At Waterloo the Scots Greys took a large number of prisoners and captured the eagle of the 45th Infantry. This was secured by Sergeant Ewart after a desperate combat, in which, after cutting down the standard-bearer, he was attacked successively by a Polish lancer and a foot soldier, both of whom he slew. 

Throwing the woman, to the ground, Freeman walked toward the house himself. Kennedy, who had been on the watch, opened fire on him. Freeman went back to where his wife lay, and seizing the rope dragged her from the yard into the went back to where his wife lay, and seizing the rope dragged her from the yard into the road. In a few seconds Kennedy heard the sound of Freeman's rife. After leaving Kennedy's house Freeman had forced his wife a few hundred yards, and, cursing her for not obeying his orders to kill Kennedy, he sent a bullet through her heart, killing her instantly. The body lay in the road until next morning. Freeman has disappeared.

AFTER EIGHT YEARS. Captured Priests and Nuns Escape From the Mahdists. the Mahdists.

A Cairo cable says': At the time of the revolt against Egyptian authority in the Soudan the followers of the Mahdi took as prisoners a number of priests and nuns who had been working in that country for the evangelization of the natives. Since that time many stories have been received regyrding the treatment these prisoners received at the hands of the captors. It was said that the men were absolute slaves, and compelled to perform the most menial services for their taskmasters, while the women met a worse fate, being parcelled out among the chiefs and grossly outraged. Among those who thus fell into the hands of the rebels in 1883 were the members of the Austrian Soudan mission, who were captured when Kordofan mission, who were captured when Kordofan was taken by the hordes of the Mahdi. After their capture they were conveyed to Omburman, where they were held close prisoners. Among those taken prisoners were Father Chowalder and Sisters Catrina, Chincarina, Elizabeth and Venturini. For eight years they awaited a favorable opportunity to make their escape, and at last the opportune moment arrived. They immediately took advantage of it and set out on their journey toward civilization. They were pursued by the Arabs, but managed to eliude them, and finally reached Korosko, where they were safe from recapture. They were greatly exhausted by their journey across the desert. No details of their life among the desert tribes have been received, but it is believed when they fully recover they will be able to tell a most interesting story of their adventures among the fanatical Arabs.

WASHINGTON, Dec. — To the Senate and House of Representatives. The work of the State Department has been characterized by an unusual number of important negotia times and by diplomatic results of a notable and highly beneficial character. Among these are the reciprocal trade arrangements which have been concluded with the Republic of Brazil, with Spain for its West India possessions, and with San Domingo. Like negotiations with other countries have been much advanced and it is hoped that before the close of they are unfured efinitive trade arrangements of great value will be concluded.

THE SEAL SETTLEMENT.

In view of the reports which had been received as to the diminution of the scals in Behring Sea, I deemed it wise to propose to Her Majesty's Government in February last that an agreement for a closed season should be made pending the negotiations for arbitration which seemed to be approaching a favorable conclusion. An agreement was reached and signed on the 15th of June, by which great Britain undertook from that date and until May 1st, 1892, to prohibit the killing by her subjects of seals in the Behring Sea, and the Government of the United States during the same period to enforce its existing prohibition against pelagic sealing and to limit the catch by the fur seal company upon the Islands to 7,500 skins. In the last annual session I stated that the basis of arbitration proposed by Her Majesty's Government for the adjustment of the long pending controversy as to the seal fisheries was not acceptable. I am glad now to be able to announce that terms satisfactory to this Government have been agreed upon, and that an agreement as to the arbitrators is all that is necessary to the completion of the convention. ompletion of the convention.

THAT PAMIR FIGHT.

The report of the Secretary of the Navy shows a gratifying increase of new naval vessels in commission. The Newark, Concord, Bennington and Miantonomah have been added during the year, with an aggregate of something more than 11,000 tons. Twenty-four warships of all classes are now under construction in the navy yards and private shops, but while the work upon them is going forward satisfactorily, the completion of the more important vessels will yet require about a year's time. There should be no hesitation in promptly completing a navy of the best modern type, large enough to enable this country to display its fing in all seas, for the protection of its citizens and of its extending commerce.

THE PENSION BUREAU.

The administration of the Pension Bureau has been characterized during the year by diligence. The total number of pensioners upon the roll on June 30th, 1891, was 676,160. There were during the year 250,565 cases, of this number 102,387 were allowed under the law of June 27th, 1890. The issuing of certificates has been proceeding at the rate of about 30,000 per month.

The appropriation for the payment of pensions for the fiscal year 1890-91 was \$127,685,793.89 and the ameunt expended surplus of \$9,155,144.64. The commissioner is quite confident that there will be no call this year for a deficiency appropriation, notwithstanding the rapidity with which the work is being pushed. A London cable says: Official despatches received here this evening from Calcutta state that there has been fighting between the British forces and the tribesmen in the vicinity of Gilgil, near the Pamir frontier, and not far from the boundary line recently claimed by Russia. In short, the British troops are now face to face with frontier tribesmen in arms who are claimed to be under Russian protection, and most serious events may result.

Later-Other despatches just received here from Calcutta announce that Fort Chalt was captured on Dec. 2nd, and that several sepoys were killed and twenty-six were wounded. Col. Durand, the despatch adds, Capt. Aylmer and Lieut. Baboock were seriously wounded. Several other officers, including Lieut. Gorton others, were alightly wounded. Capt. Aylmer and Lieuts Boisrazon and Babocck, continued the despatch, displayed extraordinary gallantry. Capt. Aylmer most gallantly led 2 sooming party carrying å gun cotton petard, and in face Of a shower of bulleta dashed up to the iron-bound gates of the fort, affixed the petard to it, lit the fuse, retreated a short distance, and then had the pleasure of hearing a deafening report. The next moment the gallant captain saw that the petard had blown the gates of the fort to pieces. Capt. Aylmer and a dash into the fort, and after some desperate fighting captured a field gun which had been used effectively against the attacking party. The British officers and sepoys also captured nine prisoners, the remainder of the rebel tribes fleeing, leaving a number of dead inside and outside the fort. The news of the engagement on the Pamir frontier is not quite clear on this point, that of what became of the original Kashmir garrison of the fort. It is presumed, however, that the rebel tribes men captured the fort previous to the arrival of the British troops, and that it has now been retaken.

IS RUSSIA FOMENTING TROUBLE

Without entering into any discussion of the causes of the dispute between the three great powers over the boundary lines in the Pamir, it may safely be said that Russia's object in her aggressive campaign is not merely to acquire that uninviting region, but to accure it as a stepping-stoue to regions that lie beyond. From the Pamir there is the easiest progress into Eastern Turkestan and Tibet, along the valleys at the northern foot of the Karakorum Mountains. Even Nepsul and Bhotan are not so far off. Russia would like to drive a wedge between the British and the Chinese empires, threaten the whole northern froptier of India, and make a junction with the French possessions in Tonquin. If England uses Aighanistan to shut Russia away from the Arabian Sea Russia will seek the Bay of Bengal by the way of Nepsul and Assam. It seems preposterous to talk of a Russian army invading the Ganges Valley and attacking Calcutta itself. Yet more amazing things have happened. And the advance into the Pamir is a move exactly in this direction.

The latest reinforcements sent to the scene were armed with 27-pound Gatling guns. The force available at Fort Chalt and the reinforcement taken together made up an effective strength which would be absurdly disproportionate if only tribesmen were expected to be encountered. It is evident from the elaborate preparations that have been making that a European soldiery were looked forward to as combatants, and it is not doubted that the battle with the natives will lead, sooner or later, to a meeting of Russian and British troops.

The latter got up during the night and examined the stranger's baggarg, and finding the money, a larger sum than she had ever-dreamed of determined to possess it. The husband and father slept on. The mother stealthily got skinfe and cut the throat of the stranger, killing him instantly; then she took and hid the gold. When the father awoke he found his son in a pool of blood on the bed. Smallpox is also ravaging the Provinces of Viatka, Samars, Kharkoff, Viadimir, Kursk, Orenburg, Peterhoff and Saratoff. Typhus fever is also carrying off numerous victims in various Provinces. On the whole, a more gloomy outlook could not well be imagined, and although the few doctors scattered through the country are doing their utmost to stay the diseases, their efforts are almost useless. The people have reached a stage where they think it useless to fight against any affliction sent them, and consequently many who might recover had they any energy or will-power, lie down and succumb to disease without making a single effort in their own behalf. Many, too, prefer death from disease to suffering the alow torture of death from starvation.

At Shadrinak, in the Province of Perm, as ad condition of affairs exists, and it may be necessary for the Government to interfere to prevent a wholesale carrying off of the inhabitants by famine. The granaries there are almost exhausted, and the poor people know not where to turn to obtain food to keep life in their miserable bedies. Missionaries, who were sent to relieve the distress, were unable to buy corn at any price. All the stocks of grain in the vicinity were used, or else those who did have grain refused to sell it, for fear that if they did they would soon find themselves in a plight similar to their unfortunate neighbors.

The trans-Siberian Railway it is proposed to open for traffic in 1895. But the same doubts exist as to the feasibility of accomplishing the work in such a short time, as existed respecting the Canadian Pacific Railway. The building of the railroad has become not merely a commercial but a political necessity to Russia. The Chinese, it is claimed, have designs upon the fertile valley of the Ussuit, which lies between Manchuria and the Russian territory, and contemplate pushing railroad extension in that direction. About 2,500 miles of the trans-Siberian road have been surveyed. On the plains of Siberia, as in our own prairies, few engineering difficulties will be encountered. This part of the route for 1,200 miles has been fully surveyed; also 700 miles east o Baikal Lake; and about 200 miles the Pacific poast. The sud-scarce European frontor through the Ural mountains is still unsurveyed. The Pacific terminus will be Vladivostoek, which is to be made a first-class fortified harbor and the Russian nawal station. The cost of the railroad and its entire equipment in running order is placed at \$175,000,000. The road will develop a large commerce and possibly the Russian anthorities in undertaking this large expenditure principally for political purposes are building better for humanity than they imagine.
