At Last Yields to the Demands of Russia—Administration Displeas-ed Czar—Persian Charge d'Affaires Announces Decision to Foreign Office.

London. Dec. 22-Persia tcday yielded to the demand of the Russian ltimatum that W. Morgan Shuster, an American, who holds the post of treasurer-general in the Persian government, be dismissed from the service of the Persian government. The Russian ultimatum also calls for the payment of an indemnity, which is to reimburse Russia for money expended in sending an armed expedition into

Persia to enforce her demands.
