Town Council Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening, with the Mayor and all the Councillors present.

The Finance Committee reported the expenditures for the past month \$668.52, and receipts for the same period \$657.84. The credit balance at the bank at the end of February was \$314.48.

A bill of Charles Murphy was referred to the superintendent of streets for report.

A bill from Mrs. Currie for expense of repairs to fence adjoining school property was referred to the Committee on Public Property for investigation.

Can. McKenna reported that a number of water services had been frozen during the late cold weather. Some of these had been thawed out at considerable expense, and in other cases it was deemed useless to attempt to get the pipes clear at present.

Halifax Notes.

The Isle of Wight.

AN INTERESTING LETTER FROM MR. WILLIAM CHIPMAN.

DEAR MR. EDITOR.—The place of which I now write being rather out of the line of ordinary tourist travel the thought occurred that possibly some of your readers might be interested in hearing a few facts concerning the Isle of Wight. After our return from a few months' excursion through England and Scotland, taking in many of the most famous places including the English lakes, we returned to London and from there on by way of Brighton and Dover, giving these places some few weeks' visit.

On reaching the Island we find it has some especially fine features of body, color and climate that grow upon one to such an extent as to make our month's stay appear altogether too short. This is the universal testimony of all visitors. In consideration of the Island's beauty one wonders why it has not received the praise it so justly merits—some hold to the opinion that the commercial instinct is too evident in her well written guide books, and that this fact makes the true nature of the Island less to the writing of the Island's charms, for fear of classing himself among those that seek for a profit from the guileless stranger. However, the true reason is yet to be given. Historically too, the Island scores. It has once been Celt, Roman, British, Norman, and Saxon, and very hard to realize now when looking over its fertile fields, that every foot of surface has been, thousands of years ago, trodden over by these hardy half barbarians who talked, and walked, and no doubt over which they strenuously fought, joyed and suffered. These old Iron-Ages knew a good thing when they saw it. To-day its appearance verifies the old written accounts of its great diversity in wood, hill, and rich pasture-lands. The Island now measures in length twenty-three miles, breadth about thirteen. It is divided quite equally by a range of chalk hills, and to one, even barely acquainted with the first principles of geology, is very interesting, as nearly all the ordinary formations are traceable in its cliffs, from the very old up to that of to-day.

We come from Brighton here by way of Portsmouth. The steamer voyage down the harbor and across the Solent was most enjoyable. There were ships of all classes from the low black and ominous-looking war-ships of to-day, back to the old Victory, Nelson's Flag Ship, built more than one hundred years ago, her huge hull made more apparent by her light draught. Bunting was flying from every mast and on almost every rope from deck to main truck, and as she jauntily moved with the tidal swell, showing her three tiers of sinister guns it gave her a look of conscious pride as if she fully remembered her part in bringing to the nation the glory of Trafalgar, not showing any signs of age or decay.

We landed at Kyde on the Isle of Wight, a town built on the cliff. The sea is reached by a slight descent first, then on to a gracefully bowed, natural terrace, green and smooth, a flight of steps on either end enables one to reach a long and broad esplanade, almost on a level with the sea. Here, most of the attractions centre. Thousands of people, some boating, others bathing, walking, and talking. These, with the donkey and goat carriages, riding ponies, out door theatricals, all busy. The boys shout, dogs bark, babies cry, and banal music keeps up the vibrating din. This reduplicates Brighton, only in a lesser degree. Shanklin has many fine modern houses, yet in contrast there are many very old and quaintly constructed, with straw-thatched roofs. Its chine is a great attraction. This is a wide water-worn fissure, its rocky sides take the most fantastic shapes, which are covered partially by trees, shrubbery, and protusely growing ivy, and ferns, all flourishing together in a most friendly and artistic way.

An artificial roadway follows the side near the bottom of the chine, and its serpentine course is crossed over the water-ways, by pretty rustic bridges, giving a most pleasing effect. Longfellow visited this place, and the lines he wrote in admiration of its beauty are cut in stone on the side of the chine in a very conspicuous place. Shanklin has its village church nine hundred years old, besides many others of all stripes. The walk over to Venton by the cliff road, a distance of four miles, is a delightful one. The way, a foot-path running at times over smooth high downs, at others over rugged wooded hills with the dancing sea always in sight. This is a very popular walk judging from the scores of happy people we met coming and going. The first sight of Venton so romantically situated, almost starles one, it's natural beauty is such a great surprise. The town is built very irregularly upon a series of high hills, or rather upon a succession of natural terraces along the hill-sides, and these are built upon in some places close down to the sea. These great hills are worn by erosion from rainfall and hidden springs into the most confused and irregular rocky shapes which give these high hills a most strange and wild beauty, and art in many places has added to this one instance from a concealed spring a fall breaks out near the centre of the town some thirty or forty feet above the under cliff a place for dumping town debris.

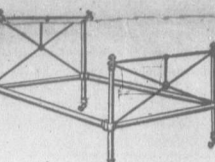

Letters to the Editor.

To the Editor of THE ACADIAN. Sir.—Referring to the action of the recently elected member for Kings, Mr. Campbell, in voting for Mr. Farrell to the Speaker's chair in our Local Legislature, it is fairly open to criticism by any elector especially if that one be a voter who helped give the new member for Kings his seat.

I for one, whatever other Reform voters may think, consider Mr. Campbell's act a very reprehensible one. Surely he should have known, and know that he wasn't sent there to vote for a Speaker a man who as the records show has politically disgraced this Province. If he pleads ignorance, then it is for the Reform Party to 'kick' themselves for sending imbecility to represent us. If it be a matter of compromise we surely baffle our name and profession as Reformers to countenance any sort of compromise whatsoever. If it be to simply show he had no sympathy with any conservative opposition to the first vote it was a most inopportune and unfortunate occasion to show it.

On the very threshold, where a straight, courageous and manly stand against what might look like the appearance of evil, this new member failed to shun that evil and failed to give a reason for the faith that was in him, but guilelessly, or otherwise, apparently fell into the cunning trap laid by Machine Grits (and let me say right here that I would condemn this vote just as rigorously if it were under the auspices of Machine Toryism, for we want none of either) and 'sold' shall I say his birthright for a mess of pottage.

Surely this act of the new M. P. P. is a gross insult to the Reform Party or to what the principles of that party are supposed to be in re Electoral Reform; and it serves to reflect odium on it as well as to discredit to a great extent the man who causes it. He makes no public explanation—and surely none satisfactory can be made in the face of facts—and subject members of the party who elected him to humiliation and derision because of his act at the outset of his career when there was most important and even notorious opportunity for placing himself on record as a genuine Reformer who at least had courage and intelligence enough to show true and fast colors for electoral purity and reform in the character and occasion of an important vote cast.

The sources from which these derisive remarks emanate—as notably from machine Grits and their press—indicate plainly that in trying to make their point against the Reform Party they virtually admit the conscious guilt of the Government in the vote of the Speaker's chair. For the Reform Party to attempt at all to mitigate or palliate the seriousness of their member's vote on the question redounds to their own discredit and will not become the grand principles which they stand for.

Do not the long suffering and humiliated people readily see that the game of the Local Machine Government was clearly to whitewash the man Farrell by electing him again to the Speaker's chair despite the fairly proven allegations laid to his door; and likewise to serve as a double coat of whitewash to that Government or party's favorite idol the famous or rather notorious son of Nova Scotia, W. S. Fielding, as Farrell was his right and left-handed man in the recent Sheburne-Queens election case.

her parents. Dr. Kennedy has had opportunity for a wide and varied study of Natural Science, which a mind of more than ordinary clearness and a capacity for grasping and remembering details enabled him to utilize to the full. He possessed large and valuable collections of rocks, fossils and specimens of marine life. All those throughout the Province who have come under his instruction will learn of his departure with regret, and will join with a host of friends in sympathy for the bereaved.

The funeral took place on Monday afternoon from his late home. Rev. R. F. Dixon conducted the services, and the interment was in the cemetery of St. John's church. The members of St. John's Lodge, A. F. & A. M. attended, and performed the customary Masonic rites at the grave.

He subsequently took a post-graduate course at the Sheffield Scientific School at Yale, and in 1871 was made instructor in the Applied Science Department of McGill.

In 1873 he was elected Professor of Natural Science by the Governors of Acadia College and came to Wolfville in 1874 to succeed Prof. Elder. He was an enthusiastic, diligent and painstaking teacher and awakened much interest in science studies. When the college building was erected he was especially serviceable in designing the plans for the new museum and in replacing the minerals lost by fire.

In 1882 he accepted a similar position in King's College, where in addition to the department of Chemistry and Geology he was librarian and curator of the museum and from 1887 to 1890 vice president. Two years ago he resigned active work and removed to Wolfville, but later he has been in declining health.

He leaves a widow who was Miss Rima Longard, daughter of the late John D. Longard, of Halifax, and a daughter, Maude, who resides with

I'm sorry, now, I gave so very little thought to all the helpful lessons which my patient mother taught. Now older grown, and she has gone. I often long to tell how they all come back to me, each one remembered well.

For in the work and cares of life that come from day to day, I find I stop to ask myself, "What was my mother's way?" There never seemed to be with her a drudgery of life. She got along so quietly with all its cares and strife; She always sang, about her work, and mid perplexing things The farmhouse walls re-echoed, "Rise, my soul, and stretch thy wings. I never hear old 'Amsterdam' but that I think how oft It bore my mother's soul from earth to unseen things aloft!

When sitting in her rocking chair, her lap with mending piled, She used to say, 'I want to rest, now read a psalm my child.' I learned by heart about the 'hills, and lifting up my eyes,' "Thou pastor green" and waters still The shepherd's love supplies, and all about 'Abiding' health the shadow of his wing.

For God our refuge is, our strength, I read in everything. Sometimes I hurried through the Psalms, taking but little heed, And then her thanks, so kindly said, encouraged me to read Some of the words that Jesus spoke, for that was mother's way To read from Psalms and Gospels both upon the busiest day; For at such times she needed a much longer rest, and so, While but a child, I learned the favored passages to know.

These precious words of quiet come to my own soul now I A busy woman, full of work, my daily duties ply. I sing her hymns when fretted with ceaseless rounds of care, I repeat the Psalms and Gospels when in my sewing chair, I wonder if she knows it, and how glad I am each day, That my mother's way of resting was such a hopeful way.

Fruits of the Traffic.
There died a few days since, in a cell of the Winnipeg police station, a woman who but a short time ago was one of the most popular concert singers. She was the wife of a Minneapolis millionaire. The coroner having attributed her death to alcoholism. The wife and five children of a German settler in Manitoba were recently frozen to death. The man had gone to a near-by village for fuel and could have returned with it at once, for there was no storm. He got to drinking and remained away three or four days, and before he reached home his wife and children perished.

At the license-granting meeting of the Halifax City Council, last week, Rev. J. W. Aikens, Methodist minister, made these three charges against licensed drink shops in the city: (1) In a bar-room was a half intoxicated man with a group of others. They asked for drinks and forcibly took the money out of the man's pockets to pay for them. (2) In a bar-room a half drunken man was taken by his companions, who bought liquor and forced it down his throat. (3) Children had come home and told their parents that liquor had been given to them free by a dealer.

These are only samples of what the liquor traffic does. Numberless things equally as horrible are being done by it every day in the year. How many men who pose as good citizens signed the applications for license and the fellows who carry on the traffic of degradation and death? Petitions are being presented to the Ontario Legislature asking for amendment of the clause in the Local Option Law which requires a three-fifths vote to adopt prohibition.

'One of the Grandest.'
The Mayor of Salford, speaking at a great Temperance parade on Saturday, said "The Temperance cause was often derided, but it was one of the grandest missions to which one could put hand and heart." It is one of the grandest, and it is one of the most urgent. Long ago, in another part of Lancashire, the late Prince Leopold, Duke of Albany, said that drunkenness was the only enemy England had to fear. The Mayor of Salford had to say it differently, but with equal accuracy, when he said that "England need fear no foreign foe so long as her people were faithful to themselves, so long as she had a sober, righteous, and manly race of brave and God-fearing men and women."
