

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

FIRST SESSION, OF THE 10th PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT, 9th GEORGE IV.

Prayers were read.

The House formed,—and the Honorable Mr. Baby sat Speaker.

At two o'clock His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor being seated on the Throne, the Honorable the Speaker of the Legislative Council commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod to inform the Members of Assembly that, it was His Excellency's pleasure that they do forthwith attend at the Bar of this House—who being come up thereto—the Speaker of this House said—

A Speaker of the

I am commanded by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to inform you that, His Excellency does not think fit to declare the causes for which he has summoned this Provincial Parliament until there be a Speaker of the House of Assembly.—It is, therefore, His Excellency's pleasure that you, Gentlemen of the House of Assembly, do forthwith repair to your Chamber and there chose a fit person to be your Speaker, and that you present the person that shall be so chosen to His Excellency in this House, to-morrow at two of the clock in the afternoon, for His approbation.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor having come to the House, and being seated in the Chair on the Throne, the Speaker commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod to let the Assembly know, it is His Excellency's pleasure they attend Him immediately in this House—who being come—

Mr. Bidwell said:—

May it please Your Excellency.—In obedience to Your Excellency's commands, the House of Assembly have proceeded to the Election of a Speaker, and I am the person upon whom their choice has fallen, I respectfully pray that it may please Your Excellency to give your approbation to their choice.

Then the Speaker of this House said:—

Mr. Bidwell,—I am commanded by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to acquaint you, that relying upon your sufficiency for the office to which you have been elected, and upon your diligence and discretion in the exercise of its duties, He approves the choice which the Assembly has made, and doth allow and confirm you to be their Speaker.

Then the Speaker of the Assembly said:—

Sir,

The manner in which your Excellency has been pleased to signify your assent to the choice of the Assembly, of which I have the honor to be the object, demands from me the deepest and sincerest gratitude. them, whose servant I have the honor to be, and that they, Sir, may be the better enabled to do their duty to His Majesty and their Country, I do, in their name, and on their behalf, by humble petition, lay claim to all their rights and privileges, particularly that they may have liberty of Speech for the better management of their debates, access to your Excellency's person on all seasonable occasions, and that their proceedings may receive from your Excellency the most favorable interpretation.

Then the Speaker of this House said :—

Mr. Speaker,

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has commanded me to say that, He reposes implicit confidence in the Loyalty of the Assembly, and their duty and affection to His Majesty and His Government, and trusting that their proceedings will be equally distinguished by wisdom, temper and prudence, He grants, and upon all occasions will recognize and allow their constitutional privileges ; His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has commanded me also to assure you that the Assembly will find a ready access on all seasonable occasions, and their proceedings, as well as your words and actions, will always receive from Him the most favorable construction.

Then His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor was pleased to open the Session by a gracious Speech to both Houses.

The House of Assembly having withdrawn, His Excellency was pleased to retire.

The Honorable the Speaker informed the House that he was in possession of a copy of His Excellency's Speech, which he read, and it was again read (*pro forma*) by the Clerk, and is as follows :—

*Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and
Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.*

At the time of my assuming the Government which His Majesty has been pleased to commit to my charge, I was desirous of meeting you in Provincial Parliament at an earlier period than the present; but the interests of the Country have been best consulted by convening you at a season when little embarrassment or inconvenience can be experienced in any District, from your being called to your Legislative duties.

In recommending your immediate and earnest attention to be directed to affairs that are closely connected with the welfare of the Colony, I must remark, that no surer proofs of your vigilance and judgment can ever be adduced, than the prosperity, happiness and contentment of His Majesty's faithful Canadian Subjects; and I trust, if the public good be exclusively and diligently considered, in the exercise of your important functions, that those ends will be assured, and that the beneficial effects of your proceedings will soon be apparent in every part of the Province.

Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

I have ordered the Estimates of the present year and the Public Accounts to be laid before you.

The commands of His Majesty that have relation to the several Addresses of the House of Assembly of the last Parliament, shall be communicated to you.

Honorable Gentlemen, and Gentlemen.

The Laws that are about to expire will require your consideration. The repeal of the Act, entitled, "an Act for better securing this Province, &c." passed in the 44th year of the late King, is I think advisable, as it seldom can be applied to cases which it was intended to meet.

The report of the Arbitrators on the part of Upper and Lower Canada, for ascertaining the proportion of Duties to be paid to this Province, has been transmitted to me; and it must be satisfactory to you to be informed that on that question, an equitable arrangement has taken place.

The Public Schools are generally increasing, but their present organization appears susceptible of improvement.

FIRST SESSION, OF THE 10th PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT, 9th GEORGE IV.

Measures will be adopted, I hope, to reform the Royal Grammar School, and to incorporate it with the University recently endowed by His Majesty, and to introduce a system in that Seminary that will open to the youth of the Province the means of receiving a liberal and extensive course of instruction. Unceasing exertion should be made to attract able Masters to the Country, where the population bears no proportion to the number of Offices and Employments, that must necessarily be held by men of education and acquirements, for the support of the Laws, and of your free Institutions.

The expense already incurred in carrying on the Works in the Gore and Niagara Districts has been considerable, but few will regret that they have been undertaken. Such enterprises can, at first, be seldom duly appreciated. It is obvious, however, that the value of the productions of your soil can never be known, unless you have Canals, and good Internal Communications to facilitate your Commercial intercourse with the vast Empire of which you form a part.

From the observations of the Deputy Post Master General, at Quebec, to which I shall draw your attention, respecting the impossibility of forwarding the Mails with either expedition or safety, I am persuaded that some better expedient than Statute Labor must be resorted to for maintaining the Roads in a proper state.

The sums expended on the useful works now in progress, circulate in their natural channels, remain in the Province, enrich it, and promote industry. On the extent of protection and encouragement afforded to projects of this kind;—and on your being prepared, by means of the essential aid of well organized Institutions, for the reception and location of every description of settlers, the Agricultural Interests of the Colony, and the advance of its Commerce, will be found chiefly to depend.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCE.

We, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Legislative Council of Upper Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, return our most respectful thanks for Your Excellency's Speech from the Throne.

We beg to express our acknowledgement for the kind consideration of Your Excellency, in forbearing to Summon the Provincial Parliament at an earlier period than the present, in order to consult the interests of the Country, by convening us at a season when little embarrassment or inconvenience can be experienced in any District from our being called to our Legislative duties.

We fully concur with Your Excellency, while recommending our immediate and earnest attention to affairs which are closely connected with the welfare of the Colony, that no surer proof of our vigilance can be adduced than the prosperity, happiness, and contentment of His Majesty's Canadian Subjects, and we trust that while diligently and exclusively considering the Public good in the exercise of our important functions, those ends will be assured, and the beneficial effects of our proceedings will soon be apparent in every part of the Province.

We shall not fail to give our early consideration to the Laws which are about to expire, and also to the suggestion of Your Excellency, relative to the "Act for the better securing the Province," passed in the 44th year of His late Majesty's reign.

It is satisfactory to us to be informed by Your Excellency that, an equitable arrangement has taken place with respect to the proportion of Duties to be paid to this Province by Lower Canada.

Notwithstanding that Your Excellency considers the organization of the Public Schools susceptible of improvement, and hopes that measures will be adopted to reform the Royal Grammar School, and to incorporate it with the University recently endowed by His Majesty, and to introduce a system in that Seminary that will open to the youth of the Province the means of receiving a liberal and extensive course of instruction, it is still highly gratifying to learn that the advantages of education are generally increasing.

We sincerely unite with Your Excellency in the opinion that unceasing exertion should be made to attract able Masters to this Country, where there are necessarily many offices and employments to be held by men of education and acquirements, for the support of the Laws and our free Institutions.

Although the expense already incurred in carrying on the Works in the Districts of Gore and Niagara has been considerable, we trust that few will regret that they have been undertaken, as such enterprises can at first be seldom duly appreciated, and as it is obvious that Canals and good Internal Communications must render the productions of our soil more valuable, and facilitate a commercial intercourse with the vast Empire of which we form a part.

We cordially unite with Your Excellency in the opinion that some better expedient than Statute Labor must be resorted to for maintaining the Roads in a proper state, and we have always been prepared and anxious to concur in any equitable measure adapted to the attainment of so valuable an object.

We agree with your Excellency that besides the advantages derived from the completion of useful works, a large part of the sums expended during their progress, circulates among the inhabitants, promotes industry, and enriches the Province, and that from the extent of protection and encouragement afforded to projects of this kind, together with the aid of well organized institutions for the reception and location of settlers, the Agricultural interests of the Colony and the advance of its Commerce will be found greatly to depend.

The Archdeacon of York being constituted President of the College by virtue of office, (although the present incumbent is eminently qualified for that important appointment,) appears to the Lieutenant Governor an exceptionable part of the Charter, and He thinks that the Province would derive benefit from the Professors being declared eligible to the Council without the religious test specified; and He is of opinion also, that the details to the qualifications required for taking degrees should not be inserted in the Charter, but that it should be declared only that, the Students shall have the liberty of taking the Degrees of Bachelor, Master, and Doctor, in the several arts and faculties in the manner that may hereafter be directed by the Statutes and Ordinances framed by His Majesty's Government. The Lieute-

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nant Governor imagines that it is needless to expatiate on the absolute necessity of establishing in the Province, as soon as possible, a Seminary at which the Sons of its inhabitants may receive an education, under the tuition of able Masters, that will render them fit for the University, or for any Profession.

The want of such a School is felt and acknowledged every where, and He is fully persuaded that a College of this kind, co-operating with the Senior King's College, would produce that which is most required in the Province, Religion, Knowledge and good taste.

Most RESPECTFULLY REPORT.

That Your Committee find that provision is made by the Laws of the Province, for the Salaries of the respective Officers of each House of the Legislature.

That other expenditures are made during the Session, which come under the description of contingent expenses; and that most of these are necessarily and unavoidably incurred before the Session, as also before the prorogation, and are contracted for on the presumed good faith and responsibility of the Legislative Council, at the close of each Session.

That a courteous understanding has hitherto prevailed in each branch of the Legislature, in allowing the respective contingencies of each to be audited and passed without comment or remark on the disbursements of either.

That a Bill has uniformly passed, covering such expenditures.

The House of Assembly anticipating the passing of such a Bill, have found it necessary to address the Lieutenant Governor for a previous advance by Warrant, on the Receiver General, and in the usual language, a promise to make good the same, although such a Bill must of necessity be concurred in and passed by and with the assent of the Legislative Council before this pledge can lawfully be redeemed.

Avoiding precipitation at the close of a Session would afford a more digested consideration of the several items of expenditure, and continue that courteous and joint co-operation for the public service which has uniformly prevailed.

If this view of the subject should correspond with that of Your Honorable House, Your Committee would then suggest the expediency of addressing His Excellency on the subject, praying him from time to time to advance such sums as may be necessary, under a well regulated economy, to discharge such contingent expenses as may arise during the Session.

Your Committee are further urged to notice, that this course now recommended has been invariably pursued by the Sister Province.

Your Committee do also most respectfully suggest, for the consideration of this Honorable House, whether it would not better comport with the true interest of the Legislature, that the Salaries of the Officers of both Houses should be augmented after a lapse of——years, since which, the value of money has diminished, the resources of the Province enlarged, their labour and duties increased, and the period of the Sessions protracted.

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of the Province by the adoption of energetic measures to be rendered effective by a vigilance commensurate with the threatened danger.

At this juncture the Provincial Legislature deemed it wise and expedient to pass the Law now under consideration;—a Law, in the opinion of Your Committee, which has not failed in some instances to produce the most salutary effects.

On examination, Your Committee find that this Law, so far as regards the inhabitants of this Province who have resided in it for six months or have taken the Oath of Allegiance, is absolutely inoperative.

Your Committee have therefore come to the obvious conclusion, that any apprehensions of evil to arise, as regards them, by a continuance of it, must be idle and imaginary.

The penalties or liabilities provided by this Act are applicable only to strangers of a suspicious character, who come to this Province, an event in the opinion of your Committee, taking into consideration the disturbed state of a part of the British Empire, by no means unlikely to occur.

Although from this view of the subject it appears quite possible that a state of things may again present itself when this or some other efficient Law, adapted to times and circumstances, may be indispensably necessary for the safety of the Government and the well being of the people,—yet Your Committee after due consideration incline to the conclusion that it is expedient under existing circumstances, to repeal the said Law, trusting to the Loyalty and good sense of the Legislature, to make such provisions in future as the exigencies of the State may require.

In arriving at this conclusion, your Committee are desirous that this Honorable House should clearly understand that they have not been so much influenced by the consideration that the Law in question is unnecessary, of which they entertain strong doubts, as by a conviction that it will be impolitic any longer to continue it in the Statute Book, upon the ground that the unfounded clamour raised against it has originated in ill-disposed and designing men, seeking their own elevation in the scale of Society, by making the existence of this Statute, and the promised repeal thereof, a passport to political ascendancy.

In reference to the independence of this House and the constitutional influence which they possess, Your Committee beg leave to state, that by the constitution of this Province, either branch of the Legislature is independent of each other.—Moreover, the Members of this House are appointed by the Crown for life, and are not liable to removal; and not being subject to the exercise of the Elective Franchise for a renovation of their right to their seats after the expiration of certain terms, they are therefore alike independent of the Crown, the House of Assembly and the people.

Thus constituted, they cannot but feel it to be their first duty, to preserve unimpaired, all the rights and privileges which appertain to their Body: and in no instance to yield to any influence incompatible with their independence, and the constitutional influence which they ought at all times to enjoy.

Your Committee feel satisfied that Your Honorable House, although they are determined, by a conscientious and correct discharge of their Legislative duties, to maintain their independence, and merit and acquire that influence in the Country to which they are entitled, as a co-ordinate and independent Branch of the Legislature, will nevertheless at all times be most ready to shew, that a deference and attention to the opinions and recommendations of the Representative of the King, as well as that due regard to the Acts of the Assembly to which they are constitutionally and respectively entitled.

In respect to the recommendation of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in his Speech from the Throne at the opening of the Session, to repeal the 44th of the late King, Your Committee beg leave to observe that they cannot but deem it a source of great gratification to this House, to have it in their power, upon the present occasion, to concur with His Excellency and the other Branch of the Legislature in the repeal of that Law.

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN.

We, Your Majesty's Most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Commons of Upper Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, feeling it to be a duty incumbent upon us to make every practicable exertion to procure relief for those Inhabitants of this Province who sustained losses during the late War with the United States of America, humbly beg leave again to address ourselves to your Majesty in behalf of those sufferers.

We repeat our most grateful acknowledgements to Your Majesty for that benevolence which has afforded to our unfortunate fellow Subjects some measure of relief, and we will not weary Your Majesty on this occasion by any re-statement of those grounds on which we have formerly ventured to rest the expectations of the claimants, to an adequate indemnity against the injuries sustained by them in a National War,—a War in which their fidelity and gallantry were as conspicuous as their sufferings were severe.

In our last appeal to Your Majesty in behalf of these expectants on the sympathy and generosity of the British Nation, we humbly entreated your Majesty to submit their application to the Imperial Parliament, and we pray Your Majesty to forgive our importunity in again representing to Your Majesty, that it would be most satisfactory to the sufferers and to their fellow-subjects in this Province, if their case could undergo the deliberate consideration of Parliament, and more especially at this time, since Your Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies has it in his power, from his personal knowledge of the disastrous consequences of the War, and of the character and circumstances of the Inhabitants of this Province, to afford the most satisfactory explanations.

We are encouraged in our hope of a favorable issue when we reflect that we can lay before Your Majesty, and the Imperial Parliament, the most convincing proofs that the Legislature of this Province has not hesitated to make extraordinary efforts to meet the exigencies and to relieve the distresses of War.

We acknowledge the claims of the Sufferers to be such that the indemnity they have so anxiously expected cannot be much longer deferred.

The resources of this Colony are ill able to bear the additional burthen which would be imposed upon them by an attempt to afford that indemnity, and we therefore earnestly and anxiously urge this last appeal to Your Majesty, praying that the case of our fellow Subjects may be graciously recommended by Your Majesty to Parliament.

We beg to renew, on this occasion, our earnest assurances of faithful devotion to Your Majesty's Person and Government.

Welland Canal Secu-
rity Bill recommitted.

After some time the House resumed.

The Chairman reported that the Committee had taken the Resolutions and Address into consideration, and recommended them to the adoption of the House.

Ordered, that the Master in Chancery do go down to the Assembly and acquaint that House, that the Legislative Council have adopted the Resolutions and Address to His Majesty on the subject of Losses, received by Message from the Assembly this day, and have appointed a Committee of two Members who will be ready to meet a Committee of the Commons House of Assembly this day for the purpose of presenting the same to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

Ordered, that Messrs. Dunn and Markland be appointed a Committee for that purpose.

Mr. Dunn from the Select Committee to whom was referred the Contingent expenses of this House for the present Session, presented their Report.

The Committee to whom was referred the Contingencies of this House, beg leave most respectfully to Report:—

They therefore recommend the payment of the several above named sums, together with the sum of Twenty Pounds to the Door-keeper, in order to render his salary equal to that of the Door-keeper of the House of Assembly.

IX.—"An Act to provide for the Survey of a part of the Township of Oxford, in the Johnstown District."

XXII.—“An Act to provide for the completing the Light-House on the False Ducks Island and for keeping and maintaining the same during the present year.”

And His Excellency was pleased to Reservc the following Bills for the signification of His Majesty’s pleasure:—

I.—“An Act to make valid certain Marriages heretofore contracted, and to provide for the future solemnization of Matrimony in this Province.”

II.—“An Act to encourage Emigration from Foreign Parts into this Province.”

III.—“An Act for the Relief of Mary Lawrence.”

After which His Excellency was pleased to address the two Houses of the Legislature in the following words:—

*Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,
Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.*

I cannot close this Session without expressing my regret that the People will derive no immediate advantage from your deliberations on two subjects of primary importance, Improvement of Public Schools and the measures that should be adopted to ensure Good Roads and Safe Bridges throughout the Province.

In allowing your Roads to remain in their present state the great stimulus to Agricultural industry is lost.

Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

I thank you for your offer for making a provision for the Support of the Civil Government, which I should have gladly accepted in His Majesty’s name, had not the Revenue arising from the Statute of the 14th of George 3rd, Chapter 88, (the appropriation of which for the public service is under the controul of the Crown) appeared quite sufficient to defray the

expences of the current year.—An intimation to this effect was conveyed to you in my reply to one of your Addresses early in the present month.

Honorable Gentlemen, and Gentlemen.

In Legislating for the general and local interests of the Province, due time should be afforded to each Branch of the Legislature, for the consideration of Bills that may be forwarded for assent.

In consequence of the number of Bills, Addresses and Resolutions that have been transmitted to me a few hours since, it becomes necessary to remind you that serious embarrassment may be experienced from the business of the Province being thus suffered to accumulate towards the conclusion of the Session; and I am persuaded that you will coincide with me in thinking that this inconvenience should in future be remedied.

His Honor the Speaker of the Legislative Council then said:—It is His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's will and pleasure that this Provincial Parliament be prorogued to Wednesday, the twenty-ninth day of April next, to be then here holden, and this Provincial Parliament is prorogued accordingly.
