CAP. I.

An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain Duties on Goods, Wares and Merchandize, imported into this Colony and its Dependencies.

[Passed 23rd March, 1866.]

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY :---

WE, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects ^P the Commons of Newfoundland, in General Assembly convened, towards raising the necessary Revenue to defray Your Majesty's Public Expenses in this Colony, have freely and voluntarily resolved to give and grant unto Your Majesty the Duties hereinafter mentioned; and do therefore beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted :

Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows :

Preamble.

Duties imposed.

I.—From and after the passing of this Act, and during the continuance thereof, there shall be raised, levied, collected, and paid, unto Your Majesty, Your Heirs and Successors, upon all Goods, Wares and Merchandize, imported, brought, or in any way coming into this Island, or any of its Dependencies, the several and respective Duties inserted, described and set forth in Figures in the Table of Duties hereinafter contained, denominated "Table of Duties," opposite to and against the respective Articles in the said Table mentioned, described and enumerated, and according to the value, number or quantity of such articles therein specified, as follows :

when imported in the Vessel on which they are intended to be used, and entered as Ship's Stores; such Sheathing and Materials to be so used before the Ship again leaves port, or the same shall be entered for duty in the ordinary way.

Fish, British caught and cured.

Twines, to be used for manufacturing Nets in this Colony.

Dye Stuffs.

Foreign Fish not to be Warehoused without payment of Duty.

III.—It shall not be lawful for any importer of Fish, salted, dried or pickled, not exempted from duty by any of the provisions of this Act, to Warehouse the same in any of the Ports of this Colony or its Depen-

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dencies, without the payment of the Duty hereinbefere imposed ; and the provisions of any Act of this Colony with regard to the Warehousing of Goods on the first entry thereof, or to the allowance of drawbacks upon exportation, shall not, in either case, apply, or be construed to apply, to such Fish.

IV .- From and after the passing of this Act, the Duty to be levied, paid, and collected on Spiritucus Liquors, 'manufactured, extracted or distilled in this Island, shall be at the rate mentioned in the Table of Duties, in this Act, for Local Distillation.

V.—All sums of Money payable under this Act, as Duties, Penalties, or Forfeitures, shall be deemed, and lars and Cents. are hereby declared to be in Dollars and Cents, Newfoundland Currency, and shall be received, taken and paid in such Currency; and all such Duties shall be paid and received according to Imperial Weights and Measures by law established in this Colony; and in all cases where such Duties are imposed according to any specific quantity or value, the same shall apply in like proportion to any greater or less quantity or value, and no reduction in the cost value of Goods shall be allowed, on account of what is usually termed Cash Discount.

VI.-All Yachts sailing under Warrant of the Lords Yachts exempt. of the Admiralty, or belonging to the Royal Yacht Club, shall be exempted, on view of the said Warrant, from payment of all Local Duties whatsoever.

VII.—The several Duties imposed, and in the said Table of Duties mentioned, in this Act, shall be paid by the Importer or Importers of such Articles respectively, and shall be collected and secured by means of and under the regulations and penalties, and in the way and manner, provided by this Act, and by any

Salaries to Officers. VIII.—There shall be allowed and paid annually to the following Officers of Her Majesty's Customs in this Colony, hereinafter mentioned, to defray all expenses of remuneration for the collection of the Colonial Revenue, and charges incidental thereto, the sums set opposite the names of the said Officers, for the period during which this Act shall be in operation, viz. :—

The Assistant Collector at St. John's, One Thousand Three Hundred and Eighty-five Dollars.

The Landing and Tide Surveyor, One Thousand One Hundred and Fifty-four Dollars.

Two Landing Waiters at St. John's, each Nine Hundred and Twenty-four Dollars.

First Clerk and Warehouse Keeper at St. John's, Nine Hundred and Twenty-four Dollars.

Second Clerk at St. John's, Six Hundred and Ninety-three Dollars.

Third Clerk at St. John's, Six Hundred and Nipetythree Dollars.

Fourth Clerk at St. John's, Six Hundred and Ninetythree Dollars.

Assistant Clerk at St. John's, Two Hundred and Thirty-one Dollars.

Two Lockers at St. John's, each Three Hundred and Seventy Dollars.

The Collector at Labrador, Four Hundred and Sixtytwo Dollars, and two and a half per cent. on all duties collected.

The Sub-Collector at Gaultois, Four Hundred and Sixty-Two Dollars, and two and a half per cent on all duties collected.

The Sub-Collector at Trinity, Six Hundred and Ninety-three Dollars, and two and a half per cent. on all duties collected.

The Sub-Collector at Harbor Grace, Seven Hundred and Thirty-nine Dollars, and two and a half per cent. on all duties collected. Provided that the amount of the said salary shall be equal to but not more than One Thousand One Hundred and Eighty-two Dollars.

The Landing Waiter and Clerk at Harbour Grace, Five Hundred and Seventy-seven Dollars.

The Sub-Collector at Carbonear, Five Hundred and Seventy-seven Dollars, and two and a half per cent. on all duties collected.

The Sub-Collector at Brigus, Four Hundred and Sixty-two Dollars, and two and a half per cent. on all duties collected.

The Sub-Collector at Burin, Four Hundred and Sixty-two Dollars, and two and a half per cent on all duties collected.

The Sub-Collector at Harbor Britain, Four Hundred and Sixty-two Dollars, and two and a half per cent. on all duties collected.

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Salaries to Officers.

The Sub-Collector at Twillingate, Four Hundred and Sixty-two Dollars, and two and a half per cent. on all duties collected.

Stationery, Printed Forms, Postages, and other in-Printed Forms. and Postages. expenses, Six Hundred and Ninety-three cidental Dollars.

The Keeper of the Custom House at St. John's, One Hundred and Eighty-five Dollars.

IX.-Every sworn Surveyor of Lumber, who shall measure or survey the cargo of Vessels importing Lamber, Timber and Shingles, into any Port or Ports in this Island, shall, and is hereby required to, produce to, and deposit with, the Receiver General, Assistant or Sub-Collector, or other proper Officer of Her Majesty's Customs for the Port where such Lumber, Timber and Shingles shall be landed, within twentyfour hours after discharging said cargo, a Certificate of the measurement, contents and quantity of said Lumber, Timber, and Shingles, respectively; for

which Certificate the said Surveyor shall be entitled to receive Fifty Cents; and should said Surveyor neglect to produce his Certificate at the time hereby required, he shall be subject and liable to a fine of Twenty Dollars, to be recovered in a summary manner, upon complaint of an Officer of Her Majesty's Customs or other person, before a Justice of the Peace, and may be levied by distress and sale of Goods and Chattels.

Drawhack on Flour, &c.

X.—There shall be a Drawback of Twenty Cents allowed on every Hundred Weight of Biscuit manufactured in this Colony, from Flour the Duty on which shall have been chargeable and paid: Provided that every person claiming such Drawback shall deliver to the Receiver General, Assistant or Sub-Collector, or other proper officer of Her Majesty's Customs, an account of the Biscuit baked; and shall annex thereto an affidavit, made before the Receiver General, Assistant or Sub-Collector of Her Majesty's Customs, that the full Duties on the Flour from which said Biscuit has been manufactured, were paid, and by whom, together with the name of the Establishment where such Biscuit was baked-whereupon such person shall be entitled to receive the Drawback allowed by this Act: Provided that no drawback shall be payable on any quantity of Biscuit, the Drawback in respect whereof would not amount to Twelve Dollars, nor on any Biscuit manufactured from Flour the Duty on which has been secured by Bond and not actually paid.

Duty of Owner or Agent. XI.—The Owner or authorised Agent of every Establishment for the manufacture of Biscuit, shall make and subscribe the following Oath, before the Receiver General, Assistant or Sub-Collector :

I, A. B., do swear that the account now tendered by me is a just and true account of all Biscuit manu-

factured since the day of 186 . at (setting forth the name of the Establishment), calculating One hundred weight, Two quarters, and Fourteen pounds of Biscuit to each barrel of Flour, and that the full duties on such Flour has been duly paid , and that Drawback has not been by previously paid on the same.

XII.—Any Person who shall, knowingly, make any False false or untrue statements or declarations, under this tion. Act, shall be liable to a penalty of Four Hundred Dollars.

XIII.-There shall be allowed a Drawback in lieu of any Duties that may have been paid on Materials Ship-building. for Shipbuilding; which drawback shall be computed at the rate of One Dollar per Ton, on every Ship or Vessel newly built from the keel, in this Colony; which Drawback shall be paid by the Receiver General or Assistant Collector when such Vessel shall have been registered according to Law in this Colony .--The Drawback payable under this section shall be payable to the person or persons for whom such Vessel as aforesaid shall have been built, or to such person or persons duly authorized by him or them to receive the same, when any such Vessel has been registered as required aforesaid: Provided further that no Drawback shall be paid on Vessels built or in course of building before the passing of this Act

Power of Board of Revenue.

XIV.—The Board of Revenue shall have power to make any Regulations they may deem necessary for the purpose of preventing fraud in obtaining Drawbacks under this Act.

No Spirits to be imported in casks less than 30 gallons.

XV.—No Spirits (except from Europe, the British West Indies, or the British Possessions in North America) shall be imported into this Island or its Dependencies, or be carried coastwise from one Port to any other thereof, in any cask, or other vessel capable of containing Liquors, not being of the size or contents of Thirty Gallons at least, instead of Fifty Gallons as mentioned in the Sixty-third Section of the Act passed in the Twenty-seventh Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, entitled "An Act to amend and consolidate the Laws of the Customs"; but the said Section shall otherwise apply and be in force.

Former Act repeated. XVI.—When and so soon as this Act shall come into operation, the Act of the Legislature passed in the last Session thereof, entitled "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain Duties on Goods, Wares and Merchandize, imported into this Colony and its Dependencies," shall be, and stand repealed : Provided always that all Bonds given and Payments made for Duties under the said Act, are hereby confirmed and declared valid, and nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect the same.

Continuance of Act. XVII.—This Act shall continue in force from the passing thereof up to the Twentieth day of May, which will be in the Year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixty-seven, and no longer.

CAP. II.

An Act to amend an Act passed in the Twenty-seventh year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, entitled " An Act to amend and consolidate the Laws of the Gustoms."

[Passed 1st May, 1866.]

CAP. III.

An Act for granting to Her Majesty a Sum of Money, for constructing and repairing Roads, Streets and Bridges, within this Colony.

[Passed 1st May, 1866.]

Preamble.

HEREAS it is expedient to provide for the internal improvement of this Colony, by constructing, repairing and improving Main and other Roads, Streets and Bridges, therein :

Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:

I.—From and out of such moneys as may from time to time remain in the hands of the Receiver General unappropriated, there be granted to Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Successors, the Sum of Eighty-four thousand six hundred and fifty-one Dollars and Fifty Cents, to be expended under this Act, in the constructing, repairing and improving of Main and other Roads, Streets and Bridges; which said sum shall be distributed and appropriated as follows, that is to say :—

Main Roads.

\$84,651 50.

On the road from St. John's to Brigus, Two thousand eight hundred dollars : Four hundred dollars of which to be expended between St. John's, Palk's Hill and Topsail.

On road from Brigus to Carbonear, Eleven hundred and eighty dollars.

On roads from Carbonear to Bay-de-Verds, One thousand and fifty-six dollars.

On road from Carbonear to New Perlican, eight nundred and twenty dollars: out of which the sum of two hundred dollars is to be expended in repairing Bennett's Hill, leading to Pack's Farm in Carbonear.

On the road from Trinity to Bonavista, One thousand and eighty dollars: two thirds of this amount to (continued) be expended from Trinity to Catalina, the remainder from Catalina to Bonavista.

On the road from Trinity to King's Cove, one thousand and eleven dollars; one half to be expended on Trinity side and one-half on King's Cove side: Provided that if the Trinity half of said road do not require half the above amount to finish that part, it shall be lawful for the Board of Works to expend any surplus therefrom on the road from Trinity to Plate Cove.

On the road from King's Cove to Tickle Cove, One hundred and eighty-eight dollars.

On the Great Northern Mail Route, Two thousand three hundred and seven dollars.

On the road from Spaniard's Bay to New Harbour, five hundred and twenty-nine dollars and fifty cents.-

On the road from New Perlican to Grate's Cove, Eight hundred and eighty dollars.

On the road from Cat Harbour to Ragged Harbour, Two hundred dollars.

On the road from Seldom-Come-By to Fogo, Three hundred and eighty dollars.

On the road from Tizzard's Harbour to Moreton s Harbour, One hundred and thirty dollars, and on to Western Head.

On the road from New Bay to Fortune Harbour, Sixty dollars.

On the road from Twillingate to Bluff Head, and onto Tillard's Cove, One hundred and ten dollars.

On the road from St. John's to Portugal Cove, Four hundred dollars.

Main Roads, (continued.) On the road from Holyrood to Little Placentia, Two thousand and twenty-four dollars : out of which the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars to be deduc-" ted on account of expenditure already incurred on the road between Holyrood and Placentia.

On road from Salmonier Bridge to St. Mary's, Sevenhundred and twenty dollars : out of which, Eighty dollars to be expended on the Black Duck Gully road.

On the road from Burin and Grand Bank, via St. Lawrence, to Lamaline, One thousand dollars.

On road between Burin and Garnish, to be expended in equal proportions on each side, Four hundred and ninety-three dollars.

On road between Harbour Briton and Gaultois, Two hundred dollars.

On road between Harbor Briton and Bellorem, One hundred and sixty dollars.

On road from Waterford Bridge to Northern Goulds Bridge, three hundred and twenty-six dollars.

On road from Northern Goulds Bridge towards Trepassey, One thousand eight hundred and fortyfour dollars.

Roads and Bridges, and any other necessary Public Works, in the District of Burgeo and LaPoile, Three hundred and sixty dollars.

On repairs of Waterford Bridge, Three hundred and twenty dollars.

On road from Bay-de-Verds main road to Red Head Cove, Two hundred dollars.

On road from New Harbour towards Heart's Delight, Three hundred dollars.

II.—All advances not provided for by this Act, and made on any of the aforesaid main lines of road, or on account of district appropriations in the employment of the able-bodied poor, or otherwise, shall be a prior charge thereon.

III.—The Interest due on the 30th June last, and that will become due this and each year on that day, on the amounts hereafter stated, on the following sums due for Debentures issued for compensation for damage by Riots under the Act 25 Victoria, cap. 3, shall be deducted each year from the Road Appropriations for the respective Districts hereinafter mentioned, that is to say,—For St. John's District, Interest Fourteen dollars and sixteen cents on Two hundred and eighty-one dollars and twenty-two cents ; Harbor Main District, Interest Thirty-three dollars and seventy-eight cents on Four hundred and thirty-three dollars and ninety-eight cents ; Carbonear District, Nine dollars and seventy-four cents Interest on One hundred

and ninety-four dollars and ninety-six cents; Harbor Grace District, Twenty-one dollars and seventy cents Interest on Four hundred and thirty-three dollars and ninety-eight cents.

IV.—Whosoever shall in anywise maliciously damage any Public Bridge may be prosecuted summarily Penalty for mabefore any Justice of the Peace, and, on conviction, Bridges, shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding Twentyfive dollars, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding two months : Provided that this Section shall not be construed to exempt any offender from being otherwise punished by the Criminal Law in operation in this Colony, when not convicted under this Section.

V.-Any person who, after being duly notified by the Chairman of the Board of Works, shall wilfully croaching on continue to encroach on any of the Public Roads, may be summoned before any Justice of the Peace, who shall decide, in a summary way, a complaint, in the name of the said Chairman, of such encroachment; and on being satisfied, by proof thereof, may order the removal of all fences and obstructions on any such road, and may adjudge the offender to pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty Dollars, together with costs and expenses of removal, which may be levied by distress and sale of the offender's goods and chattels.

VI.—The moneys hereinbefore granted shall be paid by the Receiver General in discharge of such Warrants paid by Waras may from time to time be drawn by the Governor nor. for the purposes of this Act.

CAP. IV.

An Act to provide for Quarantine and the Establishment of Boards of Health.

[Passed 1st May, 1866.]

THEREAS it is expedient to provide for Quarantine and the establishment of Boards of Health:

I.-The Governor in Council may, from time to

Governor may time, make such general and particular Quarantine orders and regulations applicable to vessels, goods, persons and things, being within this Colony, or expected hither from abroad, as they may deem expeand affix penal. dient ; and may revoke, vary, or amend the same, or any of them; and may affix penalties, forfeitures, and punishments, for the breach of any such general or particular orders and regulations, and for the breach or violation of any provision of this Act, except where otherwise provided.

II.—The said general orders and regulations shall Publication and be notified by proclamation, or published in the Royal Gazette, and the production of any such proclamation or publication shall be evidence of the making, date, and contents thereof. Particular orders may be proved either by production of the original, or of a paper purporting to be a copy thereof, certified to be such under the hand of the Colonial Secretary, or any Member of the Executive Council.

Orders shall have the force of law while unrevoked.

III.—Such general and particular orders and regulations shall have the force of law while they remain Their expiry, revocation, unrevoked or unexecuted. or amendment, shall not prevent any person, liable for a breach or violation, during their operation, from being tried and punished therefor.

IV .- The Governor in Council may appoint Health Governor to apand all other Officers necessary for the due execution and other Offic of this Act, and of the orders and regulations to be their duties. made thereunder, and shall appoint to such Officers their respective duties.

V.-Custom House Officers and Licensed Pilots shall be subject to the orders of the Governor in cers and Pilots Council, as the case may be, for the purpose of aiding of orders. in the execution of this Act, and of the regulations and orders to be made thereunder.

VI.-Persons required or appointed according to the provisions of the fourth and fifth sections of this Pena'ty for no-Act, who shall neglect the duties to be by them performed, or shall violate any of the provisions of this Act, or of any regulations or orders to be made thereunder, shall, besides being subject to punishment or forfeiture, also be liable to dismissal from all employment under the Crown.

VII.-All Vessels, and any particular class of Ves- Vessels liable to sels, and all Vessels in particular, any or either of fees, &c. them, shall, from time to time, at particular times, or at all times when the Governor in Council may deem it expedient, be subject to, and chargeable with, such fees and dues, either rated on the tonnage or otherwise, as may be directed by any general or particular order; and such fees and dues shall be a lien on the Vessel before all other claims, and no Vessel shall be entered or cleared outwards at the Custom House if such fees and dues be not duly paid, and the Masters and Owners of any such Vessel shall be liable for such fees and dues as for a Crown debt, and such fees and dues shall be applicable for the purposes of this Act.

VIII.—It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, at all times when deemed expedient for preventing the introduction or spreading of any Contagious or In-

Governor to ap- fectious Disease into or in this Island or its dependencies, to appoint and commission such competent persons, at the several ports of this Island as may be required, to act as Boards of Health for carrying into effect and enforcing the rules and directions in any such order, to be made by the Governor in Council, contained; and also to prescribe and direct the particular duties and modes of proceeding to be executed or observed by such Boards of Health, and to authorize and empower them, or any of them, to make, establish, and cause to be observed, any rules and regulations which may be found necessary to preserve the public health, and to render effectual all measures of precaution against the introduction or spreading of disease or diseases as aforesaid.

Health Wardens

IX.—The Governor in Council may, from time to time, appoint Health Wardens for the several districts, who shall act gratuitously, who may, in the day time, enter and examine all Houses, Buildings and Places, and all Vessels and Boats, and report their condition, as required by the sanitary order in that behalf; they shall give directions for cleansing any house, building, place, vessel or boat, and generally for the preservation of public health, the maintenance of cleanliness, and the prevention of contagion and infection.

Powers of War. dens.

X.—The Wardens, or any two of them, may, by order in writing, cause any house, building, place, vessel or boat, to be whitewashed, fumigated, or otherwise purified, and may cause anything dangerous to the public health to be removed or destroyed.

Penalty on refusing to act.

XI.-If any Health Warden, upon being notified of Health Wardens his appointment, shall refuse to accept the office, or, when accepted, shall refuse to discharge the duties thereof, or to comply with any sanitary orders to him communicated, he shall forfeit Twenty Dollars, to be

recovered in manner in the sixteenth section specified, and another shall be immediately appointed in his place; but no appointment of Health Warden shall continue for more than one year, nor shall any party be bound to serve oftener than once in four years.

XII.—Any Board of Health, or Health Wardens, or, where none exist, any Justice of the Peace, may order or Health Warto be removed from any dwelling-house or place, or removal of sick from any vessel or boat approaching near to or within persons in cerany place or port, any person sick with any contagious or infectious disease, to any hospital, house or place proper for that purpose, it being first certified by a Medical Practitioner that such removal is necessary for the public health. And if any person be sick with any infectious or contagious disease, in any house or place, and such person cannot, in the opinion of such Medical Practitioner, be removed, then the Board, or Health Wardens, or Justice, as the case may be, may cause such house or place, or any contiguous house or place, to be vacated, by other occupants, for such time as the safety of the inhabitants shall require.

XIII.-If any action or suit shall be commenced against any person or persons, for any matter or thing against persons done in pursuance or execution of this Act, or of any order made by virtue hereof, the defendant or defen- this Act, defen. dants in such action or suit may plead the General G n. Issue, and Issue, and give this Act and the special matter in evidence, at any trial to be had thereupon, and that the same was done in pursuance and in the execution of this Act; and no such action or suit shall be brought against any person, for any matter or thing done in pursuance of this Act, but within the space of three months after such matter or thing shall have been done.

XIV.—The Governor in Council, as aforesaid, shall, amongst the general orders to be made under this Act,

XVI.-In any case of violation, as aforesaid, the offender may be tried, in a summary way, before any Justice of the Peace in this Island, at the suit of the Queen, or of any person entitled to prosecute, under any general or particular order, as aforesaid, and, upon conviction, shall be committed to prison where imprisonment shall be the penalty; and where a penalty or forfeiture shall be imposed, with or without imprisonment, the amount of such penalty or forfeiture, together with costs, may be levied by Warrant of Distress, under the hand of any Justice of the Peace, or the offender may be detained in custody, or committed to prison, (where imprisonment is not part of the sentence) until such penalty or forfeiture be paid: Provided that such detention or imprisonment shall not exceed three months: Provided, further, that no proceeding had or done by a Justice of the Peace, under this Act, shall be set aside by certiorari, or otherwise, for want of or for matter of form, nor shall any offender be relieved therefrom, nor shall any action lie therefor, if such proceedings, had they been regular, shall be found to have been justified by the facts: Provided, also, that nothing herein con- Provise, tained shall prevent any person being sued for a penalty or forfeiture in an action in a Superior Court of Record.

XVII.-Forfeitures and penalties shall be applied Application of as any general or particular regulation or order, to be penalties. made by the Governor in Council, may prescribe.

XVIII.—In the absence of the Governor from the Seat of Government, the Executive Council shall have have power in and exercise all powers vested in the Governor in the Governor. Council under this Act.

XIX.-The provisions of this Act, and the general and particular regulation and orders aforesaid, shall be the law of this Colony for the time being, although they may in all or any respects differ from the Acts now in force relating to Quarantine and Boards of Health

An Act for the Reduction of Pauperism, by encouraging Agriculture and more effectually carrying into operation the Provisions of the Act 23 Vic., Cap. 3.

THEREAS the condition of the People of this Colony, for some years past, shews that the Preamble. present means of support are not sufficient to provide for their wants; and the drain from the Public Treasury for the relief of the able-bodied Poor absorbs the funds that should be devoted to the improvement of the Country : it is therefore expedient to make provision for the reduction of Pauperism, by encouraging

Agriculture, and more effectually carrying into operation the provisions of the Act 23 Victoria, Cap. 3.

Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows :---

I.—It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to expend, from time to time, out of the moneys unappropriated in the hands of the Receiver General, towards the promotion of Agriculture and carrying out this Act, a sum not exceeding Twenty Thousand Dollars each year, for two years from the passing thereof, which amount shall be fairly apportioned and expended in the several Districts, in the allotment of lands for settlement and cultivation, and among those of the inhabitants who by their industry may avail themselves of the benefit of this Act.

II.—Before expenditure of any part of the said sum, the Governor in Council shall make such Rules and Regulations as he may deem necessary for the Survey and Allotment of the most eligible Lands for the purpose of settlement in the several Districts, and towards carrying this Act into operation.

III.—There shall be paid to every Poor Settler, if in the opinion of the Governor and Council he shall come within the designation in the fourth Section, who shall conform to the Rules and Regulations to be made as aforesaid, the sum of Eight Dollars for the first acre, and Six Dollars for every acre thereafter, not exceeding Six Acres, of the Waste Lands of this Colony, cleared, tilled and reduced into cultivation by every such Settler; provided that any Poor Settler who may, before this Act comes into operation, have cultivated land belonging to him in any of the Districts less than the limit aforesaid, shall, on conforming to the said Rules and Regulations, be entitled to the amount of

\$20,000 to be expended each year for 2 years to promote Agriculture—

V.-No person shall receive the compensation aforesaid who shall not produce satisfactory evidence of his paid by order of being justly entitled thereto under this Act, and in Council. every instance upon the order of the Governor in Council.

VI.-The Rules and Regulations to be made as Rules to he pub. aforesaid shall be published in the Royal Gazette, and zette. laid before the Legislature shortly after the opening of the Session next after the same shall have been so made and published.

VII.—No person who shall have received relief, as a Pauper, from or out of the public moneys, within certain cases. one year after, or at any time during the year preceding) any Election of a Member or Members to serve in the House of Assembly, shall be competent to vote at such last Election; and the Justices revising the list of Electors shall strike therefrom the names of all persons who shall have received relief as aforesaid; provided that relief received before the passing of this Act shall not render any person incompetent to vote as aforesaid.

V.—It shall be lawful for the several Courts of Sessions in this Colony, within their several jurisdictions, to make from time to time orders for the prevention of Nuisances dangerous to personal safety or affecting Public Health, other than those mentioned in the hereinbefore recited Acts, such orders to be confirmed and approved by the Governor in Council and published in the *Royal Gazette*.

VI.—The orders of Session mentioned in the Fifth Section, when confirmed and published, shall, at such time as may be appointed by Minute of Council, have the same force and effect as if by this Act specially enacted, under such Penalties as may be prescribed by the said orders, and recoverable in the same manner as provided for the recovery of Penalties by the said Act revived by the First Section.

VII.—No Penalty imposed for any offence against any order made in pursuance of the last preceding Section shall exceed Twenty Dollars, and no term of imprisonment for any such offence shall exceed Twenty Days.

III.—The Inspector shall inspect all Beams, Scales, Weights and Measures, on the premises of the owners; and should any of the same require adjustment, they shall be sent by such owners to the office of the Inspector, for that purpose.

IV.-The Fee of Ten Cents, mentioned in the Fifteenth Section of the hereinbefore mentioned Act, for all Beams, Scales and Measures, shall be construed to be Ten Cents for Beam and Scales.

V.-Any person who shall counterfeit the marking Penaltier. or stamping of the Inspector on any Beam, Scale, Weight or Measure, or shall use any such Beam, Scale, Weight or Measure, when condemned under the second section, shall forfeit and pay a Penalty of Twenty Dollars, to be recovered in a summary manner before any Justice of the Peace, and in default of payment, shall be imprisoned for any term not exceeding one month.

CAP. X.

An Act for Preventing Collisions at Sea on the Coast within the limits of the jurisdiction of this Colony.

[Passed 1st May, 1866.]

WHEREAS great loss of life and property has been occasioned by Collisions at Sea on the Coast within the limits of the jurisdiction of this Colony; and whereas it is expedient and necessary to adopt measures to prevent the same.

Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows :---

I.—The Lights mentioned in the following sections of this Act shall be carried, in all weathers, between sunset and sunrise.

II.—Coasting Vessels, Fishing Vessels, open Fishing Boats, and other Boats, when under sail, at anchor, or attached to their nets, and stationary, shall exhibit a bright white light at the masthead when practicable, or in the most conspicuous place the circumstances will admit of: Provided that nothing herein contained shall apply to vessels carrying lights as provided by Imperial Legislation.

III.—Coasting Vessels, Fishing Vessels, open Fishing Boats, and other Boats, shall, however, not be prevented from using a flare-up in addition, if considered expedient.

IV.—Whenever there is fog, whether by day or night, a fog horn shall be carried and used, and shall be sounded at least once in every half hour.

V.—Nothing in this Act contained shall exonerate any Vessel or Boat, or the Owner, Master, or Crew thereof, from the consequences of any neglect to carry lights or signals, or of any neglect to keep a proper

Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows :

An Act to amend the Acts for the Establishment of a Board of Works.

[Passed 1st May, 1866.]

Preamble.

Board of Works to consist of Chairman and four other members.

Control over buildings, &c.

Powers of Board. WHEREAS it is expedient to amend and consolidate the Acts relating to the Board of Works :

Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Legislative Council, and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows :---

I.—The Board of Works shall be composed of a Chairman and four other Members, to be appointed, as occasion may require, by the Governor in Council, to hold office during pleasure, any three of whom shall be a quorum : The Board shall have the superintendence and management of the Government House, Colonial Building, Court Houses, the Penitentiary and Gaols, Lunatic Asylum, Custom Houses, Light Houses, erected and to be erected, Buoys and Beacons, Poor Asylum, and all other Buildings and Property belonging to the Colony, and also of all Public Roads, Streets and Bridges, made, or to be made, within the Colony: The Board shall have and exercise the power and authority of the Board of Works superseded by this Act, and subject to its provisions.

II .- The Chairman of the Board shall have a salary Salary of Chairof Eleven hundred and fifty-four dollars, and shall not be disqualified from being elected to the Assembly, or Chairman disqualified from sitting and voting therein, within the provisions from being elecof the Act passed in the Twenty-fifth year of the Reign bly, &c. of Her present Majesty, entitled "An Act for better securing the independence of the House of Assembly."

III.—The Board shall have a Secretary, to be appointed by the Governor in Council, to hold office salary. during pleasure, at a salary of Nine hundred and twenty-four Dollars; and that a sum not exceeding Two hundred and thirty-one Dollars be appropriated each year towards compensating non-official Members of the said Board for their attendance : Provided that a Member of the Assembly, who shall not receive any part of the said amount, shall not be disqualified from being appointed to the said Board.

IV.—The Governor in Council shall have full power, at all times, to make and establish general Rules and Regulations for the meetings and management of the Board of Works: Provided that the Board may make, from time to time, Bye-Laws, Rules and Regulations, make Bye-Laws but which shall not be of any force or effect until approved of by the Governor in Council.

V.-The Governor in Council to appoint and remove Governor to ap. all Officers, Superintendents and Keepers of Public point and re-Buildings and Light Houses, Road Inspectors, and and servants, Surveyors, and other necessary officers and servants of the said Board, who shall respectively hold office during pleasure, and to allow to all persons so émployed such salaries or other compensation as he shall salaries, &o: deem reasonable, but not to exceed the amount now allowed any officer, without the sanction of the Legislature, and subject to its annual revision and control.

> VIII.—The Chairman of the Board shall have and exercise the power and authority vested in the Surveyor General by virtue of an Act passed in the Twentyfourth and Twenty-fifth years of the Reign of Her present Majesty, entitled "An Act to make further provision for the prevention of Nuisances."

> IX.-All actions brought by or against the said Board may be taken in the name of the Chairman for the time being; and no action shall be commenced against the said Board, for any thing done in pursuance of the provisions of this Act, until One Calendar Month after notice in writing shall have been delivered to the said Chairman, or left at the office of the said Board, by the party who intend to institute such action, his Attorney or Agent, in which notice shall be clearly and explicitly contained the cause of action, the name and place of abode of the person who is to bring the same, and the name and place of abode of his Attorney or Agent.

> X.-The Salaries payable under this Act shall be paid quarterly, by warrant on the Receiver General.

> XI.—The Board shall make a general statement of their affairs to the Governor, quarterly, and a particular report yearly, of their proceedings, to be laid before the Legislature at the opening of the then next session.

CAP. XIII.

An Act to make provision for the Constitution of a Marine Court of Enquiry in this Colony.

[Passed 1st May, 1866.]

THEREAS it is expedient to make provision for Preamble. the Constitution of a Marine Court of Enquiry in this Colony:

Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows :---

I.—It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, from time to time, and whenever occasion shall arise persons as Maor require, by Commission under his hand and seal, to appoint Five Persons to form a Court, called the Marine Court of Enquiry; and such Court shall comprise some person or persons of Judicial knowledge and habits, and some person or persons of Nautical skill and experience; and in the Commission may be indicated the person to preside over the Court: The proceedings of the Court shall be assimilated, as far as possible, to those of ordinary Courts of Justice, with the like publicity.

II.—In cases following, that is to say ;—

Whenever any Ship is lost, abandoned, or materially damaged, on or near the Coasts of this Island or its **Dependencies** :

Whenever any Ship causes loss or material damage to any other Ship, on or near the Coasts of this Island or its Dependencies, or in any Roadstead or Harbor thereof:

Whenever, by reason of any casualty happening to or on board of any Ship on or near the Coast of this Island or its Dependencies, or in any Roadstead or Harbor thereof, loss of life ensues :

Governor to commission five rine Court of Enquiry.

Whenever any such loss, abandonment, damage or casualty happens elsewhere, and any competent Witness or Witnesses thereof arrive, or are found at any place within this Island or its Dependencies :

Whenever a charge of misconduct or incompetency is brought by any person against a Master, Mate, or Engineer of a British Ship;

—It shall be lawful for such Court to hear and enquire, and generally to exercise the powers and perform the duties given and prescribed by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, as amended by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1862, or as the same may be after amended; and may also exercise the powers given to Inspectors appointed by the Board of Trade : Provided that the duty of Inspection may be performed by any one or more Members of such Court, or by one or more competent persons to be appointed by the said Court.

Impeding Inspection.

Penalty,

Power of summoning witnesses, regulating the proceedings, and enforcing penalties.

III.—Every Person wilfully impeding such Inspec. tion, or wilfully impeding any person or persons engaged in such inspection, whether on board ship, or elsewhere, shall incur a penalty not exceeding Forty Dollars, and may be seized and detained, by any such person or persons, or others, who may be called to assist, until such offender can be conveniently taken before some Justice of the Peace ; and such penalty shall be recovered, and such offender dealt with, in the same manner, as nearly as applicable, in the case of a person impeding an Inspector under Part 1st of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854.

IV.—The said Court shall, so far as relates to the summoning of parties, compelling the attendance of witnesses, the regulation of the proceedings, and the enforcing of penalties, and of obedience to the judgment or orders of the Court, have the same powers as Justices of the Peace would have if the proceedings related to an offence or cause of complaint upon which they had power to make a summary conviction or order, or as near thereto as circumstances permit; and the said Court of Marine Enquiry may exercise the jurisdiction and authority conferred on Justices of the Peace under the third section of this Act.

V.-It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, upon any occasion which he may see fit, and at whatever place may be necessary, to nominate and appoint to make enquir any other person or persons whomsoever, to be a Tribunal duly authorized to make enquiry into the several matters aforesaid, with the like powers as the Court hereinbefore mentioned.

An Act to amend the Acts for the Encouragement of Education in this Colony.

[Passed 1st May, 1866.] HEREAS the Laws providing for the Encouragement of Education in this Colony require amendment in some particulars.

Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows :----

V.—In addition to the sums appropriated for Commercial Schools in the said Act referred to, in the first section, there shall be paid the sum of Two hundred and thirty-one Dollars towards defraying the Salary of the Teacher of the Roman Catholic Commercial School at Bay-de-Verds, and the sum of Two hundred and seventy seven Dollars towards the establishment of a Commercial School at Bay Roberts, in lieu of the amount granted in the Supply Bill, the present Session, for Protestant Commercial Schools.

VI.—So much of the Second, Sixth, Sixteenth and Seventeenth Sections of an Act passed in the Twentyfirst Year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, entitled "An Act for the encouragement of Education," as refers to the Protestant Educational District of Bay Roberts, shall be, and the same is hereby repealed.

VII.—That the Protestant Educational District of Bay Roberts shall consist of and include the Town and Settlement of Bay Roberts and Coley's Point, as defined and included in the Electoral District of Harbor Grace ; and that the Educational District of Port-de-Grave shall consist of and include all that part of the Educational District of Port-de-Grave North of Northern Gut in Port-de-Grave Salmon Cove.

VIII.—That out of the Educational appropriations for Protestant Districts, there shall be annually applied and expended, by the Board of Education for the District of Bay Roberts, the sum of Six hundred and

CAP. XXIII.

An Act to provide for the Contingent Expenses of the Legislature.

[Passed 1st May, 1866.]

WHEREAS it is expedient to provide for the Contingent Expenses of the Legislature of this Colony.

Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows :—

From and out of such moneys as shall, from time to time, remain in the hands of the Receiver General, and unappropriated, there be granted to Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Successors, the sum of Thirty Thousand Six Hundred and Twelve Dollars and Thirteen cents, to be applied towards remunerating the Officers of the Legislature for their services, and towards defraying the Contingent Expenses of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, as follows :
