#### Patriotic Fund Meeting

Move Made to Increase Maximum Allowances to \$40. a Month

The West Northumberland Branch of the Patriotic Fund met on Tuesday evening. Present: Revs. W J Bate and C W Squires, and Messrs. W A Park, H H Stuart and E P Williston.

Mr. Park occupied the chair. Application of Mrs Judson Porter, South Nelson, for grant on account of her son No. 793199 Pte. Wm Tozer of the 132nd who enlisted on Dec. 17, 1915, was received and the usual allowance was granted. There are four children, aged 7, 9, 11 and 13.

The allowance of Mrs Bertha Gerish Quarryville was increased to \$35 from February 1st.

Mrs Louis Ginnish was dropped from the list, she now drawing a pension.

Mrs Basil McDonald's grant was increased to \$19 a month, and it was resolved that she be transferred to Chatham District from March 1st, as she has removed to Bayside.

Four applications for separation allowance were signed by the chairman.

The following was moved by H. H Stuart:

"That, in accordance with the authorization recently received from the Canadian Patriotic Fund, Ottawa, the maximum allowance to soldier's families be increased to \$40.00 a month, to take effect March 1st next."

This was held over till next meeting on account of the small attendance.

#### MALCOLM E AMOS NOW A LIEUTENANT

The many friends of Malcolm E Amos of Lower Derby, N B, will be pleased to learn of his recent promotion to Lieutenant. Lieut Amos enlisted as a private in August, 1915 with the 56th Battalion. Previous to that he was with the 72nd Regiment doing duty at the Wireless Station in Newcastle. After the arrival of the 56th in England he was gradually promoted to Sergeant, and when the Battalion was broken up and the members sent in drafts to France he was detained in England as an instructor; He was transferred into different Reserve Battalions as instructor after taking a couple of courses at Hythe and finally was transferred to the 26th Nova Scotia Reserve. After repeated efforts to get to the Front he was at last permitted to go in May 1917 when he reverted to private in order to get across, and he was then attached to the 25th Nova Scotia Battalion. He wasn't long in France however until he won back two stripes and after the big engagement on August 15th last he was recommended for a commission. He has been in England about three months taking the course necessary to qualify as Lieutenant, and word has just been received that it has been successfully completed.

### North Shore Boys' Conference at Chatham

About Sixty Boys Have Canadian Standard Efficiency Tests Explained to Them

The first North Shore Boys' Conference on Canadian Standard Efficiency Tests was held in St. Luke's Hall, Chatham, Friday evening, Saturday and Sunday, 15th-17th instant, under the Superintendence of Rev. L. A. Buckley of Halifax, Director of Boy's work in the Maritime Provinces, in connection with the Y. M. C. A.

The first session commenced at 8 p. m. Friday, with about 60 boys over fourteen years of age present from Campbellton, Newcastle, Douglstown, New Mills and Chatham.

Rev. J. J. Pinkerton presided. An address of welcome was given by Rev. John Harris of St. John's Church, Chatham.

Representatives from each of the denominations present assured the boys of the interdenominational character of the gathering and emphasized the fact that all were allies.

At 4 o'clock the boys went to the College rink, where the Campbellton boys played the boys of Chatham a score of 6 to 9 in favor of Chatham the Campbellton boys putting up a good game but being smaller on the average than those of Chatham. Both sides played a good game and the best of good fellowship prevailed.

### Germans Again Raid London

Three Attempts by Air Made on Three Successive Nights—Some Casualties

Six German airplanes attempted to attack London on Saturday night, but only one of them succeeded in reaching the capital. This raider dropped one bomb which demolished a house in the south western district and buried an invalid officer and his wife and two children. Several other bombs were dropped by the raiders on the outskirts on its way in. An attack which was delivered against Dover about 10:45 was driven off, some bombs being dropped in open country. On Sunday night six or seven air planes took part in the raid. The first flew over London, dropping bombs in various districts. All the others were turned back.

The casualties in Sunday night's air raid were 16 killed and 37 injured. It was officially announced this afternoon. The report on Saturday night's was killed 9 men, 5 women and 3 children. Injured, 1 man and 3 children.

German fliers took advantage of another clear moon-light night on Monday to attempt to drop bombs on London. Their attack was a failure as far as the metropolis was concerned. The fire of barrage guns on the outskirts of London was heavy for two hours. The work of both the gunners and the airmen seems to have been the best yet shown.

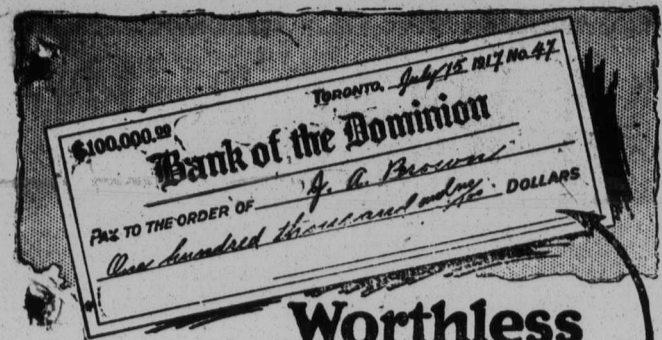

Quebec Province to be Bone Dry

Absolute Prohibition to Take Effect One Year from May 1st Next

Hon. Walter G. Mitchell's bill providing for a bone-dry prohibition for Quebec province with the exception of the sale of wine for sacramental purposes and of intoxicating liquors for medical, mechanical, manufacturing or industrial purposes has been put through the second and third reading stages in the legislative assembly, passed by the Upper House and signed by the Governor. The act is to take effect May 1st, 1919.

Millerton Women's Institute

Did Much Work for Red Cross and Halitax Sufferers

The following is a report of the Millerton Women's Institute from July 19, 1917, to Dec 13, 1917

A meeting of the Institute of the Institute was held each month with an average attendance of 18 members and 3 visitors.

At the September meeting it was suggested that each member bring \$1.00 or more to the October meeting. This was done and the sum of \$59.25 was collected.

Mrs D R Brown and Miss Florence Lyon were appointed the Red Cross Committee in July.

On Nov 22 the Red Cross shipped a box to the I O D E Fredericton containing:

2 quilts, 61 hospital shirts, 6 face cloths, 29 sheets, 10 pyjama suits, 2 pillows, 5 pillow slips, 23 cup covers. Donated by Mrs John Betts.

On Jan 17 the Institute shipped 2 boxes of clothing to the Halifax Relief Committee:

Paris, Feb 14—Bolo Pasha was sentenced to death, the Court Martial deliberating for only fifteen minutes. Darius Porchore, an accountant who was a co-defendant, was sentenced to three years imprisonment.

Paul Dolo Pasha's Court Martial was one of the first of the so-called cases of "intelligence with the enemy" and came up for trial before the third Court Martial of Paris on Feb 14. Bolo Pasha was charged with having capitalized the company that bought the Paris newspaper Le Journal with money obtained from Germans.

Provincial Premiers Meet at Ottawa

And Discuss Questions Having Weighty Bearing on Canada's Future

A meeting of the Provincial Premiers began at Ottawa on the 15th. The agenda of the conference was:

- 1—Co-operation in a campaign for greater food production.
2—The problem of agricultural labor.
3—The re-habilitation of returned soldiers.
4—The formation of an immigration policy suitable for the whole Dominion and in which the provinces can co-operate.
5—The problem of fuel, with a view to preventing a scarcity next winter.
6—The handing over of the natural resources to the western provinces.

I never got any of the boxes that you sent me to France. I like this Hospital very well. I will close hoping this letter finds you all well.

Following is the extract from a letter received by Mrs Duncan Munn from her husband, Driver Duncan Munn:

Witley Camp, England, Jan. 20

Just a line to let you know I have just returned from my trip to Scotland, which I enjoyed very much. I did see some wonderful sights. The people were very kind to me and gave us our Xmas dinner free. They seemed as though they couldn't do enough for us.

I have met Otto Betts and Pete and James Arbeau and Willie Russell since coming here. They are just a few huts from me. They are all looking fine. I expect we will soon be crossing the channel, as the casualties in artillery have been pretty heavy and we will have to reinforce them, I suppose. But, of course, that is what we came over here for, and we may just as well go now and get it over with. Tell mother I'll write to her soon. Give my regards to all my friends. The tobacco here is not like the tobacco we used to get in old Canada. We are going to riding school, learning to be rough riders. Believe me, we are having the time of our lives here. I like the place fine out here. I have not met Fred Rushton or David Ward yet. I am sending you a souvenir from England. Hope you will like it. Write soon as a letter from home is like sunshine after a week of cloudy weather.

**THE RUSSIAN MUDDLE**

Russia, whose government on the 10th instant refused to sign peace on Germany's terms, which were that she should relinquish to the Central powers all of Poland, Lithuania, Courland, part of Livonia and the Estonian islands, without any guarantee as to their future and all this over and above acknowledging the independence of Ukraine, was again attacked by German troops on the 18th. And it is reported that the Maximalist government of Russia, having its hands full with the support of its Maximalist allies in Eastern Ukraine and the Cossack states and enemies nearer home, has at last agreed to Germany's terms.

The Ukraine is split in two. The Maximalists have set up a workmen's republic in the east in alliance with Russia, while the west of the country has made peace with and opened its arms to the Central powers. Meanwhile the Maximalists have taken the capital. To offset this the Austrians and Germans will help the Ukrainian Rada keep on its feet and incidentally make it an Austro-German dependency.

The Anti-Maximalist Cossacks seem to have been beaten and a Maximalist republic set up in their country.

Romania is reported to have made an alliance with the Ukraine Rada, Romania to have the province of Bessarabia, which lies between Romania and the Dniester and is peopled mostly by Roumanians rescued by Russia from Turkey in 1812. This alliance will be used by the central powers to obtain peace with Romania, the latter country to have Bessarabia, with 17,000 square miles and 2,500,000 in exchange for her territory south of the Danube called Dobruzsch, with 5,500 square miles and less than 1,000,000 people which she will be required to cede to Bulgaria. Roumania, besides, will have to enter the Central Alliance.

If Russia has submitted to the enemy, the European crisis becomes acute, resembling that of 1807, when Russia after Prussia's defeat, deserted the British Alliance and went over to Napoleon for four years, leaving Britain for a while without a single unconquered ally. We are not so badly off however as in 1807, for France and Italy are almost free of the enemy's troops and the United States is daily becoming a more powerful factor in the war. While the situation is very serious, it is not by any means desperate, and the chances are still in our favor. The direction of the war on the whole western front has been placed under a war Council at Versailles, which will give unity of Command and ensure the greatest possible concentration of forces and co-operation of effort.

Jack Pickford, the strenuous young Paramount star in Ghost House, finding himself too young to be accepted by the government in the army, has gone into fighting on his own account and recently appeared in a four round boxing match at a local boxing club. It was generally thought around the studios that Jack was rather lacking in energy and it caused a great deal of consternation when it was learned that this clever young actor had been arising every morning at six and undergoing rigorous training at the hands of an experienced fighter. In the boxing match Pickford came off victorious. Mr. Pickford's next recent picture, "The Ghost House," will be shown on Friday at the Happy Hour also extra attractions Fatty at Coney Island.

**Progress of The War**

Canadian Army Headquarters in France, via London, Feb. 18.—On the eve of an historic dinner to commemorate the arrival of the first Canadian division in France three years ago, the Canadians raided the enemy lines near Hill 70 and in front of Lens, capturing a total of ten prisoners and two machine guns. At approximately the same time, farther south at Hargicourt, other Canadians again crossed one hundred yards of No Man's Land, took thirteen prisoners and two machine guns, destroyed four trench mortars and bombed both the enemy's front and support lines.

These raids confirm the presence of crack German troops opposite the Canadians, the prisoners taken belonging to the First Guards Regiment.

The British again have hit the Turk line in Palestine a hard blow Northwest of Jerusalem they have penetrated Turkish positions to a depth of two miles on a front of six miles.

Steal out into the Strait of Dover, German torpedo boat destroyers early Friday morning made another of their sudden attacks on small British craft, sinking eight of them—seven drifters and one trawler. Having carried out their work of destruction the Germans beat a hasty retreat to the north before British naval forces could engage them.

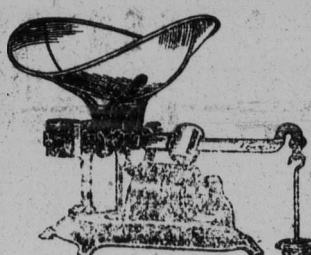

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any man over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter section as pre-emption. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00. Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honourably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

### Many Babies Burned to Death

**Top Story of Grey Nunnery Used as Infants Dormitory Destroyed**

The lives of many little children were blotted out shortly after 8 o'clock Thursday night by fire in the top story of the west wing of the Grey Nunnery in Montreal. Thirty-eight charred bodies were found by the firemen when the fire was under control. It is known that while firemen and soldiers were engaged in rescuing infants they were forced to leave many to die as the flames and smoke drove the rescuers from the building. The property loss is not extensive as the blaze was practically kept to the floor. The top floor was used as a dormitory for infants being cared for by the nuns and the lower part of the west wing was occupied by returned sick and wounded soldiers.

The cause of the fire is supposed to have been a spark from the switch of the X-ray machine in the soldiers' hospital, which was immediately under the floors destroyed.

During the night the firemen recovered a number of bodies of babies. At 9:30 Friday morning there were 55 little bodies in the mortuary of the playroom of the institution, taken out by men of the salvage corps. There were 170 infants in the section destroyed.

Friday morning many young mothers, whose children have been placed in the institution for care besieged the sisters for information about their little ones. None of the bodies are recognizable. The monetary loss on the building will be \$125,000 upon which there is \$100,000 insurance.

### British Chief of Staff Displaced

**Unity of Control and Action Indispensable to Allied Success**

London, Feb. 18—The withdrawal of Gen Sir Wm Robertson as head of the Imperial General Staff, the climax of a long struggle between the soldiers and politicians, has thrown the country into the biggest political crisis of the year. It comes at a most unfortunate time, for there is every indication that the enemy will soon launch his long expected offensive in the West, and to meet it unity and steadiness are needed on this side of the line.

General Robertson says he did not resign as chief of the British Imperial General Staff, but considers himself dismissed. The question is not material. His removal from the very important post he occupied will go far toward bringing about that unity of control and action that is indispensable if the Allies are to utilize their maximum effort to meeting a very critical stage of the war.

The one point that does matter is that the decisions of the Versailles council should receive the fullest possible support. They represent the unanimous views of the four Allied governments concerned. This council decided that complete unity of action is essential to the successful conduct of the war and it is obvious that in order to obtain such unity the direction of all separate commands must conform to it.

### 200,000 DIED FROM NEGLECT

At a recent conference in New York, Miss Julia C. Lathrop, chief of the Children's Bureau of the Department of Labor, declared that 200,000 children and 15,000 mothers died from neglect in the U.S.A. during 1917.

### Alleged Claim of Bigamy Made

**Man Arrested at Derby Junction by Chief Lucas—Sent to St. John**

A man giving his name as John Hall Knight, now residing in Nova Scotia, called on Tuesday on Dominion Police Inspector Rideout, at Ancton, and told him the following story:

He states he was born in Sheet Harbor, Nova Scotia, and was married in 1909 by Rev. Walter Dean, Methodist Minister, of Newcastle, N. B. who is now residing at some place in Nova Scotia. He states that he and his wife moved west in 1912 to Timmons, Ontario, and in 1914 separated.

They have four children, the eldest being seven years of age and the youngest three years of old. He also says there was an adopted child. Shortly afterwards he discovered his wife was living with a man at Timmons, Ontario. He states that the man and Knight's wife came east in 1914 and took up residence at Derby, about three miles from Newcastle. He believes the man is an employee of the paper mill on the Miramichi.

He also states his wife and the man went through a sort of a marriage ceremony and shortly after she gave birth to a child. He states that this latter marriage took place at South Porcupine in March, 1914. Knight also alleges that the man living with his wife is not registered, but is fit for the draft as he is only thirty years of age.

Chief Rideout immediately got in touch with Chief Lucas, of Newcastle, who arrested the man whose name was Barnes, of Rexton, N. B., at Derby Junction, and had the man detained on a charge of violating the Military Service Act. He was sent to St. John on Saturday morning to the Military authorities.

### WHO OWNS THE PROPERTY?

The session of the Appeal Division of the Supreme Court at Fredericton, Friday, was occupied with the hearing of the appeal in the case of Wilson, et al vs. Bell, et al. The case is from Carleton County, and concerns property left by a man who killed his wife and then committed suicide. The case is most unusual and points brought out are of great legal interest. Wilson killed his wife and then hanged himself. The property was owned by both or the survivor. The husband's heirs brought claim. There were two questions involved: The first, as to which one survived the other; the second, as to whether he murdered his wife or was insane at the time of killing her. If it were murder then his heirs could not take the property on account of his crime. The jury found that she survived him and that he murdered her. The motion for a new trial is made by A. B. Connell, K. C. and opposed by Mr. W. P. Jones, K. C. The grounds are verdict was against the weight of evidence, improper admission of evidence and mis-direction. The action was tried before Mr. Justice Chandler and a jury at the Carleton Circuit in November. The court considers:

### NO VOTE TO SOUTH AFRICAN WOMEN

The South African House of Assembly on the 12th, by a vote of 64 to 60, rejected a motion in favor of incorporating a paragraph in the electoral reform bill, giving the franchise to women.

### EGG PRICES TOO HIGH

W. F. O'Connor, Canada's Cost of Living Commissioner, reports that on February first instant Montreal egg dealers had more than twice as many eggs on hand as a year ago; also that during January 3,053 dozens of eggs spoiled in Montreal. He reiterates this opinion that egg prices are too high.

## ALL RAIL ROUTE to Prince Edward Island

With the inauguration of the car ferry service between the two nearest points of land, Port Borden and Cape Tormentine, a distance of eleven miles, Prince Edward Island may virtually be said to be connected with the mainland by rail.

Hitherto freight, mails, and express have had to be unloaded from the train at Charlottetown and Summerside, transferred to the steamer, unloaded from the steamer at Pictou and Point du Chêne and reloaded on the train. It took about four hours to load the vessel, from three to four hours to cross the Strait, and about the same time to unload. This at four points, and then only for eight months in the year.

At Port Borden a standard gauge track has been constructed alongside the Island track, so that freight can be conveniently transferred from the smaller Island cars to the larger ones operated on the Canadian Government Railways mainland lines, the latter having double the capacity. Thus there will be in actuality standard mainland freight cars loaded on the island ready for the mainland rails. The car ferry, "Prince Edward Island," is capable of carrying twelve freight cars, which means freight will be landed from the Island on to the mainland without breaking bulk, and vice versa. In other words, a through freight service has been established between Prince Edward Island and the mainland railways. The twelve cars are capable of carrying a tonnage equal to one steamer load. The ferry is scheduled to cross the Strait in an hour, tranship its cars and be ready in less than an hour to recross the Strait again with a similar cargo. This at two points only and by a route which is confidently expected to be operated the year round.

A refrigerator car service for perishable goods is to be established. Another important feature is that heavy freights, such as undressed lumber and coal which has up to the present been dependent upon sailing craft, can now be assured of through rail carriage. Special facilities are being provided for the unloading of coal shipments, and development may be expected along similar lines where commodities require special handling.

Express, mail and baggage will be transferred at Port Borden, but until the Island Railway gauge is standardized there will not be any necessity to ferry passenger cars. The "Prince Edward Island" provides a handsomely furnished first-class saloon, dining room, ladies' room, gentlemen's smoking room, and second class accommodation, so that the comfort of the passengers while crossing on the ferry will be well looked after.

Under the winter passenger schedule the ferry will make one round trip a day.

The summer service contemplates two round trips of the ferry daily (Sunday excepted), which will mean that passengers from the Island will be able to arrive at Halifax much earlier in the evening, and also make connection with the two expresses, the "Ocean Limited" and the "Maritime Express," for the west. From the mainland there is to be connection with the two expresses from the west, and passengers from the east will arrive at their destinations on the Island much earlier.

So that with a passenger, mail and express daily service the year round, the saving in time and money of handling freights—one transshipment instead of four, and through one terminal instead of four, a frequent freight service with refrigerator facilities for perishable goods and without breaking bulk—the ferry making such extra trips as business warrants—rail shipments of heavy freights, connection in the open season with the two expresses from the west and the earlier arrivals on Prince Edward Island, the new route must lead to the greater development of the "Garden of the Gulf," a freer intercourse between its people and those on the mainland, and be a powerful factor in removing its feeling of isolation from the rest of the Dominion—an improvement of conditions in which Canada, and particularly Eastern Canada, will equally participate.

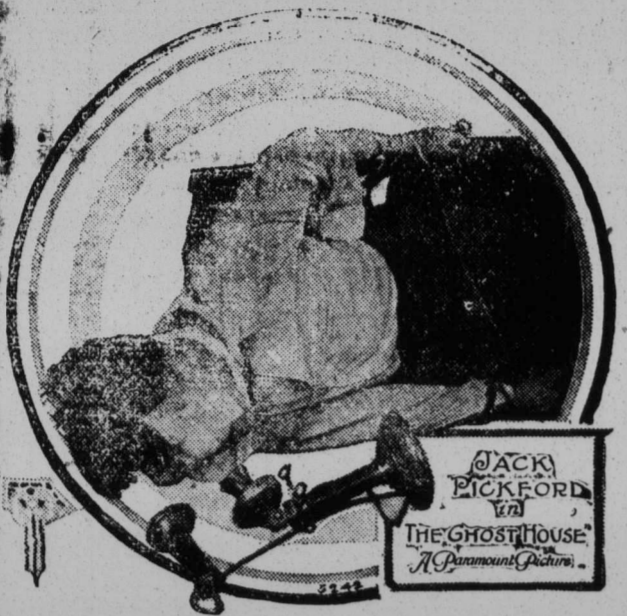

The Department of Agriculture has ordered wheat and oats through the Seed Branch, Ottawa. The germination is carefully tested

This seed is now stored in the elevators at Quebec, thus avoiding transportation difficulties and guaranteeing delivery. The department requests the co-operation of the County Councils in the distribution. Seed will be forwarded at their order in car lots, thus avoiding local freights and such handling.

Wheat will cost about \$2.00 per bushel in bags laid down. The seed branch is yet unable to fix the price on oats. Definite prices will be stated in this space immediately they are at hand.

New Brunswick is expected to bread herself for the duration of the war. Every farmer should grow some wheat.

Agricultural Societies should arrange orders early. Send all your orders to the County Councillors immediately.
