help the weak-hearted, and to raise up them that fall, and finally to give us the victory over temptation;

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to succour, help, and comfort all that are in danger, necessity, and tribulation;

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

SEVENTH SERVICE.

That it may please thee to preserve all that travel by land or by water, all sick persons and young children; and to show thy pity upon all prisoners and captives;

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to defend and provide for the fatherless children and widows, and all that are desolate and oppressed;

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to have mercy upon all men;

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to forgive our enemies, persecutors, and slanderers, and to turn their hearts;

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to give and preserve to our use the kindly fruits of the earth, so as in due time we may enjoy them;

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

That it may please thee to give us true repentance; to forgive us all our sins, negligences, and ignorances; and to endow us with the grace of thy Holy Spirit to amend our lives according to thy holy word;

We beseech thee to hear us, good Lord.

Gracious Lord God, Father of mercies, we beseech thee to hear us.

Lord, have mercy upon us.

Through thy loving-kindness declared to us by Jesus Christ, hear us, O Lord.

Grant us thy peace.

Let us pray.

Incline my heart unto thy testimonies, and not to covetousness.

Turn away mine eyes from beholding vanity; and quicken thou me in thy way.

And take not the word of truth utterly out of my mouth; for I have hoped in thy judgments.

So shall I keep thy law continually for ever and ever.

And I will walk at liberty: for I seek thy precepts.

Let my cry come near before thee, O Lord: give me understanding according to thy word.

Let my supplication come before thee: deliver me according to thy word.

My lips shall utter praise, when thou hast taught me thy statutes.

My tongue shall speak of thy word: all thy commandments are righteousness.

Let thine help me: for I have chosen thy precepts.

I have longed for thy salvation, O Lord; and thy law is my delight.

Let my soul live, and it shall praise thee; and let thy judgments help me.

Now unto the King eternal, immortal and invisible, the only wise God.

Be honour and glory, through Jesus Christ, for ever and ever. Amen.

Then shall be sung the following Canticles.

Enlighten our understandings, that we may know the wonderful things of thy law, the greatness of thy love in Christ, the mysteries of thy kingdom, and the riches of thine eternal glory.

Hear us, we beseech thee, O Lord.

Shed abroad thy love in our hearts, that we may love thee above all things, and our neighbour as ourselves, and by that charity which never faileth, be abundantly refreshed in our toils and sufferings.

Hear us, we beseech thee, O Lord.

Bless the Queen of Great Britain and the Governor-General of this Dominion: endue them with those graces and virtues which will enable them to discharge their several trusts in such a manner as may promote thy glory, and the peace and prosperity of this people.

Hear us, we beseech thee, O Lord.

Bless all those who are called to the ministry of thy gospel: grant them great gifts, and great holiness; and may they be fruitful branches of the true vine, our Saviour Jesus Christ.

Hear us, we beseech thee, O Lord.

Remember, O God, all those who bear good fruits
and do good works in thy holy Church.

Hear us, we beseech thee, O Lord.

Remember our friends and kindred ; and so fill us with
love, gentleness, and forbearance, that we may walk in
our homes with a perfect heart, and have joy in each
other which passeth not away.

O Father in heaven, we beseech thee to hear us.

May those who are parents bring up their children in
the nurture and admonition of the Lord ; and may children
love and reverence their parents.

O Father in heaven, we beseech thee to hear us.

Remember, O Lord, those who are in need, sickness, or
any adversity : even though they be utterly destitute of
man's aid, yet let the comfort of thy Holy Spirit never
depart from them : give them patience and constancy,
and in thine own good time turn their sorrows into
joy.

Hear us, O Lord, and let our sighing come before thee.

We thank thee, O God, for all thy faithful servants who
have departed this life : mercifully grant, we beseech thee,
that we, being compassed about with so great a cloud of
witnesses, may lay aside every weight, and the sin which
doth so easily beset us, and run with patience the race
that is set before us ; looking unto Jesus, the author and
finisher of our faith.

Hear us, we beseech thee, O Lord.

O Lord, bless all thy people ; and may the kingdom
of thy Son increase and shine throughout the world ; and
everywhere may the song of angels be heard, Glory to
God in the highest, on earth peace, good-will among
men.

Hear us, we beseech thee, O Lord.

For the sake of thy great love in Jesus Christ, we beseech thee to have mercy upon us.

O Lord, we are thine; save us, thy children, we beseech thee.

O MOST merciful God, whose mercy is as high as the heavens, and endureth for ever; thou hast opened thy hand to fill us with blessings and the sweet effects of thy loving-kindness. Thou art pitiful as a father, tender as a mother; we pray thee to fill our souls with a deep sense of thy unspeakable goodness, that our thankfulness may be as great as our need of mercy. Whatever we possess, outwardly or inwardly, is thy gift. Let thy fatherly loving-kindness still preserve and bless us: as thou hast holden us up ever since we were born, so let thy mercy go along with us all our days: and grant that after we have, by thy aid, fought the good fight of faith, and finished our earthly course, we may lie down in righteousness, and have a joyful resurrection to the society of saints and angels, and the full fruition of heavenly blessedness in the presence of thy glorified Son, Jesus Christ. Amen.

HOLY Father, grant us, we earnestly beseech thee, time and opportunity to tarry in the most plentiful pastures of the holy Scriptures, where thou leadest us beside the still waters, until the day of eternity dawns, and the shadow of mortality is gone down. Amen.

GOD, our heavenly Father, quicken in us, we beseech thee, every good and pure thought, and strengthen us in our devout resolves this day. Let no unhallowed words pollute the tongues which thou hast made to praise and bless thee; no evil action defile the sanctuaries which thou hast, in thy wondrous mercy, chosen for thyself. Remove whatever in us may be a hindrance to holy living, or a stumbling-block in another's way. May our

trust in thee, and our kindness to one another, never fail. May we bring to thee not only a humble spirit of obedience, but also great love. O Lord God, make us what thou wouldest have us to be, and may we do what thou wouldest have us to do: only be thou ever with us to cleanse and renew, to teach, rule, and sustain us; till at last we come to thee, to dwell for ever with thee and thy saints in light. Amen.

O LORD, may the words of our mouths, and the meditation of our hearts, be acceptable in thy sight. Thou, Lord, art our shepherd; lead us and feed us; and nothing shall be wanting where thou hast folded us, until we be brought to the pasture of eternal life. To thee, O Father, be all glory and praise from the whole Church of Jesus Christ. Amen.

The Lord bless us and keep us; the Lord make his face to shine upon us, and be gracious unto us; the Lord lift up the light of his countenance upon us, and give us peace. Amen. Num. vi. 24, 26.

NINTH SERVICE.

¶ The Minister entering the desk, and the People, standing, shall say :

Minister.—The Lord be with you.

People.—And with thy spirit.

Minister.—Come let us return unto the Lord, and he will raise us up, and we shall live in his sight.

People.—Blessed be the Lord God, who turneth not our prayer away, nor his mercy from us.

Minister.—The most High dwelleth not in temples made with hands.

People.—He is not far from any one of us.

¶ Then shall the Minister say :

DEARLY beloved brethren, the Heavenly Father in whose presence we now stand is always more ready to hear than we to pray ; nor does anything hide him from us but the veil of our impure and earthly mind. And since the preparations of even the willing heart are not without him, let us inwardly pray for the grace of a humble and holy spirit ; that for a little while we may be alone with him ; and as his beloved Son went up into the mountain to pray, so we may rise above the haste and press of life, and commune with him in spirit and in truth.

Such knowledge is too wonderful for me; it is high, I cannot attain unto it.

Whither shall I go from thy Spirit? or whither shall I flee from thy presence?

If I ascend up into heaven, thou art there. If I make my bed in the grave, behold, thou art there.

If I take the wings of the morning, and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea;

Even there shall thy hand lead me, and thy right hand shall hold me.

If I say, Surely the darkness shall cover me, even the night shall be light about me.

Yea, the darkness hideth not from thee; but the night shineth as the day: the darkness and the light are both alike to thee.

I will praise thee; for I am fearfully and wonderfully made: marvellous are thy works; and that my soul knoweth right well.

Thine eyes did see my substance, yet being unformed; and in thy book was everything written; my days were appointed when as yet there was none of them.

How precious also are thy thoughts unto me, O God! how great is the sum of them!

If I should count them, they are more in number than the sand: when I awake, I am still with thee.

Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts:

And see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting.

Now unto the King eternal, immortal, and invisible, the only wise God,

Be honour and glory, through Jesus Christ, forever and ever. Amen.

Vouchsafe, O Lord : to keep us this day without sin.

O Lord, have mercy upon us : have mercy upon us.

O Lord, Let thy mercy lighten upon us : as our trust is in thee.

O Lord, in thee have I trusted : let me never be confounded,

Then the minister shall say the following Prayers, or such portions of them, or such extemporaneous Prayers, as he shall deem expedient ; all kneeling, and the people responding with Amen.

HOLY Lord God, how can we lift up our face, and make mention of thy loving-kindness ? for thy praise is only our abasement, and the greatness of thy mercy is the measure of our guilt. Yet turn us not back from thy presence. Look upon us according to our deep need, not our poor deservings. Lift off the burden of our many sins, and revive the contrite that fly to thee. When thou art nigh, we are weary of our selfish desires, our faithless cares, our unresisted temptations : wasted moments, and bitter words, and vain ambitions, rise up in judgment against us ; we lay at thy feet with shame the vows we have not kept, and the sorrows we have not sanctified. No secret thing is hid from thee. Thou knowest the spirit we are of. Chasten us with thy rebuke, seek us with thy pity, recall us by thy grace, ere we are quite estranged from thee. Let the saving word, once heard on earth, be renewed from heaven, "Your sins are forgiven; go in peace." Amen.

O GOD, our everlasting hope, who holdest us in life, and orderest our lot ; we ask not for a prosperity that would tempt us to forget thee. As disciples of one who had not where to lay his head, may we freely welcome the toils and sufferings of our humanity, and seek only strength to glorify the cross thou layest on us. Every work of our hand may we do as unto thee ; in every trouble, trace some lights of thine ; and let no blessing

fall on dry and thankless hearts. Redeeming the time, may we fill every waking hour with faithful duty and well-ordered affections, as the sacrifice which thou hast provided. Strip us, O Lord, of every proud thought; fill us with patient tenderness for others, seeing that we also are in the same case before thee; and make us ready to help and quick to forgive. And then fix every grace, compose every fear, by a steady trust in thine eternal realities; behind the changes of time and the delusions of men. Thou art our Rock: we rest on thee. Amen.

ALMIGHTY Lord, of whose righteous will all things are, and were created; who lifted the islands out of the deep, and prepared not in vain the habitable world; thou hast gathered our people into a great nation, and sent them to sow beside all waters, and multiply sure dwellings on the earth. Deepen the root of our life in everlasting righteousness; and let not the crown of our pride be as a fading flower. Make us equal to our high trusts; reverent in the use of freedom, just in the exercise of power, generous in the protection of weakness. With all thy blessings bless thy servants the Queen of Great Britain and the Governor-General of this Dominion. Fill their hearts with loyalty to thee. To our Legislators and Counsellors give insight and faithfulness, that our laws may clearly speak the right, and our Judges purely interpret it. Let it be known among us how thou hatest robbery for burnt-offering; that the gains of industry may be all upright, and the use of wealth considerate. May wisdom and knowledge be the stability of our times: and our deepest trust be in thee, the Lord of nations and the King of kings. Amen.

O THOU whose eye is over all the children of men, and who hast called them, by thy Prince of Peace, into a kingdom not of this world; send forth his spirit speedily into the dark places of our guilt and woe, and

arm it with the piercing power of thy grace. May it reach the heart of every oppression, and make arrogancy dumb before thee. Let it still the noise of our strife, and the tumult of the people; put to shame the false idols of every mind; carry faith to the doubting, hope to the fearful, strength to the weak, light to the mourner; and more and more increase the pure in heart who see their God. Commit thy word, O Lord, to the lips of faithful men, or the free winds of thine invisible Providence; that soon the knowledge of thee may cover the earth, as the waters cover the channels of the deep. And so let thy kingdom come, through Jesus Christ thy Son. Amen.

Thoughts of peace, saith the Lord, do I think towards you: ye shall go and pray unto me, and I will hearken unto you: ye shall seek me and find me, when ye shall search for me with your whole heart. *Jer. xxix. 11-13.*

Give glory to the Lord your God, before he cause darkness, and before your feet shall stumble on the dark mountain, and, while ye are looking for light, he turn it into the shadow of death. *Jer. xiii. 16.*

Let us search and try our ways, and turn unto the Lord: let us lift up our heart with our hands unto God in the heavens. *Lam. iii. 40, 41.*

Know ye not that ye are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwelleth in you? *1 Cor. iii. 16.*

The temple of God is holy: which temple ye are. *1 Cor. iii. 17.*

DEARLY beloved brethren, God, in whom we live and move and have our being, never leaveth us day or night. But the very nearness and custom of his presence hide him from our infirm and sinful hearts: and under cover of this darkness, our inner discernment becomes dim, temptations gain a shameful power, and the good that is in us droops and fades. To clear such blindness away, and recover the pure wisdom of a Christian mind,

we are called to this day of remembrance and this house of prayer. Entering here, therefore, we cross the threshold of eternal things, and commune with the Father who sooth in secret. Let us shake off the dust of transitory care, and every disguise that can come between us and God: and, remembering whose disciples we are, come to the simplicity, though it should be also to the sorrows, of Christ.

Here let us rest from the many shows of life, and converse with thee, the Only True. And though thou receivest higher praise than ours, from natures that know thee more and serve thee better, yet tune our spirits and join our voices with theirs; and unite us with the faithful and saintly, there and here, in one light of faith, one beauty of holiness, one repose on thee. Amen.

T Then shall be read by the Minister and People responsively the following selections from the eighth and the one hundred and forty-fifth Psalms.

O LORD our Lord, how excellent is thy name in all the earth! whose glory reaches above the heavens. Out of the mouth of babes and sucklings hast thou ordained strength to silence thine enemies, that thou mightest still the enemy and the avenger.

When I consider thy heavens, the work of thy fingers; the moon and the stars which thou hast ordained;

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What is man, that thou art mindful of him ? and the son of man, that thou visitest him ?

Yet thou hast made him a little lower than the angels, and hast crowned him with glory and honour.

Thou hast given him dominion over the works of thy hands ; thou hast put all things under his feet ;

All sheep and oxen, yea, and the beasts of the field ;

The fowl of the air and the fish of the sea, and whatsoever passeth through the paths of the seas.

O Lord our Lord, how excellent is thy name in all the earth !

I will extol thee, my God, O King ; and I will bless thy name for ever and ever.

Every day will I bless thee ; and I will praise thy name for ever and ever.

Great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised ; and his greatness is unsearchable.

One generation shall praise thy works to another, and shall declare thy mighty acts.

I will speak of the glorious honour of thy majesty, and of thy wondrous works.

And men shall speak of the might of thy terrible acts : and I will declare thy greatness.

They shall abundantly utter the memory of thy great goodness, and shall sing of thy righteousness.

The Lord is gracious, and full of compassion ; slow to anger and of great mercy.

The Lord is good to all, and his tender mercies are over all his works.

All thy works shall praise thee, O Lord ; and thy saints shall bless thee.

They shall speak of the glory of thy kingdom, and talk of thy power ;

To make known to the sons of men thy mighty acts, and the glorious majesty of thy kingdom.

Thy kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and thy dominion endureth throughout all generations.

The Lord upholdeth all that fall, and raiseth up all them that be bowed down.

The eyes of all wait upon thee; and thou givest them their meat in due season.

Thou openest thine hand, and satisfiest the desire of every living thing.

The Lord is righteous in all his ways, and holy in all his works.

The Lord is nigh unto all them that call upon him; to all that call upon him in truth.

He will fulfil the desire of them that fear him: he also will hear their cry, and will save them.

My mouth shall speak the praise of the Lord: and let all flesh bless his holy name forever.

Now unto the King eternal, immortal, and invisible, the only wise God,

Be honour and glory, through Jesus Christ, for ever and ever. Amen.

¶ Then shall be sung the following Canticle: all standing.

I WAS glad when my companions said unto me: Come, it is our holy day:

Let us go into the house of the Lord: let us take sweet counsel together;

Let our feet stand within his gates: and heart and voice give thanks unto him.

Blessed be the temple hallowed by his name: pray for peace within its walls.

Peace to young and old that enter there: peace to every soul abiding therein.

For friends' and brethren's sake I will never cease to say: Peace be within thee!

What though for Him who filleth heaven and earth: there can be no dwelling made with hands;

What though his way is in the deep, and his knowledge too wonderful for us: and before him we are as children that cannot speak;

Yet, touched by the altar's living glow : we learn, as an infant, to lisp his name :

And try the wings that beat for his refuge : and flee as a bird to the mountain.

O Lord, when we cry unto thee from the deep ; and wait for thee as they that wait for the morning ;

Thou wilt have regard to our entreaty : the sigh of the lowly thou wilt not despise.

Not long, O Lord, shall we feel after thee in these courts below : not long wilt thou hearken to these faltering lips.

Our fathers thou hast called to thy higher praise : and gathered to their fathers must all the children be.

Let the dead and living praise thee, O God, above, below : let all the generations praise thee.

Let the glorified company of the first-born : whose names are in the book of life ;

Let angels in the highest : praise thee, who dwellest in the heavens ;

Let thy Church on earth praise thee : the delight of whose wisdom is the children of men.

O House of the Lord's praise ! Peace be to them that love thee :

If I forget : may my right hand forget its cunning :

To the Only Holy, the First and the Last : be thanksgiving and praise ;

From all kindreds and tongues on earth : and the voices of saints in heaven. Amen.

Then the Minister shall say the following Prayers, or such portions of them, or such extemporal Prayers as he shall deem expedient; all kneeling, and the People responding with AMEN.

O GOD, ever blessed and holy : none but the Angels and thy Redeemed can know thee with a perfect joy. On us, as we look up to the light of thy countenance, the shadows of shameful remembrance fall : and to all thy mercies we must still answer with a cry for more.

Called in our measure to be perfect as thou art perfect, we have been most unlike to thee, and are not worthy to be deemed thy children. Thirsting with momentary desires, we have forsaken the living springs of heavenly wisdom, of which he that drinketh shall never thirst again. We have been slow to the calls of affection, heedless of the duties, hard under the sorrows, which are thy gracious discipline: yet are oppressed with cares thou layest not on us, with ease thou doest not permit, and wants thou wilt never bless. O Lord, regard our complaint: it is only against our faithless hearts. We have nothing to boast, and renounce our pride before thee. Only leave us not to ourselves. Visit us with the wrestlings of thy Spirit: and lay on us the cross, if we may but grow into the holiness, of Christ. Amen.

ETERNAL God, who committest to us the swift and solemn trust of life; since we know not what a day may bring forth, but only that the hour for serving thee is always present, may we wake to the instant claims of thy holy will; not waiting for to-morrow, but yielding to-day. Lay to rest, by the persuasion of thy Spirit, the resistance of our passion, indolence, or fear. Consecrate with thy presence the way our feet may go; and the humblest work will shine, and the roughest places be made plain. Lift us above unrighteous anger and mistrust into faith and hope and charity, by a simple and steadfast reliance on thy own will: and so may we be modest in our time of wealth, patient under disappointment, ready for danger, serene in death. In all things, draw us to the mind of Christ, that thy image in us may be clearly traced, and thou mayest own us at one with him and thee. Amen.

LORD of all, whose balance trieth the nations, to lift up or to cast down; thou hast planted us, as a people, in quiet resting-places, and stretched out our branches over the sea, and laid upon us a mighty trust.

Never through vain conceit may we be blind to the unchanging conditions of thy blessing. The world and its fulness are thine; our portion thereof may we hold, not in wanton self-will, but reverently, as of thee; making it the strong-hold of right, the refuge of the oppressed, and the moderator of lawless ambition. Bless all our Magistrates and Rulers. Make all who speak or act for this nation true organs of thine equity, that through their wisdom and faithfulness thou mayest be our Lawgiver and Judge. And let it be that, as with the people so with the chiefs, as with the servant so with the master; as with the buyer so with the seller, all may know thee as weighing the path of the just; that righteousness may be the girdle of our power. Amen.

O GOD, who didst send thy word to speak in the Prophets and live in thy Son, and appoint thy Church to be witnesses of divine things in all the world; revive the purity and deepen the power of its testimony; and through the din of earthly interest and the storm of human passions, let it make the still small voice of thy Spirit inly felt. Nearer and nearer may thy kingdom come from age to age; meeting the face of the young as a rising dawn, and brightening the song of the old, "Lord, now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace." Already let its light abash our guilty negligence, and touch with hope each secret sorrow of the earth. By the cleansing spirit of thy Son, make this world a fitting fore-court to that sanctuary not made with hands, where our life is hid with Christ in God. Amen.

THE Lord bless us and keep us: may he be gracious unto us; and give us peace now and for evermore. Amen. Num. vi. 24, 26.

Or,

AND now may the peace of God rule in your hearts: and the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom. Amen. Col. iii. 15, 16.

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T Then shall be read the Scripture Lesson.

T After that shall be sung a Hymn.

T Then shall follow the Sermon; at the conclusion of which shall be said, all joining,

The Lord's Prayer.

OUR Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive them that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil: For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

T Then may follow an Anthem by the Choir.

T After which the Choir and the Congregation will join in singing a short Hymn.

MARRIAGE SERVICE.

ADDRESS.

FRIENTS, we have assembled here to solemnize the nuptials of this man and this woman, who design to become one in holy wedlock, pledging their mutual faith, in a solemn covenant before God, that they will henceforth live together, after God's ordinance, as husband and wife.

For wedlock is the ordinance of God, who saw that it was not good for man to be alone, and therefore created him male and female, and instituted marriage as the ground of human fellowship, the beginning of society, and the mother of mankind. For this cause, it is written, shall a man leave father and mother, and shall cleave unto his wife, and they two shall be one flesh.

And this estate our holy religion has made the symbol of a higher than earthly alliance, typifying by it the soul's espousal with the Heavenly Bridegroom.

Seeing, therefore, that marriage is of God, let us hallow it in our thoughts, and attend these rites, as a sacrament of religion, with seriously disposed and reverent minds.

Then, addressing the parties to be united in marriage, the Minister shall say:—

M. and N.—Ye stand here mutually betrothed, and ye purpose to enter the holy estate of matrimony. Know that the covenant which ye now make with each other and with God, and to which ye pledge your mutual faith, engages you, as far as in you lies, to be helpers of each other's joy and comforters of each other's sorrow, to cleave



one to another with holy affection and unwavering constancy so long as you both shall live. See to it, therefore, that ye are fully persuaded in your own minds, and that ye know of no impediment by reason of which ye may not be lawfully married.

T Then shall the Minister say to the man :

M., wilt thou have this woman to thy wedded wife, to live together, after God's ordinance, in the estate of matrimony? Wilt thou love her, comfort her, honour and keep her, in sickness and in health, in good days and in evil days, and, knowing no other as wife, cleave only unto her so long as ye both shall live?

T Then the Minister shall say to the woman :

N., wilt thou have this man to thy wedded husband, to live together, after God's ordinance, in the estate of matrimony? Wilt thou love him, comfort him, honour and keep him, in sickness and in health, in good days and in evil days, and knowing no other as husband, cleave only unto him so long as ye both shall live?

T Here the man will hand to the Minister the ring, who, after receiving it, will hand it back to the man, who will place it upon the third finger of the woman's left hand; while he is doing so the Minister will say :

Let this emblem of eternity, presented and received as a token of mutual love, be a cherished memorial of the vows this day made. And now, in further indication of the purpose of your hearts, join your right hands.

T Then shall be said the following prayer, or such other as the Minister shall be moved to utter :

O ETERNAL God; Creator, and Preserver of all mankind, command thy blessing, we beseech thee, on these thy servants, whom we bless in thy name. Enable them to fulfil and obey the covenant which they have now made

in thy presence. May their hearts be united in the closest bonds of love, may they be counsel and strength, and light and comfort one to another, sharers of each other's joys, consolers of each other's sorrows, and helpers to each other in all the changes and chances of the world. May they so discharge the duties which belong to this relation into which they have entered, that it may not be to them a state of temptation and sorrow, but of holiness and comfort. Give them grace, whereby they may serve thee acceptably so long as they live. Hand in hand, and heart with heart, trusting in each other and in thee, may they tread together the path of life. Be thou, dear God, their guard and guide; give them grace to know and to serve thee aright, and lead them through this transitory life unto life eternal, according to thy rich mercy, in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

T Then shall the Minister say :

Forasmuch as M. and N. have consented together in wedlock, and have witnessed the same before God and this company, and thereto have engaged and pledged themselves with the gift and acceptance of the ring, and the joining of hands, I pronounce them to be husband and wife. And what God has joined together, let not man put asunder.

T Then shall he add this blessing :

The Lord God Almighty bless and preserve and keep you, the Lord look mercifully upon you with his favour, and fill you with his grace, that ye may so live together in this life, that in the world to come ye may have life everlasting. Amen.

For a thousand years in thy sight are but as yesterday when it is past, and as a watch in the night.

Thou carriest them away as with a flood ; they are as a sleep : in the morning they are like grass which groweth up.

In the morning it flourisheth, and groweth up ; in the evening it is cut down, and withereth.

We spend our years as a tale that is told.

The days of our years are threescore years and ten ; and if by reason of strength they be fourscore years, yet is their strength labour and sorrow ; for it is soon cut off, and we fly away.

So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom.

Make us glad, O Lord, according to the days wherein thou hast afflicted us, and the years wherein we have seen evil.

Let thy work appear unto thy servants, and thy glory unto their children.

And let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us :

and establish thou the work of our hands upon us ; yea,
the work of our hands, establish thou it.

¶ Then shall follow this Lesson :

1 Cor. xv. 20.

NOW is Christ risen from the dead, and become the first-fruits of them that slept.

For since by man came death, by man came also the resurrection of the dead.

For as in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive.

But every man in his own order : Christ the first-fruits ; afterward they that are Christ's at his coming.

Then cometh the end, when he shall have delivered up the kingdom to God, even the Father ; when he shall have put down all rule, and all authority and power.

For he must reign till he hath put all enemies under his feet.

The last enemy that shall be destroyed is death.

For he hath put all things under his feet. But when he saith, all things are put under him, it is manifest that he is excepted who did put all things under him.

And when all things shall be subdued unto him, then shall the Son also himself be subject unto him that put all things under him, that God may be all in all.

But some man will say, How are the dead raised up ? and with what body do they come ?

Thou fool, that which thou sowest is not quickened except it die :

And that which thou sowest, thou sowest not that body that shall be, but bare grain, it may chance of wheat, or of some other grain :

But God giveth it a body as it hath pleased him, and to every seed its own body.

All flesh is not the same flesh : but there is one kind of flesh of men, another flesh of beasts, another of fishes, another of birds.

There are also celestial bodies, and bodies terrestrial : but the glory of the celestial is one, and the glory of the terrestrial is another.

There is one glory of the sun, and another glory of the moon, and another glory of the stars : for one star differeth from another star in glory.

So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown in corruption : it is raised in incorruption :

It is sown in dishonour ; it is raised in glory : it is sown in weakness ; it is raised in power :

It is sown a natural body ; it is raised a spiritual body. There is a natural body and there is a spiritual body.

And so it is written, The first man Adam was made a living soul ; the last Adam was made a quickening spirit.

Howbeit that was not first which is spiritual, but that which is natural ; and afterward that which is spiritual.

The first man is of the earth, earthly : the second man is the Lord from heaven.

As is the earthly, such are they also that are earthly : and as is the heavenly, such are they also that are heavenly.

And as we have borne the image of the earthly, so shall we also bear the image of the heavenly.

Now this I say, brethren, that flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God ; neither doth corruption inherit incorruption.

Behold, I show you a mystery : we shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed.

In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump : for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed.

For this corruptible must put on incorruption, and this mortal must put on immortality.

So when this corruptible shall have put on incorruption, and this mortal shall have put on immortality, then shall be brought to pass the saying that is written, Death is swallowed up in victory.

O death, where is thy sting ? O grave, where is thy victory ?

The sting of death is sin ; and the strength of sin is the law.

But thanks be to God, who giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Therefore my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord.

T Or, instead of the above, the Minister may read such other Lesson as he shall deem expedient. After the Lesson, if convenient, a Hymn or Anthem may be sung. If there be any Address, it may be introduced here. Then the Minister shall say either one of the following Prayers, or such extemporeaneous Prayer as he shall be moved to offer.

ALMIGHTY GOD, with whom do live the spirits of them that depart hence in the Lord, and with whom the souls of the faithful, after they are delivered from the burthen of the flesh, are in joy and felicity, we thank thee for having given to us our dear brother whom thou hast now taken away ; and for the blessed assurance that, though he will not return to us, we shall go to him. O grant, we beseech thee, that we, with all those who are departed in the true faith of thy holy name, may have our perfect consummation and bliss in thine eternal glory. Amen.

Or,

LORD GOD, Holy Father, be thou blessed both now and evermore : for all that thou doest is good. Thou hast seen fit to take away one who is dear to us : give us, we beseech thee, the spirit of filial submission. Enable us to say, It is well, for thou didst it. May we feel that thy will is better than anything we can desire for ourselves, and find comfort in holy and happy thoughts of the unseen world. Bring home to our hearts thy Son's promises to those who fall asleep in him.

O Lord, teach us how to live so as to please thee. May nothing cause us to forget that we are pilgrims and sojourners here, as our fathers were; and may we set our chief affections on those things which are above. Merciful Father, forgive us our sins, and raise us from the death of sin to a life of righteousness.

O Lord God, fill our hearts with gratitude for thy great loving-kindness to us. When thou takest away, we see how much thou hast given. We thank thee for the sweet memory of blessings which are for a season withdrawn from us, and for the many blessings which yet remain, and for hopes which no earthly troubles can overshadow. Hear, accept, and answer these our prayers, which we would offer to thee in the faith and spirit of Jesus Christ. Amen.

To Then the Lord's Prayer, to be said after the Minister.

O UR Father which art in Heaven, Hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses; as we forgive them that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil: For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

To When they come to the grave, and the body has been lowered into the earth, the Minister shall say:

MAN that is born of a woman hath but a short time to live, and is full of trouble. He cometh up, and is cut down like a flower; he fleeth as it were a shadow, and never continueth in one stay.

Forasmuch as it hath pleased God of his great mercy to take unto himself the life of our dear brother here departed, we therefore commit his body to the ground; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust; in sure and certain hope of a resurrection to eternal life, through our Lord Jesus Christ; who will change this corruptible body,

that it may be like unto his glorious body ; according to the mighty working, whereby he is able to subdue all things to himself.

Or,

THE dust returns to dust, and the spirit unto God who gave it ; therefore do we now commit the body of our dear departed brother to the grave ; in the blessed hope that as he has borne the image of the earthly, so also he shall bear the image of the heavenly, through our Lord Jesus Christ.

¶ Then shall be said :

I HEARD a voice from heaven, saying unto me, Write, From henceforth blessed are the dead who die in the Lord : Even so, saith the Spirit ; for they rest from their labours, and their works do follow them.

¶ Then shall the Minister say the following Collect :

O GOD, our heavenly Father, grant that we sorrow not as those who know not the promises of thy holy gospel ; but may we look forward to the great gathering of thy faithful servants and children into their everlasting home. O thou in whom we trust, help us by thy grace, that we may live as the heirs of this blessed and glorious hope, which thou hast set before us in thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

THE grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, be with us all, evermore. Amen.

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
