A hugh serpent mould has been discovered in the Carthage road, between Quincy, Ill., and Carthage, by the Rev. S. D. Peet. A clearly defined rattlesnake lies coiled along the ground, following the line of the bluff. Its entire length is 1,450 feet. The ridge has been plowed down until now it is only two or three feet above the surface, but the outlines are still plainly discernible. 
