Signs in the East Herald a Rise in the Price of Tea.
London, Feb. 4.—It does not take a prophet nor the son of a prophet to foretell a rise in the price of tea. Apart from the signs playing across the commercial horizon, the world is full of omens that the right way the right place, which make the higher cost of tea as sure and certain as the continued existence of the tea trade. Cheerfully and gallantly we have shipped our favorite blend of Indian and Ceylon teas and perhaps wondered how the blender had managed to give us all the generous strength of the former with the fine flavor of the latter at a few cents more per pound for our favorite blend that never crossed our mind. 'An Indefensible Dismissal.'

The Western Chronicle of the 15th inst. editorially waxes indignant at what it terms the 'indefensible dismissal' of Mr. Rufus Starr as foreman of the Experimental Farm at Kentville. It takes great pains in elaborating upon Mr. Starr's political views and leanings as well as upon his qualifications. It also attempts to make political capital against Mr. Starr, M. P., by inferring that he is either a prevaricator or deficient in backbone. We take it for granted that this glib editor of the shrew-town has been in communication with Mr. Starr—otherwise the latter should beg to be delivered from his friends.

In the first place Mr. Rufus Starr was never appointed to a permanent position at the Experimental Farm. He was employed by the Liberal administration at Ottawa in a purely temporary sense, but for what? Mr. Starr was, and is, only a collector of Customs at Port Williams. He has received his salary at such, and in addition one hundred dollars per month as temporary foreman at the Experimental Farm. Mr. Starr has already received a liberality of treatment from the Conservative government at Ottawa, quite unexpected to many, but no doubt upon the kind recommendation of Mr. Foster. Notwithstanding the sinister insinuations of Mr. Starr's spokesman we trust Mr. Foster and the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa will be permitted to survive such indignation.

The Western Chronicle says that Mr. Starr does not consider himself a Liberal since when, pray? If Mr. Starr will state that he ever failed to vote for Sir Frederick Borden since he had a vote we will accept his word, not otherwise. It is quite possible that he is anxious for the public to know that he is not a supporter of Mr. Wickwire, and he will state that he never voted for that gentleman. We will believe that. If he will say that he voted for Mr. Foster we will even take his word for that. We do not see where the political element comes in. Mr. Starr was drawing pay for and acting in a double capacity, but why we cannot explain, unless upon the ground that he was the only man capable of holding the position of Collector of Customs at Port Williams and likewise the only man capable of acting as temporary foreman of the Experimental Farm at Kentville.

Mr. Starr's services were no longer required at the Experimental Farm and he was politely so informed from Ottawa. Mr. Gray, who is now the acting foreman, is an expert and has had an extended training at the Experimental Farm at Ottawa. We do not know his politics, neither do we care. We do hope, however, that Mr. Rufus Starr will now have time to mullize his friend of the Western Chronicle and attend to his duties as Collector of Customs at Port Williams.

The Manitoba Boundaries.

The Morning Chronicle, of Halifax, the St. John Telegraph, and sundry other newspapers of a like faith, are working overtime in manufacturing romances as to the great danger the Borden Cabinet are now passing through, because of the certain revolt of the ultra Catholic element in the Conservative party from the province of Quebec. This revolt, or bolt, was to take place over the school question connected with the settlement of the boundary legislation for Manitoba. The whole opposition circle of the mendacious order has sedulously propagated the story that the Catholics of Quebec would insist upon separate schools for the annexed territory. Would it be reasonable to believe such a nonsense as that these Conservative Catholics, after suffering under an anti-Catholic law for fifteen years, would seize the first opportunity of making trouble for the present government? We can tell these paid trouble seekers that separate schools is not an issue at all. That no split will occur in the Conservative ranks from Quebec Premier Roblin's government in the past has been generous to the Catholic minority of Manitoba, and no one but silly romancers who write for the Grit press, think other than that he can be relied upon to continue to do so in the future.

The Boy Scout Movement.

The Rev. Geo. T. Bryant, who is to occupy the Rev. J. W. Frestwood's pulpit next Sunday morning and evening, is an enthusiastic Scout and may be regarded as the pioneer of the movement in Kings county.

On his removal from Bernuda into the Berwick circuit about two years ago, he was impressed by two things in connection with his new charge, the utter paucity of young men between 15 and 20 years of age, and the exceptional brightness of a class of boys whose ages ranged from 12 to 15. Consequently he lost no time in organizing Miss Alcorn's bright boys into a boys' club called 'The Searchers,' which was the first boys' class to be registered under the 'New Movement Plan' in Nova Scotia.

Out of the 'Searchers' he formed the Revere Patrol as the nucleus of the First Berwick Troop (11th in this province) of Baden-Powell's (Canadian) Boy's Scouts, and, falling a volunteer for the Scoutmaster's position, himself assumed that position. Equally impossible it was to secure the use of suitable premises for headquarters, but, not to be outdone, the pastor fitted up a corner of his own barn for a gym, and rendezvous, while one of his sitting-rooms was given up twice a week as a well stocked library for the use of the 'Searchers' and the 'Revere,' who were not slow to avail themselves of such conveniences. It was not long before a second patrol had to be enrolled from the juniors, who were called 'Eagles,' and yet a third, a little later, was added chiefly from the boys of the Baptist church. At the beginning of this year, in consequence of his appointment as District Commissioner, the Rev. Mr. Bryant found it necessary to resign for a time, the Scoutmaster's position, in which he was succeeded by the Assistant Scoutmaster, Mr. Gordon Wright, a young Englishman, who had acted in a similar capacity in the Old Country, before emigrating to seek his fortune by farming in the 'Land of Evangeline.'

Mr. Bryant's brother is equally active in the capacity of assistant Scoutmaster in the city of Halifax, while their father, a retired R. N. Lieutenant, who died in his time between Halifax, Berwick and the dear old homeland, is never so happy as when he is instructing the boys preparatory to the passing of their tests for efficiency badges.

It is only natural, therefore, that the 'First Wolfville' should honor the occasion of the District Commissioner's week-end visit by holding a public meeting next Saturday evening. His worship the Mayor will preside. Mr. Bryant will be the speaker of the evening, but addresses will also be delivered by a number of leading citizens, including Scoutmaster Percy Brown, who has striven to do for Wolfville what Mr. Bryant has done for Berwick. Through the sympathetic co-operation of Mr. Archibald, the use of one of the College halls has been secured for this event. As a result of this meeting it is hoped to establish the local Association that will undertake the control of the troop.
